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The Woods' Lakefront Park

The decision of the Michigan Supreme Court that the Woods village has the right to acquire and operate a municipal park in the Shores is a heartening verdict for the Board of Village Commissioners who had the courage to propose this venture and see it through to the finish.

The Woods has long been the only municipality in Grosse Pointe which has been completely landlocked. It has had no ingress of its own to the lovely Lake St. Clair shore which offers such an agreeable contribution to living out here. For a year or so it had periodic access to the lake for bathing through a gentlemen's agreement entered into with the Grosse Pointe Shores village, but this was not a satisfactory arrange-ment for either the Woods or the Shores. Later the Woods authorities made an arrangement for the use of the Oleve authorities made an arrangement for the use of the Olson beach property, but this proved too inconvenient and was not popular with the people.

With the acquisition of the 43.7 acres of lakefront property the Woods will possess the largest lakefront park of any of the Pointe communities. It awaits extensive improvement but nature has already done much to make it attractive and admirably adapted to park uses by the people of the youngest and fastest growing village in the Pointe.

The residents of the Woods are also obligated to Mrs. Edsel Ford for her sympathetic cooperation with them in their quest for a beachfront park. Her insistence that a suitable green barrier shall be erected by the village, cutting off its public park from the remainder of her estate, is only fair and reasonable but in this too she has kindly agreed to a sufficient time for its erection and completion conformable to the Woods' financial abilities.

Brightening Skies

The American people are determined to be alert against the encroachments of communist doctrine on their constitutionally guaranteed rights and liberties.

They accurately sense that the scheme of governmental control of everything which took form in Russia thirty years ago is the social antithesis of every American tenet of life, liberty and happiness. It may have been an improvement for the Russians over the mediaeval social and political system under which they had lived from time immemorial, but in no degree and in no spirit was applicable to that which we had had since we became our own masters. We want none of it here.

That viligance which is the price of liberty must be kept alive and active, but in our zeal in its pursuit care must be exercised, not to let it degenerate into a mere senseless witch hunt. There are many honest and sincere Americans who hold views at variance with the simpler orthodox beliefs of Americans of the old school, who would shudder at the suggestion of their classification as communists .

Their argument is that as all the processes of our political and economic life become more involved and complex, it grows increasingly necessary for Government to take over a closer supervision. All reasoning men concede a measure of truth in this position.

The old fashioned hard boiled individualist who thinks and acts as did his grandfathers a half century or more ago, has no more place in our world today than has the red eyed communist who would surrender our century and a half old secrets so necessary to our defense. structure of liberty and human dignity to the keeping of a small group of men whose only gesture towards democracy is the recognition of a single party which must, however, at us at Pearl Harbor and all over the Pacific. take its direction and bidding from them.

From Europe recent developments indicate that sufficient virility still inheres in democracy to at least have the strength and will to suppress by force of law, and arms when necessary, those forces which would destroy the whole structure of democracy.

The skies are brightening and the assurance grows that, given time to digest a situation, the free born men of the world will not be stampeded into surrendering the liberties and rights which they and their forbears have built up through the centuries.

There is a numerous group in this country who, in the abiding belief that all the ills of the world can be settled by the resumption of international trade, are ready to send anything we have anywhere it can be paid for.

The present tension between this country and Russia is such that it behooves us to look a little farther than the cash register. If Russia wants any of our materials we should not be timid about asking when, where and for what purpose now or hereafter?


