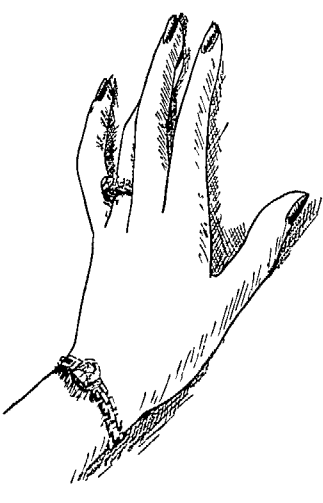

Property Owners Taking Tax Fight Into Villages After Lansing's Encouragement

Asks for Assessment Cut Totalling \$1,280,000; Granted Reduction in Appeal to State

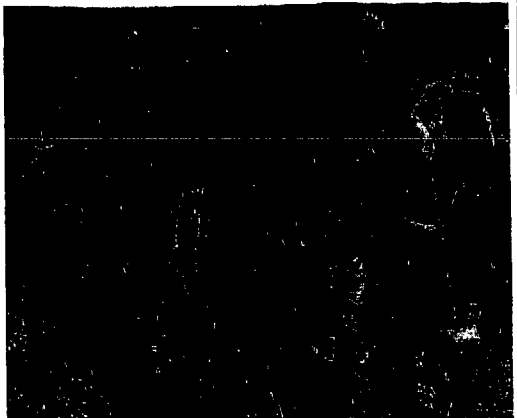
The mansion type property owners are pursuing their fight for reduced assessments on their properties into the village offices as well as the township.

When the Park Village Board met last night, the village officers held its meeting on Tuesday and Friday May 28 and 29. Fred Behr, attorney, presented a formidable list of man type property owners with their assessments and urged a cut in that village and urged a cut in that assessment. He asked for a reduction amounting to \$1,280,000 on all mansion type properties.

When he came around the following morning Saturday the board learned the Board of Assessors had agreed only to a 10 percent reduction amounting to \$120,000 and not applicable in any case to the land they occupied.

Behr said ok, but he would be back again next year for a better reduction. But the matter did not proceed any further such as a vote to take the matter to the village assessor.

Summer School Registration Starts; Classes Begin Monday

The regular Grosse Pointe Summer School begins its registration tomorrow June 15 at 2 p. m. in the high school building and continues throughout the week during the early part of next week.

On Monday June 15 regular classes begin at 8 in the morning. Those in charge urge the use of the Friday and Saturday registration periods. Not only will it enable students to start promptly on Monday but it will offer the greater opportunity for individual attention to each student's selection of courses said H. Leroy Schneider, the summer school principal.

Advance requests for information point to a large summer school. As has been true in more recent years the percentage of summer school students who are forced to attend because of their failures in the regular season has become less and less. The modern summer school seems to appeal to the more ambitious boys who wish to get all the science and mathematics they can before graduation. Many girls as well as boys take courses in typing and music which they cannot crowd in the program during the regular year.

The interest of students is particularly expressed in 1948 by the request for two new courses in music. One in theory will give the elements of musical notation. The other in voice will help students secure the correct production for work in special dramas or solo singing. These musical opportunities will be under the direction of Glen Woods and are included in his regular curriculum instruct on which will be conducted by Samuel Trecky.

If high school foreign language study has been expanded considerably Spanish and French as well as Latin will be available. The full facilities of the high school library will enrich the training of English and Social Studies just as it does in the regular sessions.

All courses are thoroughly covered in the eight weeks period ending August 15. Classes proceed at more than double their winter pace but, since class periods are twice as long this concentrated effort would no hardship on the student. Working under qualified teachers the student must meet the same test standards as in the normal school year.

The regular fee of \$800 per course is required of all residents of Grosse Pointe at the time of registration while a fee of \$12.00 per course is required of all non-residents before they may enter any classes.

As has been customary for many years special instruction in the elementary school subjects of arithmetic spelling and reading for the third fourth fifth and sixth grades will be available. The emphasis is placed upon the growth in these fundamentals by each individual child. Past records have shown many fine cases of improvement in the fall after such a summer's work in one or more of these elementary school subjects. This summer these courses will be led by Miss Nault, Mrs. West and Mr. Shaffer.

Swim Season Opens Again For Pointers

Water of Lake St. Clair Declared Safe; Pollution Going into Interceptor

The swimming season has once again been officially proclaimed in Grosse Pointe, with the announcement by Dr. Thomas Davies, Pointe health director, that the waters of Lake St. Clair are now safe for bathers.

The unusually heavy spring rains have caused Macomb County drainage officials to divert sewage and drainage into the lake a large part of the season. The resulting pollution forced local officials to ban swimming on Memorial Day the usual opening date of the season.

Macomb sewage was diverted into the interceptor at Nine Mile road last Wednesday. Studies of the pollution have shown that in cases where the pollution has not been dumped into the lake for a long period the water will clear in about 48 hours and be safe for swimming after the dumping is stopped.

William G. Harper, Macomb County Drain Commissioner, has promised Dr. Davies and other Pointe officials that he will only divert the drainage and sewage into the lake when excessive rains cause heavy drainage. Macomb drains the City of Detroit 43 per million gallons for sewage treatment and the bill can mount very fast when heavy rains are experienced. The normal dry weather flow of Macomb drainage through the Farms pumping station is 4.5 million gallons per day.

The objection which has been continually raised by the local officials is that when a rain occurs Macomb diversifies its pollution into the lake as soon as the storm starts and continues this practice for a full week thereafter.

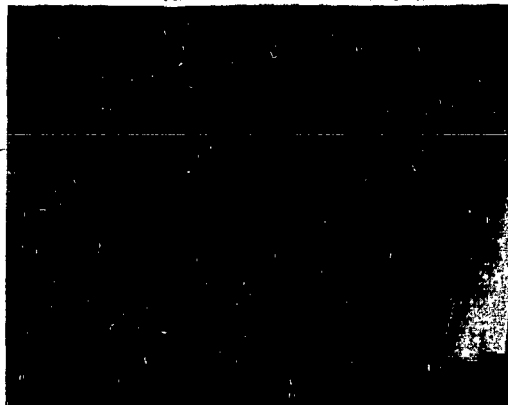

great convenience but its need seems to have passed particularly with the early prospects of motorists obtaining more gas. Commissioner Frisch had the park police take a recent four day count of the number and origin of the cars using it. He said it was true one of these days was Memorial Day when parking was light but thought nevertheless it gave a fairly clear picture of the situation.

Survey Reveals

This disclosed that on these four days 223 cars used the plot. Of these 143 came from the Farms itself, 67 from Detroit, 42 from the Farms 37 from the City of Grosse Pointe, 17 from the Woods village 14 from St. Clair Shores and only 13 from Grosse Pointe Shores. The park police accounted for about 45 per cent of its use.

Before taking final action on the matter Manager Lane was requested to get in touch with the other five Pointe municipalities and ascertain whether they thought it still served a useful and important need to justify its maintenance and if so would they be willing to continue to support it. The cost has been projected among the municipalities in the same ratio as their contributions to the OCD.

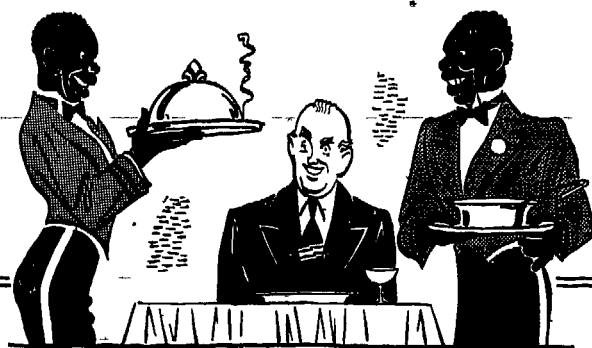

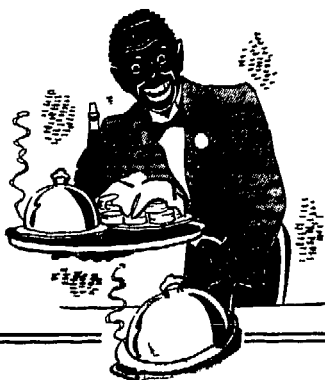

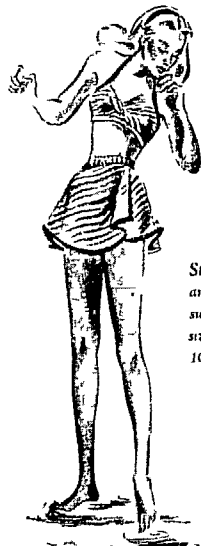

Antoine, he married Marie-Berthe the pet manicurist of the Parisian Toujoulie they opened in Antwerp. Internationally known Salon on the Rue Cambronne.

From then on his life is an open book. In Paris Antoine charged a hundred dollars for special hair arrangements. Cleopatra women would cover their hair hanging by the hair in Antoine's artistic hands.

Among the clientele of salons that made fame for him are Cecile Sorel, Lady Mendel Mrs. Vincent, Miss Cole Foster, The Duchess of Windsor, Miss Katherine Corneil and all the important names in Burke's Peccage and The Social Register.

By many of his clients Antoine was lovingly entertained, thereby giving the cash registers on the day shift and the social register on the night shift.

Antoine drew the hair of La Marquise Casati in tawny streaks to match her tiger cub thereby creating the Tigress wig.

Antoine originated for Lady Mendel the first blue rinse for grey hair, but so universally used in his salon.

Owners of numbered motor-boats in the Cleveland 8th Naval District which include Detroit may now replace their overseas numbers with smaller ones if they so desire. Capt. Paul E. Hull, U. S. Coast Guard at the District office in Cleveland announced today.

Pointe High Alumni Earning High Marks Throughout Country

Students Recommended to Colleges in 1944 Set New Record for Scholastic Excellence

Exceptionally high marks were earned by recommended graduates of Grosse Pointe High School who entered colleges and universities as freshmen in 1944, according to W. B. Clemenson, principal. Mr. Clemenson has recently completed a compilation of reports of the freshmen marks of Grosse Pointe graduates received from 33 institutions of higher learning scattered from coast to coast and from Michigan to the Gulf of Mexico.

He found that the recommended group of 1944 earned more A's and B's as first semester college marks than any other group in history. More than fifty per cent of all the marks reported were A's and B's.

Eighty seven graduates of Grosse Pointe High School entered colleges and universities upon the recommendation of the high school in 1944. They carried a total of 1329 semester hours of work and made an honor point average of 1.52. Less than two per cent of the grades were fail.

In only one year since 1932 has a higher honor point average been attained and that was in 1942 when recommended graduates scored an honor point average of 1.54. The next closest average was achieved by the group of 1937 which made an average of 1.47.

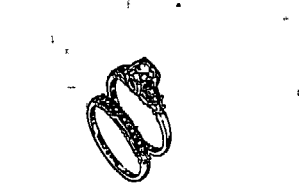
