

Conversion Issue On Woods Ballot In Early Summer

If That Village and Park Both Approve Change to City Status, Shores Will Be Lone Remaining Municipality In Grosse Pointe Township

The Committee of seven that was set up in the Woods some time ago to explore the advisability of converting into a city, has had two formal meetings in the council chamber and many talks among individual members of the committee. The group will probably urge that the village convert to a city and if council approves a vote on the issue by the qualified electors of the village will follow.

The function of this committee is to consider only broadly the general advantages or disadvantages of city structure. The actual structure of the proposed city would take, if the change is authorized, would depend on the charter commission which would be named at the same time the city change was authorized.

Election In Summer

The election on the issue will probably be held in early summer. The study group is expected to make its report late in April or early in May. If the conversion is then authorized by the citizens, the charter commission will go to work on its assignment at once and when the proposed charter is completed it must then turn to go to the people for adoption or rejection.

The rejection of the proposed charter would not be a rejection of the city status. That having already been determined by the people, another commission would have to be named and its work in turn be submitted for approval.

Shores Would Be Alone

If the Woods and Park should

both approve the city scheme it would pretty well determine the future of all Grosse Pointe municipal government. With only the Shores remaining in the township that century-old unit of local government would automatically pass away and the Shores, left alone, would virtually be compelled to also move into city status.

Under Michigan law a village may become a city with a population as small as 750.

Traffic Report Being Prepared

For many months past City Clerk Norbert P. Neff and the City police, working with the Wayne County Road Commission, have been making a survey of traffic and parking conditions in the City.

At the Council meeting on Jan. 16 Mr. Neff reported that their work was practically finished and that he would be ready to present the final report by the next meeting.

It is believed that the City's long considered program for parking meters, off street parking facilities and other allied matters, will then be seriously undertaken in the light of this forthcoming report.

The City has long been planning on improving the parking facilities and preventing the cluttering up of the curbs where parking congestion now prevails. The accomplishment of these improvements is directly tied in with the meter and municipal parking lot questions.

Community Council Urges All Groups to Cooperate

The Grosse Pointe Community Council this week renewed its bid for increased participation in the Council by every one of the 150 organizations in the Pointes, urging them to affiliate and to return to the Council the questionnaires which have been sent to them.

Publication of a weekly calendar of events in the Pointes, the Council's first project, is to start next week and will be continued throughout the year. The Calendar will serve as a reminder for current activities and will be an advance source of reference, so that meetings may be scheduled without conflicts in dates. It has been found that many Pointe organizations have had such conflicts without advance knowledge, resulting in disappointing attendance at meetings.

A Community Directory, listing all Grosse Pointe organizations and the name of a responsible officer of each, is the next project of the Community Council. Publication is expected in the near future.

The Grosse Pointe Community Council was formed at the concluding meeting last April of the Family Life Institute, which was attended by more than 1,000 men, women and youths of Grosse Pointe. Representatives of 42 Pointe organizations voted then to form a permanent Council to "foster the development of community life in the Grosse Pointes."

The enthusiastic response at that time to the Council plan by the youth of Grosse Pointe helped make adults realize the need for such an organization. In later appeals to the Council, delegates from youth groups have urged consideration of recreational facilities, better parent-youth understanding and a moral code for students.

The executive board and present membership of the Council have carefully studied the work done by the 53 other community councils in Michigan. Some of these councils conduct regular public forums on matters of community interests, others have annual fairs, some have developed particular projects for youth or adult groups.

A recent speaker from the Highland Park Community Council traced its development over 11 years from a small beginning to one of the most vital forces in the community today. One of its most successful projects is the play-lot plan, whereby recreational facilities are taken to the young people in all parts of the city.

"A successful Community Council can be developed in Grosse Pointe only if every segment of the community gives its enthusiastic support," said Grant E. Armstrong, president. "Many organizations and individuals have given wholehearted backing. Some have not."

"If your club or organization has not acted on its affiliation with the Council, we urge it to do so immediately. If your organization would like to have a representative at your meeting to explain the Council's objectives, please call the recording secretary, Mrs. H. Ray Will, at TU 5-3124."

"Only with the combined effort of every organization in the Grosse Pointe area, whether it be

educational, religious, service, veterans, artistic or recreational, can the Community Council be a success.

"We want the Council itself to be an important force in Grosse Pointe community life, and at the same time we want it to be in a position to help its member organizations with their own projects."

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Evidence Filed In Liquor Case

It is reported by the Detroit office of the State Liquor Control Commission that the evidence is all in and in the hands of the State Board at Lansing in the case which involved the Mike's Bar establishment in St. Clair Shores for selling liquor to minors.

It was alleged to be this establishment which sold drinks to the five boys who were in the car which smashed up in Grosse Pointe Shores at 1:55 a. m. on January 21, 1949, in which accident one of the boys was killed.

Mike's Bar was cited to the Liquor Control Board in August by the Grosse Pointe Shores police. Agents of the Board have been in the region making inquiry since then and an attorney for the Board went to Niles, Michigan, to get the deposition of one of the boys who was in the car at the time of the accident.

The Detroit office of the Liquor Control Board says that the matter is now in the hands of the people at Lansing and that action from that quarter is expected momentarily.

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Snow, Rain and Sleet Fell Wires and Trees, Mire Cars

The ravages of the storm on February 13 were principally evidenced in the Pointe by broken limbs and fallen wires. The same story came from all sections of the area.

Up in the Shores many of the fine elms along Lake Shore road were badly broken and Manager Tom Jeffris said his highway crew was busy all night clearing up broken limbs and safeguarding fallen wires pending the arrival of the Detroit Edison repair crews.

In the City the same story occurred. As the desk man at police headquarters said we "answered about a million calls about fallen limbs and wires. The highway crews worked overtime to clear streets and sidewalks and safeguard the public safety. Stalled cars came a dime a dozen."

Chief Walter Goulette of the Wopds said his village got off easy as far as fallen wires and broken trees went. There were a few cases, but none of them serious.

The Farms police blotter is cluttered with reports of fallen tree branches and broken and sagging electric wires. One wire fell right in front of the police station and a tree on the Municipal Building property was topped when the sleet broke off the upper branches. A large elm in the Old Kerby School yard also lost a big limb.

The excessive rainfall also got into the police radio and telephone cables at the Farms building. There was no outright break in the service, but for some hours Tuesday the officers were hearing phone calls over the radio system and the office help upstairs could hear police radio

broadcasts over their telephones. All wires were cleared by 2:30 Tuesday afternoon.

Long before nightfall the afternoon's rain had turned into a sea of slush that slowed traffic to a snail's pace. The Farms municipal parking lot was a welter of churning wheels and angry drivers as cars became stuck in the goopy mess. More rain Monday night and Tuesday turned the lot into a vertiable wading pool.

Highway and maintenance crews worked throughout Monday night with plows and shovels to clear the streets and sidewalks and haul away fallen branches from hundreds of trees.

Plan to Enlarge Marine Hospital

Rep. Louis C. Rabaut, 14th District of Michigan, has made public a letter to him from Jess Larson, General Services Administrator, in which the Marine Hospital at Windmill Pointe is named as having been selected for improvement under the provisions of Public Law 105, 81st Congress.
The Act authorizes the appropriation of \$40,000,000 for the acquisition of sites and the preparation of plans for Federal buildings. The list of projects selected brings the total number so far to 461.
"This is good news for the people of the Detroit area," Rep. Rabaut said. "Additional land is to be acquired for the Marine Hospital, and plans will be prepared for the erection of new facilities."
"The proposed limit for the cost of the entire project," Rabaut concluded, "for land, drawings, specifications, construction, etc., is \$3,700,000."

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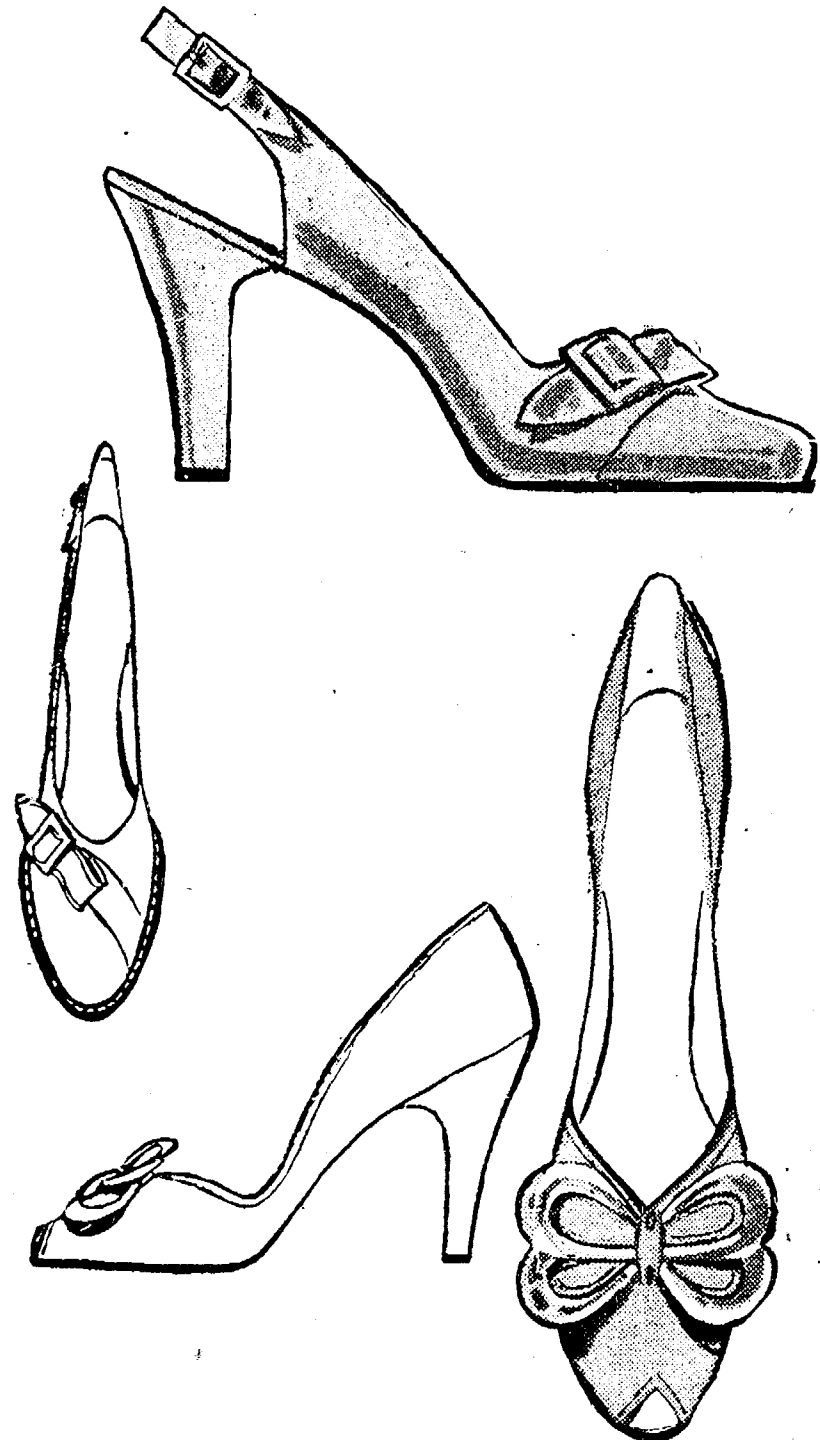

Mrs. John Gaine Rumney of Washington road, who is celebrating her ninetieth birthday today, wears her years with grace and elegance and great joie de vivre.

The interview took place in Mrs. Rumney's cheery up stairs sitting room. There was a basket of letters pulled to attention spot on her desk ... several books were open on a bridge table ... and everywhere were signs of something Mrs. Rumney was just about to do.

But hers was a gracious greeting as she offered a chair beside the crackling fireplace and we talked of Detroit in 1860, the year she was born. Mrs. Rumney's parents were the Samuel E. Pittmans and at the time of her birth lived on Macomb street, about where the Fercy Seed Co. is today.

Then it was known as Crogan. Before her first birthday, her father left for the Civil War. He was adjutant to General Williams, the grandfather of Mrs. William T. Barbour. Mrs. Rumney remembers nothing of course, of her father's service but two swords he wore were in the family for years. One is now in the Detroit Historical Museum and the other is being marked for a young man relative.

THE BRUSH FAMILY As a child, Mrs. Rumney had no greater joy than visits to the Brush home (also on Macomb), and being permitted to peek inside the boxes of wonderful ribbons and materials brought from abroad by Miss Lily Brush, a great beauty of her day who died while she was still a very young woman.

So many Detroit streets are named for members of the Brush family who owned immense tracts of land. You'll recognize Brush street, Adelaide, Elliot, Elizabeth, Frederick, Rowena, Alfred. Mrs. Frederick C. Ford is a descendant of this family.

Mrs. Rumney was christened in the year 1860 in the little wooden church which was replaced by old Christ Church on East Jefferson avenue. In the Pittman family, there were five other children: Lansing Mizerer Pittman, Samuel Kemp Pittman, Mrs. Granger Whitney who had a twin sister (she was 12 years old) and Mrs. George Sargent. Of the family, Mrs. Whitney, Mrs. Sargent and Mrs. Rumney remain.

MOVE TO THE POINTE The Rumneys lived on Joseph Campau when they first came back to Detroit, in a terrace next door to the Walter Russells. It was there that both their children were born: the late Mason P. Rumney and Mrs. Richard H. Doughty of Washington road.
