At the same time Dr. Davies issued a letter to the Farms authorities requesting that an arrangement be made again this season whereby the water tests and facilities of the Farms pumping station be made available to him as was done last season.
This request will come before the Farms Council at their next meeting on Monday night.
On May 11th Dr. Davies received the following letter from Dr. DeKleene:
Dear Dr. Davies:
Pursuant to your telephone call on May 7, 1946 I have made enquiry and have determined that the Macomb County Interceptor sewer has been in operation and the sewage originating in Macomb County was at the gate of our plant on May 5 being discharged into the Wayne County sewer system for treatment at Detroit.
Except for excess flows occurring during storms the sewage has been treated in this manner for several weeks following a period in February and March when diversion to Lake St. Clair occurred.
Daily bacteriological samples collected at the Grosse Pointe Farms water works intake, of which the best available laboratory check on the quality of the lake water available to us.
The April report is not yet received but on the basis of previous records under comparable physical circumstances we believe the lake water should be of satisfactory quality for recreational purposes.
Until such times as it becomes possible to prevent all diversion of mixtures of untreated sewage and storm water in the lake a thing not financially practical at present, unquestionably it is going to be necessary to keep a close watch on this water front.
Even under the best of control the physical nature of the sewage system in this area will bring the lake from time to time and all the health authorities and others interested in the recreational uses of this water will need to study the matter carefully so that maximum safe use of these waters can be enjoyed but also so that such use is not controlled within potentially unsafe conditions are present.

He said the best service the folks at home can render these men is to accept them as normal beings again into our domestic life. Their spiritual disturbances will soon become adjusted.
Above all he said we must not look upon wounded or physically disabled men. No look or question should be directed to them which would imply any doubt upon our part of their ability to again become self respecting, self supporting and assisting American citizens. They want sympathy it would be better to ignore it.
The Colonel spoke at some length on the magnificent job the women in the combat service corps have done. He said these women were about 90 per cent unscathed. They had done a good job vitally necessary.
He bluntly stated that in his opinion the social conduct of these young women who have done a wonderful job often in the midst of real hardships was superior to the average moral level of these at home.

budgets where services can be reduced is paramount. Certain ly this is the time for a considerable reduction of salary on personnel with all of the tremendous inflationary forces going on around us.
I sincerely hope that our local assessing authorities can convince the State Tax Commission that the whole matter of reduction of assessments could more reasonably be considered at a time when we had some additional building going on which might take up the load that occurred in any kind of a recession.
I enclose herewith a study of the wealth per pupil in Grosse Pointe Michigan since 1930. Table X, I also enclose Table XII, a statement showing the decrease in State Aid received in the local school district for the past thirteen years. Glancing down the columns of assessed valuation in millions on Table X and in our average membership of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools one can see readily the increasing financial problems that we have had. Any accounting of that decreased wealth per pupil when our membership remains about the same figures as had our two neighboring cities of Grosse Pointe would seriously cripple our school system.
I am sure from our conversations about this matter that I have said nothing here which you do not already know and with which you do not agree. I simply want to point out a few of these facts to be of aid to you in meeting this situation in the wisest and most judicious manner.

Young Semmler's directive says that "he is prohibited from obtaining any mileage ration of whatever description for so long as gas shall be rationed."
Long Time No Gas
The one applying to Robert W. Semmler, director, that directed the period in which this order is in effect every and all basic and supplemental and fleet mileage rations of which he may be in possession for use in passenger automobiles (referring to two cars a Cadillac and a Ford in possession of the Semmlers), now in his possession or any other passenger automobiles subsequently to be acquired by him together with the right to receive any further ration for passenger automobiles now in use are hereby revoked and suspended for the period beginning May 21, 1946 and ending November 31, 1946 or upon the expiration of the term of the Second War Powers Act whichever is sooner.
It is furthermore specifically intended that this order extends to and includes not only revocation of any rations presently existing but to the respondent's right to be of any gasoline obtained by means of such rations.
Calls for Surrender
"R. W. Semmler shall surrender all of the aforesaid designated basic, supplemental and fleet rations for use in passenger automobiles."
Attorney John E. Wilcox atorney for the G.P.A. in the case stated that the issue involved only the right of the Semmlers to the use of gas in their passenger cars. The question of the gas for the fleet of trucks which Mr. Semmler's routing concern operates was not in issue except only as were used for gas in his passenger cars.
That issue would be one which the Office of Defense Transportation would need pass upon.

In the very first event of the meet the 120 high hurdles Don McLean tied the school record held by Ralph Savory and Frank Stamford. McLean, a tall rangy easy going lad has been showing great promise all spring and Coach Frank Bannach believes he will hold the record alone before the track season ends. The record is 18.5 seconds.

McLean attempted to make it another double win which has been the case in the first four meets for him in the 200 yard low hurdles but Dame Fortune wasn't so generous this time. McLean stumbled on the first hurdle and took a nasty spill when he was leading by three yards. He picked himself up and finish off third behind team mate Johnny Kels and Conrad Hill berry of Ferndale.

Everettman showed remarkable staying power to win the mile run easily and Mart Beer ran the best race of the day when he came from behind in the 440 to win by a half step.

Don Beck and Bill Drew, those one two wins ran 2.8 in the 100 yard dash and 1.1 in the 200 All season long Dan and Bill have taken turns in winning these two events. Drew also won the broad jump with a leap of 10 1/2.

Campaign Will Be Conducted For Elimination of Ragweed

The Garden Clubs of the Detroit area, affiliated with the Michigan Federated Garden Clubs are making ready for an intensive campaign of public education on the theme of ragweed elimination. The campaign will be carried on the week of June 2.

Mrs. W. K. Wheelock of 288 Cleverly road is the chairman of the ragweed campaign. "Placards will be displayed bearing essential information on the work for Grosse Pointe are being made by the pupils of the art department of the schools.

In addition to this publicity a most practical measure is to be inaugurated in familiarizing the small gardeners to be notified and displayed in store windows and other conspicuous places. There is no danger from contact with the weed prior to pollination which occurs usually about mid-August.

The ragweed elimination program is of special interest to victory garden workers as it is most apt to start in newly turned ground and many garden workers do not recognize it on sight.

Plant pathologists in the Michigan State College hope to be able to announce a specific formula for its elimination soon but this relief is not yet in sight. The surest way of destroying it is to cut it down with a hoe if this is done prior to pollination it effectively prevents the recurrence of the plant another year in that location.

Of all the minor plagues that beset the American people annually the ragweed stands first. It can be banished by the aroused interest of the people
