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ly provided by the village, and adding necessary and non-duplicating functions presently carried on by the township.

### 2. BY HOME RULE CITY GOVERNMENT—

(a) Duplicate property assessments and duplicate Boards of Review will be eliminated. At present the village has an assessor and the township has an assessor and both provide Boards of Review.

(b) Residents will receive and pay bills through one local office, thus avoiding present confusion in tax bills.

(c) Duplicate sets of voting registration records will be eliminated. At present the village and township maintain separate systems.

(d) Voting precincts could be arranged for the best advantage and citizens would vote in the same place for all elections.

(e) The city will have direct representation on the Board of County Supervisors. The village does not elect or appoint its supervisors to represent it, representation is had only through the township.

(f) The judiciary will be elected by voters of the city community from its own citizens.

### 3. OTHER ADVANTAGES in the adoption of a city form of government are:

**Simplification of Government.** As village residents, citizens are a part of two local governments. They are governed by two governing bodies, one for village purposes and one for township purposes, and the township government is only partly responsible to the village citizens because it serves a much larger area.

It may not be a major problem to deal with two local governments, but it is an unnecessary inconvenience, annoyance, and waste of time, and the net effect is a lack of interest in and control of the "second" or township government. As a city, all local affairs are managed by one government, organized by its citizens, and responsible only to them.

**Removal of Partisan Element in Local Affairs.** Township elections are on a partisan basis (candidates appear on the ballot as Democrats or Republicans).

Most municipal charters provide for non-partisan elections because it is generally accepted that local issues may be brought more clearly into focus if they are devoid of county, state and national politics.

**No Change in Character of Community.** It should be emphasized that calling the Farms a "city" instead of a "village" produces no change whatsoever in the social and economic character of the community or the people living in it.

**No Change in School Districts, Health or Welfare.** Health and welfare are administered and financed either on a county-wide basis, or by townships and cities; therefore the city taxpayers would simply continue to pay for such services through the city. School districts in Michigan are separate and distinct from municipalities and there would be no change in the size or organization of the school districts in a new city.

**Automatic Charter Revision.** The procedure in becoming a city requires that a charter commission be elected to draft a new charter. This compulsory preparation of a new charter will result in modernizing and improving the form of government.

**IMPROVING ORGANIZATION.** In addition to the advantages of city incorporation which arise from separation from the township, there is also the important possibility of improving the organization of the local government itself. The Village operates under the General Village Law of the State of Michigan, passed 53 years ago. This out-of-date law does not provide the flexibility or the self-determination of form of government provided in the Home Rule Act for cities. Operating as a "Home

Rule City" permits an up-to-date and efficient form of governmental organization with a modern city charter adapted to the individual character of Grosse Pointe Farms.

The foregoing is more completely explained in detail in the enclosed publication by the Michigan Municipal League.

Do not confuse the issue of combining the five Grosse Pointes with the question of having a "Home Rule" city for the Farms only. There is no connection between the two questions.

a single city unit rendering health services in this method because the Farms children attend the same schools as Woods, Shores, City and Park children. Efficient service would be impossible unless the proposed city could, as does the City of Grosse Pointe, purchase its health service from the Township or some other municipal agency. The Wayne County Health Department has advised us that it will not render this service. The Grosse Pointe Township Health Department, with out inquiry as to residence, conducts a community baby clinic, an eye clinic, dental clinic, hearing aid clinic, health and sanitary services inspecting the five communities, as well as all drinking and eating places in all food handling establishments (groceries, butcher shops, drug stores, etc.) It also tests drinking water, swimming pools and all beaches.

**RADIO SERVICE**  
A single unit radio service is now rendering service to Grosse Pointe Farms, Grosse Pointe Shores, Grosse Pointe Woods, and

Grosse Pointe Park. The elimination of this township radio as proposed by the city form of government would be replaced by five separate radio stations unless these communities could merge into a single unit similar to the present township system to obtain this protection to the public. The radio service rendered by the township is conducted by five experienced, licensed radio technicians, furnishing 24 hour service. Five separate radio units would not necessarily need 25 similar men but we submit that five men as now employed would be insufficient to give the same police protection and give 24 hour service in five separate municipalities.

In 1930 when radio protection was suggested as necessary to the best interests of this community the various Grosse Pointe Villages requested the Township, because of its control of the total radio service, to assume the responsibility as being the most economical and effective. There has never been an official complaint filed against the present system.

The Township conducts all National, State, County, and Township elections within the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms. There are seven voting places for the convenience of the residents thereof. Under the city plan there would be one central voting precinct to provide voting facilities for the more than 5,000 registered voters of Grosse Pointe Farms. The city form of government would require that the expense of conducting National, State and County elections be borne by the residents of the proposed city. This would place the cost of said elections upon the taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Farms. The Township election is held at the same time as the State and County elections, hence no Township election costs would be eliminated. Costs for holding elections would increase under a city form of government. Keep in mind that this forthcoming election is being held in one voting place located in your Municipal Building. An interview with any City of Grosse Pointe voter will more indubitably impress you with the convenience furnished by the seven township voting precincts rather than by one.

**WELFARE**  
Another service performed by the township is that of the care and service to the indigent and mentally afflicted residents of your community. At the present time when employment and economic conditions are favorable this is a problem of not much magnitude, but experience has proven that we have periods when the residents of Grosse Pointe Farms require assistance along these lines. This would be an additional cost to the Farms under the city form of government.

**ASSESSMENTS AND TAXES**  
The assessments for and collection of county and school taxes are now being handled by the township. The city form of government would require the city to provide for the assessment and collection of these taxes and would be separate and distinct from the collection and assessment of taxes for city operation. The cost of the same would have to be borne by the city because of the resultant need for additional personnel, including a full time assessor, and expenses including bond premiums, stamps, present Village of Grosse Pointe

etc. The assessments used in the Farms are the same assessments made and formulated by the Township of Grosse Pointe.

### COSTS

We, the officials of Grosse Pointe Township, submit:

1. You, as village residents, not only support two local units of government, the village and township, but you also support the county, state, school board, and federal governments. It is not possible at the present time to eradicate all forms of government locally. Though the question is not before you in this election, savings in eliminating alleged overlapping of government structures could be avoided without any question if the communities in Grosse Pointe should consolidate into one unit of government, thus eliminating 4 presidents, 4 chiefs of police, 4 fire chiefs, 4 village attorneys, 4 assessors, 4 auditing firms, 4 treasurers, 4 highway departments, as well as many other duplicating officials.

DO YOU KNOW that your present township tax rate is 93c per one thousand dollars of assessed valuation? The township is the only unit of government in the five Grosse Pointe municipalities that lowered its tax rate this year. Consider the services that you are now receiving which have been enumerated above. These costs, for illustration, are based on the average home assessment in Grosse Pointe Farms of \$7,000.

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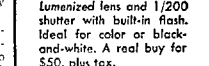

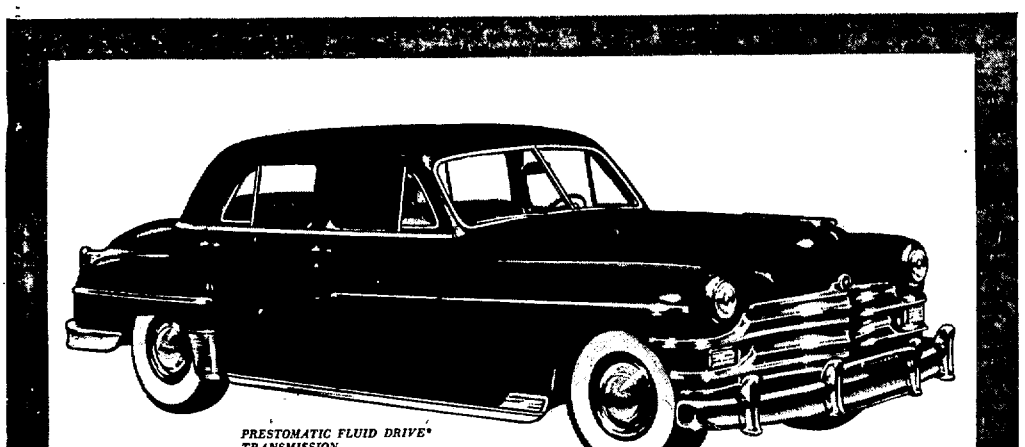

### Potter Asks Answers to Joint Pointe Police Radio Questions

The subjoined letter was written by Judge John L. Potter, an attorney-at-law and one of the justices of Grosse Pointe Township and ex-officio a member of the Township Board.

He complains that insufficient information has been given to the people of Grosse Pointe as to the cost, efficiency, and method of operation of the proposed Grosse Pointe Inter-Municipal Police Radio by the proponents of township radio.

Pointe Township about the new radio hook-up that is proposed by the Villages of Grosse Pointe Park, Grosse Pointe Shores, Grosse Pointe Farms and the City of Grosse Pointe.

It appears to me that no satisfactory explanation has been presented to the people as to the reason for this change. Some have suggested that this is the method of ridding the taxpayers of the township. Others have said that the reason for the new set up was that the various villages, through their officials, had no control over the present township radio.

From my investigation I have learned that the township inter-village radio has been in operation since 1930 and that this plan was arrived at because a plan similar to the one now proposed was not only inefficient but was grossly lacking in protection for this area.

officers who have had no special training in broadcasting or radio engineering and to scrap an investment that the taxpayers of Grosse Pointe Township have in the present radio station WRDR. One excuse offered is that the cost to the villages will be less than the present method of operation; If this is true, will the savings in cost of operation justify the loss of efficiency? I, for one, believe that before this plan is officially adopted that an answer should be given.

The taxpayers of this township should also know that the cost of the operation of the radio station is set up in the township budget and this budget is now being prepared. It is true that a great deal of consideration must be given to the fact that the Federal Communications Commission requires a change-over from the present method of broadcasting to the frequency modulation system, commonly known as FM. This cost is not a minor item to be considered and the township board has been considering the changes necessary and have installed equipment anticipating the change which goes into effect in 1950.

It can be seen that a uniform inter-village radio is necessary when one considers the report that is on file of the operation of the radio station for the year 1947. This report has previously been printed in the papers having circulation in this community but to review the report we will call attention to the services rendered:

In examining the 1948 report, it will be observed that the services rendered by the present radio station have increased, to-wit:

Such increase obviously is in direct relationship to the growth of this community.

What do the proponents of the plan offer for the areas not subscribing to this new plan? Will it be necessary for the village of Grosse Pointe Woods, for instance, to establish their own radio system as did the City of Grosse Pointe when it became a city? What are the costs of the operation of the radio station now operated by the City of Grosse Pointe and how many calls were broadcast at station

WRDR for the City of Grosse Pointe radio station? I believe that these questions should be answered impartially so that the taxpayers of Grosse Pointe can voice their opinions as to this proposed plan. I do not believe that we have the right to jeopardize public safety for personal political ambitions.

The police radio, like the services rendered by the Board of Health, are property of each individual taxpayer and such services should not be curtailed unless the voice of the people is heard.

May I suggest, Mr. Editor, that this letter be published and an invitation extended to those who know some of the answers, or purport to know, to express their opinion on both sides of this question.

**Discuss Present Needs**  
Following a report of what had been previously attempted along recreational lines in the Pointe, the meeting was given over to present needs and how these needs could be accomplished.
