The relay team consisting of Jack Marty Beer Dan and Jack Huckins won the Ypsilanti relay squad.

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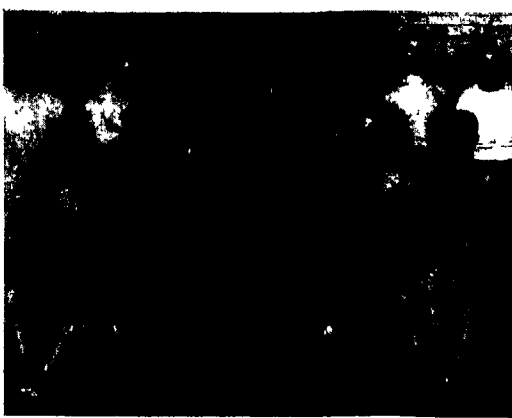

Out in the far reaches of the Pacific or other sections of the Seven Seas, when our drenched aircrews need drinking water they can get it from the sea.

With a full supply of water a simple raft can keep alive for weeks, even without food and as long as there is sunshine the Solar Still will keep them from perishing for lack of water.

This seemingly magical, but essentially simple, floating water still is a vinyl plastic envelope, 30 inches long, 18 inches wide, 10 inches in diameter. A plastic screen covered with black cells is stretched through the middle. Through the plastic transparency of the still's envelope about 80% of the sun's rays may pass the sponge, soaked with sea water, absorbs the heat of the sun. The heat evaporates the water which passes off as vapor leaving the sea salt in the sponge.

On the cooler envelop of the Solar Still, the vapor condenses into fresh water which runs down to the reservoir at the bottom of the still.

Responsible for design and development of the still are the AAF Air Technical Service Command Wright Field, the Army Proving Ground Command at Eglin Field, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the General Higgins Chemical Corporation and Huggins Industries. Now after a year of intensive research, the Solar Still is ready for mass production.

To prepare the Solar Still for use our AAF man on a raft pours in 2 quarts of sea water before unrolling. When the sponge is saturated he rolls the envelope with lung power and drains excess sea water from the sponge by tilting the still. The excess sea water washes out salt left from previous use. Our drenched crewmen then place the Solar Still on the water and tie it to the raft. This presents the problem of how to keep the still up a precarious space inside the raft while the still is in use.

The new Solar Still packs into about 1/5 the space of the older style a great factor in its favor is that it is easy to use. At Eglin Field, with the standardization of the new Solar Still, the AAF has found a way to keep each man's water supply assured each man of at least 1 pint of water per day. Without this water supply the men would die but rather the result of a careful study of weather conditions an inherent part of the ocean throughout the theaters of war.

To men adrift on a life raft there are two non-expendable sources of drinking water that cover most conditions first, the precipitation source, transferred from which the water is caught in pans and transferred to a receptacle. Second, the Solar Still with which as long as the sun shines bright and there's water in the ocean no AAF crew adrift will ever perish from thirst.

The third source is the Sea

Water Desalting Kit now in production. The Army Air Force, the Navy and the Permutit Company have all had a part in its development. The Desalting Kit is a chemical compound consisting of about 2/3 silver put up in briquettes in a package weighing about 22 ounces. Service tests so far have been lengthy and thorough.

The Desalting Kit produces eight times the amount of water contained in one drinking water can and the time to use it is when the sky is overcast, when there is neither rain nor sun.

With these three newly-developed sources of water supply the AAF has taken another notable step in protection of its personnel.

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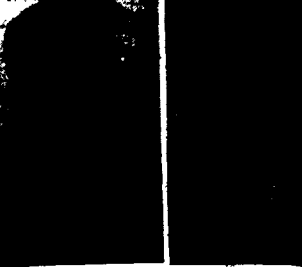

CHAPTER 17 — RETIREMENT SYSTEM FOR THE EMPLOYEES OF THE VILLAGE OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS MICHIGAN

Section 1. Name and Establishment. A Retirement System of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms herein after called the Retirement System is hereby established for the purpose of providing retirement allowances and death benefits for certain classifications of employees as hereinafter set forth.

Section 2. Definitions. The following words and phrases wherever used in this Amendment unless a different meaning is clearly indicated by the context, shall have the following meaning:

(a) "Village" shall mean the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms, State of Michigan.

(b) Council shall mean the Village Council of the Village.

(c) "President" shall mean the President of the Village.

(d) "Commission" shall mean the Retirement Commission provided for in Sections 3, 4 and 5.

(e) "Member" shall mean any person included in the membership of the Retirement System.

(f) "Original Member" shall mean any member with prior service credited to his service account.

(g) "New Member" shall mean any member without prior service credited to his service account.

(h) "Service" shall mean service rendered to the Village as an employee of the Village.

(i) "Prior Service" shall mean service rendered as an employee of the Village prior to the effective date of this Retirement System.

(j) "Membership Service" shall mean service rendered as an employee of the Village since last becoming a member of the Retirement System.

(k) "Regular Interest" shall mean interest at three per cent per annum compounded annually, for a period of five years from the effective date of this Retirement System. For each subsequent five year period, regular interest shall be such rate of interest as the Commission may determine.

(l) "Accumulated Contributions" shall mean the sum of all annuities deducted from a member's compensation and credited to his individual account in the Annuity Savings Fund, together with regular interest thereon.

(m) "Average Final Compensation" shall mean the annual average of the highest pay received by a member (not including any pay for extra service or bonus and not in excess of the annual amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council) during a period of five consecutive years of service contained within his ten years of service immediately preceding his retirement, if he has less than five years of service then his average final compensation shall be the annual average pay received by him (not including any pay for extra service or bonus and not in excess of the annual amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council) in cases where compensation is not all paid in money. The Commission shall fix the value of that part of the compensation not paid in money.

(n) "Final Compensation" shall mean the annual rate of pay earned or attributable by a member (not including any pay for extra service or bonus and not in excess of the annual amount payable at the regular rate of pay for a work week as established from time to time by the Council) at the time of termination of his last employment with the Village.

(o) "Annuity" shall mean annual payments derived from the accumulated contributions of a member.

(p) "Pension" shall mean annual payments derived from money provided by the Village or instrumentally thereof.

(q) "Retirement Allowance" shall mean the sum of the annuity and the pension and shall be paid in monthly installments thereof.

(r) "Retirement" shall mean withdrawal from active service with a retirement allowance pension or annuity granted according to the provisions of this Retirement System.

(s) "Beneficiary" shall mean any person in receipt of a pension annuity retirement allowance or other benefit provided by this Retirement System.

(t) "Annuity Reserve" shall mean the present value of all payments to be made on account of any annuity, or benefit in lieu of any annuity computed upon the basis of such mortality tables and regular interest as the Commission shall adopt.

(u) "Pension Reserve" shall mean the present value of all payments to be made on account of any pension or benefit in lieu of any annuity computed upon the basis of such mortality tables and regular interest as the Commission shall adopt.

(v) "Eligible Retirement Age" shall be age sixty years provided that subject to the provisions of section 15 (a), the Commission may, during time of war engaged

in by the United States, or other national emergency, extend the age at which any member is eligible to retire.

(w) "Policemen" shall mean employees of the Police Department holding the rank of patrolman, or higher rank but it shall not include (1) privately employed policemen (2) persons temporarily employed during emergencies, or (3) civilian employees of the Police Department.

(x) "Firemen" shall mean employees of the Fire Department holding the rank of fireman, or higher rank, but it shall not include (1) privately employed firemen, (2) persons temporarily employed during emergencies, or (3) civilian employees of the Fire Department.

(y) The masculine shall include the feminine and the singular, in relation to a person, shall include the plural and vice versa.

Section 3. Retirement Commission. A Retirement Commission shall be established as hereinafter provided to administer, manage and operate the Retirement System and to carry into effect the provisions of this Amendment. The Commission shall consist of five members of whom two shall be appointed annually by the Council from its own membership two shall be elected by the members of the Retirement System from their own membership, and one, who shall be an elector and a taxpayer of the Village and eligible to the Retirement System, shall be appointed by the President. No more than one member representative on the Retirement Commission shall be from any one Village department.

Section 4. Initial Commission. Within thirty (30) days after the effective date of the amendment, the President and the Council shall appoint the members of the Commission above provided to be appointed by them respectively.

Section 5. Commissioners' Regular Term of Office. Within thirty (30) days after the general village election next following the effective date of this Amendment, and annually thereafter within a like period the President shall appoint the members of the Commission and the Council shall appoint the two members hereinbefore provided to be appointed by them respectively and the members of the Retirement System shall elect the member to be elected by them. The Commission shall adopt the existing Commission shall make proper provisions as to time, place, notice, method of nomination and balloting and other necessary or proper requirements. The persons so appointed or elected shall hold office until their successors shall be elected or appointed and shall have qualified as hereinafter provided.

Section 6. Meetings of the Commission. The Commission shall hold regular quarterly meetings. Special meetings shall be held on call of the Chairman or on written request of two Commissioners. Three Commissioners shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Commission. Each Commissioner shall be entitled to one vote in the meetings of the Commission and at least three concurring votes shall be necessary for a decision by the Commissioners. The Commission shall adopt its own rules of procedure including provisions as to notice of time, place and purpose of meetings, and shall keep a record of its proceedings. All meetings of the Commission shall be public and all members of the Commission shall serve without compensation for their services as such.

Section 7. Officers.

(a) The Commission shall elect from its members a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman.

(b) The Village Clerk ex-officio, shall be Secretary of the Retirement System.

(c) The Village Treasurer, ex-officio shall be Treasurer of the Retirement System and the custodian of its funds. All payments from the funds of the Retirement System shall be by checks signed by the Village Treasurer and a member of the Council designated by it only upon vouchers signed by persons designated by the Commission. A duly attested copy of a resolution designating such persons and bearing upon its face specimen signatures of such persons shall be filed with the Village Treasurer. His authority for making payments upon such vouchers. No vouchers shall be drawn unless it shall have been previously authorized by resolution of the Commission.

(d) "Actuary" The Commission shall appoint an Actuary who shall be the technical advisor to the Commission on matters regarding the operation of the Funds of the Retirement System and who shall perform such other duties as are required in connection therewith.

(e) "Medical Director" The Commission shall appoint a Medical Director a physician who is not eligible

for membership in the Retirement System. The Medical Director shall be responsible to and shall hold office at the pleasure of the Commission. The Medical Director shall arrange for and pass upon all medical examinations required under the provisions of this Retirement System and shall investigate all essential statements and certificates of a medical nature by or on behalf of a member or beneficiary in connection with an application for disability benefits, and shall report in writing to the Commission his conclusions on matters referred to him.

(f) "Employment of Professional and Clerical Services" The Commission may employ such professional and clerical services as are required for the proper operation of the Retirement System. The services of the Actuary, the Medical Director and for other professional or clerical services shall be determined by the Council on recommendations by the Commission.

Section 8. (a) Records of Retirement System—Annual Report. The Secretary shall keep, or cause to be kept in convenient form such data as shall be necessary for an actuarial valuation of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System. The Commission shall render a written report to the Council on or before the first day of May of each year, showing the fiscal transactions of the Retirement System for the year ending the preceding last day of February, and a balance sheet showing the financial condition of the Retirement System by means of an actuarial valuation of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System as of the preceding last day of February.

(b) Mortality and Other Tables. The Commission shall adopt such mortality and other tables of experience as are necessary in the operation of the Retirement System on an actuarial basis.

Section 9. (a) Membership. The membership of the Retirement System shall include all persons now or hereafter employed by the Village, except (1) any person whose services are compensated for on a contractual or fee basis or (2) any person whose compensation in a period of three consecutive years averages less than five hundred dollars a year, or (3) the Medical Director, or (c) any elected official unless he is an employee in an other capacity in which event his salary as an elected official shall not be included in any average hereunder.

(b) Right of Commission to Deny Membership. In all cases where the Commission shall decide who is a member within the meaning of the provisions of this Retirement System.

Section 10. Termination of Membership. Except as provided for in section 17 should any person (1) be absent from service for more than thirty (30) days or (2) become a beneficiary or die, he shall thereupon cease to be a member.

Section 11. Service Creditable. The Commission shall fix and determine by appropriate rules and regulations how much service shall be credited to a member of service but in no case shall less than ten days' service in a calendar month constitute a month of service, nor shall less than ten months service in a calendar year constitute a year of service. Credit shall be given for one calendar year for all service rendered.

Section 12. War Service Credit. An employee who during his employment was called to or who existed in any armed service of the United States or a member who shall be called to or who shall exist in any armed service of the United States and who has been or who shall be on active duty during time of war or other national emergency recognized by the Commission and who shall have been recognized by the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms, securing the rights of reemployment and benefits, after separation from such service or after release from hospitalization shall be credited with service in any case of doubt as to the period so to be credited the Commission shall have final power to determine such a member to the Federal Government, his contributions to the Annuity Savings Fund shall be suspended and his balance in the Annuity Savings Fund at the last payroll date preceding his leave of absence from Village service shall be accrued to his credit.

Section 13. Members' Service Accounts. The Commission shall credit each member's service account with the number of years and months of prior service and membership service to which he may be entitled.

Section 14. Optional Retirement from Service. On or after July 1, 1945 any member who shall have attained his eligible retirement age as defined in Section 2 (v) may retire from Village service upon his written application to the Commission setting forth at what time, not less than thirty (30) days before his retirement, he desires to be retired.

Section 15. (a) Compulsory Retirement from Service. On or after July 1, 1945 any member who shall have attained age sixty five years, shall be retired forthwith by the Commission, subject, however, to the provisions of paragraph (b) of this section.

(b) Extensions of Service. Upon the written request of a member who shall have attained the compulsory retirement age according to the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section, approved by his department head, the Commission may continue such member in service for periods not to extend beyond (1) the member's attainment of age seventy years or (2) four years from the effective date of this Retirement System, whichever occurs later.

Section 16. Service Retirement Allowance. Subject to the provisions of paragraph (e) of this section, upon retirement from service a member shall receive a service retirement allowance, which shall consist of:

(a) Annuity. An annuity which shall be the actuarial equivalent of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his retirement, and

(b) Basic Pension. A basic pension of one hundred dollars per annum, and

(c) Membership Service Pension. A membership service pension equal to one-one hundred thirty fifth (1/135) of his average final compensation for each year of membership service credited to his service account, not to exceed thirty years, provided, that the sum of the membership service pension and the basic pension shall not exceed thirteen hundred dollars per annum.

(d) Prior Service Pension. A prior service pension equal to one-nineteenth (1/19) of his average final compensation for each year of prior service credited to his service account, provided that the sum of the membership service and the prior service exceeds thirty years, then credit for membership service shall be reduced so that the sum of membership service and prior service shall not exceed thirty years and provided further, that the sum of the prior service pension, the basic pension and membership service pension shall not exceed thirteen hundred dollars per annum.

(e) Maximum Service to be Eligible for a Pension. To be eligible to receive the pension provided for in paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this section, a member must have at least ten years of service credited to his service account, provided, that the foregoing shall not apply to a member becoming eligible for benefits provided for in sections 18 and 24.

Section 17. Deferred Service Retirement Allowance. On or after July 1, 1945 should any member (1) who has fifteen or more years of service credited to his service account, and (2) who has attained the age fifty five years, separate from the service of the Village for reasons other than becoming a beneficiary, he shall remain a member during the period of his absence from Village service for the exclusive purpose only of receiving a service retirement allowance provided for in section 16, said service retirement allowance to begin at the attainment of his eligible retirement age, provided, that if such member should withdraw all or part of the accumulated contributions credited to him in the Annuity Savings Fund, he shall thereupon cease to be a member, and all his rights hereunder shall end except only the right to withdraw any balance of accumulated contributions then credited to him.

Section 18. Optional Retirement Allowance. Until the effective date of his service retirement, as provided for in sections 14 and 15, any member may elect to receive his service retirement allowance in a retirement allowance payable throughout life (to be known as a regular retirement allowance), or he may elect to receive the retirement allowance at that time, in a reduced retirement allowance payable throughout life, in accordance with the provisions of Option I, II or III, as hereinafter set forth. If a member dies before he has elected an option effective, such a member shall be considered in service at the time of his death and his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of section 25 (b).

Option I. Cash Refund Annuity. If a beneficiary dies before he has received in payment of the annuity portions of his reduced retirement allowance, the amount of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his retirement, the balance shall be paid in a single sum to such person or persons, having an insurable interest in his life, as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission, or if there be no such designated person or persons, then to his executor or administrator, or

Option II. Joint and Last Survivorship Allowance. If a beneficiary dies his reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person, having an insurable interest in his life as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission at the time of his retirement, or

Option III. Modified Joint and Last Survivorship Allowance. If a beneficiary dies, one-half of his reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person, having an insurable interest in his life, as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Commission at the time of his retirement.

Section 19. Duty Disability Incurred. Upon the application of a member, or his department head, a member who becomes totally incapacitated for duty as the natural result of the actual performance of duty as an employee of the Village, without negligence on his part, shall be retired, provided, the Medical Director after a medical examination of such member, shall certify (1) that the member is totally or physically totally incapacitated for the further performance of duty in the service of the Village, and (2) that such incapacity will probably be permanent, and (3) that such member should be retired. If a member is eligible for retirement, the Medical Director shall be approved by the Commission.

Section 20. (a) Duty Disability Benefits — For Retirement After Eligible Retirement Age. Upon retirement for disability, as provided for in section 19 a disability beneficiary who has attained his eligible retirement age shall receive a service retirement allowance according to the provisions of Section 16.

(b) Duty Disability Benefits — For Retirement Before Eligible Retirement Age. Upon retirement for disability, as provided for in section 19, a disability beneficiary who has not attained his eligible retirement age shall receive a disability retirement pension equal to one-half his average final compensation to continue from the date of his application for disability benefits to the date of his death, his annuity reserve provided that such disability retirement pension (1) shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per annum, and (2) shall be subject to the provisions of sections 23 and 24. Upon attaining his eligible retirement age, such disability beneficiary shall receive a pension as provided for in section 16 paragraphs (b), (c) and (d), provided, that in computing such pension membership service credit shall be given such disability beneficiary for the period he was receiving a disability pension. In addition to his pension, such disability beneficiary, at the attainment of his eligible retirement age, shall receive an annuity equal to the amount of his annuity reserve which has been given his contributions to the Annuity Savings Fund, said contributions to be based upon his final compensation at the time of his disability retirement.

(c) Disability Beneficiary's Accumulated Contributions. During the period of his service retirement, as receiving a disability retirement pension, as provided for in paragraph (b) of this section, his contributions to the Annuity Savings Fund shall be suspended and his balance in the Annuity Savings Fund shall be accumulated at regular interest until his attainment of his eligible retirement age, or prior death. Upon attaining his eligible

...age, his accumulated contributions shall be transferred from the Annuity Savings Fund to the Annuity Reserve Fund. Should he die before attaining his retirement age, the amount of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his death shall be paid in accordance with the provisions of section 25 (b).

Section 21 Non-Duty Disability Incurred. On or after July 1, 1945 upon the application of a member, or a dependent who is in the service of the Village and who has ten or more years of service with the Village, and who becomes totally and permanently incapacitated for duty to the Village, as a result of causes occurring not in the actual performance of duty to the Village, and without negligence on the part of the member or dependent, provided, however, that a Medical Director after a medical examination of such member shall certify (1) that such member is mentally physically totally incapacitated for the further performance of duty in the service of the Village, and (2) that such incapacity will probably be permanent, and (3) that such member should be retired, and provided further that the report of the Medical Director shall be approved by the Commission.

Section 22 Non Duty Disability Benefits. Upon retirement for disability, as provided for in section 21, a beneficiary who has attained his eligible retirement age shall receive a service retirement allowance provided for in section 23, and which becomes payable as stated in his eligible retirement age shall receive following benefits:

(a) **Cash Refund Annuity** A cash refund annuity shall be the actuarial equivalent of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund at the time of his retirement, and

(b) **Disability Retirement Pension.** A disability retirement pension equal to one-hundred thirty fifth (135) of his average final compensation for each year service credited to his service account not to exceed (30) years, provided, that such disability retirement pension (1) shall not exceed the maximum annual amount, and (2) shall be subject to the provisions of sections 23 and 24.

Section 23 (a) Pensions Offset by Compensation. Any amounts which may be paid or payable under the provisions of any workmen's compensation, or under any similar law for the benefit of the member or dependent of a member or beneficiary, on account of any disability or death, shall be offset against any disability pension or allowance provided by the Village in the event of the death of the member or beneficiary, or the same disability or death, and such benefits payable under any such law shall be offset against any disability pension or allowance provided by the Village shall be accordingly reduced.

(b) **Subrogation Rights.** In the event an employee of the Village becomes entitled to pension benefits as a result of an accident or injury caused by the act of a third party, the Village shall be subrogated to the rights of the employee as against such third person to the extent necessary to the Village pays or becomes liable to the employee.

Section 24. (a) Re-Examination of Disability Benefit. Once each year during the first five years following retirement of a member with a disability retirement pension or allowance, and at least once in every two years thereafter, the Commission may require the beneficiary a application shall, require any disability beneficiary who has not attained his eligible retirement age to undergo a medical examination by or at the direction of the Medical Director. If the disability beneficiary who has not attained his eligible retirement age refuse to submit to such medical examination at any such period, his disability retirement pension or allowance may be suspended by the Commission, and should such refusal continue for one year all his contributions and to his disability retirement pension or allowance may be revoked by the Commission. If upon medical examination of a beneficiary the Medical Director reports that such beneficiary is physically unable to resume employment with the Village his report is concurred in by the Commission, then the beneficiary shall be restored to active service with the Village and his disability pension or allowance shall be continued.

(b) **Adjustment of Disability Pension.** Should the report and certify to the Commission such disability beneficiary is engaged in a gainful occupation, or as an employee of a business, or as an owner of a business from such occupation business or employment his disability retirement pension or allowance provided by the Retirement System exceeds his final compensation then the amount of such pension or allowance shall be reduced to an amount which together with his annuity and the amount earned by him shall equal his final compensation provided that the report of the Secretary is concurred in by the Commission. Should the disability beneficiary's earnings be later changed his disability pension shall be correspondingly adjusted.

Section 25 (a) Refund of Accumulated Contributions to Retirement. Should a member cease to be employed by the Village before attaining his eligible retirement age, for reasons other than becoming a beneficiary or dying, or (2) after attaining his eligible retirement age at not being entitled to a pension he shall be entitled to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund, and the amount of his credit shall be paid in accordance with the demand in writing on forms furnished by the Commission.

Section 26 (a) Refund of Accumulated Contributions - Upon Death of Member. Should a member die the amount of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund, at the time of his death shall be paid to such person or persons having an insurable interest in his life as he shall have nominated by written declaration duly executed and filed with the Commission. If there be no such designated person or persons his accumulated contributions shall be paid to his executor, administrator, or legal representative.

(b) **Installment Refund of Accumulated Contributions.** Payment of refunded accumulated contributions may be made in monthly installments according to such regulations as the Commission may adopt.

Section 26 (a) Annuity Savings Fund. The Annuity Savings Fund is hereby created in which shall be accumulated contributions, the contributions from the members to provide for the annuities.

...quittance of all claims and demands whatsoever for the services rendered by such person during the period covered by such payment, and either of the officer or clerk for making up the payroll shall certify to the Village Treasurer, on each and every payroll, the amount of contributions to be deducted from the compensation of each member, and each said amount shall be deducted by the Village Treasurer, and when deducted shall be credited by the Secretary to the individual Annuity Savings Fund of each member from whose compensation said deduction was made.

(c) **Re Deposit of Contributions Previously Refunded.** In addition to the contributions deducted from the compensation of a member, as herebefore provided, any member may redeposit in the Annuity Savings Fund, by a single payment, or by an increased rate of contribution, an amount equal to the total amount or any part thereof which he may have previously withdrawn therefrom as provided by this Retirement System.

(d) **Transfer of a Member's Accumulated Contributions.** Upon retirement of a member, his accumulated contributions shall be transferred from the Annuity Savings Fund to the Annuity Reserve Fund. At the expiration of a period of three years from the date an employee ceases to be a member, any balance of accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Savings Fund unclaimed by such member, shall be transferred to the Pension Reserve Fund.

Section 27 Annuity Reserve Fund. The Annuity Reserve Fund is hereby created. The Annuity Reserve Fund shall be a fund in which shall be paid all annuities and all benefits in lieu of annuities as provided by this Retirement System. Should a beneficiary retired on account of non duty disability, be restored to active service, his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the Annuity Reserve Fund and shall be credited to his individual account therein.

Section 28 (a) Pension Reserve Fund. The Pension Reserve Fund is hereby created. The Pension Reserve Fund shall be a fund in which shall be accumulated reserves for the payment of all pensions and other benefits payable from the contributions made by the Village or other persons in the service of the Village, and from which shall be paid all pensions and other benefits in lieu of pensions and other benefits as provided by this Retirement System.

(b) **Contributions by Village.** Upon the basis of such mortality tables regular interest and other tables, as may be adopted, the Village shall annually compute the pension reserve credits, reserves, annuities and other benefits payable or which might be payable from the Pension Reserve Fund to members and beneficiaries of the Retirement System. The pension reserve credits, reserves, annuities and other benefits shall be amortized in such manner as the Commission may determine subject to the approval of the Council.

(c) The pension reserve credits, reserves, annuities and other benefits rendered or to be rendered after the effective date of the Retirement System by members and pensions of beneficiaries on retirement rolls shall be amortized over a period of years not to exceed the natural lifetime of members and beneficiaries. The Commission shall report in writing to the Council on or before the first day of May of each year the amount of contributions to be paid by the Village, or any instrumentality of the Village to the Retirement or Pension System, and from which shall be paid appropriate and the Village and such instrumentality of the Village shall pay such amounts of contributions to the funds of the Retirement System during the current fiscal year. The amount of contributions to the Retirement System shall be credited to the Pension Reserve Fund.

(c) If the amount appropriated in the budget for any year is not sufficient to pay in full the amounts due in said year to all beneficiaries of the Retirement System, the amount of such insufficiency shall hereupon be provided out of the funds of the Village, or any instrumentality thereof, by the appropriating authorities of the Village.

Section 29 Expense Fund. The Expense Fund shall be a fund to which shall be credited all money provided by the Village to pay the administration expense of the Retirement System and from which shall be paid all expenses necessary in connection with the administration of the Retirement System. The Commission shall annually certify to the appropriating authorities of the Village on or before the first day of May of each year the amount of appropriation necessary to administer the Retirement System during the current fiscal year and the Village shall appropriate such amount to the credit of the Expense Fund.

Section 30 (a) Management of Funds. The Commission shall have full power to invest and reinvest such funds subject to all terms, conditions and restrictions imposed by the law of the State of Michigan upon life insurance companies in the making and disposition of investments, except that notes, bonds or other securities of any county, city, village or other political subdivision of Michigan shall not be subject to said restrictions or limitations. The Commission shall have the power to purchase real estate bonds or other obligations of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms at any legally conducted public or private sale.

(b) The Commission shall have full power to hold purchase sell assign transfer and dispose of any of the securities and investments in which any of the funds of the Retirement System have been invested as well as the proceeds of any such investments and any moneys belonging to the Retirement System. There shall be kept on deposit available cash not exceeding ten per centum of the total assets of the Retirement System. All funds of the Retirement System shall be held for the sole purpose of meeting disbursements for pensions annuities and other payments authorized by the provisions of this Retirement System and shall be used for no other purpose.

(c) The description of the various Funds of the Retirement System in sections 26, 27, 28 and 29 shall be interpreted to refer to the accounting records of the Retirement System and not to the segregation of moneys in the funds of the Retirement System.

Section 31 Allowance of Regular Interest. The Commission annually shall allow regular interest on the amount of assets credited to the Annuity Savings Fund, Annuity Reserve Fund and the Pension Reserve Fund provided however that interest on contributions from members credited to the Annuity Savings Fund which have any fiscal year to begin on or after the first of the fiscal year next following and shall be computed and credited at the end of the fiscal year. The amounts of interest so allowed shall be due and payable to said funds of the Retirement System shall be annually credited thereto by the Commission from interest and other earnings on moneys of the Retirement System. Any additional amount necessary to allow regular interest on the funds of the Retirement System shall be paid from the Pension Reserve Fund and all interest and other earnings from deposits and investments of the funds of the Retirement System not required for the allowance of regular interest shall be credited to the Pension Reserve Fund.

Section 32 Assignments Prohibited. The right of a person to an annuity or pension on a retirement allowance, or to the return of accumulated contributions the annuity or pension or the retirement allowance itself, any optional benefit and any other accrued or accrued to any member or beneficiary under the provisions of this Retirement System and the moneys belonging to the Retirement System shall not be subject to execution garnishment attachment or other process of law whatsoever, and shall be unassignable except as is specifically provided by the provisions of this Retirement System, provided,

that the Village shall have the right of setoff for any claim arising from embezzlement by or fraud of a member.

Section 33 Errors. Should any change or error in the records result in any member or beneficiary receiving from the Retirement System more or less than he would have been entitled to receive had the records been correct, the Commission shall correct such error, and as far as practicable, shall adjust the payments so that benefit to which such member or beneficiary was correctly entitled shall be paid.

Section 34. Other Provisions of Charter or Ordinance. No other provision of law, charter, or ordinance which provides wholly or partly at the expense of the Village for pensions or retirement benefits for employees of the Village their widows, children, or other dependents shall apply to members of beneficiaries of the Retirement System, their widows, children or other dependent.

(b) If a state-operated retirement system including municipal employees as beneficiaries shall become operative the Council may, by such vote as may be required by the statute providing for such system, take the action required to make the Village a member of such system, in which event the Council shall have full power so to deal with the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System hereby created as to comply with the requirements of the state law.

(c) All provisions of any ordinance inconsistent with the provisions of this Amendment are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

Section 35 Unclaimed Funds. Any moneys credited in any of the funds to a member, as to which or as to any part of which there shall be a failure of beneficiaries, shall by action of the Commission be credited and transferred to the Pension Reserve Fund.

Section 36 Modifying the Provisions of This Retirement System. Whenever an actuarial valuation of the assets and liabilities of the Retirement System shows that

the total of the assets credited to the Pension Reserve Fund equals or exceeds the total of (1) the pension reserves covering pensions being paid to beneficiaries, and (2) the pension reserves covering pensions which might be payable on account of accrued service credited to members of the Council may by ordinance (1) increase the amount of pension benefits provided by this retirement system or (2) add new pension benefits, provided, that no such increase in pension benefits or new pension benefits shall be made if the Village's total annual contribution to the Retirement System, for all pension benefits being paid or which might be payable by the Retirement System, shall by reason thereof exceed seven per cent of the aggregate pay salary or compensation received by members during the preceding fiscal year.

Section 37 Saving Clause. If any provision, section, paragraph, sentence clause or phrase of this Amendment is for any reason found to be unconstitutional, or is held to be unconstitutional, the remainder of the provisions of this Amendment shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect.

Section 38 The effective date of this Retirement System shall be the first day of March 1945.

Only persons having the qualifications of electors who have properly assessed for taxes in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms or the lawful husbands or wives of such persons shall be entitled to vote thereon in said election.
