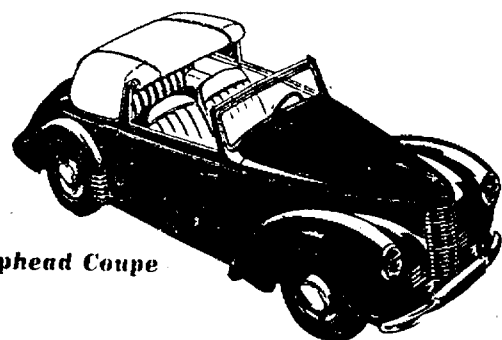

The girls and boys at Mason School claim to have the finest playground anywhere. It is a large playground, well-equipped with apparatus of various kinds. There are the usual pieces, such as swings, slides, horizontal bars, ladder, teeter-totters, and jungle gym, made of metal. There is a chicken coop ladder, which is made of wood; then there are some new pieces of cement equipment which are not likely to be found anywhere else except in Brooklyn, New York, where it was originally built. They consist of a "Dodger" cement block walls, which are 37 feet long, 4½ feet high, and 8

inches thick in E- and T- shapes and three sewer crock sections embedded on their sides in cement. These cement pieces of equipment are especially suited to children of lower elementary school age as they provide opportunity for creative play. What a surprise the children will get when the log picnic tables and benches, which are being ordered, arrive and are placed under the trees! Solve Series of Robberies With Arrest of Young Trio

Youths Described as 'Tough Babies' to Crack Picked Up After Making Noisy Entry of Gas Station on Mack Avenue

As a citizen of the Park was strolling along Mack avenue at 11:30 o'clock on Friday night, June 18 he heard the sound of breaking glass at or near the Jack Conley gas station at 15299 Mack. He immediately used the nearest phone to call the Park police station and Sergeant Anthony Walsh and Patrolmen Mouton and Art. Conlan responded.

After cruising about a few minutes, they picked up three suspicious looking boys at Marlborough and Alter and hustled them to the station. Meanwhile Detective Hennig had been busy seeking finger prints in the gas station and got one that was workable.

The young men arrested were Louis Davey, of 3691 Lakepointe, Nick Ciani, of 3672 Alter, and George Horn, of 373 Marlborough. Although only 16 years old each, Chief Art Louwers said they were hard babies to crack. It was only after the print Hennig had taken corresponded with one of Davey's they had taken on the spot, that they came through.

A grilling developed the fact that they had not only broken into the Conley gas station but had also robbed the Leslie Hardware Store at Mack and Weyburn and the Aloma theater and

had stolen a car belonging to Janet Dohrman of 1371 Lakepointe on May 15.

These were the only Pointe robberies the Park police could tie them up with but it has been learned they had burglarized at least sixteen other places in the Detroit 5th and 15th precincts.

Their specialty was gas stations but they digressed enough from their usual route to rob two florists shops and two real estate offices in Detroit.

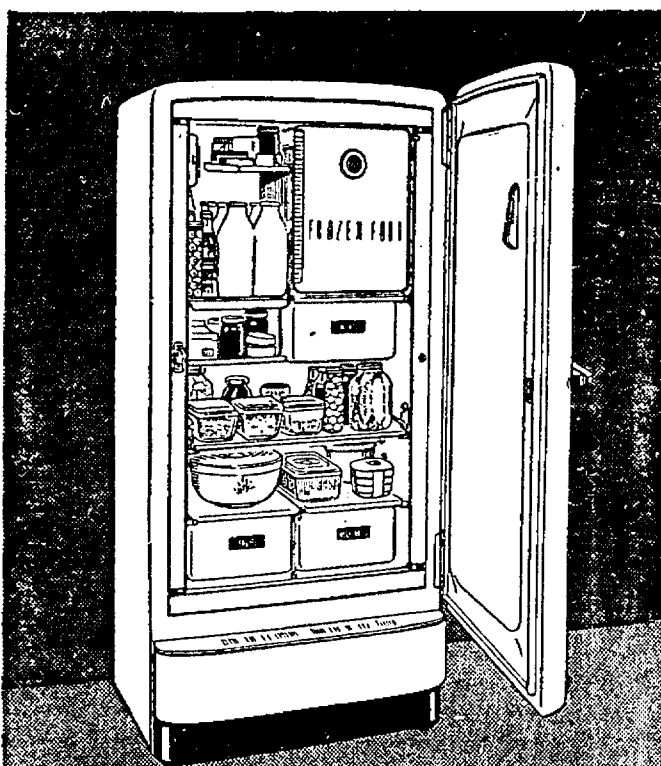

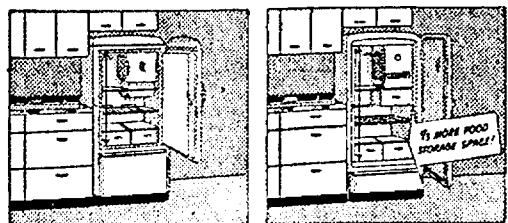

Pointe Loses Fred A. Behr

Former Shores President, Trustee and Attorney, Dies in Home

Frederick A. Behr, one of the best known attorneys in the Detroit area, died at his home at 57 Colonial road on Monday evening, June 21.

Mr. Behr had suffered a stroke in October, 1946, and since that time had been a semi-invalid. He resigned only recently as legal counsellor for Grosse Pointe Shores. He served the village in the past both as village president and a member of the Board of Trustees.

The funeral services are to be held this afternoon at the Hamilton Funeral Home.
Mr. Behr is survived by his widow, Camilla; a son, Robert; daughter, Camilla; and three brothers, Edgar G. and Waldo L., both residents of Grosse Pointe, and Herbert C. of Detroit. He was born in Detroit and was a graduate of the University of Michigan.
Burial was in Woodmere Cemetery.

The village dog impounding wagon is attempting to apprehend all animals running at large. You must keep your dog confined to your own property and on a leash if on public property.

Pointe War Hero Given Reburial

Reburial services were held June 21 at Arlington National Cemetery for Capt. Benjamin R. Martin, who died in the African theater on June 12, 1943. Capt. Martin, a graduate of Clemson College and University of Detroit law school, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Martin of 790 University place, Grosse Pointe, who attended the services in Arlington, Va.

Capt. Martin, who was born July 24, 1911, was connected with Headquarters Co., 757th Tank Battalion, at the time of death. He is survived by his widow, Janet Johnson Martin, and a son, Benjamin R. Martin Jr., of Los Angeles, in addition to the parents, one brother and two sisters.

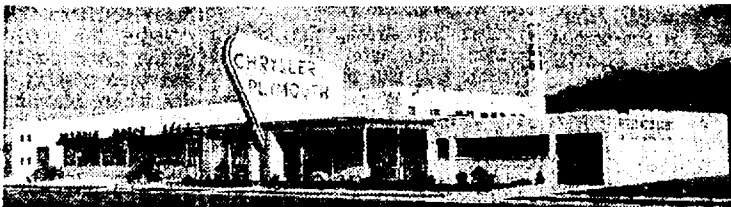

Your note—suggesting I toss off the "Sweet and Low Down" on Paris at present—came on the same day as the travel issue of the dear old New York Times.

Well, of course, their travel figures are correct—the round-trip fare by air at \$740.00 being the only heavy expense — but when they list food at \$4.00 a day and a single hotel room at \$2.00 a day, they are rather dipping into the dream department for anyone who wants a big time.

It is true that with the franc fluctuating in favor of the American dollar, money does go far—but not that far. It sounds almost like the sailor I heard remark at Maxim's last night that once when he was down to his last dollar he wanted to see how far it would go—so he mailed it to Shanghai. And ever since he's been having a huge time in Paris.

Here, at the Plaza Athenee, which we all know is rated as one of the de luxe hotels, you can get a good single room with bath for \$3.85 a day. You can dine — with wine — at Maxim's

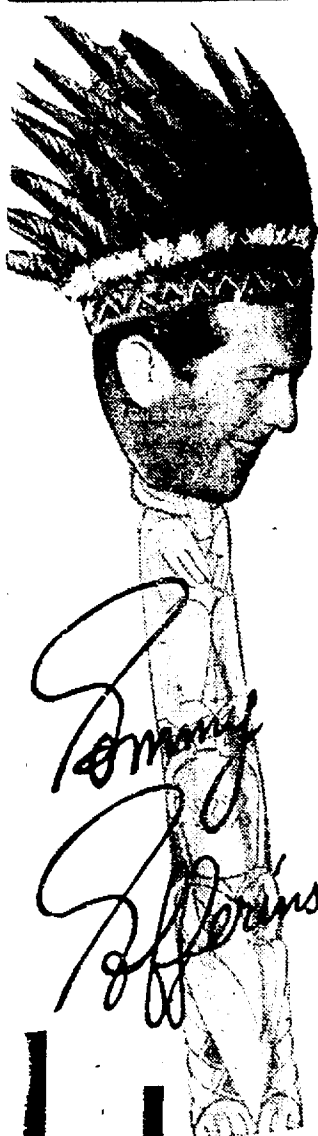
for \$6.50 and have a really sumptuous spread at the Tour d'Argent for \$8.00. And when we say dine we mean dine. Only in Paris does one realize the difference between dining and merely eating. Whatever they serve they do it with such finesse that even the food looks fashionable. Luncheon or dinner for a twosome in any little Paris cafe becomes a chic-to-chic occasion. This in contrast to London where you still simply eat—and darn lucky to be able to do it.

La Belle Paris was never so beautiful as this June. She is again a gay and enchanting city, with none of that air of a lady with her face lifted but all the scars still showing, as we all feared might follow her war days. The trees and flowers are in luxurious bloom along the boulevards, and everyone seems intoxicated with the joy of living, as the French say. They're expecting over a hundred thousand American visitors this summer. In fact, both air and ship passage is increasingly hard to get, but as always it can be had. These American throngs are not counting the American soldiers from the occupation zones who flock to Paris on leaves. And these lucky lads really have themselves a time and see Paris in a far merrier mood than the boys who left her behind them.

One big drawing card besides the fact that luxury taxes are abolished is the fact that the United States Customs have ruled that one may bring back \$400 worth of merchandise — duty free. There are lots of red tape measures governing buyers bringing in merchandise for sale in America. This allowance is provided for non-commercial travelers and aimed to step up the economy of our European allies.

For the conservative spender, me . . . alas, this means that a girl can bring at least two Paris gowns—one on her own allotment and one on her husband's allotment. Christian Dior and Jacques Fath are getting the big play from American women among the couturiers. This is largely because Christian Dior has been so brilliantly publicized as the creator of "That New Look."

At both these designers' showings, The Fall Look is going to be considerably slimmer and shorter. The Dior clientele have given the nod to Dior's Zig-Zag Gowns. And at Jacques Fath's June showing there was much applause for his Drape-the-Shape dresses. As a prophet—without profit—I'd venture the Harem Gown is going to ankle

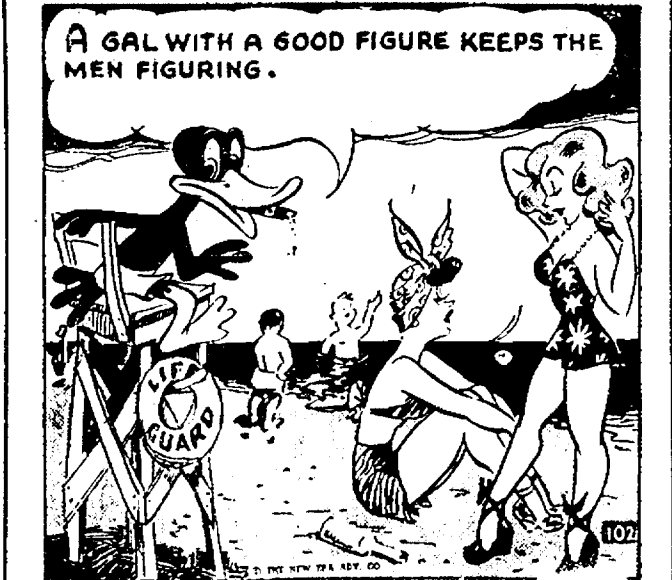


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in for fall. The young fashionables over here dote on their very girlish-gowns with all that mileage in the skirts, and they certainly look very naive and JEUNE FILLE in the real French manner.

The solid hit in the theaters here is Jean-Paul Sartre's "MAIN SALES." Literally "Soiled Hands," this play has been sold for fall presentation in New York under the title of "Red Hands." It's a foregone hit. An anti-Communist drama, it concerns a young officer who, after imprisonment, loses faith in the Party. Another sellout in Paris is Jacques Deval's "MADMOISELLE." The Theatre Guild has the rights to "AUPRES DE MA BLONDE," which I understand they offered to Helen Hayes as a starring role under the milder title of "Speak to Me of Love." But Miss Hayes hasn't signed, has she? The smash hit "BORN YESTERDAY" was a fast flop here. The French can't understand a girl with two mink coats casually strolling out on real live money. Just tell the boys and girls if they'll come over we can all have fun without a ton of du-

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ats. In fact, one gagster at the hotel said that his beautiful American greenbacks seemed to increase and propagate—he left two of them in a bureau drawer and when he opened it a week later they were growing like lettuce leaves all over the drawer. What gives in Grosse Pointe? Love, etc. RACHELLE.

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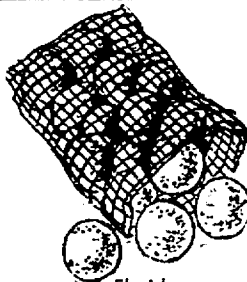

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


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Bill Hanson Tops Class In Mills Trophy Contest
