## Need of Post Office Shown in Xmas Rush

Claims of Proponents Ample Justified by Amount of Business Being Done

The sub post office set up here in the Pointe to handle Christmas mail is already doing a business which amply justifies the claims of its proponents regarding its need. The office opened for business on December 1 and from Dec 1 to 13 inclusive or practically two full weeks it has handled a formidable volume of mail.

A brief itemization of the service so far is as follows: In individual parcels mailed were 10,441 which included 212 outside parcels. There were 2781 insured parcels and 118 C.O.D. parcels.

The office has handled 4293 persons and has sold approximately \$4200 worth of stamps. This is a big showing for such an early date in the Christmas rush.

### Police Chief Piel Urges All Motorists to Fight Winter's Sabotage Against Automobiles

Echoes U S Plea to Prevent Wrecks and Ties Nine Rules Are Laid Down for Drivers to Follow in Course of Duty

Urging motorists to take safety precautions at once to get the benefit of them for the four full months of winter lying ahead, Chief of Police Henry W. Piel today called the attention of every driver in Grosse Pointe Park to the wartime safety driving communique just issued in Washington by the war department and the nation's chiefs of police.

Referring to Winter as a master saboteur the statement to which Chief Piel referred was made in Washington December 3 by Under Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson and Assistant Secretary of War Robert E. Releigh safety director of the National Association of Chiefs of Police. It said in effect:

When dangerous conditions exist during and immediately after snow or sleet storms drivers should reduce speed even below the wartime 25 maintain adequate vision with windshield wipers and defrosters and keep up braking power and gear traction with anti skid chains - or cleats keep off ice roads and give safer drivers a chance.

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### SPIN AND SKID ON SNOW OR ICE WITHOUT CHAINS

It takes 3 to 11 times normal distance to stop on snow or ice with any tires. Anti skid chains reduce braking distance 40 to 50 per cent on snow and ice and without them you can't get up or down slippery hills. Tires that spin on snow or ice to pavement, waste gas and wear tires.

4 SKIDS ON SNOW OR ICE FREQUENTLY STAY BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD. EQUALIZED BRAKES. Have yours checked. The practice of letting air out of tires to prevent skidding is a fallacy. It gives too little adhesion and increases instability and skidding on curves. It also damages tires, making them very susceptible to blow outs. Tire chains are most practical.

5 WINDSHIELD WIPERS OR DEFROSTERS THAT DON'T WORK CAUSE ACCIDENTS. Make sure yours are in good order. You must see a hazard to avoid it, as well as be able to stop and start, regardless of weather conditions.

6 FAULTY HEADLIGHTS LEAD TO WINTER ACCIDENTS. Replace dead light bulbs immediately and have headlights checked for focus and direction. Use "traffic beam" in city or when passing other cars in country.

7 SUDDEN SLOW DOWNS AND STOPS ARE A PRIMARY CAUSE OF SKID WRECKS. Slow down gradually in gear and apply brakes lightly on-off-on on snow or ice. Keep wheels from locking particularly if not safeguarded by anti skid chains. Maintain plenty of stopping space between your car and the car in front. Don't try to pass on hills or curves. This is risky enough on dry pavement. It's foolhardy on snow and ice.

8 BEWARE OF ODORLESS CARBON MONOXIDE GAS. Always open garage doors before starting engine. Remember ACCIDENTS and delays help the Axis and "an ounce of PRECAUTION is now worth ten pounds of cure."

We are a fortunate community in having an unusually high standard of wellbeing among our people but it should be remembered that even in this period of high wages and larger incomes and general employment there are always a considerable number in every community who are unable to share in these better times for obvious and truthful reasons and the greatly increased cost in day to day living which none escape bears with special severity on these unfortunate ones.

The New Isolationists

The isolationists in this country have been jumping back and forth across each others' lands at a lively clip in the last three years.

A year or so before we got into the war the cult of group which Col. Charles Lunderberg was an outstanding protagonist who thought we should withdraw into a rock ribbed shell and ignore the storms gathering which threaten our civilization.

The sneak attack by Japan at Pearl Harbor at the very moment when we were striving to reach a modus vivendi whereby the people of the Pacific might be maintained in the quietus to that whole school. The lightning move of events ridiculed that group into oblivion or night.

Now another group it seems must bear the odious classification. They are those who clearly foresaw the peril to the free world and the inevitability of our soon being compelled to fight for the survival of the whole way of life which had been peculiarly our own since our beginning. They are those who not only backed the President and Congress in making ready to meet the attack and when the deluge had offered its full evils and fortunes to America and to the cause of freedom and human dignity throughout the world.

The new isolationists according to the cataloguing of the starry-eyed planners of the new Utopia are all who disapprove in their hearts and minds of the deluge being spilled enough for us to spend our blood and treasure to liberate the small free countries of the world from the thralldom of slavery and perpetual terror without engaging for an indeterminate time to feed, clothe, finance and employ all the rest of the human race.

The latest isolationists are those who dare to insist that the welfare of Americans and their opportunities for employment and happiness must come first. These are now in the dog house according to the blue-printers of a new social, political and economic order for the whole world.

The new isolationists however need not be unduly depressed. They know that the composite judgment and common sense of the people in this country will soon assert themselves in the light of decision approaches the company will swell to include the great body of clear thinking men and women that make up the vast majority of the citizens of America.

Peanut Butter Flavors Scones

2 eggs enriched flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 cup milk  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon shortening  
2 tablespoons peanut butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup chopped peanuts

Mix sugar, peanuts and salt with beating, cream and salt. Cut or rub in shortening and peanut butter. Beat eggs and milk. Add liquid to dough mixture in single quantity. Pat or roll out in about one-eighth inch thickness, cut into diamond or round shapes, with pointed top, and bake in 350 degree oven for 15 minutes. These scones freeze beautifully in a plastic bag. Thaw and reheat in 375 degree oven for 20 minutes.
