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### Mission Accomplished

It is to be hoped that the announcement coming out of western Berlin on July 29 that the airlift is to end definitely places a period to one of the most threatening episodes in the cold war. That it was one of the most successful 'peacetime' military operations in history is now recognized by all, and with especial distaste by the Russians.

The blockade was conceived by the Soviet for the frank purpose of demonstrating to the Germans their dependence for their physical existence upon them. With their abundant supplies of foodstuff dangled before the eyes of the hungry west Berliners it seemed simple logic that the residents in the allied zones of the city, who numbered more than half the total population of about 5,000,000, would be willing to swap their dependence for food and other absolute necessities and be coerced into an acceptance of the Russian scheme of life.

Happily, because of Anglo-American resourcefulness and courage, their scheme fell awry. The success of the airlift has put new courage in the hearts of the lovers of freedom and true democracy in central Europe and has done more to place a stop to the advance of communism in Europe, and even in far places of the world, than any other incident of the current period. It may well be that in the years to come the historian will say democracy owed a debt of thanks to the communists for having tried the blockade.

Unless this challenge had been met, and successfully, by this time Italy, and France might have been taken over and the cause of human freedom been irreparably harmed.

The Allied leaders on the spot, however, have wisely let it be known that a standby air service will be maintained. There is no intention on their part to be taken off guard by the apparent success so far gained.

There are many soul stirring lines about Calmness and Peace at Home, but not a line in repetition of the nation-old principle of the separation of Church and State.

The former First Lady had merely dared to question the wisdom of spending public taxes for sectarian schools. There was nothing original in that thought in America. It has been Alethodist Church endorsed by millions of Americans, including millions of Catholics themselves. In retaliation His Eminence said she was not a good American Mother, a statement somewhat extraneous to the subject under discussion. Of course, there were millions of Catholic boys who fought their country's battles as there always have been from the beginning of the Nation. There were also a lot of Jewish boys and some American Indians who still worship the Great Spirit. For all we know there were some Mohammedahs also. There still remains no valid reason why public taxes should be employed in the maintenance of sectarian schools. This same practice has accounted for half of the religious wars that have deluged Europe.

The parochial schools of the Catholic Church, for whom. the Cardinal speaks, are doing a magnificent work in molding better men and women in this land. They result not only in better religionists but in better citizens. Would that other religious sects gave more heed to accompanying their secular education with deep religious truths. But in a day and age when, unhappily, much religious prejudice still exists, it would only add fuel to these flames of religious prejudice and bigotry to take money out of the pockets of a citizen to go in part for the support of schools under the direction of a religious group of which he was not a member, however broad and unbiased that instruction might be. The founding fathers of this nation foresaw such results and took early steps to forfend against them.  $\sim$

### Uses of Memorial Center

The early reports of the great success of the dances recently held in the Memorial Center is a happy augury of the place this splendid property is destined to hold in the up at the foot of Westchester on life of this community.

It would be unfortunate however for the impression to get abroad that social functions are to be the main activity of this property. These will properly have their place in the operating agenda of the Center but to make it the 'living memorial' which was agreed upon at the beginning of the study of the project three years ago, its interests and activities must be as wide and embracing as the life of the community itself. To be less would make the name "Community Center" a misnomer.

This project was planned primarily as a memorial to the men and boys of Grosse Pointe who gave their lives to their country in the last war and as a fitting perpetuation of the names of those who served in the war and survived.

With the development of the place it is, now being realized by most Grosse Pointers that it was a fortunate turn that the project has taken the form it has rather than become a mere public library, disappointing though that change of direction seemed at the time.

Referring to the library project it would be most fitting if the Grosse Pointe Public Library would take over a suitable. room in the property as a kind of reference library, or more particularly as a repository for rare books, many of which would doubtless be forthcoming from private collections in the Pointe.

Quarters should also be offered to the recently created Grosse Pointe Historical Society: This idea was also included in the early discussions of the memorial project.

Very properly quarters have already been set aside for a Garden Center. This will be not for the use of any particular garden club or association, of which there are many in Grosse Pointe, but rather as a focal point for the activities of all of them from which valuable information will be disseminated throughout the community. This will be one of the important projects which will go far to support the educational and cultural character of the Center.

The Veterans' organizations which are most intimately associated with the basic purpose of the Memorial have already been provided for in the allocation of a beautiful room in the building, of their own selection, and this place will be largely left to the tastes and desires of the veterans for its development.

Not any of these uses will impinge upon the proper use of the property for affairs of community-wide appeal, and all will be under the direction and control of the Board of Directors. The community is to be congratulated that the original board of directors, already functioning, is made up of a representative group of prominent men and women of the Pointe, each one of whom has been selected as fitting into the operational scheme of the project.

The sincere purpose of the directors is to make the conduct of the Center fit into the general picture of Grosse Pointe's community life. No clique or group is to be given a dominant place in its use or direction.

Grosse Pointe is deeply obligated to the Alger family that it is possessed of such an exceptionally beautiful property both in structure and location, to stand as a perpetual patriotic memorial and as an instrument dedicated to the enjoyment of its people for the advancement of its cultural and educational life.

With such a fine start and with the spirit already in evidence in its development our community is destined to be the possessor of one of the finest establishments of this character in the entire nation.




