The Pointe's "Rockefeller Center," after sitting in quiet dignity during these war years when building has been banned, is about to become the center of a building boom.

The "Rockefeller Center" for the benefit of the uninitiated, is the name affectionately given by Pointeans to that block of stores and offices between MacMillan road and Oak street on Kercheval avenue in the Farms District.

Sick Leave Plan Adopted in Park

Village Manager Lane of the Park reported to the Commissioners Monday night on the plan now in effect between the Municipality and its employees regarding sick leave and vacations.

The chief feature of the arrangement is that every employee allowed two weeks' sick leave a year with pay. He is also allowed two weeks vacation with pay.

The absence from employment because of sickness must be duly supported by a physician's certificate. If the absence for sick leave continues beyond the two weeks limit, the employee is allowed paid vacation period. Under the plan an employee might be out for sickness for three weeks during which he would draw his regular pay and have also one week vacation with pay coming to him.

At the end of four full calendar weeks all pay would cease. It would be at this point that the provision for the employee arranged in the pension and retirement plan would become operative.

Park Studies Pension Plan

Majority of Employees Have Already Expressed Satisfaction With System

The Park village has moved definitely near the adoption of a pension and retirement plan for its employees since the last Commissioners meeting. Commissioner James McMillan, chairman of the committee reported to the Council Monday night that he and his committee with Manager Lane have had two conferences already with the employees.

A G. Galziel, the actuary has participated in these talks and satisfactory progress has been made towards setting up in the near future a practical and satisfactory system.

The police department and the members of the Public Works departments have already expressed their satisfaction with the plan which is based on the plan set up by the state at the last session of the legislature.

The firemen also find much to approve in the scheme but have not yet definitely committed themselves. There will be an other meeting on Wednesday, Mr. McMillan said, with every reason to hope for a unanimous approval of the plan.

The plan provides for practically every angle of the benefits the employees have been seeking for several years. It takes into account pensions and retirement pay disability payments and makes just allowance for earned benefits for the older employees who have already spent many years in the service of the village.

Already several municipalities of the state have adopted it. Ten municipalities must adopt it with a minimum of 250 employees before it becomes operative. The plan will be administered by the municipal treasury and a 5 percent withholding assessment from the pay of the employees.

In police court Monday evening Judge DeBaerle placed him on six months probation.

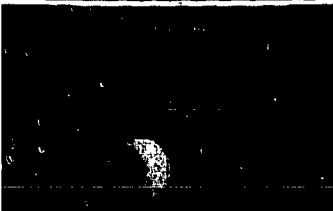
Foul Aspersions Launches Battle

An anonymous phone message to the Park police headquarters at 8 33 Saturday evening said a false story was in progress at Beaconsfield and Jefferson.

As long ago as 1936 Secretary Byrnes and Mrs. Byrnes were co-travellers with Congressman Rabaut and a group from the Senate and the House to China, Japan and the Philippines. There they journeyed to witness the inaugural of the Commonwealth of the Philippines as guests of that government.

The late President Manuel L. Quezon was the first President of the Islands known as the "gentle of the Orient".

On the return voyage just before the boat docked at Seattle Washington the Congressional group aboard ship in excess of a hundred gathered in the dining room. Congressman Rabaut tells with pride that it was at the request of Secretary James F. Byrnes that he sang the final song "God Be With You Till We Meet Again".

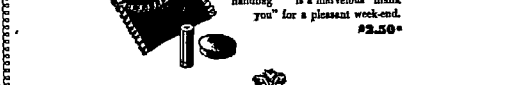

Detroit Edison Set to Receive 1200 Veterans

Letters Being Sent to All Former Employes Welcoming Them Back to Work

Plans for the return of 1200 Detroit Edison employes on military leave from the Company have been completed. James W. Parker, president, said today and we are most anxious to welcome them back.

Our plan recognizes three simple facts, Mr. Parker said. Veterans do not wish to be segregated and treated as a group apart. Each veteran is anxious to resume his own individual life and has his own ambitions and hopes which, immediate reemployment is vital to him. He is more concerned with the years ahead.

In a message to each employe in the service the company is now advising that he will be restored to his former position or if qualified to the position to which he would have been rated by promotion, had he not been away. His wage rate will include raises granted to his job while he has been in the service. If the man's position has been discontinued the company will endeavor to find another position of like seniority at the same pay. Life insurance, retirement plan benefits, immediate vacation with pay and sick leave benefits will automatically be restored. Other benefits such as additional insurance and hospital and surgical insurance coverage for the family will be available to him if desired.

The company has selected James F. O'Brien and assigned him to the employment bureau as veterans coordinator whose full time job will be concerned with retraining veterans to their former jobs and assisting them in solving any individual readjustment problems which may arise. Mr. O'Brien has a long background of service with the company and is a veteran of World War I. Mr. Parker said, "Apprentice training courses will be accelerated twenty per cent for returned veteran employes who were enrolled before leaving for military service. Our plans are flexible and designed to offer the best opportunity we can to each veteran in helping him to take his position in civilian life. We recognize that no one pattern will fit the needs of all. Some men will want refresher courses some will have acquired new skills others will wish to complete their apprentice ship training courses and some will require and receive special consideration because of wounds or illness contracted in the service." Parker said.

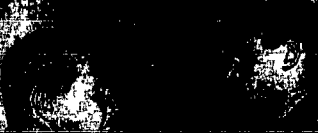

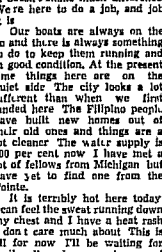

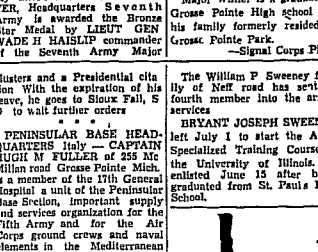

Promoted Czech Consul to Manchuria Addresses Pointe Rotarians

Rudolph Herman, late of Czechoslovakia, minister of the Czech Republic, was the guest speaker at the luncheon meeting of the Grosse Pointe Rotary club on Monday at the Whittier. Mr. Herman had unusual opportunity to observe the workings of the Japanese mind and the results of the Japanese policy toward conquered or occupied countries during his considerable residence in Dairen one of the chief cities of Manchuria, as it is now called, Manchukuo.

The sense of master race, which we have come to know by the name of the Germans, is still more intensified among the Japanese he said. Their whole policy is to stamp out every vestige of the preceding economy or culture of every territory they enter. Schools, hospitals and business enterprises are all swept away in their advance.

There is no question he said but that they are a favorable contact with Japanese commercial houses and an insight into Japanese life.

Office of Veterans' Affairs Lansing

Civil Service Forms
Many veterans are seeking positions in federal and state Civil Service. Calls have been made upon veterans' organizations for assistance in filling out civil service blanks.

Realizing that the material submitted on applications carries some weight in determining minimum qualifications and at the same time, believing that assistance should be given to a veteran in making the best possible presentation of his qualifications, training and experience to either the state or federal Civil Service Commission, the Office of Veterans' Affairs cleared with both commissions as to the matter of preparing in rendering such assistance.

The Office of Veterans' Affairs has been advised by both federal and state agencies that assistance that such assistance in filling out civil service papers for veterans is entirely desired. Full information about the service is available at local counseling centers.

As demobilization proceeds and as cut backs and layoffs in civilian employment will become a problem of major importance, only mobilization of community resources and careful planning will enable local councils to meet the problem.

All community agencies are urged to cooperate with the local counselor and employment committee in planning now for the coming months.

Confusion results when unformed persons attempt to advise or counsel a veteran on any problem he may have. Agencies and services have

established either federally by the state or by private organizations to render assistance to a veteran regardless of his needs. These are specialized services and are administered by experts in the various fields.

The greatest service any citizen can give to a veteran is to direct him to the Veterans' Affairs Center in his own city or county where proper guidance awaits him.



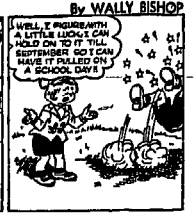

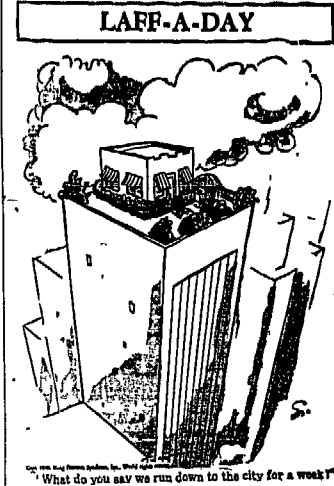

When Tot Begins to Creep

By Garry Cleveland Myers, Ph.D.

FOR ABOUT NINE months after the baby begins to creep he will be right into everything. His mother almost wears herself out protecting him from dangers and things about the house which he can harm or destroy.

A strong safe play pen is the logical answer. Next to the baby's safety is the most essential piece of furniture. Let the budget be cut on anything else, but the baby's necessary food. A husband busy with work can make a play pen at very little cost. He should be sure to place the bars close enough together so the baby cannot slip his head through.

Leave the baby in the pen when you are not with him. There he can play with simple toys creep climb up and hold to the sides and around them even learn to take his first steps alone.

He may be fretful while in the pen especially when no person is near or in sight. Often the baby mother can have the pen in a room where he can see her even she should go about her work whether he cries or not. However, if the mother in any case he complains violently at the end of short periods. She can go to another room and let him play for a few minutes at the end of eight minutes and so on. She should not let him run out of the pen often though several times during the day she might drop everything for 15 or 20 minutes to hold rock or cuddle him or let him creep or walk about while she is gone.

Fats Collection Drops in May

Collections of used household fat in Wayne County are dropping steadily month by month. A Schirmer chairman of the Wayne County Salvage Committee said today in announcing May collections for the state.
