### Elects Browne

Harry C. Browne was elected president of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, at its annual meeting held in Boston on June

7. This is the Mother church. Mr. Browne was born in North Adams, Massachusetts, where he received his education in the public schools. After leaving high school, he began the study of law, which was interrupted by the Spanish-American War, in which he saw active service. During the winter following the war, Mr. Browne lectured on his experiences. In 1900 he became interested in the theater, and for 25 years he toured the United States and Canada as an actor, being associated with many of the foremost producers and man-

Mr. Browne became interested in Christian Science in 1910 tollowing the healing of his wife. He joined The Mother Church in 1916, later uniting in member-ship with First Church of Christ, Scientist, Flushing, New York, which he has served as a mem-ber of its board of trustees.


He left the theater in 1928, removing to New York City two years later. There he joined Second Church of Christ, Scientist, and served that church for a full term as First Reader, as well as in other capacities, in-cluding three years as a member and chairman of its board of

trustees.
In 1931, Mr. Browne withdrew from the position of production director and announcer for the Columbia Broadcasting System to devote his entire time to the practice of Christian Science. He served as First Reader in The Mother Church from 1938 to 1941, and in 1942 was elected a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship. During a period of retirement from this work for study and practice, Mr. Browne was ippointed official speaker for radio programs to be broadcast in person and by tran-scription for The Mother Church, in which activity he is still engaged.

"This group served for abou two and one-half years. It made the widest possible effort to ascertain the wishes of the people of Grosse Pointe. Prizes aggregating \$300 were given for the best written opinions on the theme. Veterans' organizations, High School Students and citizens at large were particularly urged to give their views."

There was some sentiment for a field house, but the overwhelming sentiment was in favor of a memorial library. This latter sentiment was strengthened undoubtedly by the offer of the Board of Education to donate the site on the School property.

One of the items in the project which the Study Group had to constantly consider was the matter of maintenance, without having to call periodically on the people. The offer of land, plus the assurance of maintenance in perpetuity by the School District, was a factor largely determining the final library choice.
"While this subject was under

consideration Mr. Murray Sales, without knowledge of the War Library movement, offered his homestead at Lincoln and Jefferson to be remodeled into a public library in memory of his wife, the late Jessie Carter Sales, who had long been identified with several of Grosse Pointe's prominent charities."
"When Mr. Sales learned of

the War Library movement underway he most generously authorized the School authorities, to whom he had tendered his homestead, to sell the property and apply the proceeds to the cost of the War library."

For this generous act it has already been decided that the name of Jessie Carter Sales shall be perpetuated in the children's library within the library proper which shall bear her name. Mr. Neff stressed that this fine

movement should have a deep and heartfelt appeal to every Grosse Pointer. It was to honor their own sons, both those who served the country in its days of peril and those who gave their lives in its defense.

"The deilberate opinion of those who have been closest to this movement," he said, "is that a Library will best serve the memorial character intended and contribute to the cultural life of the community and to the development of coming generations. of the successors of those who died and served."

Then the French saluted the flag and fired their muskets. The Indians, apparently impressed by such a celebration, whooped their approval. The ceremony ended with a great bonffre around which the French sang a Te Deum, "to thank God on behalf of these poor peoples, that they were now the subjects of so great and powerful a mon-

dians ripped the coat of arms from the post and, as lead was always a scarce item, used it to make bullets, according to Michigan historical information.

A century later, the British by force of arms took the Great Lakes and the region east of the Mississippi from France, expecting to retain them as parts of their growing empire. But again the possession won by blood and money was only temporary. For 20 years later, by the Treaty of Paris, the area became a part of the infant United States, although the United States didn't
