Post Office Orders City Lease Signed

Problems Appear Ended, Money Order Service Expected Immediately

It looks at last as if Grosse Pointe was going to have its post office problem settled. Last week Victor Burlingame, Office Inspector in this district, and in charge of leases and rentals for post office properties, called upon City Clerk Neff of Grosse Pointe City and informed him he had been instructed from Washington to proceed with the execution of the lease for the property on Main Street, known as the City and which has been used as the Grosse Pointe branch of the Detroit office for nearly two years.

Mr. Neff advised the Council of his latest action at the meeting Monday night.

The rental of \$100 per month will be named in the lease as stipulated by the Council last December. This is to permit the vacating of the property when and as the Department of Post Offices so directs. The building here in the Pointe, the inference is that the issue of a permanent office is to be put off until such a place is secured.

Assessments Subjected to Careful Study

Inequalities Are Charged By Some Members of Village Governing Body

A complete list of assessments on personal property in the Village of Grosse Pointe Park was turned over to the village commissioners Monday by Clerk William Stammen.

Commissioner James McMillan, who has just week introduced the resolution calling on Mr. Stammen who is also village assessor, said he had not yet had a chance to look it over. He said that undoubtedly the commission would meet to discuss it next week after all members had had a chance to study the list.

Mr. McMillan pointed out that he did not expect any drastic upheavals in the village over the list, but he was concerned that a list should have been in the possession of all the commissioners last week so that no one had ever thought to say for one.

However, it was made known last week that certain of the commissioners were far from satisfied with what they had just learned of the personal property assessments in the village.

It was reported that for some time there has been inequities apparent in such assessments especially as pertaining to business concerns. Some of the commissioners felt that the revenues of the village could be materially increased if some of these assessments were raised to the proper level.

Mr. McMillan said that his criticism was directed against assessments on household furnishings. He said that he had personally property that produced revenue for the village, but that it was assessed at a level common to other property which obtains in Detroit.

The next regular meeting of the Park Commission is scheduled for next Monday night. If any action is taken on the assessments it will probably some time later in the month. Commissioners have had a chance to go over the figures possibly in executive session.

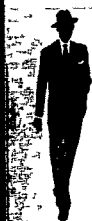

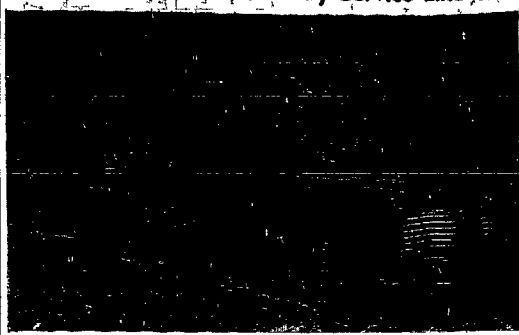

Remember—Men's and women's fashions need not be dry cleaned. A good brushing will suffice. Bad clothing, etc., should be washed and thoroughly dried but not necessarily ironed before being brought in.

Pointe to Get Taxi Service

City Approves Establishment of Stand at Kercheval and St. Clair

Following a story published by the NEWS a few weeks ago the Pointe is in a fair way of getting a taxi stand at Kercheval and St. Clair.

The NEWS acted on the suggestion of Jesse W. Fleck of Charles place contacting Mayor Hugh Dill to see if there was any existing ordinance which would have to be set aside before a hack stand could be located in the city.

James E. Webb proprietor of the gas station at Kercheval and St. Clair appeared before the City Council Monday night and asked permission to operate a taxi stand. The appealing part of his proposition was that he would not have to ask for permission to establish a cab stand on the public streets as it is his intention to keep the taxis on his own property, there awaiting phone calls from citizens who wish service.

Webb's suggestion was received most agreeably by the councilmen. With little debate they adopted a motion granting such permission to him, on the understanding that the Village attorney is to draw up an ordinance with the usual provisions and protections obtaining between the municipality and the taxi operating agency.

Mr. Webb said he expected to charge the same rates as those in Detroit. He is to go ahead at once and get his permit from the state public service commission and for gasoline from the Office of Defense Transportation. He said he did not anticipate any trouble in this as there is great need for such a local service. At the time there are no competing services and Mr. Webb has a clear field.

He intends to start business with four taxis. His service station has operated heretofore on a seven-hour basis but with the taking on of the taxi business he said he would operate on a twenty-four hour basis.

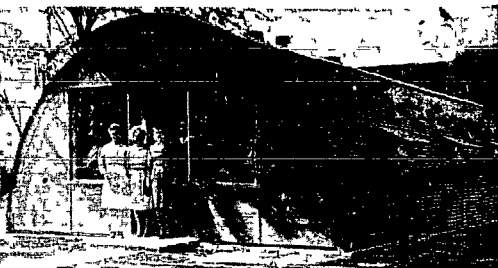
