Joy Reigns in Wilde Home When Son is Reported Safe

There was joy in the home of Mr and Mrs George A. Wilde of 1025 Nottingham road on March 13. Mrs Wilde received a letter from her son Pfc John Gordon Baker appraising her that he was a prisoner of war in Bonn Germany. It had previously been reported that her son had been missing in action since December 23. This was at the height of the big German breakthrough that started on December 16 and the desperate character of the fighting going on then inclined the family to fear that the missing message might soon be followed by word of his death. The letter a week ago Tuesday was written by John himself and came through in regular mail, duly passed by the German prison authorities at Bonn. John was in the 28th Division (Penn National Guard Division) and it has since been learned that he was in the front line of the most desperate fighting in the heart of the Belgian bulge. Incidentally it happens that this town of Bonn from which he wrote his letter is directly on the path of his own First Army and may even now be occupied by the Americans. Whether the capture of the place would effect the release of the American prisoners there is problematical. If they have time to do so the Germans would undoubtedly remove the prisoners farther east. It has happened however recently that the Russians on the eastern front have taken over several prison camps so quickly that the Germans have had no time to move their prisoners. Many Americans there have already been released and are to be returned to America via Black Sea ports.

It will then be sent to Girl Scouts in war torn countries through safe channels as the Red Cross and the Russian War Relief to be used for food clothes and educational material.

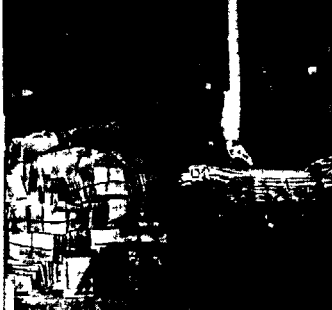

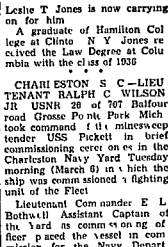

Victory Gardeners

The garden is a snap bean to the peas, chard, beets, broccoli, carrots, cabbage, sweet corn, cucumbers. For freezing plant snap beans, peas, chard, broccoli and sweet corn and storing grow dry beans beets, arrots and cabbage.

Earliness of maturity is one of the principal factors to be considered in selecting vegetable varieties for Michigan gardens. Points out Keith C. Barrons of the department of horticulture Michigan State college. This is particularly true he says in the northern Michigan where the short season plays a leading role in the selection of varieties.

An example of an early maturing variety is the new early Chatham tomato which will ripen in the same location as the late variety in the Upper Peninsula. In selecting, seed for the tender crops only those varieties which will mature within the frost free season should be used. With the more hardy crops, such as the corn, the first frost in the fall and which may be planted in the spring, earliness of maturity is not so important.

Resistance to disease is another factor that should be considered in selecting seeds for certain crops. Recommended cabbage variety are resistant to yellows, and certain varieties of other vegetables are resistant to disease prevalent in Michigan. Personal tastes also should enter into variety selection and seasonal weather and moisture conditions often affect the results obtained.

Gardeners are often confused by the many varieties offered for sale but fortunately most of those commonly sold in Michigan are satisfactory for conditions within the state.

Eisenhower Asks Scouts for Paper

General Dwight D. Eisenhower will sponsor the Boy Scout Waste Paper Campaign scheduled for the months of March and April. Frank Cody, President, Detroit Area Council, announced today.

Indicating the urgent need for more waste paper General Eisenhower in conjunction with the War Production Board has asked the Boy Scouts of America to collect 150,000 tons of waste paper during the 60 day period.

Plans for the Campaign include the awarding of special medals to every Scout who collects and turns in 1,000 pounds or more of waste paper. Scout Troops and Cub Packs whose collections average 1,000 pounds or more per member will be presented with a World War II shell covering from a shell which has been fired from an American gun in battle. Each covering will be inscribed with a message from General Eisenhower.

Cody also stressed the need for automobiles and trucks to assist in the collection. Scouts are eager to canvass for waste paper door to door. But carrying bundles weighing a hundred pounds or more for any distance is a tough job for a teen age lad. Those who wish to cooperate by donating the use of their cars or trucks for a few hours can make arrangements by calling the Scout Troop nearest them. Scout headquarters at Columbia 1600.

Each Scout Troop and Cub Pack is urged to regularly call on every family in their Troop or Pack Service Area. There are enough Scouts to cover all of the 13,000 residence blocks in the Metropolitan Detroit Area.

In urging public support of the Campaign Cody emphasized the fact that the Boy Scout Campaign would not interfere with waste paper collection projects of other organizations.

Public Is Warned 1945 Will Remain Tough Coal Year

Pointing out that the present stringent fuel situation will continue through 1945 C. J. Potter, Deputy Solid Fuels Administrator has informed Capt. Donald S. Leonard State Fuel Conservation Director that any community that burns its coal in reckless disregard of the future is likely to suffer much more than if it took every possible step to burn its fuel more carefully.

Even the end of the war in Europe will not alleviate the coal shortage. Potter said as a result of substantial cutbacks in car production during the 12 months following V E day has gone to the board.

Everything points to the fact that in respect to coal production 1945 is going to be a very tough year. Potter stated. The manpower situation will undoubtedly get worse. Not much more for mines will be there than over to get the truck and tire situation will further deteriorate.

What we must expect a substantial drop in coal production we can look for no decrease in our overall requirements. According to Potter the maximum production that we can hope for is 580 million tons.

Potter warned that for the first year since 1941-42 it may be necessary to cut coal allotments

for home heating down to 80 per cent as compared to 90 per cent for 1944-45.

While there has been some improvement in the coal situation in Michigan the statement by Mr. Potter definitely shows that we must make every possible effort to save fuel. Capt. Leonard commented. The wise consumer will take heed of the warning by Solid Fuels Administration and thereby avert the possibility of experiencing actual suffering because of lack of fuel.

Capt. Leonard reported that the Certificate of Necessity plan established by the Michigan Office of Civilian Defense of which he is also director is still in operation in many communities in the state to enable consumers to obtain coal. The number of applications for it is not as great as during the peak of the fuel shortage. Many coal dealers however are still reporting a serious shortage in supply and efforts are being made by MOCED to obtain relief for them.

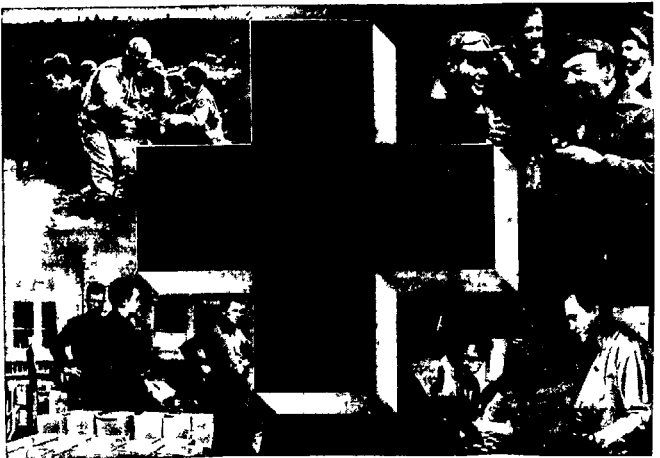

Rotarians Hear Talk on Arson
 The Grosse Pointe Rotary members listened to one of the most interesting talks they have heard in a long time at the meeting on Monday by Inspector George Smith of the Asper Bureau of the Detroit Police Department.
 Inspector Smith has headed the special branch of police work in Detroit since the creation of the Bureau 24 years ago when it was started with two plain clothes men detailed from the regular force to attend to this work.
 Since then the Bureau has grown to a numerous corps of 11 agents and the efficiency of their work is illustrated in the decline on fire losses from "started fires" which amounted to more than a million dollars a year in 1921 to less than \$150,000 at the present.
 In this intervening quarter century more than 25,000 possible incendiary fires have been investigated and 2,200 convictions secured.
 The inspector discussed in detail the character of the work they did. He classified all arson crimes as coming almost wholly under the four different classes. From one of these started for re-
