## Sensible Farm Planning

The proposal of the Senate Agriculture Committee for a long range farm program which would allow consumer food

It is the opposite of the Henry Wallace technique which sought to a range our agriculture economy by killing little pigs, throwing acreage out of cultivation and then maybe the following year paying bonuses to stimulate the very production it had prohibited.

Food, its cost and availability, is the one factor which must always be reckoned in any approach to the cost of living problem. The old laws of supply and demand have been operating ever since Joseph cornered the corn in Egypt and any attempt to circumvent them by economic manipulation al-

ways hurts the general welfare at some points.

The "ceilings over" and the "floors under" have been juggled about mercilessly. They are both a part of that controlled economy which is the antithesis of a free economy and that private enterprise towards which we are supposed to be

The day that supply and demand is recognized to replace that economy which is based on edicts from Washington

will be a happy day for America. For 15 years we have been living under that shadow of eternal regulation which has been the bane of a common average general welfare throughout its whole disastrous reign.

#### Inside Russia

The report of Drew Middleton, late correspondent of the New York Times in Moscow, should be a palliative to the fears of Americans who are shuddering over the imminence of a war between us and the Russians. Mr. Middleton is not of that school of expert foreign observers who take a hurried escorted trip through the land of the midnight sun and come back and tells us all about everything there. He knows; he has been there for long periods, and has had contacts not only with Russian leaders but can appraise the spirit and capacities of the Russian people and the material resources with which they work.

The first installment of his promised series of articles presents a sort of summary of his conclusions. He says Russia is not able to wage a successful war against the United States now nor will be in less than 10 years.

The Russians are a peasant people with little natural ability to adopt the technique of modern industrial life.

Their progress in the 30 years the communist government has been in power, while notable in limited spots is in dark contrast with the actual state of the great mass, where little

progress has been made. Their political and economic system opposes, and always must, the development of individual enterprise which is the backbone of modern strength and common well-being. By every yardstick by which Russia's future can be measured it must be classed many laps behind the United States for many years to come. He discounts entirely the rosy propagada.
