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The Hardening Purpose

There has been a notable hardening of public opinion recently on adhering to the principles which have brought us into this war. We want to defeat Germany and Japan completely and thoroughly and with that accomplished, exercise such rigid military supervision over them that they cannot start another war.

With this in mind the people are exhibiting a growing impatience with the bickerings and artificial misunderstandings that have risen between the three principal allies... which can be removed from our calculations.

He warns against the susceptibility of the American people to German propaganda. He forecasts in detail the breaches made any day between the German people as a whole and the Nazis. He states emphatically there is no difference and recited briefly the eighty years past history of the German nation to prove his point.

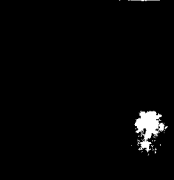
