The Atlantic Pact

There is no need for the American people to add the Atlantic Pact to their other worries. Every American with a scintilla of gray matter under his skull knows that it only legally implements a course which would be inevitable in the event of an attack by Russia on Western Europe, whether or not such a treaty existed.

If the formal alliance with Western Europe, which is purely military in purpose, serves to envisage to the Russians cution of persons who remove the inevitability of war with the United States if she pursues secret Government files for deher policy to the point of open war and so stays her it will have served a purpose wholly justifying the involvements and committments now apparent.

The formal action by the Senate merely strengthens a position which we ourselves have well realized here at home but which might not otherwise have been so bluntly apparent to European eyes.

It is no new thing for America to address its sentiments on world movements to the whole world. We did that very thing on December 2, 1823 when President Monroe challenged the monarchic system, which was then world wide, to attempt its reestablishment in the Western World. That declaration, issued less than a full generation after George Washington counseled avoidance of entangling foreign alliances, and since supported by every political party in America, has been effective from the North to the South Pole, since which time not an acre of land in this half of the world has reverted to monarchy. The abortive attempt of Louis Napoleon to set up the Maximillian empire in Mexico was abandoned under our pressure immediately with the end of our Civil War.

When Woodrow Wilson on April 2, 1917, recommended to a joint session of the Congress that America should issue a declaration of war against Germany because, "God helping her she can do no other," it was a clear recognition of the fact that circumstances can arise where our involvement in foreign war becomes inevitable.

The constitutional right of the Congress to declare war rise meanwhile. is still reserved, but all America knows that this treaty makes the assurance of such a declaration more quick and certain.

It is high time this inconsistency was rectified. Let us either purge our local government in all their departments of the communists, or openly and affectionately take them to our bosoms.
