The poison was taken early in the morning, Thursday, June 26, and he died at 2:48 that afternoon in Bon Secours Hospital.

The Park police station received a call from his stepson, Chester Verchinski, who lives with Zbyszynski and his wife, at 7:10 a.m. that his stepfather was dangerously ill. Police took him to Bon Secours, where he was quickly recognized as a poison case. He either refused or was unable to tell them what the poison was and the hospital authorities were at a loss to know the

Zbyszynski was 51. He was reputed to own several properlies, but he and his family were always noted for their frugal and abstemious life. Stories differ as to why he desired to evict Mrs. Anna Moore, his second floor tenant, but there was no doubt of the bitter quarrels he carried on with her,

It was during one of these that he was alleged to have struck her with an iron bar, leading to the arrest.

Withstand Test of Severe Rainstorm Few Complaints of Flooding in Basements Received;

Improvements, Sewer Cleaning Credited

The big storm last Sunday afternoon, which dropped more than 1.3 inches of water on Grosse Pointe in less than an nour, caused less cellar flooding and general drainage trouble than corresponding falls have in former years.

The additional drainage facili-ties that have been installed and Woods Keeps the extensive sewer cleaning programs carried on in the last year or two are beginning to pay divi-

In the Park, Manager Lane said only one complaint of cellar flooding was received and, on examination, it was learned that this was caused by local trouble in no way connected with the public drainage system. Lane credits the sewer cleaning the Park has been carrying on on a large scales for the last year.

The Farms village had the same encouraging report to make. Engineer Murray Smith said the pumps lifted 8,000,000 gallons during the storm. He thought the work of the pumps was facilitated greatly by the air pressure relief installed in the enclosure at the Kerby-Chalfonte pumping station only recently. The Sunday storm was the first test it has had.

Only one direct complaint of cellar flooding was received at his office and that he believed might have been caused by local conditions.

The Woods village also had a satisfactory experience. There was little complaint of cellar flooding and the \$300,000 installation of sewers and pumps which the village has put in within the past two years made good.

A few low places in the streets throughout the Pointe were flooded briefly with pools through which cars had to plow cautiously, as on Fisher near Kercheval, but this was only a tem-

porary inconvenience. The storm was severe while it lasted, but the rainfall was not comparable with that in the great storm of May, 1946. During

Drainage Facilities Pointer Asks Segregation Of Juveniles

The indiscriminate mixing of non-delinquent children with delinquents at the County Juvenile Detention Home, which has come in for strong adverse criticism by parents, including some from Grosse Potote, will probably be rectified soon.

At the June 23 meeting of the County Board of Supervisors, Carl Schweikart, supervisor of Grosse Pointe Township and chairman of the juvenile detention home Committee, of the county board, introduced a reso-lution calling for the condemnation of four private properties adjoining the home.

If the county board approves the recommendation, it will mean that, hereafter, the children sent down will be rigidly separated with respect to delinquents and non-delinquents. There has long been condemnation of the current practice by parents and stu-dents of child welfare. Some time ago, Schweikart had a comafe.

The plan is to revamp two of the houses now standing on the property and house in them the children that are classed as nondelinquent. There are 30 to 40 cases of this category brought into the Home every week. Many among these are children who have been abandoned by their parents and have been housed in the Home until permanent arrangements can be made for their







It should serve as a wholesome warning to other tainted gentlemen who try to or have succeeded in fastening themselves to the public payroll of a country to which they cannot give complete allegiance.

It is a good riddance of bad rubbish. This country is not so hard up for efficient and capable public servants as to have to recruit such from persons whose allegiance is less than 100 per cent genuine.
