**Saturday, Dec. 13**  
JOHN L. LEWIS, president of the U.M.A., smarting under the rebuff he received from the AFL on the non-communist oath issue, takes his 500,000 membership union out of the AFL. . . maintains his consistent record of rule or quit. . . this marks his fourth bolt from a labor organization.

**THE GENERAL STRIKE IN Rome** has been called off by the Chamber of Labor. . . Communists claim a victory which seems to be substantiated by the concessions made by the Government in its granting of larger appropriations for public works, Christmas bonuses for the unemployed and amnesty to all strikers arrested during the strike.

**THE NATIONAL CANCER INSTITUTE** announces a grant of \$250,000 towards the rebuilding of the Roscoe B. Jackson Memorial Laboratory at Bar Harbor, Me. destroyed by fire last month. . . grant conditioned upon an equivalent amount being raised and the whole project to cost about \$650,000. . . the Jackson Laboratory was founded by Mrs. John J. O'Brien, the late Edsel Ford and R. H. Webber, all of Grosse Pointe.

**SOME REPUBLICAN SENATORS** will couple their consideration of the Marshall Plan with a move to curtail, and possibly to

sever altogether, U. S. trade with Russia.

**WEEKLY CAR PRODUCTION** reaches highest point since the war, 118,535.

**PRESIDENT ALEXANDER G. RUTHVEN**, of the University of Michigan, turns down request by the Michigan Youth for Democratic action for use of the Michigan League for an address Monday by Gerhart Eisler, the Nation's No. 1 Communist.

**KING IBN SAUD**, of Saudi Arabia, assures a representative of the Gannett News Service that he "will protect and maintain" America's big oil operations and other interests in Saudi Arabia regardless of what happens in Palestine. . . King Ibn is fast becoming one of the richest men in the world due to the oil royalties paid him by the American oil companies.

**LONE NEGRO BANDIT** pulls Jesse James stunt on N. Y. Central's Buffalo-Chicago train as it nears Chicago and relieves pas-

sengers of an unknown amount of cash and jewelry. . . got on train at Englewood and jumps from last coach as it enters La Salle St. depot.

**RUMORS PERSIST THAT** a milk price hike of one and a quarter cents per quart is impending for Detroit. . . officials of Michigan Milk Producers Association says there is no incentive to increase production at present prices. . . "producers operating at a loss."

**THE SPECTRE OF EISENHOWER** as a looming Republican nominee for the Presidency has the field of aspirants in a dither.

**THOMAS C. HANSON**, 42, head of the Civil Engineering Department of the U. of D., is announced by Mayor-elect Van Antwerp as his choice for the post of Commissioner of Public Works in the incoming administration.

**SENATE AND HOUSE CONFEREES** finally agree on amount originally requested for emergency (winter) relief for France, Italy and Austria, but with China cut in. . . will probably be voted favorably tomorrow. . . actual appropriation of the funds with specified allocations to different countries listed for end of this week.

**Monday, December 15**  
**THE RUSSIANS ACT WITH** characteristic Slav directness to

solve their inflation spiral. . . devalue the ruble to one tenth of prewar value. . . the act was the first intimation that post war inflation had affected the controlled Russian economy.

**WAR FEVER MOUNTS THROUGHOUT THE Arab world** thousands are calling for war to the death to preserve their undivided homeland.

**GODFELLOWS** have their annual newspaper sale today to further Christmas charity work. Early reports indicate one of the most successful newspaper sales since the plan was inaugurated many years ago. . . Grosse Pointe's share will go well over the \$6,000 mark.

**1600 G.I.'s** the last of the American occupation forces in Italy, embark for America nine hours ahead of the moment fixed in the treaty. . . thousands of Italians regret their departure.

**SOS MESSAGES** received by the U. S. Coast Guard indicate two ships afloat in the Dutch West Indies after a collision and an ocean going salvage craft sinking in the British West Indies.

**CITIZENS OF VENEZUELA** are going to the polls today in the first open free election in that country in many years. . . early returns indicate the present government has obtained a working majority.

**JOHN L. LEWIS** is holding conferences today with leaders of his independent District 50. . . surmised he plans to organize a third major labor union.

**A NEW TYPE OF SUBMARINE** developed by the British Navy since the war, stays under water for several weeks with seven officers and sixty men aboard. . . all other types of submarines measure their underwater stays in hours.

**A U. S. EIGHTH ARMY Trial Commission** in the Philippines condemns Iku Takasaki, commandant of prisoner of war camps in the Philippines to 25 years imprisonment at hard labor for responsibility for the death of two American soldiers and abuse of others, including Major Arthur Wermuth the one-man army of Bataan.

**Tuesday, Dec. 15**  
**THE BIG FOUR FOREIGN MINISTERS' CONFERENCE** in London ends a record of complete failure by adjourning since die. . . fails completely to agree on any future Germany. . . line of cleavage between the East and

the West now bisects Europe from the Baltic to the Adriatic. . . Marshall says the Russians caused the stalemate and Molotov retaliates by saying the Western powers (U. S., Britain and France), ganged up on Russia. . . 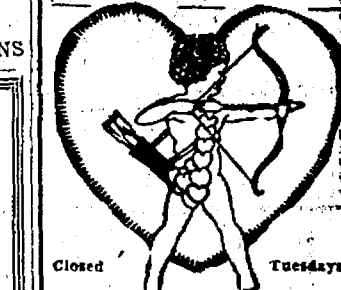

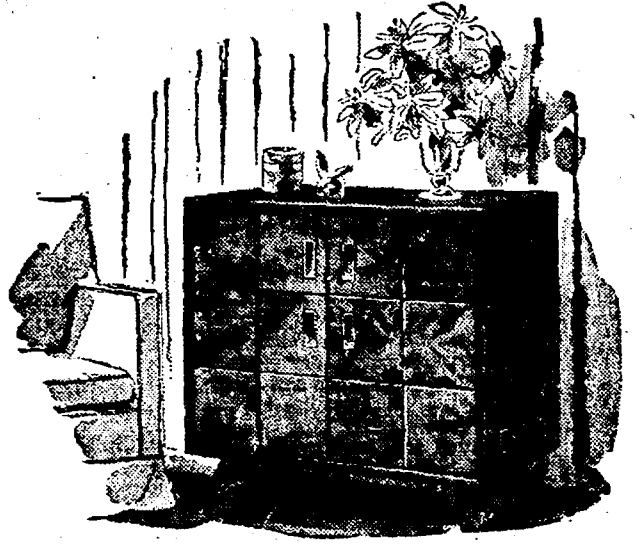

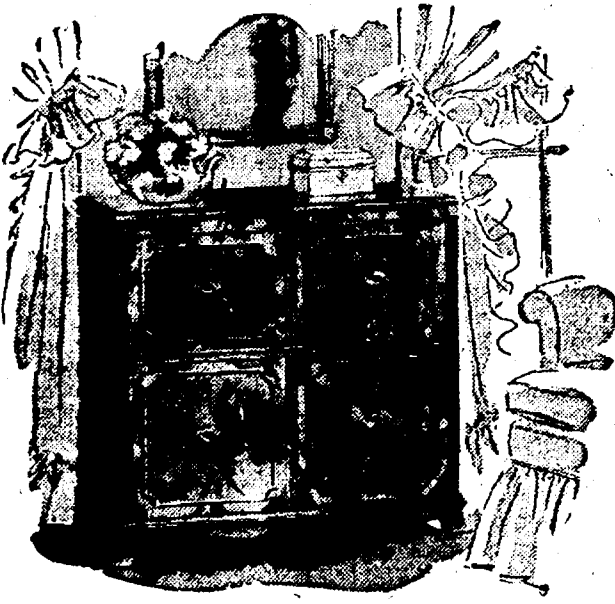

### Three Pointe Villages Now Considering Feasibility of Converting to City Status

Park Commissioners Reported Hopeful of Putting Question Up To Voters On Spring Ballot; Farms, Shores Study Reports

Grosse Pointe Shores was the first of the Pointe municipalities to call for a serious examination of the pros and cons of changing from an incorporated village to a city since the Park voted on the question in 1942.

The village officials received their report from the Michigan Municipal League in June 1946 but since then the matter has lain dormant. The report was made by John Iglauer, assistant director of the League. It is stated by officials of the Shores that this failure to pursue the matter further is not indicative of any lessening interest in the proposal but rather that the Shores village is confronted by other matters of more pressing importance. The question of a modern sewer system was not settled there-by the

negative vote which the citizens registered against it some months ago.

The village will have to provide such a system if it is to grow at all. The State Health authorities served notice that it would not be permitted to open up any more subdivisions until adequate provision was made to service them with a sewer system as prescribed by the State authorities. Since then only one subdivision has been opened up for settlement, the Lake Shore Lane subdivision,

and in this case the proprietors put in their own separate storm water and sanitary system at their own expense.

Some time after the Shores got its report on the City charter proposal the Park had a report made by the same agency. Mr. Iglauer was also the author of the Park's report. The Park Commissioners have had the report in their hands for several weeks and expected to have an executive meeting last Monday night, December 15, for final consideration prior to submitting the issue to the vote of the citizens at the meeting was postponed, shem coming spring elections.

Some members of the Village board of commissioners were ill and others were out of the city and the meeting was postponed. It is expected however that a definite recommendation will go to the people next spring.

The Farms village is also considering the city status. It will use the same report that was made by the League for the Park, as the problems of the two municipalities are identical.

The Farms committee considering the proposition is composed of William F. Connolly, Jr., chairman, Trustee Henry H. Hubbard and Village Clerk Harry C. Furton.

It is improbable, one of the Farms officials said, that the Farms will be ready to vote on the matter by next spring.

valent than in the British Isles. The experience in dealing with one of the past plagues of the race is evidence of what medical science can do in wiping out tuberculosis. The success of the effort depends, however, on the cooperation of the people themselves.

The only reason why small pox exists at all in the world today is because some people refuse to be vaccinated, or have not the means to do so.

To launch the organization that is to make the work effective here in the Pointe, five general committees were set up. These will be:

The Public Education Committee, Forrest Geary, chairman. This will attempt to do the work its name implies.

The Neighborhood Committee, George Elworthy, chairman. This committee will operate on somewhat the same system as block committees.

A Business Men's Committee John Hannan, chairman. This is to see that the business men and all employers urge upon their employees that they take advantage of this opportunity for a personal checkup for signs of tubercular affliction.

A Volunteer Committee. This is to organize a force of workers, presumably young women, who will attend to all of the paper work and records of the campaign.

A School Committee, Lynn Bartlett, chairman. This committee will stimulate the cooperation of the school children and their parents in the work.

All of these committees are privileged to enlarge their personnel, as circumstances warrant. The work of all of the committees has the single aim of bringing about the largest mea-

sure of cooperation possible with the work of the mobile unit. In discussing the subject after the meeting Dr. Davies said the X-ray examination of a person is the best method of a medical science has yet devised to discover the presence of tubercular infection. He says it is wonderfully effective.

He mentioned that during the last fiscal year, which runs from April to April, there were 15 cases of tuberculosis in its various stages discovered in Grosse Pointe. Eight of these were well advanced cases, eight were moderate cases and nine were in very early stages.

He also said that some persons through timidity will avoid an examination which they think will only confirm their worst fears. This attitude, he said, is most foolish. He referred to a certain young Pointer last year who was certain he had tuberculosis because of various symptoms. Finally scared into an examination it was proved he has no trace of the germ whatever and was suffering from a trouble which would quickly yield to treatment.

Thus far this year, since April 1, nineteen cases of tuberculosis have been recorded in the Pointe. Dr. Davies thinks the total this year will probably run about the same as last.

There was a meeting of the chairman named at Friday's meeting at the Board of Education

offices on Tuesday afternoon. The exact day of the arrival of the unit here has not yet been determined. It will be announced as soon as known. Two locations for its operation already settled on will be at the Neighborhood Club and at the Woods' Community House on Mack avenue. It will be at other places also, and these will be announced later.

### Brighter Lights For Renaud Road

The Grosse Pointe Shores Council decided at the meeting on December 8 to have the Detroit Edison company go ahead with the installation of underground cable for five street lights along Renaud road. This will provide street illumination along Renaud out to the village line at the Woods boundary.

There had been two lights there previously but the illumination was inadequate. Under the arrangement with the Detroit Edison company the company will provide and lay the cable and the five lamps. The cost of the same will be amortized over a period of time by an increase in the village's light bill of \$22 per month.

Grosse Pointe High's Champion Swimming Team Takes Up Where It Left Off Last Year; River Rouge Is First Victim

The Grosse Pointe Blue Devils, 1946-7 Border Cities League swimming champions, picked up right where they left off last year by taking River Rouge into camp, 59-25, in their first non-league meet of the current season on Tuesday afternoon in the River Rouge tank.

Four pool records went by the boards in the 100 yard breast stroke, the 100 yard back stroke and in both relay events, 150 medley and 200 free style.

Bob Jenks, Michigan State High School breast stroke champion, won his 100 yard breast stroke event the hard way by defeating Snyder, who is recognized as the State Class B champion in this event and who only the day before had established the new River Rouge pool record which Jenks erased.

Snyder led Jenks for three lengths of the four lap race but both boys hit the last turn on even terms. Jenks put on a whirlwind finish to win by a yard and a half in the record time of 1:10.8.




