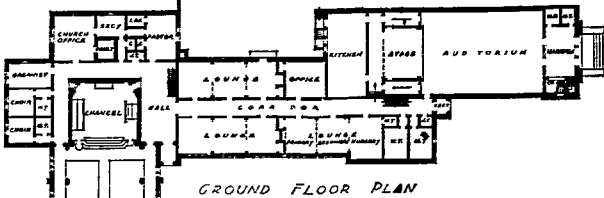

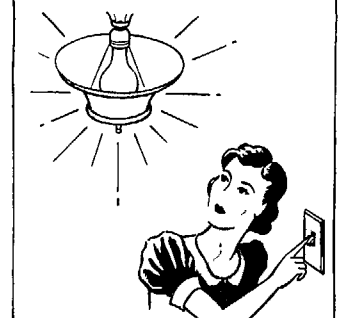

Park Weighs Plan to Keep Pavilion Open

Attempt Being Made to Obtain Fuel Oil to Heat Structure for Skaters

The Park Village is seriously considering the opening of its recreation building in the Beach Park for all winter use this year. Last winter it was closed up because of the difficulty of obtaining the oil fuel required for its heating. Commissioner Frutch, in charge of Parks and Public Recreation, asked Manager Lane to look into the possibility of obtaining the oil this year and Mr. Lane reported Monday night that thus far the best assurance he had been able to obtain was for 1,200 gallons only. It requires about 2,000 gal-

lons for the satisfactory heating of the property through the winter.

of the property through the winter. The property in question is an ornate structure, built some 15-20 years ago at a cost of more than \$20,000 but because of its type of construction with vaulted ceilings it is very hard to heat. It has been used as headquarters for the skaters for several winter past.

The suggestion has recently been made that the property should be utilized for dances for the young people where light refreshments would be served at nominal cost. While not too openly hunted it is believed in some quarters its use in this manner might contribute to the diminishment of juvenile delinquency which is looming as one of the major municipal problems.

This angle of the subject, however, gave rise to serious questioning. Commissioner Moreland believed its use with this motive would fall far short. The place is thoroughly isolated being a mile or more south of Jefferson. He thought that several of the public schools have facilities for social gatherings and recreation for the boys and girls equal in

every respect to anything offered way down on the beach front and in much safer and more central locations, where parents could keep a closer eye on the movements of their children. Similar sentiments were expressed by others including citizens at the audience.

It is necessary however to learn whether sufficient fuel can be obtained before any definite decision is made. The matter was momentarily dismissed with the understanding that Manager Lane would persevere his inquiries for more fuel oil.

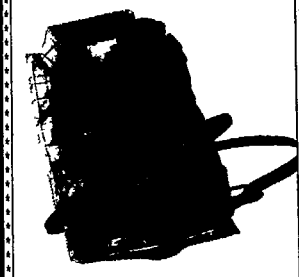

It demonstrated clearly the sustained interest of the people in this branch of salvage and in proportion to the quantity of tin waste in available tin undoubtedly a high collection on.

In the early days of tin collecting before the people had been educated to appreciate the importance of saving and turning over the cans but then there was vasty more on hand the collections were much smaller.

A couple of weeks ago in a year ago last August netted only 7 tons and the week prior 11 tons. This high no net was reached four or five months ago in a collection of 31 1/2 tons.
