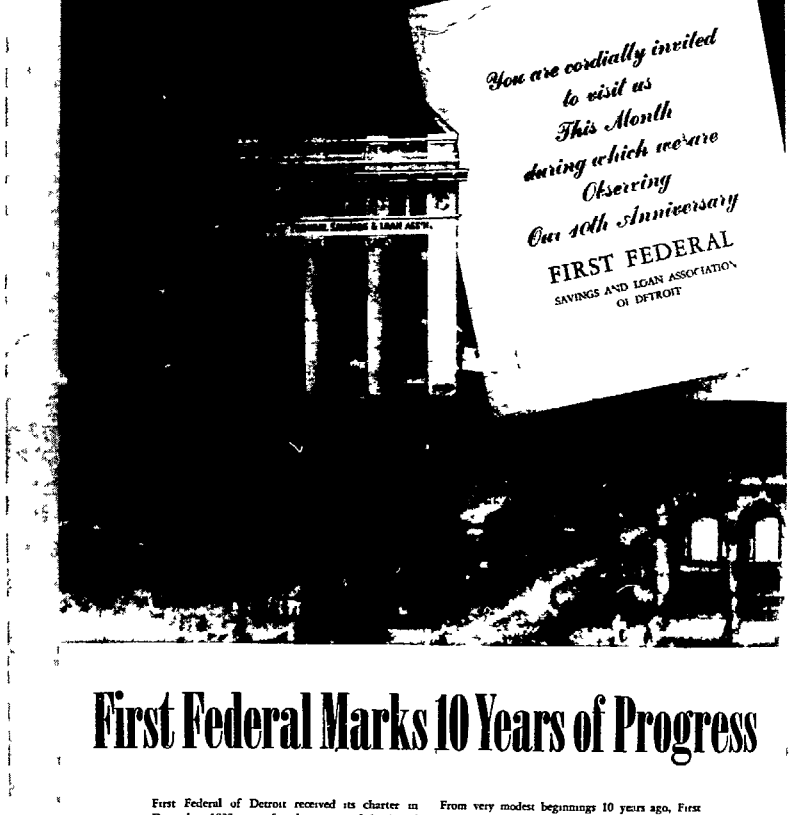

### Status of Men Affected By Consolidation Clarified

#### Woods Council Adopts Resolution While Waiting for Formal Setup Being Prepared by Committee

The committee of the Woods Council consisting of Com. Whittier and Marco, which has been named to prepare a formal set up for the Police and Fire departments of the village and which had expected to present a final report December 7, asked for more time at the Tuesday night meeting in which to prepare their report.

It is desirable to bridge the gap between the time of consolidation of the Police and Fire departments which was made a few weeks ago and when the routine work of the departments is being transferred to the new organization. A resolution was presented to the Council clarifying the status of the men affected by the consolidation and was adopted by the Council.

The resolution provides that the men who are affected by the consolidation of the Police and Fire departments shall be paid for their services until the new organization is set up.

### World Ailay Feas

The obvious purpose of the resolution was to allow certain men who would naturally be among them in the two departments as to the effect on their pay.

President Ghesler stated at this consolidation was made necessary by the effects of the war which affects municipal services as well as private enterprise and the necessity of being able to shift men around to the advantage of the public service. The change is not set forth in permanent law but may be necessary as long as the present emergency continues.

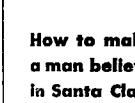

Married Last May

Mr. Campbell at the time of his death was trustee of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores and president of the board of trustees of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church. He was a member of the Detroit Athletic Club, the Country Club of Detroit and the Masonic Order. He was formerly president of the Lockmoor Country Club.

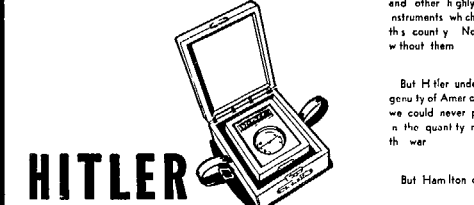

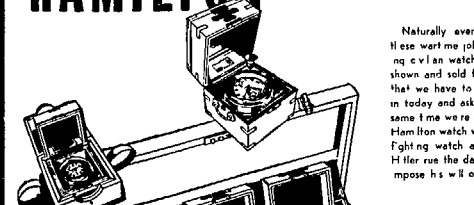

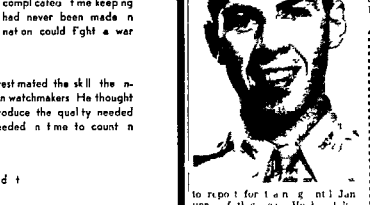
