They made it! We mean the Fashion Models selected by the John Powers jury to act as mannequins in the forthcoming Civic Opera Production of "Roberta" at Masonic Auditorium. A more streamlined, dreamlined group of models never ankl-

ed across a stage. Watching them, one wonders if any of these girls recall that the luscious star, Lucille Ball, got her first big break out in Girls' Town, acting as a mannequin in the same show "Roberta." And, going a step further in the I-knew-her-when speculation, how many of these names will have a claim to fame in the future books, as have so many of Powers' long-stemmed American Beauties?

Here's the line-up of the win-

ning models, leading off with dreamy-eyed, dark-haired Dorothy Hewitt, the "Girl with the Perfect Figure, who models custom clothes for Walton-Pierce in the City Club; blonde, bewitching Marilyn Johnson of Lochmoor Boulevard, Grosse Pointe; and these beauties: Judy Berkeley, Evelyn Johnson, Madeleine Scott, Helene Francis, Frances Huffman and Mary Pedigo.

It is obviously a fact in these Fabulous Forties that The Model has taken the place in the Public Eye of the chorus girl of the Terrific Twenties and the debutante of the Flirty Thirties. Beauty has become Big Business. Big for the Model's Agent, bigger for the Model herself and biggest of all for the business man behind her boxoffice beauty.

Beauty-plus Brains is the combination that opens all the safes in Girl's Town. With this all too rare duo, The Model can be skyrocketed from a mere Personality to "A Property." And unless you're a "Property" in Hollywood, you might as well marry the first Beverly Hill Billy who asks you.

Among the beauty-plus brains models who are now boxoffice Properties are these stars: Joan Bennett, Rosalind Russell, Dorothy Lamour, Paulette Goddard, Barbara Stanwyck, Gene Tierney, Susan Hayward, Jane Wyman, Lucille Ball, Joan Caulfield and Lauren Bacall.

Small wonder, with these Babes-in-Hollywood as their inspiration, so many girls keep asking us—and any other slave of fashion—"How Can I Become a Model?" Actually, the answer was partially predestined when the good fairies came bearing gifts at your birth. Partially, but not permanently. Given the proper proportions, poise and downright determined perseverance, you can become a model. Maybe not a Cover Girl, but at least an Undercover Girl.

There are, in fact, three current classifications of the modeling profession: Fashion Modeling, Illustration Modelling, and Photographic and Television Modeling. Each of these types has their special requirements and technique. And the steps from one to the other class is usually progressive.

Many models begin in the Fashion Salons. This has its own figure requirements and technique. There are the pivots, the presentation and the personality to sell the clothes off your back. In fact, to be a winning clothes horse, you have to have the thoroughbred qualities of a Derby race horse. Lucille Ball modeled for Hattie Carnegie for three years. Louise Barnes Gallagher was a model who wound up owning her own business and is today one of New York's foremost designers. Lauren Bacall went from the cover of "Harper's Bazaar" to Hollywood, where Humphrey Bogart proposed to her one evening in a phone booth because that was the only place he could get her alone.

Modeling for magazine illustrators is slightly more restful work than fashion modeling, but it requires endless poise and patience. However, artists no long-

er live in attics—they live in penthouses. And they can put their prize glamour-pusses into both the editorial and advertising sections—not to mention the cover, plus the cover charge. Of course, all artists are eccentric—or they aren't artists. For instance, Russ Patterson says: "I prefer red-tinted hair and a shade I call platinum-pink, but I must admit I seldom find it." And Bradshaw Crandall, the Cosmopolitan Cover Man blithely remarks that "A girl should look and be inspiring since that is her real value to the illustrator."

All of which eventually leads to Girls' Town and the movie cameras, or New York and the television studios. If the movie cameras are the magic eye, video is the tragic eye. Blondes often televise as "blizzard heads" and brunettes come out as "thunderclouds." Television is undoubtedly the toughest bracket in the racket.

For a Size Twelve, the Height is five feet, seven and a half, to eight and a half inches. The bust is 33 to 34 inches. The waist is 24 inches. The hips are 34 inches. And the weight is 114 to 120 pounds.





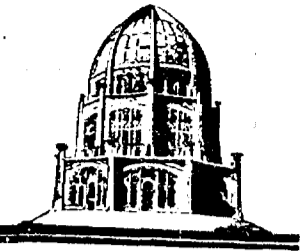

Park Will Test One-Way Street

Whittier road will soon be made a one way traffic street going north from Jefferson avenue to Mack. The J.J. jog where Whittier debouches onto Mack at the cross-over to Outer drive determined Park Manager Lane and Martin Frissel, the planner retained by the Park, to make this first one-way experiment between Mack and Jefferson on the Whittier route.

The policy of all the Pointe municipalities is to insist now on special parking facilities being provided wherever an important construction development is underway, which indicates that any unusual number of cars will be attracted to the neighborhood by the business to be carried on there.

This practice has been observed in the Woods where the village has cooperated effectively with the owners of the big development near Seven Mile and Mack where the new theater and the Wrigley store are located. The whole theory is that the streets are primarily for traffic and not for the parking of cars for longer periods than to permit the transaction of such business as brings them to that particular location.
