## Stories of Cruelty to Dogs Turn Out to be Idle Gossip

Melicious Rumors Aimed at Farms Police Unsubstantiated in Investigation Carried on by Commissioner Sutton

The week before last this News telephone brought in messages from two different women residing in the Farms telling tales of cruel and barbarous treatment of dogs by the Farms police. Not either of the women were willing to give their names and yet the charges were so damaging and in one instance so specific they could not be ignored.

These charges were that the Farms dog quarters were beat and kicked and often that the howls and cries that emanated from the police quarters were heartrending and terrifying. One of the women informants stated specifically that on the previous Friday she had seen a dog that had been wounded in a club and had dragged himself out into the middle of the street (Korby) where he was deliberately run over by one of the police cars and killed in that manner.

Plan Sponsored by Pointe Rotary Club Expected to Fill Big Need Here

The Grosse Pointe Public Tool Library will be ready to begin functioning in about a week according to Dr. Paul Essert, superintendent of the Pointe school who has just returned from his vacation spent largely in Colorado.

The plan has been sponsored by the Rotary Club of Grosse Pointe. Members have given liberally of tools from their own households and money which to supplement the supply.

## Manager Suggests Park Must Consider Improvement Plans

Projects Costing \$721,000 Suggested for Consideration by Commissioners, Financial Condition Outlined

Village Manager Lane of the Park has just completed eight months of service and took occasion to present a communication to the Commissioners at the meeting on the 19th recasting the financial condition of the Village at this time and to call attention to several important construction projects confronting the municipality with his suggestions for meeting in part this large outlay.

The present Park village debt is \$132,000 less \$907.66 in the sinking fund net \$132,233.82. The total tax rate is \$16.78 per thousand assessed valuation. Forset on next ordinary tax dollar goes to debt service.

**Fire Mala Essential**  
He lists five principal items as main essentials necessary for safe and healthy environmental conditions for the citizens and taxpayers of the village. These are:

1. Reconstruction of sewer system approximately cost \$350,000
2. Resurfacing 11 miles of streets \$10,000
3. Six miles of streets to be paved new from the ground up \$145,000
4. Seven miles of double curbing \$42,000
5. Roadway reclamation project through refuse disposal \$14,000

## Park Council Faces McHugh Case Fight

Arnold Zelenski, Representing Deposed Patrolman, Promises Action After Unscheduled Meeting Is Held

Attorney Arnold Zelenski, representing Park Patrolman Hugh McHugh in his effort to obtain reinstatement on the force, was in an unusual frame of mind when he appeared in the Park Municipal building Monday night all set to hear the Commissioners answer to McHugh's petition. He had been informed he said just an hour or two before that no meeting would be held Monday night was a regularly scheduled meeting. But it was learned that an unscheduled meeting had been held the previous Thursday evening.

At the regular meeting on August 9 Lester Alexander, the acting village attorney, stated that he had not had sufficient time in which to examine the legal aspects of the matter and an understanding had been arrived at with Mr. Zelenski for the postponement of the matter which was agreeable to him.

Mr. Zelenski in his comments to all and sundry in the corridors of the Municipal building Monday night agreed entirely with this understanding. What he did understand was why no meeting was held at which the case could be taken up as per agreement.

**Depends on Reply**  
Mr. McHugh's further action in the matter depends on the reply which the Commission made to his request which is for reinstatement in the police department.

If it is agreed to that ends the matter and Mr. McHugh gets back on the force. If denied legal steps will be instituted through his attorney to obtain a legal adjudication of the matter by competent court jurisdiction. But meanwhile Mr. Zelenski and his client must await the Commission's answer and it is again understood that Mr. McHugh has not had the matter put into the Municipal Council's hands. Frequent field workouts will also help to set the hunter himself in shape for the season, and eliminate opening day sore muscles.

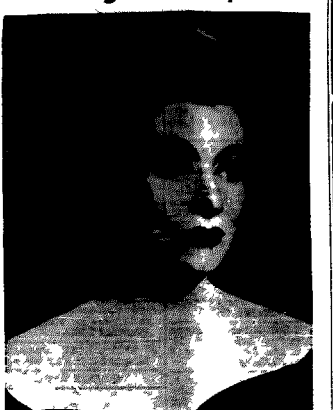
