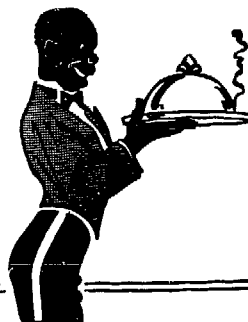

Circuit Court of Wayne county was petitioned to issue an injunction directed to the Village of Grosse Pointe Park restraining it from enforcing its bright new ordinance which is no state secret that the amendment was drawn up with the municipal eye cocked knowingly at Tony's stand.

The case has been on trial for the past four days before Judge Clyde J. Webster.

At the last meeting of the Park Commissioners Robert J. Lawrence appeared before the council and urged that some compromise be effected. He suggested that justice might be better achieved, all around than by letting the case run its course to an end which would not be better than the one which would be reached if it passed on it.

This argument appealed also to Fred McGraw the Village Attorney who confessed that late next spring would be the earliest moment at which a decision would be reached if it went to the highest court.

Thursday afternoon Judge Webster dismissed the case with prejudice. The net effect of this, under the understanding between the Village and Kohnis, is that the ordinance will stand that Tony will be permitted to remain in his present location until March 31, 1946 but at that time he must abandon the stand and will not attempt to set up a similar establishment on any street of the village.

This will prevent his applying for the ordinary transient pedicler's license as amended ordinance provides and gives him meanwhile the benefit of a full summer's business and quite time to make his arrangements for the future.

### Meeting of Yanks and Reds Nets Pointer Soviet Medal

A decoration has been bestowed on Capt. David W. Allen of Grosse Pointe Farms by the commander of a Red Army Corps which joined forces with an American corps while crushing German resistance in Austria.

The military operations of the two famous Allied Army Corps which formed a powerful wedge reached a dramatic climax when the two victorious commanders marked the successful completion of their respective missions in an historic meeting on a bridge over the Enns River where the patrols of the two Corps had established first contact.

A guard of honor composed of veterans of some of the great battles ever fought formed the background for the meeting of Lieutenant General Walton Walker, commander of the Third U. S. Army and the commander of the Russian Corps which came from the East. The meeting took place on May 9, 1945, the day hostilities officially ceased in Europe.

An exchange of personal and Corps flags by the commanders highlighted a formal ceremony which included the presentation of military decorations in the names of the American and Soviet Governments.

In discussions which took place later, it was revealed that striking similarities existed in the characteristics and tactics employed by the two Corps and usually spearheaded the drives of their respective Armies. This had participated in the greatest battles of the War and neither had experienced a single defeat.

General Walker's XX Corps lead the Third U. S. Army thrust across France to the Moselle River, liberating the well known cities of Angers, Chartres, etc.

Chateau Thierry, Elburna and Verdun. On November 19, 1918 it captured the great fortress city of Metz. The American Third Corps cleared the Saar-Moselle Triangle and seized the key communications city of Trier.

From there it drove across the Saar River to uncover the Heligolande Line after smashing powerful German forces East of Starnberg. The Corps then raced East across the Palatine forest and crossed over U. S. lines and set out in reaching the suburbs of Luxembourg. It was ordered to change its direction of attack Southwards. The arc of the Corps advance across the Danube river crossed the Danube of the Russians in the vicinity of the Enns River in Austria.

General Marshall and General Patton have in more than one occasion realized General Walker's officers and men for their outstanding military successes and honors have been received from the cities of Chateau Thierry, Verdun and Metz.

The Public Works budget in closed provisions for performing about \$3,000 worth of pavement seal work during the year conforming to the practice established several years ago of doing a continued street maintenance job in order to avoid any large item of expense in any one year.

New equipment approved for the department included a power lawn mower, flexible sewer rod, equipment, new truck snow plow and three new tractors equipped for snow plowing and street cutting.

The extraordinary budget of the Village included \$40,000 to do net acts for public improvement and poster plans. This brings a total now set aside by the Village for this purpose of \$100,000.

Provision was also made to expend about \$5,000 in grading and fencing the newly acquired area adjoining the pumping station on Kirby road.

Five thousand dollars was appropriated for a sewer to replace the Ridgmont road sewer reported by the Engineer to be operating inefficiently.

No provision was made in the 1945 budget for any contingent amount which might be used as a cost of living bonus as was the case in the 1944 budget.

At the request of Trustee Maxon who is representing the Village Council on the Veterans Affairs Committee the Council included under extraordinary items the appropriation of \$2,200 to meet the Farms share of any expenses which may be incurred by the committee in the performance of its work.

The 1945 Water Fund budget showed an estimated net profit for the year of \$1,192.51.

The Council approved three wage increases in the Water Department.

Sidney DeBoer chemist, was raised from \$3,465 annually to \$3,800 annually.

Ray LaBelle plumber was increased from \$2,722 annually to \$2,988 and his assistant Joseph Beaupre from \$2,540 to \$2,750.

Audit reports of Ernst & Ernst were approved.

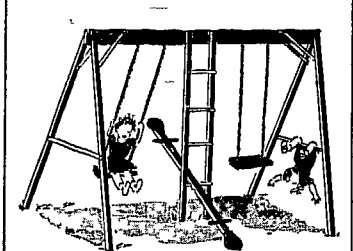

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station England—the last bombs to be dropped upon a German target by Lt. Gen James H. Doolittle's mighty Eighth Air Force were released at 11:16 a.m. April 25, on the vast Skoda armaments works at Pilsen, Czechoslovakia, it has been disclosed.

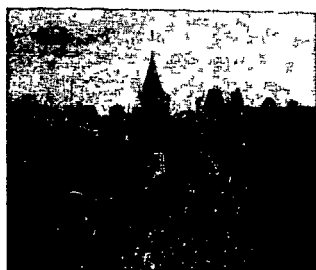

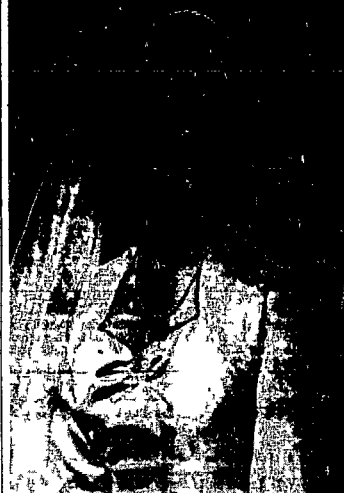

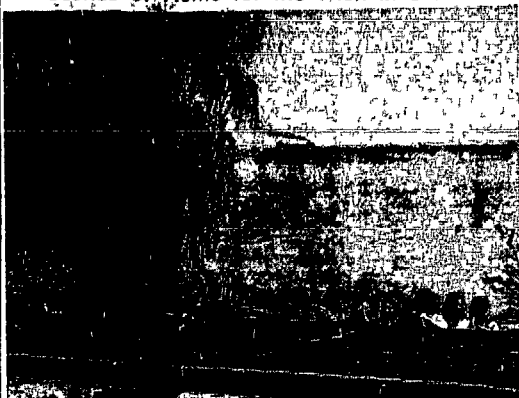

Boy Scouts to be Kept Busy
On Victory Garden Project

The whole Scouting family—Cubs, Scouts and Seniors—will be busily engaged during the next few months in another nation-wide patriotic good turn, namely, the Food For Freedom program inaugurated at the request of Marvin Jones, War Food Administrator in Washington. This year's Food For Freedom program advertised in Scouting circles as Half a Million Scout Gardens indicates that it is the War Food Administration's hope that at least 500,000 boys and leaders in Scouting will plant, cultivate and harvest a Victory Garden of their own.

There are two types of recognition which Scout Victory Gardens may receive this Fall at the conclusion of the garden project. The first is a Green Thumb certificate which may be earned by anyone who makes a sincere attempt to participate in the 1948 Food For Freedom program. The second award, recently announced by the National Victory Garden Institute is a General Arthur medal to those in Scouting whose gardens meet very high standards. The minimum requirements for this award are briefly as follows:
(a) At least 400 square feet in size.
(b) Well planned good layout, reasonable variety of products.
(c) Careful and diligent attention to soil conditions.
(d) Good production, on basis of local conditions.
(e) All produce harvested and put to good use.
(f) Good production, on basis of local conditions.

Each of the ten Districts which make up the local Scout Council is responsible for organizing its Victory Garden Committee composed of Scout Commissioners, Scoutmasters, Scout Leaders and others especially designated for this project. The job of the District Victory Garden Committees will be to advise garden inspectors and judges to encourage Cub Scouts and Scouts in their garden projects and to offer advice and counsel in their gardening programs.

It is quite likely that a number of Victory Garden Harvest Festival exhibits will be arranged by the different District Committees this Fall. Those who work in cooperative garden plots will not be eligible for the MacArthur Scout Garden medal. The medal is for individual Scout gardens only. Nor will the medal be awarded for participation in any other food production or conservation projects such as regular farming or harvesting.
Awards from any thought or hope of intrinsic award victory gardening is recommended as an ideal Cub or Scout project. It is possible for a Cub to secure many of the Cubbing's gardening activities and Scouts to qualify for Scouting's gardening Merit Badge. Rural Scouts may also earn Home Demonstration or Future Farmer recognition in the 4-H Program.
