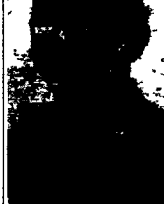

may expect to hear shortly from Major Smith, my commanding officer.

It would not be right for me to give you false hopes but please remember that many men reported lost in this war have been found later. With you I would like to share such a hope though the possibility of his being taken prisoner in event of a safe landing seems highly improbable due to the speed with which our forces won the beaches and vicinity over which Derby's plane was flying.

Of the pilot, co pilot and crew chief of the plane I can say nothing more complimentary than that they were in splendid company—all grand fellows, like Derby.

As you can probably tell I valued Derby very highly—prided from the privilege of knowing a person so innately fine within—miss him very much. We'd been friends since 'ast De

ember at Seattle.

To you, other members of his family, and to his friends, may I say that he had a very considerable part to play in my first step on to the continent—did it, as you might expect, to perfection.

Thank you for giving me this opportunity to give you some information. Please write to me if there is anything further I can do.

Enlisted in 1942

Derby was one of the most popular young men in the Pointe. He schooled at D U S. on Cook road before going to Hotchkiss and the University of Michigan. He was a manufacturers agent in Detroit before he enlisted on July 4, 1942.

He trained at Jefferson Barracks, then was sent to Madison, Wisconsin for special radio training. After completing this course with top marks he was advised by his superior officers to apply for officer training and a commission, which they felt sure would be granted.

Derby told his father later that

he had never applied because he was afraid if he received a commission he would end up in an administrative post and he wanted to fly and fight.

John Farnsworth He received further training at the Redella Air Base in Missouri then was sent to Fort Benning Ga. to train with the Para Troops.

Sergeant Allington is survived by his father, who lives at 77 Monroe road, two sisters, Mrs. Edward E. Evans, Jr and Mrs. Fred Duffield, both of the Pointe's grandmother Mrs. H. M. Gilllette of Bay City, an aunt, Mrs. Richard H. Morgan of Wing Lake and an uncle, Leslie Allington of Cadillac road. He was 30 years old.

man McHugh whose dropping a few months ago is now the subject of litigation in the courts.

Employees Disgraced Grosse Pointe City has no retirement or pension plan in operation. This year in answer to the policemen and firemen's request the city has increased the pension for an increase in pay nor as a pension fund. If they are disabled or become physically unfit to continue their duties they will get the proceeds of these bonds with accrued interest, but meanwhile it is of no help whatever to the men who are living on it. One of them, in discussing the matter the other day figured out he was nearly 28 per month worse off now than he used to be on the old pay and before the withholding taxes, etc. went into effect.

It makes a nice showing for the municipality as a buyer of Government bonds, but butters no parsnips for the policemen and firemen in present day living costs.

### Shores System Best

The Shores village has in effect the most comprehensive and just provisions for its old employees of any of the Pointe municipalities. There they have a retirement fund, applicable to all employees on reaching the age of 80 based in amount on their rates of average pay in the latter years of their service but with a top limit of \$100 per month. In addition they take 5 per cent of the employees pay and place this in escrow as the basis of an annuity payable to him when he retires.

The Farms Village, about five miles out, has a similar retirement fund for its old employees of which the village itself contributes 10 per cent of the taxes \$50,000 in five equal annual installments of \$10,000 each. The \$50,000 fund set aside becomes the backbone for the fund, to which the men, themselves, contribute 2 per cent of their pay if at any time in the future the demands upon the fund exceed both the income from this \$50,000 reserve fund and the 2 per cent payments by the men the village has obligated itself to make up the difference up to a top limit of \$10,000 per year.

May Extend Fund At the present moment there is a strong agitation on to extend the provisions of the retirement fund scheme to all of the employees. The employees have petitioned the Village trustees to make such provision and President Watkins will probably name the committee to study the problem at the next Farms Council meeting. The resolution providing for the naming of such a committee stipulates that it shall be composed of representatives from the trustees, from the employees themselves, and also for representation from the taxpayers.

Up in the Woods village where there are now in process working out the details of a consolidation of their Police and Fire departments into a single executive unit which would be in effect, a department of public safety, although as yet not to be so designated Trustee John Whitty chairman of the committee stated at the Council meeting Tuesday night that he has on the agenda for consideration by his committee the matter of setting up a retirement fund for policemen and firemen in that village.

This committee is composed of only two members, Paul Marco being the other member. The committee is to bring in a report with the detail of all of its re

### Police Rescue Woman from Auto in Lake

**Drives Machine Over Bank In Attempt to Avert Accident On Drive**

There was only a hair line difference between tragedy and a mere offroad automobile accident that came to Mrs. Elsie Stalker Bellitsky of 26400 E. Jefferson St. Clair Shores on Lake shore drive Monday morning.

Mrs. Bellitsky alone in her car was driving south on the Shore drive about 9:45 o'clock in the morning and had just passed Oxford road when she saw a car heading out of Webber's drive. She was going at a fair rate of speed and seeing a roll sign in the distance made an abrupt right turn over the island that divided

the two channels of the drive. **Threatened Again.** Mrs. Bellitsky's story is that she was only partly conscious at the moment she hit the island but was faintly aware that another car was coming up from the south which would not permit her to right her car into the other channel of the drive and compelled her to go directly over the bank into the lake. Her car ran about 30 feet out into the lake before it came to a stop. Fortunately for Mrs. Bellitsky the shore slope was gradual at this point. When she partially revived she was sitting in water up to her neck. She does not yet know whether she opened the door of her car or climbed out of the window but when the Shores police car arrived she was standing on the running board of her car from which position she was rescued.

**Call Police** Mrs. Michael J. Kearns of 74 Oxford road was the driver of the eastbound car whose approach Mrs. Bellitsky says caused her to continue on into the lake. No responsibility for the accident can attach to Mrs. Kearns as she could have had no possible

knowledge that the car on the westbound channel was about to cross her route. The moment she saw the accident she sped to her home which, fortunately was nearby, and telephoned to the Shores police station. From there a radio call was sent out at once for Shores car No. 45 to go to the spot. A request for assistance was also radioed to the Farms police headquarters and they sent out one of their cars. Patrolman Abner of the Woods also arrived on the scene and helped in the rescue. It is figured that Mrs. Bellitsky had been in the icy water for about ten minutes when she was taken off the running board and hurried to her home. She was thoroughly chilled and suffering from shock but otherwise uninjured.

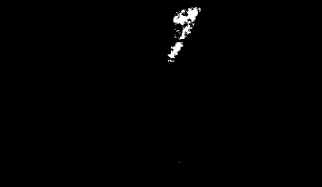

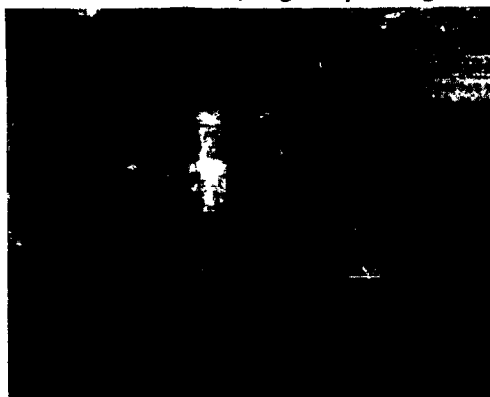

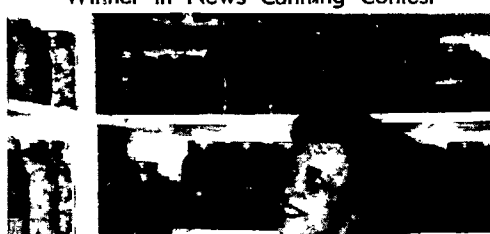

## McHugh Case Promises To Have Long Court Run

The petition for a mandamus to compel the Commissioners of Grosse Pointe Park village to reinstate former Patrolman Hugh McHugh in his place in the Park police force will come up for hearing in Judge Lila Nuenfeldt's court on December 3.

McHugh was not dismissed from the police department but was dropped because of the failure of the Park village to make an appropriation for his job in the annual budget this year.

The contention of his attorney Arnold Zelein is that the position of clerk in the 9th Division Bureau, where Patrolman McHugh was detained, was not actually abolished as a young woman had been installed to do the work he formally performed.

In addition to this contention Attorney Zein claims that the Park had no right to drop McHugh from the Park rolls because of his status as an honorably discharged soldier of the armed forces of the United States. Moreover it is alleged that McHugh's physical and mental condition disqualify him to perform the duties of a patrolman. The village implies the responsibility of retaining him as a permanent fixture in its jurisdiction.

There never was any question of the capabilities and general personal acceptability of McHugh for the job in the Violators Bureau. This issue promises to run a long course through the state courts and has largely been in the limbo through the lack of failure of the Park village to set up a retirement fund which would leave the way clear for the municipality to disburse with the expense of a meritorious and worthy employee in a fair and just manner wherever in his judgment he had earned a time when he was physically unfit to carry on with his prescribed duties.
