As strike in Chrysler and Briggs plants goes into its eighth day nearly 38,000 men are idle in Detroit war industries.

The War Labor Board in Washington today issued a number of recommendations which Walter P. Reuther UAW General Motors local said would undoubtedly pave the way for the realization of proposals by the greatest advance of labor in many decades after directing General Motors Corporation

to pay "fringe" wage increases to its workers estimated at \$10,000,000. It recommends to the President that he institute a study to regularize production guarantee full employment and stabilize earnings in the automobile industry.

**Sunday, March 4**  
The American Ninth and Canadian First Army effect a June ture Allied headquarters announces that the enemy's First Parachute Army and the Fifteenth Army along with their Fifth Panzer Army previously destroyed have now been destroyed as organized fighting forces.

The Inter Allied Conference in Mexico City through the unanimous action of the Inter American organization committee perfects an agreement given them the Act of Chapultepec which creates a league of American states each pledged to protect the territorial integrity and political independence of the others against aggression from any quarter. This measure in effect spreads the mantle of protection against foreign aggression over all the Western Hemisphere as achieved by the Monroe Doctrine but pledges to its support the common action of all the American nations rather than leaving its maintenance to the self appointed responsibility of the United States alone. It takes positive ground against intra hemispheric strife by mutually pledging the inviolability of each nation's territory.

The National Association of Manufacturers completes a survey of post war employment prospects which finds 56,000,000 jobs will be available after reconversion, about four million more jobs than were available in 1939 and only four million less than the number President Roosevelt says must be provided.

The NAM tempers its optimistic forecast with the qualification that "this volume of employment must necessarily depend upon a favorable economic climate upon how quickly the government lifts its ban on reconversion, and upon a national confidence shared by all elements of our society."

**Monday, Mar 5**  
A terrific battle is in progress between the Canadian First Army and the American Ninth and First Armies, practically on the banks of the Rhine with German divisions seeking escape across the few remaining bridges over the Rhine.

The Red army threatens Berlin from a consolidated front stretching across the Reich on the northern section of the Russo German front estimated that as many as a million German troops may be trapped.

The last Jap in Manila has been exterminated and Mac Arthur says that Filipino guerrillas have already killed thousands of Japs in northern Luzon.

The Dodge strike ends and 25,000 men go back to work.

The story of the murder by fire and machine guns of American machine soldiers and sailors prisoners of war of the Japs on Palawan island first mentioned in dispatches from General MacArthur is given in detail by one of the five survivors of the massacre.

One hundred and fifty Americans contained in small slit trenches were saturated with gasoline which was ignited and as they attempted to leap from the trenches were mowed down with machine guns the outrage happened when Jap scout planes first discovered the American convoy bound for Mindoro island and believing it was destined for Palawan island the Japs killed the prisoners.

### Await Results Of Radio Tests

The examination papers of the policemen of the Park Farm station and Woods who took the tests for Radio Telephone Operator's Permit at the Class "C" licenses last week are in the hands of the Detroit office of the Federal Communications Commission. Later cut off from the rest of the company Weiser continued his work until capture was imminent. Only then did he cease operations carefully hiding his valuable radio in a ditch. Escaping from a negligent guard after being held only a few hours he immediately recovered his radio.

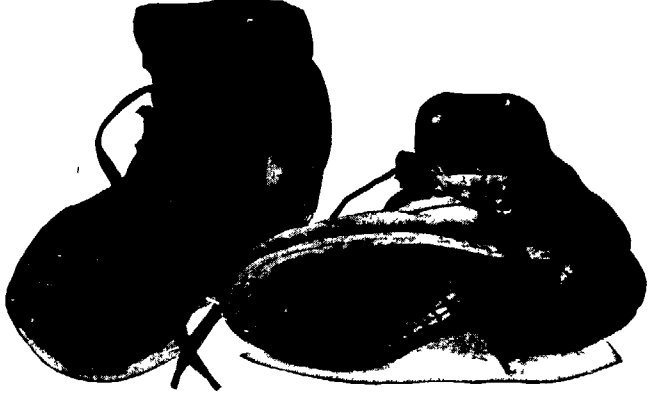

parations in the belief that the University gives its full measure of service to Michigan then the citizens of the state will back the University in solving its problems.

All our work at the University falls into one of two classes. It is either research or education. I believe that our opportunities to serve Michigan in the years ahead can be divided into the same two classes.

In the research field we demand both on and off the campus. We are studying industry with a view to know how the new process developed during the war can be applied to peacetime production. The government is ready to pay plans to conduct a great deal of its present research. The engineer biologist chemist physicist at electronic expert—all will be called on to find new discover as and applications.

Business will be asking for marketing studies. Labor and management already are calling on the University for leaders and for educational programs. Schools are asking how they can best utilize the lessons which our war training programs have taught us.

All these are just a few of the opportunities to serve which will be offered to the University by men and institutions off the campus. Great as this field will be, I believe a still larger one will lie in the way the educational.

responsibility of course will be to offer the young men and women of Michigan a chance to acquire a fine education as can be had at any institution of higher learning in this connection.

By means of our counseling and guidance programs extended. By learning what abilities what aptitudes a student has when he first comes to college we are able to help him make a wiser choice of courses and often of a career. An enlarged program will save wasted effort, cost, and time.

Veterans are returning to our colleges in constantly greater numbers. Already with comparatively few discharged from service the University has 350 enrolled. These men and women need and deserve special help. Not special courses where they are segregated, but extra co-ordination in their adjustment to civilian and academic life. Refresher work testing and guidance—all these items require added staff and added outlay but with the veterans turning to us for an education the University is glad of the opportunity to give it a service.

New extensions on centers like those at Flint and Grand Rapids are being added wherever there is a community in need for one. New branches in labor and in race relations have just been started.

Greater opportunities have never before to serve Michigan and the problem of meeting the cost of the enlarged program and the larger plant which will be needed.
