The Park has an enclosed cement pool 320 feet long by 250 feet wide. This is probably larger than the park will ever ordinarily require for its population, but the extra size is a good fault.

It was built when the Park municipal authorities were riding high, wide and handsome in the expenditure of public money. It is estimated that the beach front park with developments made at that time cost the Park in the neighborhood of \$900,000. It was this expenditure for park and swimming pool that partially accounted for the more than \$2,000,-000 of debt that the Garska regime bequeathed to the citizens. This debt has since been reduced to about \$1,400,000.

It is certain that if the water in the lake deteriorates to such a condition that the health authorities will again have to prohibit swimming, as might happen at any time in the swimming season, the agitation for enclosed pools in the other villages will start anew.

Port Huron Site Preserve Peas Traffic's Toll Of Ancient Fort For Winter Use One Every Hour

Twenty-five persons a day approximately one person every hour - are killed or seriously injured on the streets of Detroit as a result of careless or unlawful driving.

It is impossible to estimate the number of persons who walk or it is possible to determine how many will be killed or painfully

injured in traffic accidents. It is also possible to determine how many motorists, through their own improper driving, cause death or injuries to other persons walking or driving in Detroit traffic.

In the first six months of this year, more than 3,600 driver were found guilty of unlawful and improper driving. Their victims found out that they could not rely on the other guy,

These figures are not for all accidents, but only those fatal and injury accidents involving two motor vehicles or a motor vehicle and a pedestrian.

For the first six months of this year, there were 26,838 accidents in which 49,921 pedestrians and drivers were involved. A little less than half of this number were not guilty of any improper walking or driving. They, too, found out that they could not rely on the other guy.





Summer days are hot. Give your family a cooling dessert, says the Red Feather Visiting Housekeeper, and hear the thanks roll in.

FRUIT MOUSSE

- 1 cup fruit pulp and juice (raspberries, strawberries or
- peaches.) 34 cup sugar
- Pinch of salt
- 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin 2 tablespoons cold water
- 3 tablespoons boiling water
- 1 pint whipping cream

Rub fruit through sieve. Add ugar. Soak gelatin in cold water and then dissolve in the boiling water. Strain into refrigerator tray or bowl. Chill until thickened. Remove from refrigerator and beat until light. Fold if whipped cream and freeze. Makes one quart.

CAFE FRAPPE 4 cups fresh hot coffee 1 cup sugar

Add sugar to coffee, cool and freeze. Serve in tall glasses or sherbets with a spoonful of whipped cream on top.

MINT AND GRAPEFRUIT ICE 1½ cups sugar

- 34 cup white corn syrup 134 cups water
- 6 tablespoons lemon juice 1/2 cup chopped mint or
- 1/2 teaspoon mint flavoring
- 2 cups canned grapefruit sections and juice.

Cook sugar, syrup and 1 cup water to soft ball stage (238 degrees). Add lemon juice and renaining water. Cool and add mint. Cut grapefruit sections into pieces and add them to juice to cooled syrup, Freeze, Makes two quarts.
