

Rumor Says Park Will Vote On Proposal to Convert to City at Spring Election

Board of Commissioners To Consider Action on Report of Michigan Municipal League at Executive Session, December 15

The Park Village Board Commissioners is going to have an executive session on December 15 to consider action on the report made to it some weeks ago by the Michigan Municipal League on the pros and cons of a city charter.

It is an open secret that most of the argument is Pro.

It is the purpose of the advocates of the City charter to get the matter in shape in time to place it on the ballot in next spring's election.

Grosse Pointe Shores, which was the first of the Pointe communities to examine the City charter proposal, has had its report from the League for some months. Thus far no official action has been taken on the matter there. Whether it has been determined to submit the issue to the Shores voters at the same time as in the Park is not yet learned. The Farms is also known to be

toying with the City charter idea. The Woods is least concerned with the matter of any, but it is certain that if the two big municipalities, the Park and Farms, should abandon the township it would probably die an early death.

This will mean that those functions now carried on by the township in behalf of the four villages would have to be undertaken by each one separately. This includes such services as public health, joint police radio service, the collection of taxes and relief.

At about the same moment another complaint came in with an identical complaint from W. E. Neilson of 4103 Haverhill. Both cars had been parked during the same hours, approximately 8-11, and in the same place.

The exact value of articles taken could not be named by either party at the time of report.

did not dare bear down too hard on this essential part of a contract.

Meanwhile, two years have passed and still no truck. What has arrived, however, is a letter from Pirsch and Sons which was read at the council meeting Dec. 8. This letter said that inasmuch as the cost of labor, materials, etc., etc. had risen, of which probably the village fathers had some slight intimation, Messrs. Pirsch wanted 10 per cent more for the truck than the original contract price.

As contracts do not cover any more than the items they mention, and the Park's neat little contract has no delivery date, the Commissioners fear greatly that they are stuck. The Village needs the fire equipment badly and if it doesn't pay as demanded, it may find the delivery date advanced until some time in the twenty-first century.

Particularly as there is small prospect of getting such a truck from any third party at any less figure or earlier date.

The matter was referred to Fire Commissioner Ulrich and Village Attorney Hestler, to work out the best deal for the Village the harrowing situation permits.

Sleepless Park Residents Hire Lawyer to Wage War Against Sewer Job Racket

Seeking Injunction to Restrain Contractor from Making So Much Noise in Building of Big Detroit Project

The repeated complaints of residents living near Nottingham and Kercheval and Audubon and Kercheval, about the noise made by the work on the big Detroit sewer has stirred them to action. They have hired a lawyer who will seek a court injunction restraining the contractor from making the noise.

Many complaints have gone into the Park office about the matter and each time the contractor has been contacted and promised to take steps to abate the nuisance. The contractor has shown a disposition to do all in his power to do away with the noise, which has become especially offensive at night. He went so far recently as to change the motive power on some of the machinery from gasoline driven to electricity. Still the noise goes on the residents allege, and is so bad as to destroy their night's rest.

As this work promises to be underway for at least eight months longer, they propose to do something about it if possible.

The sewer is a huge tunnel 15 feet in diameter, the top of which is 38 feet below the surface.

There was no doubt of the legal right of Detroit to lay the tunnel under Grosse Pointe, but nevertheless the City of Detroit courteously discussed the matter with the Pointe authorities long in advance of the beginning of the work.

The tunnel sewer will, when finished and in operation, take the Detroit sewage from that extensive area of the East Side which formerly went into the Fox Creek vent and carry it down to the Conner Creek outlet. In this respect it will be a great advantage to the Park as it will relieve the pressure on the Fox creek outlet into which the Park discharges its sewage and is expected to minimize the complaints which came in from Detroit residents west of Alter road and thereabouts.

There is every wish of the Park authorities to cooperate with Detroit in the work but they and the affected residents are in agreement that the noise must be minimized to a much greater extent than heretofore.

Pure Cussedness Prompts Vandals

Mrs. Delja Monaghan of 1024 Maryland, reported to the Park police on Saturday, Dec. 6, that sometime between 12:30 o'clock that morning and noon that day some one had broken into her son's, William Monaghan's, new 1947 Dodge car and damaged it to a considerable extent.

The miscreants had broken both doors and smashed the vent window.

In this case as with the two cars similarly damaged on Nottingham a few nights before, there was no evidence of breaking with intent to steal. Apparently it was a case of sheer malicious destruction for its own sake.

The car was molested while it stood in the Monaghan own driveway.

VFW ACQUIRES CEMETERY

A Military Cemetery has become a reality for Detroit with the Veterans of Foreign Wars acquiring a substantial part of Westlawn Memory Gardens, Plymouth Road west of Rouge Park, for the development as their own. This establishes an official VFW cemetery for its members and their families, also a burying ground to which all who have died in defense of our country may be returned.



Society Promises Pointers Free Examinations for TB

Some time this winter, probably beginning the latter part of January, the people of Grosse Pointe are going to have the opportunity of having X-rays taken of their chest, free of charge, in the course of examination for signs of tuberculosis. This will be done by the TB and Health Society of Detroit in co-operation with the Grosse Pointe health authorities. A mobile unit will be set up a previously announced point in the community where anybody can call and register and at the same time have an examination. This information came out in the course of a talk Richard L. Lea, executive secretary for the

society, gave before the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club at its Monday meeting in the Whittier. Mr. Lea gave a picture of the tuberculosis situation in the Detroit area that was far from encouraging. This region is particularly high in the percentage of cases that are found to be well advanced when first examination is made.

The Detroit society is affiliated with the State and National Tuberculosis Associations and one of its special missions is to work for the elimination of the disease by early examination and determination. The Detroit society is supported chiefly by the proceeds of the Red Cross Christmas seals. A meeting will be held in the Neighborhood Club at 10 a. m. on Friday, Dec. 12, to organize the arrangements for the reception and operation of the Tuberculosis Mobile Unit which is to visit the Pointe for several days beginning, probably, about Jan. 25.

The meeting has been called by Dr. Thomas S. Davis, Grosse Pointe Health Commissioner. He hopes to have present the Chiefs of the Pointe Police and Fire Departments as well as other public officials.

Members of the Board of Education are also urged to be present and all other persons interested in the protection of the public health.

The presence of this unit will enable any person to have an x-ray examination for tuberculosis free of charge. Dr. Davies hopes that large numbers of Pointe residents will avail themselves of this opportunity.

Praising Trombley school for its well-balanced safety education program, Ernest P. Davis, Auto Club safety and traffic director, in a written message, singled out the teachers of Trombley school for special accolade.

"Michigan parents and auto drivers can be thankful that so many teachers are participating so fully in the safety education of the state's children," he said. "School safety patrol work coupled with classroom safety education directed towards creating safer habits in walking and playing

will go a long way in preventing the toll of deaths and injuries caused by traffic now and in the future," he added.

Records compiled by Michigan State police on traffic deaths of school children from 1936 through the present date show decreases in such tragedies.
