How to avoid Wasting Light

Today any waste of electricity is as serious as wasting rubber or gasoline or other critical war materials. When you save electricity you save coal. Here are practical ways to save electricity in your home.

(1) Turn off lights in rooms not occupied and floor or table lamps not immediately in use.

(2) Wipe lamp bulbs frequently to clean reflector bowls and cooling fixtures. Dust wastes as much as one-third of your light.

(3) Flaring lamp shades do a better job of spreading light than straight sided shades. The wider the opening at top and bottom the more useful light is directed into the room.

(4) Avoid dark colored lamp shades (they soak up light) or try fitting them with white linings. Use good white paper and fasten seam with Scotch tape. White linings will often increase the amount of light from the lamp by as much as 50 per cent.

(5) Whenever possible smoke floor and table lamps serve more than one person for reading or sewing. A single lamp on a table, for example, can provide light for chairs on both sides of it. The Detroit Edison Company.

Garden Plots Being Plowed

131 Plots in Lakeview Estate Among Those Which Have Been Turned

The Park Village in common with all the other Pointe municipalities has been doing a lot of fall plowing on victory garden plots preparatory to next season's garden work. This has been strenuously urged by the Victory Garden Council of the Pointe region.

At the Park Commissioners meeting Monday night Commissioner Van Dusen raised the question whether or not the plowing on plots that were not under their control and which might not be available for use next season.

The point in question was that there were 131 garden plots in the Lakesview estate that had been plowed and a village expense.

Village Clerk Staman stated it was true these plots had been plowed and a village expense but that the lots which were not plowed but by private speculation had been actually sold. The lots belonged to the State of Michigan which acquired them by land sale some time ago.

Last year the State readily agreed to sell without cost for Victory Garden plots but this year upon learning that private parties were negotiating for the land he addressed a letter to the State Land Office on October 20 and had the rumor of possible sale confirmed but was informed that the sale had not yet been actually consummated.

Mr. Staman said he had private conversations with the State and he is not prepared to believe that the lots passed to private ownership there would be no question about the availability for victory garden work in a general community plot as in the case of any actual building being done on them before next year was over. It is thought there was some possibility that there and there are some local private water areas which would wish to have lots in use for garden work. In that event the garden work might be held up for a year or so.
