**JOSEPHUS DANIELS**, aged 85, former Secretary of the Navy and editor of the Raleigh News and Observer, is critically ill.

**NEW ORLEANS POLICE** have captured three of the five bandits who held up the Hibernian National Bank and got away with \$14,000 at gun point. \$65,000 of the loot recovered. The offense is punishable by death in Louisiana.

FEARING A RUSSIAN push through the Dardanelles, the United States has allocated to Turkey four fleet type submarines and eleven other vessels, all suitable for the defense of the straits. Also releases \$25,000,000 of War Assets Corporation property to the Greeks.

FRANCE IS NERVOUS over the proposed British-American plan for the upbuilding of a strong industrial western Germany. It has lodged a protest with our State Department. A Germany, strong in the heavy industries and in all metal working developments has been France's nightmare for generations.

THE MERCURY DROPS TO TWELVE ABOVE in the Detroit area this morning.

AN "AUTO TAG" game between three Royal Oak high school boys in one car and two girls in another running at 50 miles per hour, results in serious injuries to the boys when their car hits a tree.

SENATOR TOBEY, Republican from New Hampshire, comes out for Eisenhower for President. First movement into the Eisenhower camp from top flight Republican practical politicians.

BRITISH TOMMIES momentarily stop Arab advance into Palestine.

WAR ASSETS ADMINISTRATION officials in the New York area freeze further delivery of surplus army explosives following the recent discovery of large caches of explosives in New Jersey marked for delivery in Palestine.

Sunday, Jan. 11  
**THE GREEK ARMY** has launched an offensive against the guerrillas under Gen. Markos Vafades only five miles from the Albanian border. Fears of encroaching on Albanian sovereignty beset the Greek government.

HAGANAH, the Jewish militia organization in Palestine, report

Arabs from Syria invaded north-eastern Palestine Saturday.

THE UNITED PRESS office in Moscow reports it has learned from a usually unimpeachable source that Stalin is alive and in normal good health. The Swedish surgeon recently summoned to Russia to attend another patient.

THE NAME OF SENATOR THOMAS of Oklahoma, is brought into the list of speculators connected with the Government. Thomas is the ranking Democrat on the Senate Agriculture committee. He reported to have speculated in cotton in his wife's name.

FIFTEEN OF THE NATION'S TOP INDUSTRIALISTS are invited to Washington to aid the Government in making plans for the industrial mobilization of the country preparatory to war.

A TWENTY-TWO STATE CONFERENCE has been called to meet in Washington Thursday, Jan. 15 to consider the fuel oil shortage and ways of meeting it.

SENATOR VANDENBERG says the Nation may recover as much as \$2,200,000,000 in loan repayments out of the \$5,200,000 to be advanced this year for European recovery.

THE JEWISH AGENCY FOR PALESTINE acknowledges that the explosives discovered in New Jersey were legally purchased by it and were awaiting legal shipment to Palestine as soon as the embargo was lifted.

A TASS DISPATCH FROM MOSCOW says that the Holy Synod of the Russian Orthodox Greek Church has decided to put Metropolitan Theophilus of New York and his associates on trial. They are accused of violating the decisions of the Cleveland Congress of 1946 to have the American churches renew their communion with Moscow. Reported Ralph Arkush, General Council of the Russian Orthodox Church in the United States, may advise the Metropolitan to submit to the trial provided it is held in the United States rather than in Russia "where I don't think he would get a fair trial."

THE UNITED STATES Department of State clamps down on the export of war surplus radar equipment after Representative Rizley, Rep. of Okla. protested that some was going to Russia.

Monday, Jan. 12

TRUMAN EXPECTED TO ASK CONGRESS for forty billion dollars today for the fiscal year of 1949. The request is about two billions higher than expected.

THE GOVERNMENT will launch today a formal attempt to break "an unlawful conspiracy" among steel producers to fix prices and limit production.

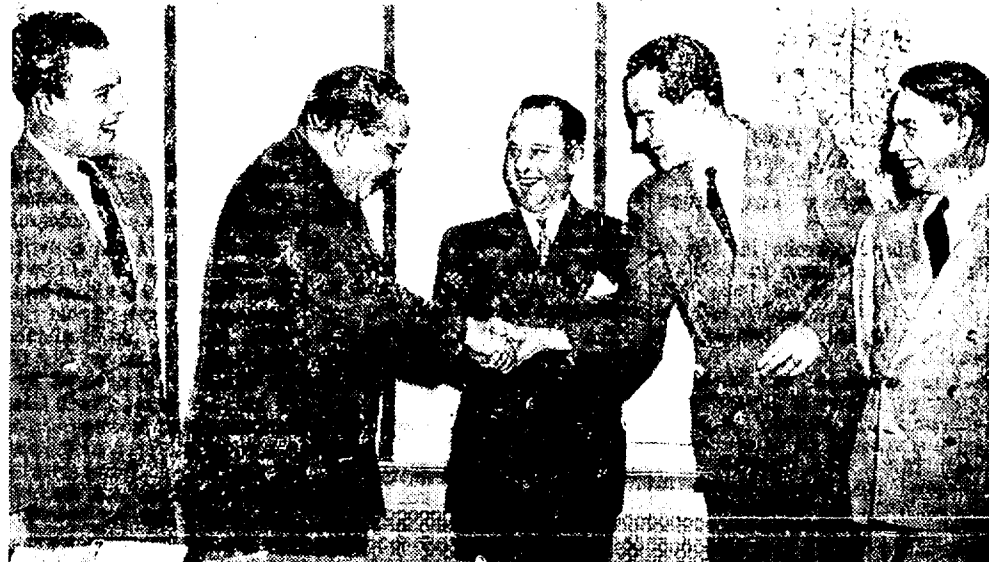

(Continued from Page 1) tarian Magazine printed a picture and brief summary of Grosse Pointe's unique tool library in March 1944.

An article by Miss Florence Severs, Director of the Grosse Pointe Public Library, about the collection was published in the December 1943 Michigan Librarian. A request for information about these loan tools was received by the librarian this past week from the Michigan Municipal Review which plans to write about Grosse Pointe's tool library in a future issue of the magazine.

The planes, saws and Stilson wrenches have been the most widely used tools during the four years of the collection's existence.

Among the tools in the recent gift are: an electric soldering iron; a 24-in. Stanley level; spiral-ratchet screw drivers; 6 cabinet clamps of various sizes; an assortment set of 11 box wrenches; and a Casco Electric-Tool kit with 20 accessories for grinding, drilling and polishing.

(Continued from Page 1) testified by village officials that the main sewer line was open and functioning.

The Commissioners finally voted to deny the claim but Mr. Herrmann served emphatic notice on the Board that if any further trouble of this nature developed he would fight the issue through the courts to the end. He was apparently willing to waive his present claim of \$103.77 but not again without a fight.

The main sewer is on the opposite side of the street from the Herrmann house.

President Parshall explained to Mr. Herrmann that to admit such a claim as his would lay the village open to liability in all future similar cases, which might in the aggregate constitute a crushing burden for the village.

Moreover it was pointed out that stoppages in the house connection line might be caused by the householder's own negligence in letting blocking matter get into his lines. In Mr. Herrmann's case however, it was admitted that the stoppage was caused wholly by tree roots which had been cut out at the complainant's expense.

It was explained for Mr. Herrmann's benefit as well as the information of all other property owners that by using a slip seal cock that part of his lines would be made impervious to root entry.

Mr. Herrmann acknowledged that this was the first trouble of this nature he had encountered in the nearly twenty years since his house was built and the sewer connection made.

While it is improbable that the village's policy would be upset by any court decision, it is realized that if it should be, it would present a revolutionary change in the matter of municipal liability for sewer service.

Dr. Fred Murphy Taken by Death

Dr. Fred T. Murphy, 75, surgeon, banker and clubman, whose family built and owns the Penobscot Building, died Saturday, Jan. 10 at his home, 17620 Jefferson avenue east, Grosse Pointe.

Dr. Murphy broke his hip in a fall in his home in October. He was hospitalized until Dec. 23, when he returned home, but pneumonia set in causing his death.

The grandson of Simon J. Murphy, prominent Detroit manufacturer, Dr. Murphy established a distinguished career in his own name. He directed Base Hospital No. 21 in France in World War I. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal for evacuation of the wounded and sick of the A. E. F. and later became director of the bureau of medicine and surgery of the American Red Cross.

After World War I he returned to Detroit and became active as a trustee of the Murphy Family Trust. He was president of the Simon J. Murphy Company, which owns the Penobscot Building. He was director of the Detroit Trust Company and also director of several Detroit industries and business firms.

Dr. Murphy was a surgeon and former member of the anatomy and surgery faculties of Harvard University.

A Yale graduate, Dr. Murphy was the football captain in 1896. In 1920 he was considered for the presidency of Yale University. In 1921 he was one of eight medical reserve officers promoted to brigadier general.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mrs. Fred M. Alger; his son, Charles, of New York; and his stepson, Theodore A. McGraw, of Detroit.

Funeral services were held Monday, Jan. 12, in Christ Episcopal Church at 2 p. m. Burial was in Elmwood cemetery.

of these examinations, the ease and speed with which they are made and the fact that the X-ray examination has been proved the most perfect method yet devised for the discovery of the first symptoms of the presence of the tuberculosis germ.

The mobile unit will come to the Pointe February 9 and remain here for a month.

The slogan that will be employed in the campaign is "Know Your Chest is Healthy — Be X-rayed."

All reports on the result of the examinations are confidential and go direct to the subject.

The examinations are completely painless; they take less than one minute and it is not necessary for the subject to remove his or her clothing.

Among the media for publicity discussed were window displays and posters, letters to all civic leaders and physicians and civic groups requesting their cooperation, merchants carrying inserts of the campaign in their advertising, proclamations by the Mayor and the Presidents of the villages, movie announcements, sound trucks, etc.

The committee on publicity aims primarily to impress on the people of Grosse Pointe the great protection which this campaign affords to the individual and the responsibility of the individual to the public health.

In one wartime year, Navy food supplies cost \$500,000,000, yet the per capita per day cost of feeding Navy men was only 64 cents.

### March of Dimes Campaign Set for Jan. 15 to Jan. 30

Every Wayne County citizen is urged to give generously to the annual March of Dimes Campaign which opens January 15 and will continue through January 30.

Wayne County had 295 cases of infantile paralysis in 1947. This is the third year out of the last four that has seen a high incidence of polio in Wayne County, according to Nate S. Shapero, March of Dimes Chairman for Wayne County.

The 1948 Campaign will mark the 10th anniversary of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. During the past decade, the Wayne County Chapter has spent \$756,792 on medical care; \$52,085 on hospital and medical equipment and \$14,750 on scholarships for local professional personnel. During this same ten year period, the National Foundation has spent more than \$13,000,000 for research and education. In addition, \$10,000,000 has been advanced to local Chapters for epidemic aid. \$22,000,000 has been spent for medical care by local Chapters throughout the country since 1938.

"While epidemic proportions were not reached during 1947 in Wayne County, the high incidence both locally and nationally over the past five-year period has resources of the Wayne County Chapter and National Foundation," according to Shapero.

"It is our hope that we may count on every citizen of Wayne County now as we have in the past, to rally in support of a great humanitarian cause," Shapero said.

The cafes, clubs and theatres are jammed. The women seem like emined sheep, huddling together to keep warm, and out of their cold houses. Even homes with the most expensive electric heat have been affected by the fuel shortage because the electric power has been cut down to conserve resources. Parisiennes, not being the type to sit shivering in their sulking tents, take to the night spots. The Club Elysees, Maxim's and the Ritz are booming — even if the boom sounds somewhat hollow. These will probably hit our shores soon, if they're not already in their New York store. If you don't fancy jewelled robins, you can have twin love birds set in emeralds, or how about a white peacock composed of diamonds.

Our American Canary in person — Lena Horne — is singing at the Club Elysees. The French men have gone into a whirle about the girl. They obviously can't savvy her singing style, but they can tell a luscious lady when they see one. Still being one of the illiterati, I can't let you in on the complete literary life here. 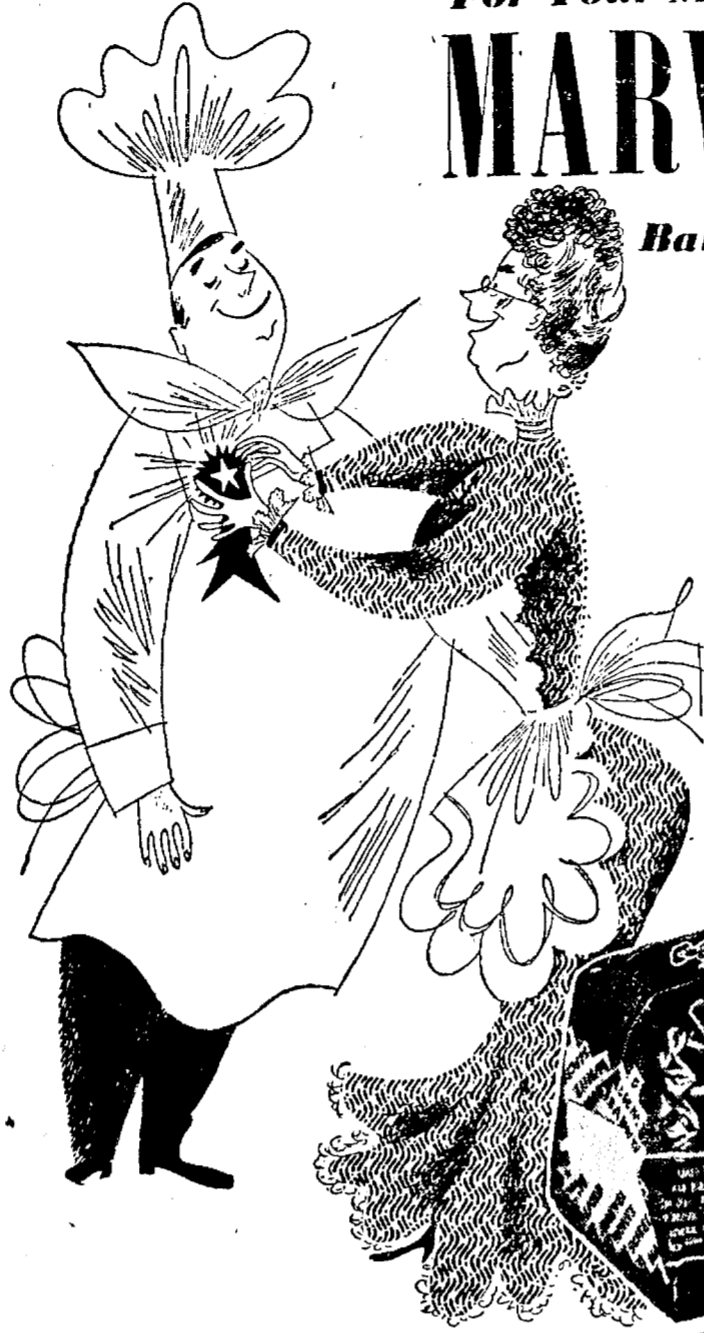

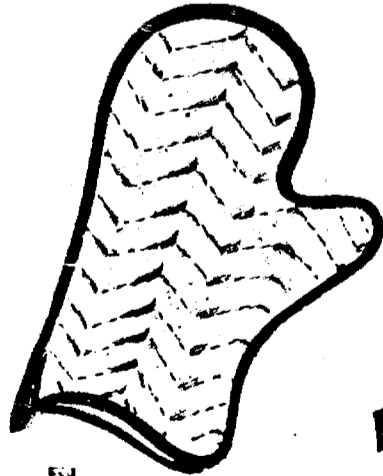

There is absolutely nothing Coach Wernet can do to get this game back except protest to the Border Cities League about Fordson officials entrusting a student with the all important time keeping job.

Fordson is the only school that allows a student to run the time clock. All five of the B.C.L. schools have a faculty member handling this assignment.

This isn't the first time Grosse Pointe has gotten a bum deal on the timing of a basketball game at Fordson. Last year the varsity had a similar incident although the score wasn't as close as this year. Two years ago the reserve team got pushed around by the time clock and lost a game. In each case these infractions did nothing but fire the players and in the return engagement of the home in home series the Blue Devils humbled the Tractors.
