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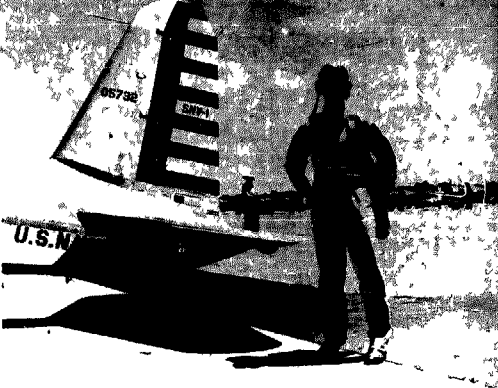

Bond Issue To Be Voted On in Woods

Council Takes Action to Submit Proposition to Raise \$265,000 to Residents

The Woods Council took a decisive action Tuesday night providing for a special election on Monday, September 13 to act upon a proposed bond issue of \$265,000.

The sum to be used in the elaborate water works project is to be used for the combined operation of the Woods Village Gratiot township and the County Road Commission.

So great has been the trouble suffered by the citizens as a result of the flood water nuisance that it is expected there will be no doubt about the approval of the voters. Only so much of the issue will be sold as is necessary to meet the Village's commitments.

Counterfeit Season Tickets for Park's Beach Unearthed

More Than 300 Picked Up By Gate Attendants Residents Complain About Conditions to Village Authorities

The problem of making an all five to six acre park suffice for the bathing and recreational needs of a community of several thousand persons plus the unusual strain placed on all public park facilities at this period because of travel restrictions imposed by war conditions plus the trouble in obtaining matured and suitable attendants have developed a difficult situation for the Park Village authorities.

The general dissatisfaction of the residents has found expression in the formation of a group who have already taken the matter up with the Park authorities represented by Commissioner French in charge of Parks and Recreation Village Manager Lane and Park Superintendent Brown. These two groups have already had one meeting held last Saturday.

Not Enough Space
Manager Lane says the root cause of the trouble is that there is not enough Park space and that as a result a great many persons are denied vacant on going lots in the Woods community.

This problem Mr. Lane says has been further aggravated by the instant scheming of many persons non residents of the Village to enjoy the park.

Under the Park use regulations every bona fide resident family in the Park must pay a fee.

Assistant Postmaster General Says He Will Give Attention to Problem

Congressman Louis C. Rabaut of the 14th Congressional District of Michigan is a part has not pointed the ambitions of this area for a better postal service.

No New Buildings

Woods Weeds Cause Protest

Citizens Complain to Council and Demand Enforcement of Village Ordinance

Some of the petitioning citizens reminded the councilmen there was an ordinance in existence under which they could compel owners of vacant, weed encumbered lots to cut the weeds and remove them at their own expense.

But the councilmen did not see the necessity of enforcing the ordinance because it has stood unenforced since its passage on September 1, 1929.

A formal compromise was reached with the protesting citizens present to have the police patrol the area when a part of the work was complained of and so not to be on the property or to cut and remove the weeds.

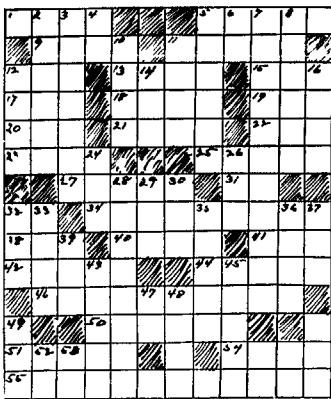

were issued for the two seasons 1942-43. Along with the cards goes a form of guest ticket with provisions for the margin for the admission of 20 guests during a single season which are purchased out of pocket.

Recently it was discovered that counterfeit season admission cards had been issued. This was learned when it was noted that the numerals 1942-43 printed in pale blue ink across the face of the card were in slightly smaller figures.

More than 300 of these counterfeit cards have been picked up at the park gate in recent days. Obviously Park Beach season admission cards were deemed valuable by some one that they took it upon themselves to print bogus cards. These cards must have been sold and it would not seem beyond the sleuthing capacity of the Village authorities to trace them back to their origin.

Citizens Sympathetic

The group of citizens who have conferred with the Village authorities on the Park Beach problem declare that it is made clear they recognize the difference with which the author is completely opposed and have no complaint further than to urge a more stringent control over admissions to the Park. They feel that unless the Park is rigidly restricted to the legitimate users the place will be completely ruined and destroyed as a bathing and recreation spot for the Park citizens destroyed.

Insistent on this point, Dr. and Mrs. Lyndie R. Martin of 828 Middlesex and Dr. Hugh A. Sicker, Mrs. Martin state in a short time the group will have definite recommendations to offer.

But the problem of keeping unwanted park hoppers at a distance involves more than mere supervision over admissions tickets. By hook or crook they scheme to get in. The other day Man Greer Lane was down there when he observed three boys swimming in from the lake. About the time they were ready to get a finger hold on the seawall he invited them to make a round trip swim of it and they did it.

Some Climax Fence
Neither the complaining citizens nor the Park authorities have knowledge of any unusual immoral conditions on the Beach front. This is apparently the only figure in the bill of complaint but it is charged that much of the trouble every day has been due to along the Park beach is due to the presence of hundreds of shifty youngsters and their parents who are not so young who are overrunning the beach.

Both the Park authorities and the complaining citizens agree that much of the trouble is caused by the convenience of Park citizens themselves in violation of the regulations for admission to the Beach.

Too Much Lending
There is entirely too much lending of tickets and guest tickets of taking long faced youngsters who hang around the entrance with them and of paying the admission for guests after they have exhausted the limits of 20 for the season.

It is reported that on a single day recently \$180 dollars was taken in at the gate for the passing admissions. Those who get in about this formality were an uncounted host.

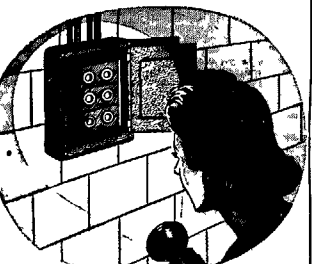

How to STOP FUSE TROUBLE

It's no fun sitting in the dark simply because a blown fuse has plunged your house into a black out. Most fuse trouble can be stopped before it happens by observing a few simple precautions:
(1) Frayed lamp cords and extension cords are often responsible for short circuits. Such frayed cords are dangerous. Have them repaired BEFORE they cause trouble. Don't loop cords over a nail. Don't kink cords or tie them in knots. Don't run cord through a door jamb or under rugs.
(2) Never put an electric appliance in water. Never poke at the element of your electric toaster or any other appliance with a fork or sharp tool, whether turned on or off.
(3) Don't connect too many appliances and extra lamps on one circuit. (4) Be careful not to overload your washer or feed too many pieces of clothing through the wringer at one time. The same is true of your iron.
(5) Disconnect appliances by pulling on the plug—never jerk out the cord. Do not let cords come in contact with water, grease or acids.
