PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT

RETIREMENT SYSTEM

NOTICE

TO ALL PERSONS RESIDING IN AND HAVING PROPERTY ASSESSED FOR TAXES IN THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS MICHIGAN

At a regular meeting of the Village Council held on Monday, January 15th, 1945 the following proposed amendment to the Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms Michigan was introduced and in accordance with the provisions of Act 278 of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan for the year 1909 as amended, same has been tabled until Monday, February 19th 1945 for action by the Village Council in accordance with the following resolution duly adopted.

WHEREAS it is proposed that the Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms Wayne County Michigan using Act No. 3 of the Public Acts of 1893 of the State of Michigan as amended be amended so as to add the following chapter to wit:

CHAPTER II - RETIREMENT SYSTEM FOR THE EMPLOYEES OF THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS MICHIGAN

Section 1 Name and Establishment A Retirement System of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms herein after called the Retirement System is hereby established for the purpose of providing retirement allowances and death benefits for certain classifications of employees as hereinafter set forth.

Section 2 Definitions The following words and phrases wherever used in this Amendment unless a different meaning is clearly indicated by the context shall have the following meaning:

- (a) Village shall mean the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms State of Michigan.
(b) Council shall mean the Village Council of the Village.
(c) President shall mean the President of the Village.
(d) Commission shall mean the Retirement Commission provided for in Sections 3 and 4.
(e) Member shall mean any person included in the membership of the Retirement System.
(f) Original Member shall mean any member with prior service credited to his service account.
(g) New Member shall mean any member without prior service credited to his service account.
(h) Service shall mean rendered to the Village as an employee of the Village.
(i) Prior Service shall mean service rendered as an employee of the Village prior to the effective date of this Retirement System.
(j) Members'ip Service shall mean service rendered as an employee of the Village since last becoming a member of the Retirement System.
(k) Regular Interest shall mean interest at three per cent per annum compounded annually for a period of five years from the effective date of this Retirement System. For each subsequent year period regular interest shall be such rate of interest as the Commission may determine.
(l) Accumulated Contributions shall mean the sum of all amounts deducted from the compensation of a member and credited to his service or bonus and the Annuity Savings Fund together with regular interest thereon.
(m) Average Final Compensation shall mean the annual average of the highest pay received by a member, not including any bonus or extra service or bonus and not in excess of the annual amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council during a period of five consecutive years of service contained within ten years of service immediately preceding his retirement. If he has less than five years of service then his average final compensation shall be the annual average pay received by a member, not including any bonus or extra service or bonus and not in excess of the annual amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council during the last employment of the member in the Village.
(n) Annual Compensation shall mean the annual rate of pay received by a member, not including any bonus or extra service or bonus and not in excess of the annual amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council at the time of termination of his last employment in the Village.
(o) Annuity shall mean annual payments derived from the accumulated contributions of a member.
(p) Pension shall mean the annual payments derived from money provided by the Village or instrumentalities thereof.
(q) Retirement Allowance shall mean the sum of the annuity and pension and shall be paid in monthly installments.
(r) Interest shall mean the amount of interest drawn from an active service withdrawal or the amount of interest credited according to the provisions of this Retirement System.
(s) Beneficiary shall mean any person in receipt of a pension or retirement allowance or other benefit provided by this Retirement System.
(t) Annuity Reserve shall mean the present value of all payments to be made on account of any annuity or benefit in lieu of an annuity or pension upon the basis of such mortality tables and regular interest as the Commission shall adopt.
(u) Pension Reserve shall mean the present value of all payments to be made on account of any pension or benefit in lieu of any pension computed upon the basis of such mortality tables and regular interest as the Commission shall adopt.
(v) Eligible Retirement Age shall be age sixty years provided that subject to the provisions of section 15 (c) the Commission may during the time of war engaged in by the United States or other national emergency extend the age at which any member is eligible to retire.
(w) Policemen shall mean employees of the Police Department of the Village, the rank of patrolman or higher rank but it shall not include (1) privately employed po-

licemen (2) persons temporarily employed during emergencies or (3) civilian employees of the Police Department.

(x) Firemen shall mean employees of the Fire Department holding the rank of fireman or higher rank but it shall not include (1) privately employed firemen or persons temporarily employed during emergencies, (2) persons temporarily employed during emergencies, or (3) civilian employees of the Fire Department.

(y) The masculine shall include the feminine and the singular in relation to a person shall include the plural and vice versa.

Section 3 Retirement Commission A Retirement Commission shall be established as hereinafter provided, whose duties shall be to administer and operate the Retirement System and to carry into effect the provisions of this Amendment. The Commission shall consist of five members of whom two shall be appointed annually by the Council from its own members; two shall be elected by the members of the Retirement System from their own membership and one who shall be an elector and a taxpayer of the Village and ineligible to receive any retirement or other benefit under the terms of the Retirement System shall be appointed by the President. No more than one member representative of the Retirement Commission shall be from any one Village department.

Section 4 Initial Commission Within thirty (30) days after the effective date of the amendment the President and the Council shall appoint the members of the Commission above provided to be appointed by them respectively and the employees then eligible to membership in the Retirement System shall elect the two members above provided to be elected by them at an election for which the Council shall make proper provisions as to time, place, notice, method of nomination and balloting and other necessary or proper requirements. The persons so appointed or elected shall hold office until their successors shall be elected or appointed and shall have qualified as hereinafter provided.

Section 5 Commissioners Regular Term of Office Within thirty (30) days after the general village election next following the effective date of this Amendment and annually thereafter within a like period the President shall appoint the members of the Commission and the Council shall appoint the two members hereinafter provided to be appointed by them respectively and the members of the Retirement System shall elect the members to be elected by them at an election for which the existing Commission shall make proper provisions as to time, place, notice, method of nomination and balloting and other necessary or proper requirements. If a vacancy shall occur in the Commission the same shall be filled by action of the same person or body which named or elected the person whose place is vacant and the new commissioner shall hold office for the unexpired term. Commissioners shall hold office until their successors shall have been named and shall be qualified. Each commissioner shall take an oath of office before the Village Clerk for faithful performance of the duties of his office.

Section 6 Meetings of the Commission The Commission shall hold regular quarterly meetings. Special meetings shall be held on call of the Chairman or on written request of two Commissioners. Three Commissioners shall constitute a quorum at any meeting, of the Commission. The Commission shall be authorized to meet in the meetings of the Commission and at least three concurring votes shall be necessary for a decision by the Commissioners. The Commission shall adopt rules of procedure, including, among others, notice of time and place and purpose of meetings and shall keep a record of its proceedings. All meetings of the Commission shall be public. The members of the Commission shall serve without compensation for their services as such.

Section 7 Officers (a) The Commission shall elect from its members a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman. (b) The Village Clerk ex-officio shall be Secretary of the Retirement System.

(c) The Village Treasurer ex-officio shall be Treasurer of the Retirement System and shall be authorized to receive all payments from the funds of the Retirement System. All payments from the funds of the Retirement System shall be by checks signed by the Village Treasurer and a member of the Council designated by the Village Treasurer as his authority. The Commission shall arrange for and pay upon all medical examinations such persons and bearing upon its face the signatures of such persons shall be filed with the Village Treasurer as his authority for making payments upon such vouchers. No vouchers shall be paid unless it shall have been previously authorized by resolution of the Commission.

(e) Actuary The Commission shall appoint an Actuary who shall be the chief advisor on matters relating to the Retirement System and who shall perform such other duties as are required in connection therewith. (f) Medical Director The Commission shall appoint a Medical Director as its physician and shall be responsible to and shall hold office at the pleasure of the Commission. The Medical Director shall arrange for and pay upon all medical examinations required under the provisions of this Retirement System shall investigate all essential statements and certificates of medical nature by or on behalf of a member or beneficiary in connection with an application for disability benefits and shall report in writing to the Commission his conclusions on matters referred to him.

(g) Employment of Professional and Clerical Services The Commission may employ such professional and clerical services as are required for the proper operation of the Retirement System. The compensation of the Actuary, the Medical Director and for other professional or clerical services shall be determined by the Council on recommendation of the Commission.

Section 8 (a) Records of Retirement System—Annual Report. The Secretary shall keep or cause to be kept in convenient form such data as shall be necessary for an actuarial valuation of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System. The Commission shall render a written report to the Council on or before the first day of May of each year, showing the fiscal transactions of the Retirement System for the year ending, the preceding last day of February, as a balance sheet show-

ing the financial condition of the Retirement System by means of an actuarial valuation of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System as of the preceding last day of February.

(b) Mortality and Other Tables. The Commission shall adopt such mortality and other tables of experience as are necessary in the operation of the Retirement System on an actuarial basis.

Section 9 (a) Membership The membership of the Retirement System shall include all persons now or hereafter employed by the Village except (1) any person whose services are compensated for on a contractual or fee basis or (2) any person whose compensation in a period of three consecutive years averages less than five hundred dollars a year or (3) the Medical Director. (b) Policemen and Firemen employed by the Village or (c) any elected official unless he is an employee in an other capacity in which event his salary as an elected official shall not be included for any purpose hereunder.

(b) Right of Commission to Decide Membership In all cases of doubt the Commission shall determine who is a member within the meaning of the provisions of this Retirement System.

Section 10 Termination of Membership Except as provided for in section 17 should any person (1) be absent from service for a continuous period of more than one year because of reason of injury or illness or (2) become a beneficiary or die he shall thereupon cease to be a member.

Section 11 Service Creditable The Commission shall fix and determine by appropriate rules and regulations the amount of service creditable to a member for a year of service but in no case shall less than ten days of service in a calendar month constitute a month of service nor shall less than ten months service in a calendar year constitute a year of service. No more than one year of service shall be creditable for all service rendered in one calendar year.

Section 12 War Service Credit An employee who during his employment was called to or who enlisted in an armed service of the United States or a member who shall be called to or who shall enlist in any armed service of the United States and who has been or who shall be on active duty during time of war or other national emergency recognized by the Village within the time provided by any law of the United States of America securing the rights of reemployment and benefits after separation from such service or after release from hospitalization shall be credited with the time of such war service as membership service provided that in any case of doubt as to the period so to be credited the Commission shall have final power to determine such period. During the period of such service rendered by a member to the Federal Government his contributions to the Annuity Savings Fund shall be suspended and his balance in the Annuity Savings Fund at the last payroll date prior to his leave of absence from Village service shall be accumulated at regular interest.

Section 13 Members Service Accounts The Commission shall credit each member's service account with the number of years and months of prior service and membership service which he has rendered.

Section 14 Optional Retirement from Service On or after July 1st 1945 a member who has attained his eligible retirement age as defined in Section 2 (v) may retire from Village service upon his written application to the Commission on or before the date of his retirement. If he elects to retire he shall be retired on the date of his retirement.

Section 15 (a) Compulsory Retirement from Service On or after July 1st 1945 any member who shall attain his eligible retirement age shall be retired with by the Commission subject however to the provisions of paragraph (b) of this section.

(b) Extension of Service On a written request of a member who shall be called to compulsory retirement on or after July 1st 1945 his department head or the Commission may extend the date of his retirement for a period not to exceed one (1) year from the date of his retirement. No extension shall be granted after the date of his retirement.

Section 16 Service Retirement Allowance Subject to the provisions of paragraph (e) of this section upon retirement from service a member shall receive a service retirement allowance which shall consist of:

(a) Annuity An annuity which shall be the actuarial equivalent of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his retirement and

(b) Basic Pension A basic pension of one hundred dollars per annum and

(c) Members' Service Pension A membership service pension equal to one hundred thirty fifth (1/135) of his average final compensation for each year of membership service credited to his service account in excess of the sum of his membership service pension and the basic pension shall not exceed thirteen hundred dollars per annum. (d) Prior Service Pension A prior service pension equal to one-hundredth (1/100) of his average final compensation for each year of prior service credited to his service account provided that if the sum of the membership service and the prior service exceeds thirty years then credit for membership service shall be reduced so that the total of membership service and prior service shall not exceed thirty years and provided further that the sum of the prior service pension the basic pension and membership service pension shall not exceed one hundred dollars per annum.

(e) Minimum Service to be Eligible for a Pension To be eligible to receive the pensions provided for in paragraphs (b) (c) and (d) of this section a member must have at least ten years of service credited to his service account provided that the foregoing shall not apply to a member becoming eligible for benefits provided for in sections 19 and 20.

Section 17 Deferred Service Retirement Allowance On or after July 1st 1945 any member (1) who has fifteen or more years of service credited to his service account, and (2) who is attained the age fifty five years, separate from the Village for reasons other than becoming a beneficiary, he shall remain dur-

ing the period of his absence from Village service for the exclusive purpose only of receiving a service retirement allowance provided for in section 16 said service retirement allowance to begin at the attainment of his eligible retirement age provided that if such member should withdraw all or part of the accumulated contributions credited to him in the Annuity Savings Fund he shall thereupon cease to be a member and all his rights hereunder shall terminate and he shall not be entitled to any balance of accumulated contributions then credited to him.

Section 18 Optional Retirement Allowances. Until the effective date of his service retirement as provided for in sections 14 and 15 any member may elect to receive his service retirement allowance in a retirement allowance payable throughout life in accordance with the provisions of Option I or II or III as hereinafter set forth. If a member dies within thirty days after his retirement becomes effective no option election shall be effective such a member shall be considered in service at the time of his death and his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of section 20 (b).

Option II Joint and Last Survivorship Allowance If a beneficiary elects his reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person having an insurable interest in his life as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission at the time of his retirement or

Option III Modified Joint and Last Survivorship Allowance. If a beneficiary dies one-half of his reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person having an insurable interest in his life as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission at the time of his retirement.

Section 19 Disability Incurred. Upon the application of a member or his department head a member who becomes totally incapacitated for duty as the result and prospect of all of the actual performance of duty as an employee of the Village with negligence on his part shall be retired and provided the Medical Director after a medical examination of such member shall certify (1) that such member is mentally or physically incapable of performing his duties and (2) that such incapacity is probably permanent and (3) that such member should be retired and provided that the report of the Medical Director shall be approved by the Commission.

Section 22 Non-Duty Disability Benefits Upon retirement for disability, as provided for in section 21 a disability beneficiary who has attained his eligible retirement age shall receive a service retirement allowance as provided for in section 16 disability beneficiary who has not attained his eligible retirement age shall receive the following benefits:

(a) **Cash Refund Annuity** A cash refund annuity which shall be the actuarial equivalent of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his retirement and

(b) **Disability Retirement Pension** A disability retirement pension of one hundred dollars per month (1/125) of his average final compensation for each year of service credited to his service account not to exceed thirty (30) years, provided, that such disability retirement pension (1) shall not exceed nine hundred dollars per annum, and (2) shall be subject to the provisions of sections 23 and 24.

Section 23. (a) Pensions Offset by Compensation Benefits. Any amounts which may be paid or payable under the provisions of any workmen's compensation or other similar laws shall be deducted from the pension of a member or beneficiary on account of any disability or death shall be offset against any benefits payable from funds provided by the Village under the provisions of this Retirement System on account of the same disability or death and such benefits payable from funds provided by the Village shall be accordingly reduced.

(b) **Subrogation Rights** In the event an employee of the Village becomes entitled to pension benefits as the result of an accident or injury caused by a third person the Village shall be subrogated to the rights of such third person to the extent of benefits which the Village pays or becomes liable to pay.

Section 24. (a) Re Examination of Disability Benefit Recipients. Once each year during the first five years following retirement from the Retirement System on account of pension or allowance and at least once in every three year period thereafter the Commission may, upon the beneficiary's application shall require any disability beneficiary who has not attained his eligible retirement age to undergo a medical examination by or under the direction of the Medical Director. Should any disability beneficiary who has not attained his eligible retirement age refuse to undergo such medical examination in any such period his disability retirement pension or allowance may be discontinued by the Commission and should such refusal continue for one year all his rights in and to his disability retirement pension or allowance may be revoked by the Commission. If upon such medical examination of a beneficiary the Medical Director reports that such beneficiary is physically able and capable of resuming employment with the Village and his report is concurred in by the Commission then such beneficiary shall be restored to active service with the Village and his disability pension or allowance shall be discontinued.

(b) **Adjustment of Disability Pension** Should the Secretary report and certify to the Commission such disability beneficiary is engaged in a gainful occupation, business, or employment and that the sum of his pay or earnings from such occupation, business or employment and his disability or retirement pension or allowance provided by the Retirement System exceeds his final compensation then the amount of his disability pension shall be reduced to an amount which together with his annuity, if any, and the amount of his disability retirement pension or allowance provided that the report of the Secretary is concurred in by the Commission. Should such disability beneficiary's earnings be later changed, his disability pension shall be correspondingly adjusted.

Section 25. (a) Refund of Accumulated Contributions Prior to Retirement Should a member cease to be an employee of the Village (1) before attaining his eligible retirement age for reasons other than becoming a beneficiary or dying, or (2) after attaining his eligible retirement age and not being entitled to a pension or allowance, he shall be paid all or part of the accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund as he shall demand in writing on forms furnished by the Commission.

(b) **Refund of Accumulated Contributions** Upon death of member. Should a member die the amount of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his death shall be paid to such person or persons having an insurable interest in his life as he shall have named by written designation, duly executed and recorded with the Commission, if there be no such designated person or persons his accumulated contributions shall be paid to his executor or administrator.

(c) **Instalment Refund of Accumulated Contributions** Payment of refunds of accumulated contributions may be made in monthly instalments according to such rules and regulations as the Commission may adopt.

Section 26. (a) Annuity Savings Fund The Annuity Savings Fund as hereby created in which shall be accumulated at regular intervals the contributions from the compensation of members and their families.

(b) **Contributions of Members** The contribution of a member to the Annuity Savings Fund shall be five per cent of his regular compensation paid to him by the Village (not including any pay for extra service or overtime and not in excess of the amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council). The officers or officers responsible for making up the payroll shall cause the contribution to be deducted from the compensation of each member on each and every payroll for each and every payroll period so long as he remains a member in the employ of the Village. The member's contributions provided for herein shall be made in two instalments, that the minimum compensation provided for by law for any member shall be changed thereby. Every member shall be deemed to consent and agree to the deductions made and provided for herein and shall receive by full compensation and payment of his compensation less said deduction shall be a full and complete discharge and acquittance of all claims and demands whatsoever for services rendered by such person or persons and shall be satisfied by such payment. The officer or officers responsible for making up the payroll shall certify to the Village Treasurer on each and every payroll the amount of contribution to be deducted from the compensation of each member and each of such amounts shall be credited by the Village Treasurer and when deducted shall be credited by the Secretary to the individual Annuity Savings Fund account of the member from whose compensation said deduction was made.

(c) **Re Deposit of Contributions Previously Refund ed.** In addition to the contributions deducted from the compensation of a member, as hereinbefore provided, any member may deposit in the Annuity Savings Fund, by a single payment, or by an increased rate of contribution, an amount equal to the total amount, or any part thereof which he may have previously withdrawn therefrom as provided by this Retirement System.

(d) **Transfer of a Member's Accumulated Contributions** Upon retirement of a member, his accumulated contributions shall be transferred from the Annuity Savings Fund to the Annuity Reserve Fund. At the expiration of a period of three years from the date an employee ceases to be an employee, an balance of accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund, unclaimed by such member, shall be transferred to the Pension Reserve Fund.

Section 27. Annuity Reserve Fund. The Annuity Reserve Fund is hereby created. The Annuity Reserve Fund shall be the fund from which shall be paid all annuities and all benefits in lieu of annuities payable as provided by this Retirement System. Should a beneficiary retired on account of non-duty disability, be restored to active service, his annuity reserve shall be transferred from the Annuity Reserve Fund to the Annuity Savings Fund and shall be credited to his individual account therein.

Section 28. (a) Pension Reserve Fund. The Pension Reserve Fund is hereby created. The Pension Reserve Fund shall be the fund in which shall be accumulated for the payment of all pensions payable by the Village, or any instrumentality of the Village, and from which shall be paid all pensions and all benefits in lieu of pensions, to members and beneficiaries as provided by this Retirement System.

(b) **Contributions by Village** Upon the basis of such mortality tables regular interest and other tables as the Commission shall adopt, the Actuary shall annually compute the pension reserve liabilities covering pensions and other benefits payable or which might be payable from the Pension Reserve Fund to members and beneficiaries of the Retirement System. The pension reserve liabilities covering prior service of original members shall be amortized in such manner as the Commission may determine, subject to the approval of the Council. The pension reserve liabilities covering service rendered or to be rendered after the effective date of this Retirement System by members and beneficiaries of the Retirement System shall be amortized over a period of years not to exceed the natural lifetime of members and beneficiaries. The Commission shall report in writing to the Council on or before the first day of May of each year the amount of contributions to be paid by the Village or any instrumentality of the Village to the Retirement System for the current fiscal year and the Council shall appropriate and cause to be paid to the Pension Reserve Fund the amount of contributions to the funds of the Retirement System during the current fiscal year and when so paid the amounts of such contributions shall be credited to the Pension Reserve Fund.

(c) **If the amount appropriated in the budget for the year is not sufficient to pay in full the amounts due in said year to all beneficiaries of the Retirement System the amount of such insufficiency shall thereupon be provided out of funds of the Village or any instrumentality thereof, by the appropriating authorities of the Village.**

Section 29. Expense Fund The Expense Fund shall be the fund in which shall be credited all moneys provided by the Village to pay the administration expense of the Retirement System, and from which shall be paid all expenses necessary in connection with the administration of the Retirement System. The Commission shall annually certify to the appropriating authorities of the Village on or before the first day of May, according to legal budget procedure, the amount of appropriation necessary to administer the Retirement System during the current fiscal year and the Village shall appropriate such amount to the credit of the Expense Fund.

Section 30. (a) Management of Funds. The Commission shall have full power to invest and reinvest such funds subject to all terms conditions limitations and restrictions imposed by the law of the State of Michigan, and to purchase and sell securities in the making and disposing of their investments except that notes bonds or obligations of any county city village or district in the State of Michigan shall not be subject to said restrictions. The Commission shall have the power to purchase notes bonds or other obligations of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms at any legally conducted or private sale.

(b) **The Commission shall have full power to hold purchase sell assign transfer and dispose of any of the investments and investments in which any of the funds of the Retirement System have been invested as well as the proceeds of said investments and any moneys belonging to the Retirement System.** There shall be kept in the Village shall not exceed ten per centum of the total assets of the Retirement System. All funds of the Retirement System shall be held for the sole purpose of meeting disbursements for pensions annuities and other payments authorized by the provisions of this Retirement System and shall be used for no other purpose.

(c) **The description of the various Funds of the Retirement System in sections 26 27 28 and 29 shall be interpreted to refer to the accounting records of the Retirement System and not to the segregation of moneys in the funds of the Retirement System.**

Section 31. Allowances of Regular Interest. The Commission shall allow regular interest on the mean amount of assets credited to the Annuity Savings Fund Annuity Reserve Fund and the Pension Reserve Fund provided however that interest on contributions from members credited to the Annuity Savings Fund upon any one fiscal year shall begin on the first day of the fiscal year next following and shall be computed and credited at the end of the fiscal year. The amounts of interest so allowed shall be due and payable to said funds of the Retirement System and shall be annually credited thereto by the Commission from interest and other earnings on moneys of the Retirement System. Any additional amounts necessary to pay regular interest on the funds of the Retirement System shall be paid from the Pension Reserve Fund and all interest and other earnings from deposits and investments of the funds of the Retirement System not provided for by the provisions of this Retirement System shall be credited to the Pension Reserve Fund.

Section 32. Assignments Prohibited. The right of a person to an annuity a pension a retirement allowance or the return of accumulated contributions the annuity the pension or the retirement allowance itself an optional benefit any other right accruing to or for the benefit of a member or beneficiary under the provisions of this Retirement System and the moneys belonging to the Retirement System shall not be subject to execution garnishment attachment or operation of law or any other process of law whatsoever and shall be unassignable except as is specifically provided by the provisions of this Retirement System provided that the Village shall have the right to satisfy any legal claim arising from embezzlement by or fraud of a member.

Section 33. Errors Should any change or error in the records result in any member or beneficiary receiving from the Retirement System more or less than he would have been entitled to receive had the records been correct the Commission shall correct such error and as far as practicable shall adjust the payments so that benefit to which such member or beneficiary was correctly entitled shall be paid.

Section 34. Other Provisions of Charter or Ordinance No other provision of law charter or ordinance which provides wholly or partly at the expense of the Village for pensions or retirement benefits for employees of the Village their widows children or other dependents shall apply to members or beneficiaries of the Retirement System their widows children or other dependents.

(b) **If a state operated retirement system including municipal employees as beneficiaries shall become operative the Council may, by such vote as may be required by the statute providing for such system take the action required to make the Village a member of such system in which event the Council shall have full power so to deal with the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System hereby created as to comply with the requirements of the state law.**

(c) **All provisions of any ordinance inconsistent with the provisions of this Amendment are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.**

Section 35. Unclaimed Funds Any moneys credited in any of the funds to a member as which or so to an part of which there shall be a failure of beneficiaries shall by action of the Commission be credited and transferred to the Pension Reserve Fund.

Section 36. Modifying the Provisions of This Retirement System Whenever an actual valuation of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System shows that the total of the assets credited to the Pension Reserve Fund equals or exceeds the total of (1) the pension reserve covering pensions being paid to beneficiaries and (2) the pension reserves covering pensions which might be payable on account of accrued service credited to members, the Council may by ordinance (1) increase the amount of pension benefits provided by this retirement system or (2) add new pension benefits provided that no such increase in pension benefits or new pension benefits shall be made if the Village's total annual contribution to the Retirement System for all pension beneficiaries being paid or which might be payable by the Retirement System shall be reason thereof exceed seven per cent of the aggregate pay salary or compensation received by members during the preceding fiscal year.

Section 37. Saving Clause. If any provision section paragraph sentence clause or phrase of this Amendment is for any reason found to be invalid or inoperative or shall be held by any court to be unconstitutional the remainder of the provisions of this Amendment shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect.

Section 38. The effective date of this Retirement System shall be the first day of March 1945.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that in accordance with the provisions of Act 276 of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan for the year 1939 as amended the foregoing proposed amendment to the Village Charter shall be placed upon the table until February 19th 1945 and that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Charter of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms be published in the Grosse Pointe News a newspaper published in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms and in the Grosse Pointe Review a newspaper published in Warren County Michigan and circulated in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms and that true copies of said proposed charter amendment be posted in two public places in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms such publication and that a copy of the proposed amendment be presented to the Governor of the State as provided by law.

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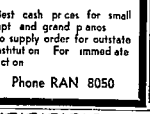
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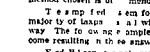
