**St. Paul School Bids Solicited**

Drawings and specifications of the new St. Paul's School, which is to be built in St. Paul's Parish in Grosse Pointe, now are available to prospective bidders, according to George H. Zimmerman, chairman of the building committee.

Plans for the building work on the two-story school now are being issued by the architects, Leinweber, Yamasaki & Hellmuth, at their office, 948 Penobscot bldg.

Drawings and specifications for plumbing, heating, ventilation, and electrical work will be issued to contractors and sub-contractors starting Monday, August 28th.

Deadline for all bids is 1 p.m. September 12.

Bids then will be reviewed and, if satisfactory, work on the school will begin soon, Mr. Zimmerman said.

The new school, to be built with contributions collected during a 10-month fund-raising drive, will be added to the present church school in order to accommodate all the children in the parish and to offer them the most modern educational facilities.

**A. M. Flora, 80, Killed by Car**

As A. M. Flora, aged 80, of 1255 Wayburn, was crossing Kercheval from the south side to the north side 41 feet west of Wayburn at 3:19 p.m. on August 26, he was struck by a car driven by Charles Hoffman of 3354 29th street, Detroit, driving west on Kercheval.

Mr. Flora was taken to Bon Secours Hospital by Park Police Officers P. Conlon and Crandall. It was later discovered that the accident had happened about 20 feet inside the Detroit city line

and the Detroit 5th precinct was notified. Mr. Flora suffered a fractured skull and the hospital authorities stated on Monday afternoon he was in a very critical condition and has not regained consciousness since being brought into the hospital. He died Tuesday.

### Honor for Philatelist

Sinnock also designed the Purple Heart considered by many as the most beautiful of all military awards. Best, who resides at 1215 Nottingham road, is one of the nation's most prominent philatelists, and a leader in junior collecting activities. He is the winner of the Lagerloef Award, one of the highest honors given in philately. The National Philatelic Museum, the scene of the 56th annual convention of the Society of Philatelic Americans, of which Best is national president, is part of Temple University, of which Best is a trustee.

### Youth Has Narrow Escape In Tumble Off Side of Car

Because he made the mistake of trying to hang onto a car which had no running board, while trying to reach in and shut off the ignition, young James Britz of 1385 Lakepointe, suffered a badly bruised and brush burned leg.

On investigation by the police, who had been informed by phone by Commissioner Bloodworth of the Park that he had seen a man either thrown out or fall out of a car at Jefferson and Berkshire at 12:25 a.m. on August 27, they learned the following:

Five high school boys had stopped their car at the Sunoco gas station at Beaconsfield and Jefferson to get air in their tires. While there another car drove up with a boy and girl in it. Thinking they recognized the boy as one who had called vile names at the girl of one of the five, Britz stepped over to the car and asked the boy's name. He told it and immediately began to drive away, having got his supply of gas. Britz tried to shut off the ignition on the other car but finding no running board on which to stand tried to keep

his hold by locking his arm about the open window.

In a moment or two the other car was speeding 30 m.p.h. out of Jefferson with Britz desperately hanging on between wind and pavement. He got as far as Berkshire when he fell off. This was the supposed eviction which Commissioner Bloodworth saw.

The police say the incident was only a squabble between rival gangs of high school boys and as one of the gang of five which started the trouble, Britz appeared to have received punishment enough, so they intended to do nothing further about it.

### Park Baby Found Dead in His Crib

When Dr. and Mrs. Alex J. Szmigiel of 851 Bedford road returned to their home shortly after 1 a.m. on Wednesday, August 23, they went upstairs to the room where their 1½ year old son John had been sleeping alone. The child was entirely covered with the bed clothing and as they pulled it away they saw he was black and apparently not breathing.

They called a nearby doctor and also the police to come with an inhalator. The police worked over the child for some minutes without apparent results and the visiting doctor said he was dead.

The coroner's office was notified and Dr. A. E. Harris, one of the regular county coroners came out in person. His immediate verdict was that the child had died of suffocation, pending a detailed verdict later.

The maid in the house said she

had gone to bed sometime earlier in the evening and the baby and

the other children were asleep when she retired.

There had been no evidence of sickness among any of the children when she retired.

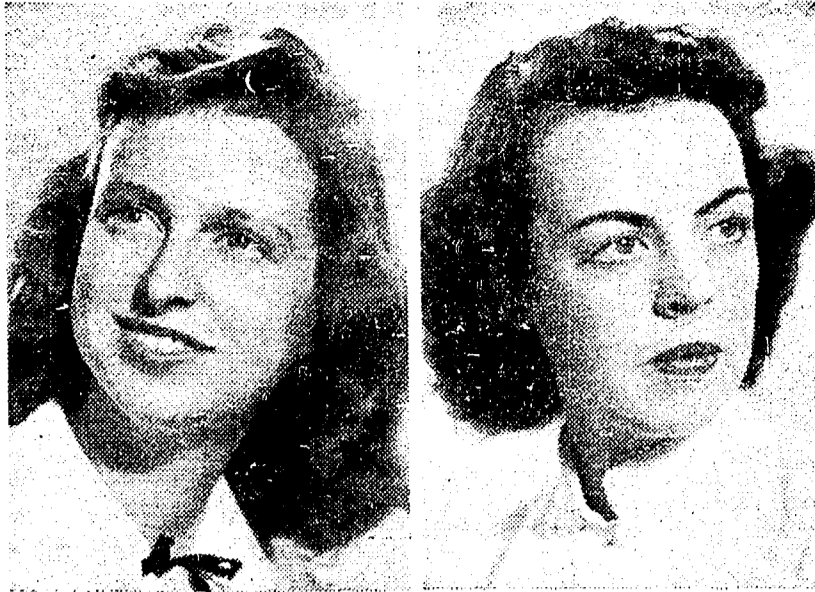

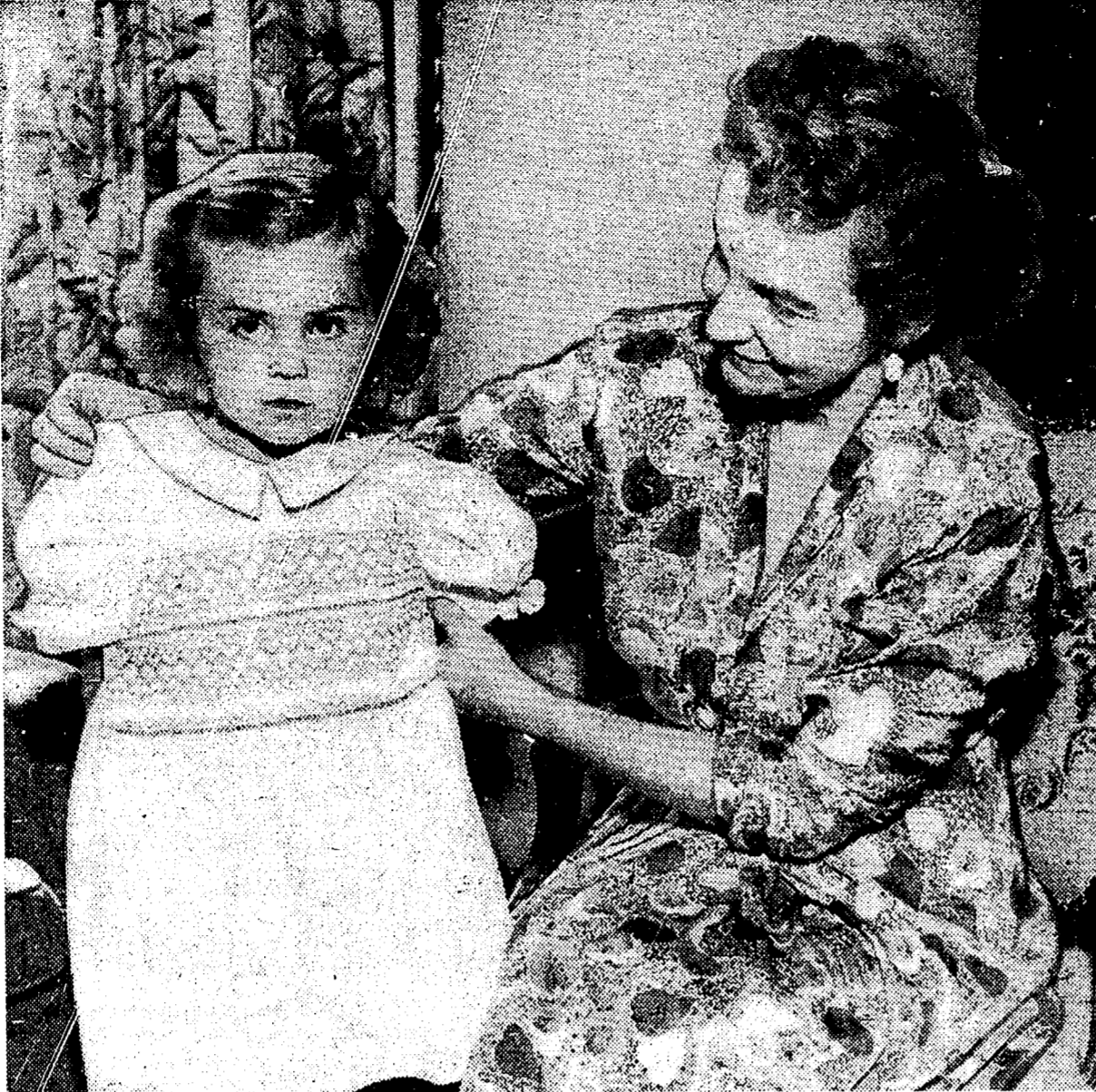
