A special election will be held in the Farms on December 12. The residents will vote to accept or reject the charter which has been prepared by a charter commission of nine, working long hours during the last eight months. At the same election the residents will choose a council of seven members and one justice of the peace.

Political Scattergun

President Truman's speech in St. Paul on November 3, despite his previous declaration that it was to be non-political, was as well saturated with politics as the best vote seeking efforts of his illustrious predecessor in his most militant days.

He set himself up as the St. George who was bent upon destroying the "reactionary," "selfish interest" and "stand-patter" dragons which roam the American economic jungle. Every group and class in the country were promised his consideration and these were meticulously rated in the order for preference according to the bulk vote they represented. He placed farmers and industrial workers at the top of his list.

Even the Townsendites and the Commies are thrown a few crumbs of comfort in his old age pension and civil rights items, although they apparently do not rate a high place on his glad chart of promise.

No group was overlooked unless it be those who by thrift, industry, intelligence or even mere chance, have accumulated property. They are the "Economic Royalists" and "Princes of Privilege," whom his great mentor taught him to damn. Mr. Truman exhibited a minimum of originality by giving them synonymous names. However, he keeps himself within the ranks of the great triumvirate of reformation by copywriting one of the "Deals." Teddy had a "Square" one, Franklin a "New" one and he himself has trotted out a "Fair"

His whole speech was what Shakespeare would call "caviar for the general." One cannot quarrel with the individual items he picks out for special consideration any more than one can quarrel with virtue, but the mass of goodness he promises to achieve, if he, Harry Truman and his crowd are kept in office a couple years more, is almost too much.

The whole program boils down to the proposal that all shall be taxed for the special benefit of the members of that particular group whose number happens to come up for the grand distribution.







Don't let little miseries spoil your fun, the Department urges. Choose, your eating spots with care. Don't drink from a creek or from any well you do not know to be safe. Don't use unpasteurized milk, cream or butter, no matter who gives or sells them to you. Treat blisters, scratches, chiggers, poison ivy or sumac at once.

Don't get tired out. Take hunting clothing to suit the climate and type of hunting you will do. Don't trudge around in rainsoaked clothes, or with wet feet. Take rubber gloves and use them when cleaning game. Cook all game until it is thoroughly done before you taste it.

Remember that hunting accidents occur to those who know better, but who temporarily are careless, and that you are in more danger of injury from memable reputation as a radio artist bers of your own party than from others.



An ordinance to regulate the design, construction, installation, repair, alteration and maintenance of gas fired space heating equipment, appliances and appurtenances.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS:

Section 1. This ordinance shall apply to all new gas fired space heating equipment installations and to all present gas fired space heating equipment, provided, that present installations may be continued in use without change where such present installations basically conform to approved standards and present no hazard through the method

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation to install, repair, alter or service any gas fired space heating equipment, or to engage in any such business in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, without first having filed an application with the Clerk of the City and having obtained from such Clerk a license as herinafter set forth, provided, however, that any such person, firm, partnership, association or corporation need not secure the said license from the said Clerk if such person, firm, partnership, association or corporation proves to the said Clerk that it has in effect a license issued by another municipality in this State under an ordinance containing at least substantially the same regulations as this ordinance and files a certified copy of such license with the said Clerk.

Section 3. Application for a license shall be made on blank forms furnished for such purpose by the said Clerk. The application shall contain, in addition to the other requested information, the following:

- Name, age and address of applicant; Qualification of applicant; If applicant be a corporation—
- Full and accurate corporate name;
 When and where incorporated;
 Full names and addresses of officers of corporation;
- (d) If applicant be a partnership-
- (1) Names and addresses of members thereof; (e) If the applicant conducts business under a trade or assumed
 - (1) Complete and full trade name:
 - (2) The name of the person or persons doing business under such trade or assumed name.

Section 4. The Clerk with the assistance of City Engineer, may make an investigation of the training, experience, general qualifications, character, reputation, reliability and fitness of each applicant, to take part in any of the operations of the business, and upon being satisfied that an applicant is entitled to a license under this ordinance, said Clerk shall issue a license to such applicant. The Clerk shall be empowered to issue such a license to an applicant of good repute who has been engaged in established heating business in the community for two (2) years or more prior to the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 5. If a licensee has failed to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, or with the rules and regulations adopted thereunder, or is not suitable to engage in the operations of the business; the Clerk may revoke or suspend any license issued thereunder.

Section 6. A fee for the issuance of such license, in the sum of five (\$5.00) dollars shall be paid to the clerk of said City. Section 7. All licenses issued hereunder shall expire on the 31st day of December next following.

Section 8. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation to install, repair or alter any gas fired space heating equipment in the City of Grosse Points Farms without a written permit issued by the said Clerk. Such permit may include the installation of partnership. permit issued by the said Clerk. Such permit may include the missing tion of electric wiring for gas fired heating equipment, providing such wiring is restricted to the installation of an insulating transformer only whose primary is connected to an existing lighting circuit. Such permit whose primary is connected to an existing lighting circuit. Such permit the applicant therefor has complied with shall not be issued unless the applicant therefor has complied with the ordinances of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms and has paid to the Clerk of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms the sum of five (\$5.00) dollars.

Section 9. (a) The Building Inspector and his authorized assistants shall have the right during reasonable hours to enter any building or premises in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms for the purpose of making any inspections or tests of any gas fired space heating equipment or parts thereof contained therein. (b) It shall be the duty of the Building Inspector or his authorized assistants to inspect all new gas fired space heating units at the time of their installation and all gas fire space heating units installed previous to the enactment of this ordinance which, due to their construction, installation or condition may present a hazard to persons or property.

(c) The Building Inspector and his authorized assistants may make such other inspections and tests as are deemed necessary for the purpose of safety and the enforcement of this ordinance. Section 10. It shall be unlawful for any owner, occupant, firm, partnership, association or corporation, having control or management of any building or structure, to use or permit to be used therein, any gas fired space heating equipment which has been installed or altered subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance without a permit subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance without a permit herein provided and final inspection of such installed or altered equipment by the Building Inspector or his authorized assistants. It shall also be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation to turn on the gas for use in any gas fired space heating equipment which has been installed or altered in any building or structure subsequent to the effective date of this ordinance without the said permit and final inspection and approval by the Building Inspector or his authorized assistants.

Section 11. (a) Whenever any gas fired space heating unit or part thereof or any accessory thereto is found to be unsafe or in a condition to contribute a hazard to life or property, the Building Inspector or his authorized assistants are hereby empowered to condemn the unit or the part thereof and no such unit or part thereof shall there-

Section 12. The requirments as to gas stiping, valves and fittings and as to gas fired space heating equipment, and regulations in respect thereto, as contained in Ordinance No. 21-2 of the City of Detroit. Michigan, which ordinance is entitled "An ordinance to regulate the design, construction, installation and maintenance of gas fired space heating equipment, appliances and appurtenances;" etc., effective May 23, 1946, is hereby incorporated in and made a part of this ordinance to the same effect as though fully set forth herein.

Section 12. Any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation or anyone acting on behalf of such person, firm; partnership, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subject to a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars or to imprisonment in the county jall for a period of not more than ninety (\$00) days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court. Each day that a violation of this ordinance is continued or permitted to exist without compliance shall constitute a separate offense punishable upon conviction in the manner prescribed in this section.

Section 14. Should any section, paragraph or provision of this ordinance be declared invalid, the same shall not effect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared invalid.

Section 15. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (30) days from the date of passage thereof. Passed: November 7, 1949.
