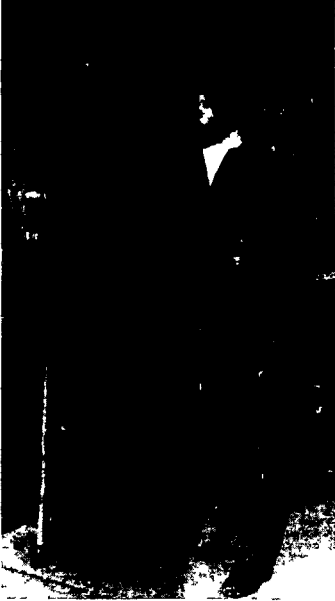

Union Proposes Sick Ordinance

A draft of a proposed ordinance was submitted to the Grosse Pointe City Council Monday night by Leo George Strama, local president of the Detroit Local of the Federal State and National Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers. Strama is pushing up the matter of sick leaves for the city employees. The union's subject, that will be later consideration at the time Mr. Strama and Mr. Percy were engaged in a discussion of the matter. Early this winter local union representatives met with the city and discussed the matter and collect on sick leave employees. The principal feature of the sick leave proposal presented by the union officials is that there shall be 15 days each year for sick leave. A third line of pay for sick leave will be provided to the employee. These sick days may carry over to a maximum of 100 days to meet an emergency of protracted illness or a long convalescence from an operation. It is doubtless this sentiment among many Frenchmen as well as the personal ambitions of De Gaulle who would be the new man in horseback that emboldened him to rebuff President Roosevelt's conciliatory request for a personal conference on his return from the Yalta meeting.

This public attitude of De Gaulle is certain to amaze and irritate the American people. They will not wish an act which they themselves construe as little less than an insult to their President.

Despite the unusual efforts which the Roosevelt administration has pursued to maintain a good neighbor policy with the Latin peoples of this hemisphere a course which is unquestionably being approved by the vast majority of the American people it has not succeeded in winning the wholehearted cooperation of all of these peoples.

Many trying situations no doubt exist in composing the differing attitudes of the individual Latin countries to ward world peace and unity. Naturally this part of the problem will be left largely to us by Britain and Russia who have long recognized the United States leadership in this half of the world.

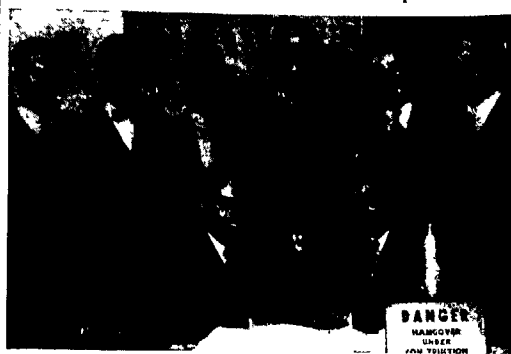

Navy-Trained Radar Experts Face Rosy Post-War Futures

Widepread post war use of "walkie talkie" portable communication devices will create many new jobs for Navy Radar trained technicians.

This was pointed out by Lieut. Comdr. Byron E. Flechtner, officer in charge of Navy recruiting and selection for this area. He urged men interested in preparing for a future after the war while they serve their country to investigate opportunities offered by the Navy in Radar. Commander Flechtner cited a recent report by the Navy in Radar Communications Commission which expressed the view that post war use of walkie talkie communications equipment will be as broad as the imagination of the public and the industry of the equipment manufacturer.

The FCC reported that walkie talkie is used by the armed forces and later employed for business calling services. To such extent they are not available by telephone by means of organ set ups to communicate between offices and delivery vehicles and on farms to reach men in the fields.

Because of the training given them in Navy Radar technicians will be able to install and maintain this type of equipment. Commander Flechtner said that men 17 to 30 years old are qualified for Radar training by passing the Eddy Test given at all Navy Recruiting Stations. Those in the 18 to 30 age bracket can take the test after passing their pre-induction physical examination. The test covers mathematics algebra physics electricity radio and shop practice.

The test is given daily except Sundays at Navy Recruiting Stations in Detroit. First class Rapid Jacks, Kalamazoo Lansing and Sarnia.

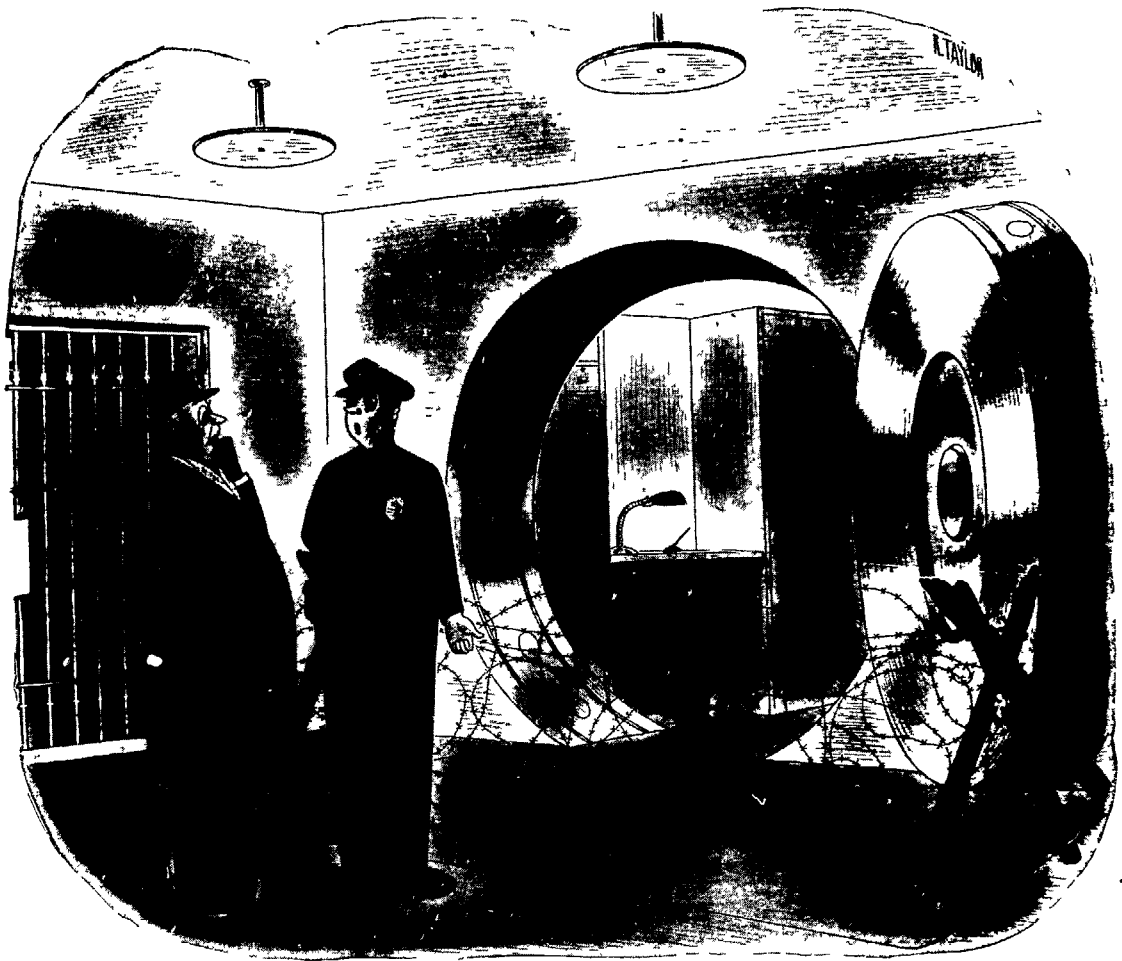
