were resurfaced with asphaltic concrete.

Approximately 1,600 feet of cement curb was also replaced.

#### New Lights Installed

Twenty new standards, all concrete bases, and cable for a new lighting system on Mack from Cadieux to Wayburn, have been installed.

A four-foot chain link fence was installed along the frontage of Three Mile drive property owned by the Park, and a six-foot chain link fence was placed across the foot of Grand Marais to prevent parking and trespassing.

property in the rear of Kercheval on the north side between St. Clair and Notre Dame and it is the plan to develop this for off street parking as quickly as possible. Mr. Ferry has been very generous in permitting the use of this property for offstreet parking for several years past, but did not feel it incumbent on himself to also place the property in first rate parking condition.

With the City's purchase of the property this will be done as the No. 1 project on the parking program.

#### No Bond Issue

It is not the intention of the City to issue bonds for any of this parking program, but to proceed with it out of general revenue.

Councilman John L. Kenower, who is the chairman of this whole parking and traffic problem, is particularly concerned with the furnishing of parking facilities for the large number of employees and owners who do business in the commercial area. He stresses the fact that it is as important to provide for the needs of this element as for the residents who shop in the area.

A recent survey made of this angle of the problem by City Clerk Norbert Neff shows there are 182 persons so employed in the commercial area who drive every day to and from their work. This element will require about 30 per cent of all available space.

The Gunderson report has divided the district into six areas or parking zones, many of them calling for widely different treatment. Three of these areas have a surplus of available parking area and three of them have a dearth of such space. These conditions, however, do not cancel each other, and throughout the entire area there is urgent need for at least 100 more parking places.

The Council recognizes that it will probably be necessary for the City to acquire more property for parking space, but fortunately there is considerable space within usable distance from Kercheval avenue and there is no likelihood of the city being held up by the owners of such property.

### Pointers' Work In Art Exhibit

The work of three Pointers is included in the annual Michigan Artists Exhibition which opened in the Detroit Institute of Arts on November 14. It will continue through December 17.

Picked by the jury to be shown were a sculptured torso and two oil paintings by A. W. Massnick, Jr. of 1217 Bishop road, a drawing by Eleanor S. Smart of 935 Westchester road, and an oil painting by Edna Burian Skelton of 273 Ridge road.

In this year's show, the 41st annual one, 223 paintings and 31 sculptures are being shown. They were selected by the jury from 1700 entries submitted.

Painter Robert Tannahill, Detroit Arts Commissioner, was a member of the jury with John I. H. Baur, curator of painting and sculpture of the Brooklyn Museum.

Among the award winners were Mrs. Owen Skelton and her daughter Edna Burian Skelton, both of 273 Ridge.

Mrs. Skelton received a \$200 cash award. Her daughter was the recipient of the American Association of University Women's prize of \$50.

Lou R. Maxon, former Grosse Pointe, also received a \$200 cash award.

Grosse Pointe Park Police said that Herbert Towel, 48, of 17840 E. Jefferson, a passenger in a car driven by Dodge, suffered back injuries.

Police said that Dodge and the driver of the second car, Vernon R. Nance, 29, of 1297 Lillibridge, were issued tickets for entering an intersection without due care and ordered to appear in court on December 6.

According to police, Nance was going south on Pemberton when he collided with Dodge's car which was moving west on Korte.

Dodge gave his age as 50 and his address as 17840 E. Jefferson.

Nance is employed on the assembly line at Briggs Manufacturing, Meldrum plant.

### Rotarians Set For Annual Party

The Grosse Pointe Rotary Club completed plans Monday for its annual benefit party at the Neighborhood Club on Monday, November 20.

Funds raised will go into the Club's Goodwill Fund to provide a year-around program of public service.

### Local OCD Able to Report Progress on Its Program

The local OCD has been going ahead in the weighing of its purely local problems and the best way of meeting them if disaster should strike the Pointe community. Directions and suggestions have been lacking and apparently are stymied for the time being as a result of the state elections.

Some information is coming through from Washington. The results of the Bikini tests are being forwarded to OCD officials throughout the country with greater freedom than prevailed up until recently.

Hiroshima Lesson  
One piece of information, stemming back to Hiroshima, is the statement that that experience demonstrated that the greatest danger from an atomic explosion occurs above the ground. With human lives this would be expected, but it was news from the Hiroshima explosion that the damage to water and gas mains was not too serious when these conductors were laid as little as three and one half to four feet below ground.

The local emergency repair crews have been set up in each of the Pointes, for the maintenance of the water service if disaster strikes. These men have been carefully selected. Each one has been fingerprinted and is thoroughly vouched for. While these crews were picked out for each community, they will be trained to work together as a unit for service in any one of the places where trouble occurs.

Inventories are being taken of the piping and all other supplies which might be needed, with the aid of a master plan of the entire Pointe area showing where these reserve supplies are located, so that in the event of any crew being obliterated the crews from the adjoining communities could go in and get to work immediately.

In this connection the local OCD has called on the Park and City to install cross connections in their water service so that if disaster should cut off one source the other source could be cut in immediately. The Farms, Woods and Shores are already equipped with such auxiliary service.

Murray Smith, Engineer of the Farms, is in charge of the water main repair work in the local OCD. George Elworthy is general chairman of the Grosse Pointe OCD with headquarters in the Neighborhood Club where a central operating office has already been installed.

Repairs to lights and phone lines would of necessity have to be left to the public service companies maintaining them. Up to date much progress has been made in setting up the machinery to meet an emergency. Collection depots have been designated for the transferring of killed or injured persons, doctors have been enrolled under the direction of the County Medical Society, and caches of emergency medical supplies designated. One matter on which the local OCD asks the people to be reminded is that if a disaster should strike, the householders, wherever able, should first cut off the gas supply to the house. This would go far to minimize the danger of a general conflagration.

### Board of Appeals Hears Requests

The Park Council following the regular meeting late Monday afternoon, Nov. 13, sat as a Board of Appeal on two cases where requests for permits had already been denied by the Building Department.

The Whyte Chevrolet Company wanted permission to erect a large Post Sign in front of their new property now in course of construction on Jefferson immediately east of the Park Municipal Building. The Building Department had denied the permit on the grounds it transgressed on the ten foot setback recently established for that area on Jefferson avenue.

The other appeal came from the McLean Motor Service making ready to erect a plant on Mack avenue between Lakepointe and Beaconsfield. The Building Department had denied this permit as insufficient offstreet parking space had been provided. Both appeals were set aside for further consideration.

### Missing Wheel Fires Gas Tank

Sparks caused by a missing rear wheel ignited the gas tank of a car driven by Harry H. Wybo, 26, of 22085 Rausch, Centerline as he was driving on Vernier near Mack Thursday morning, November 9.

Damage, estimated at \$100, was confined to the rear of the car by Grosse Pointe Woods firemen.

### Speeding Youths Have Close Call

Two Grosse Pointe youths and their girl friends narrowly escaped serious injury when the car in which they were riding at a high rate of speed skidded 109 feet and crashed into a utility pole at Mack near Lochmoor blvd. Saturday afternoon, November 11.

Grosse Pointe Woods Police said that the driver of the car was Michael J. Bundy, Jr., 23, of 1383 Fleetwood.

He told police that he was traveling on Mack about 40 miles an hour when he swerved off the road to avoid hitting a car in front of him that had stopped for the traffic light at Lochmoor blvd.

In the car with Bundy were Harold Wedyke, of 1592 Brys Drive; Silvia Epataino, of 5706 St. Clair and Wilma Riggs, of 7282 Abington.

Miss Riggs was treated at the Grosse Pointe Woods Medical Center for shock and bruises on the face, legs and arms.

The car, which was badly damaged, is owned by Harold's father, Joseph C. Wedyke, of the Brys address.

### Suggests Ambulance Service Operated by Municipality

At the Park Council meeting on November 13 Commissioner Burgess suggested that the City should look into the advisability of setting up a municipally operated ambulance service.

He said such a service had been proposed by some citizens on the ground that facilities should always be available to transport Park residents to and from hospitals independent of the hospitals' own facilities.

All police patrol cars are now equipped with ambulance facilities but these are intended for emergency use as arising in the police department and are not in the category suggested in Mr. Burgess' proposal.

Mr. Burgess said he had advanced the suggestion only for further examination and was not himself sold completely on the proposition. Several of the Councilmen questioned whether this kind of service was a proper municipal function. It was not proposed to be a free service.

The citizens would pay for it, but it would be a standby facility ready for instant use in an emergency or sickness. It was decided the matter should be further investigated and Mr. Burgess will bring in a report at the November 27 meeting.

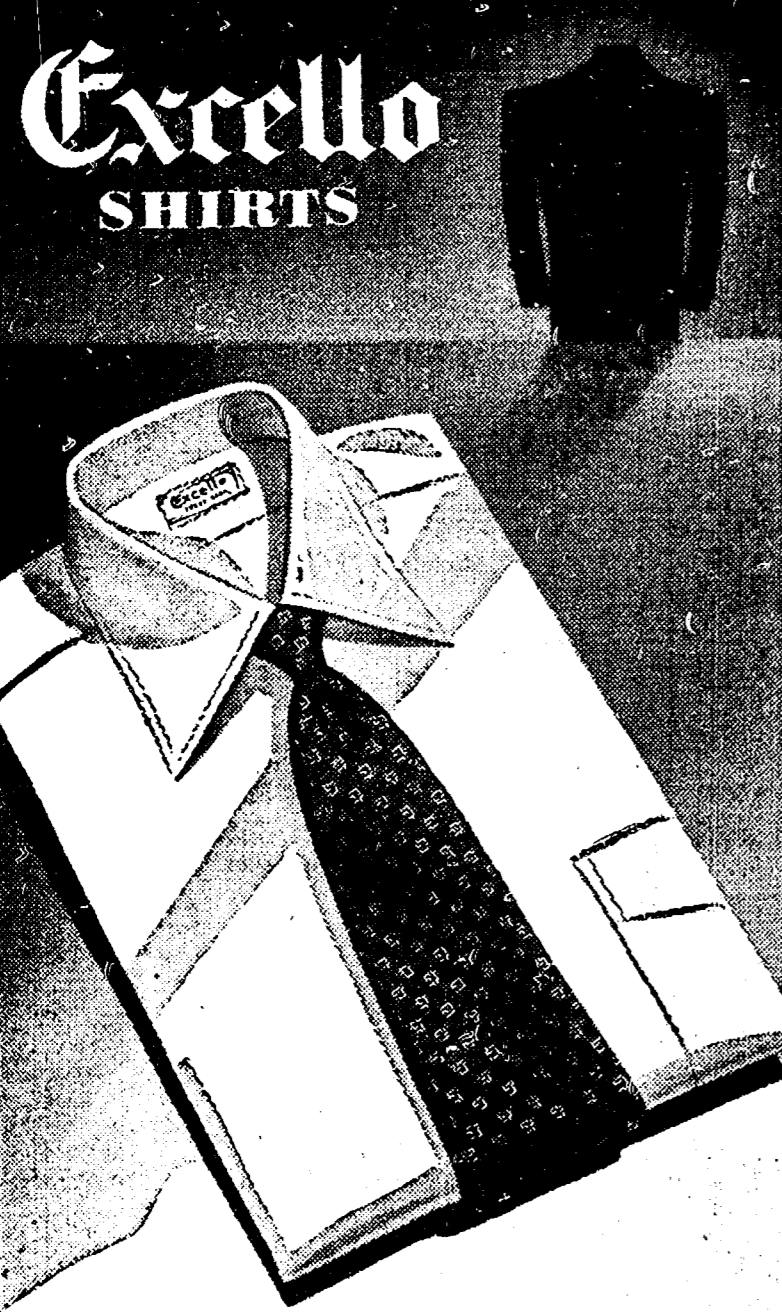

After the beachhead at Inchon was secured by Marine Corps units, the Toledo remained in the area to supply long range support to groups pushing inland.

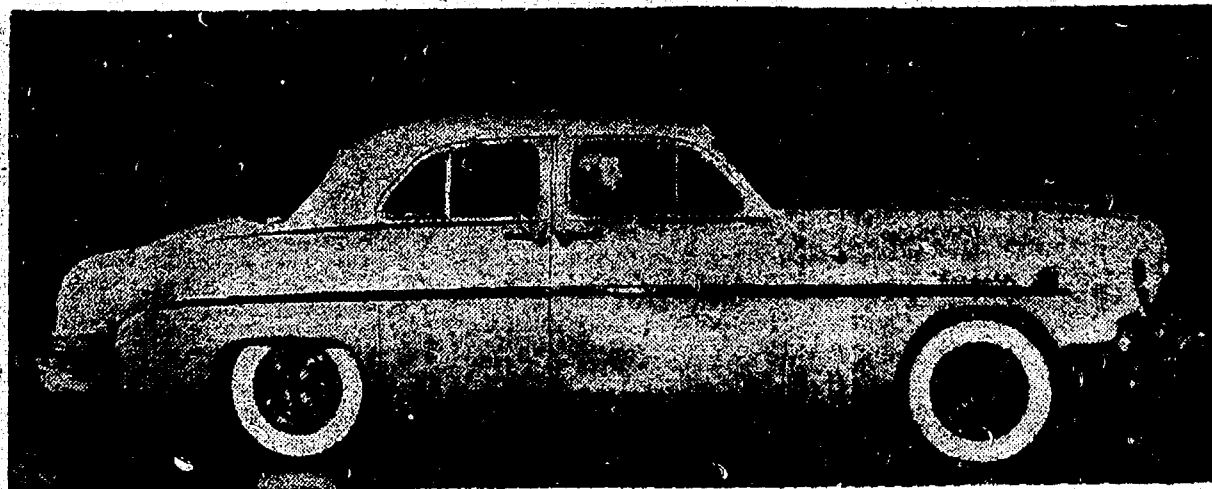

The Tylers were married in 1941. He is a district plant manager of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co.

The funeral services for Mrs. Tyler were held Wednesday at St. Clare of Montefalco Church. Burial was in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

## TURKEY \* KING OF THE FEASTS

By Marie Gifford



Turkey is the nation's number one meat for holiday feasts. Smart homemakers will select a Table Dressed Quick Frozen Bird to grace the Thanksgiving table for it comes all ready for the oven—drawn, cleaned, and wrapped in moisture proof paper with cooking directions included.

Planned around the kingly bird, here's a menu which will let you have as much fun as your guests. In the living room serve cranberry juice cocktails with cheese straws. The trimmings for the roast turkey could be a sausage dressing could be parsley rice potatoes, giblet gravy, baked tomatoes with corn stuffing, relish, hot rolls, pumpkin pecan pie, coffee and mints.

Here's our favorite stuffing recipe for the holiday bird.

### SAUSAGE STUFFING

- 1 pound Pork Sausage
- 3 quarts toasted bread cubes
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1-1/2 cups hot water

Break sausage into small pieces, brown slowly over low heat until crisp. Pour sausage and all drippings over bread cubes, salt, celery, onion, parsley, and seasoning. Mix thoroughly. Add hot water to moisten. Sufficient stuffing for a 10-16 pound turkey.

Before stuffing, rub 1/2 teaspoon of salt per pound on inside of neck and body cavity. When bird is stuffed, estimate the weight of bird by adding 25 percent to the dressed weight so that total cooking time may be determined. Lay, breast side down, in a shallow baking pan, in a V-shaped rack. Bake uncovered at 325° F. half the estimated baking time, then breast up until the cooking is completed. Brush the skin lightly with unsalted fat such as lard, to prevent blistering. If desired, cover with a cheesecloth, lightly moistened with fat, to prevent drying out. Remove the cloth during the last half of the roasting period if the bird is not evenly browned. Roast a 10-16 pound bird 18-20 minutes per pound.

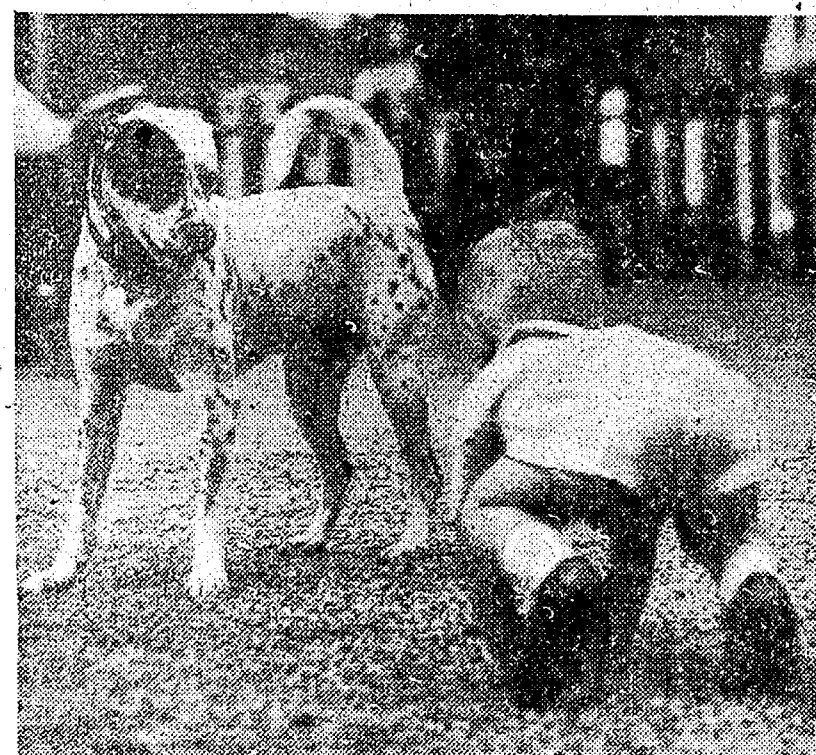

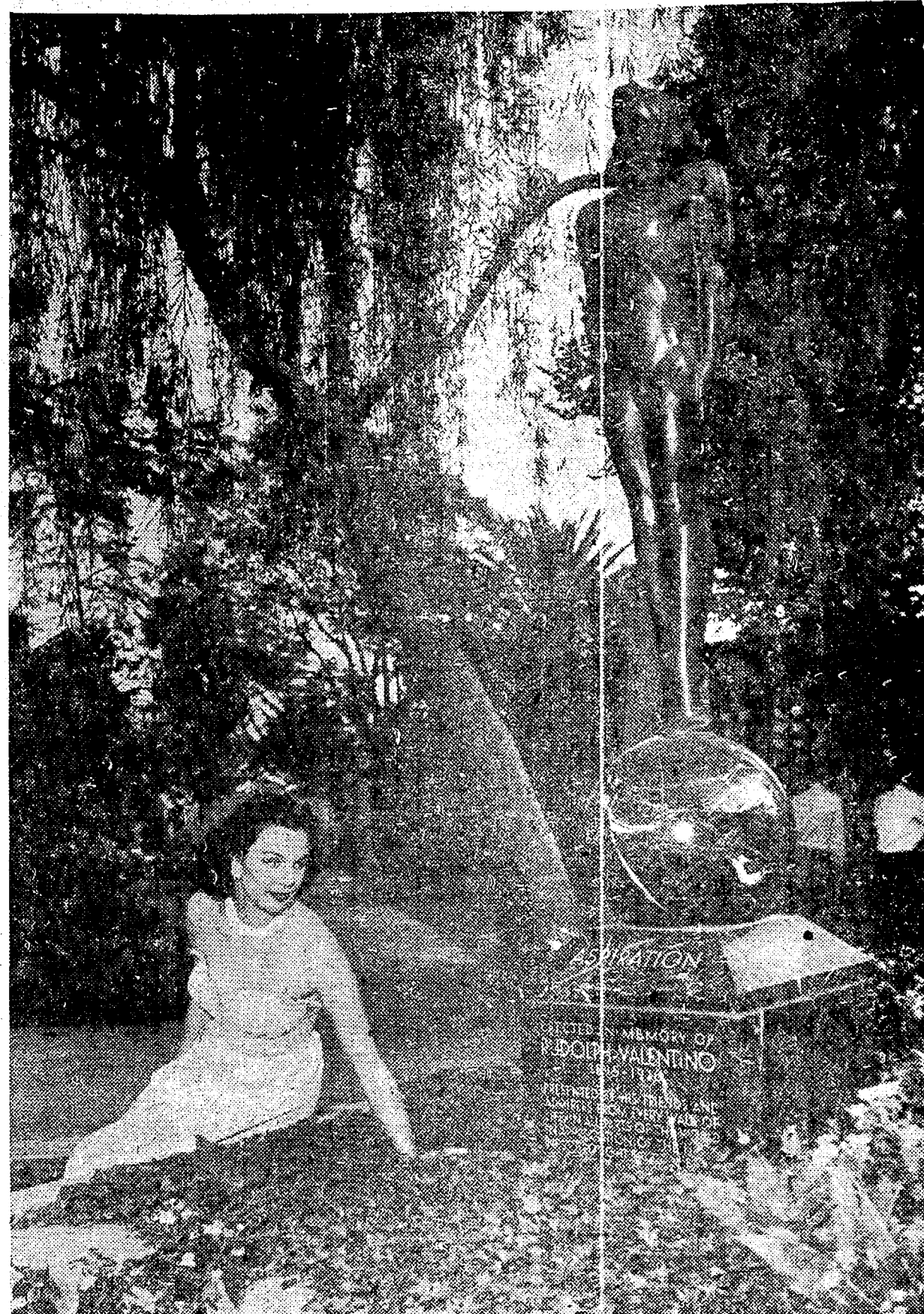

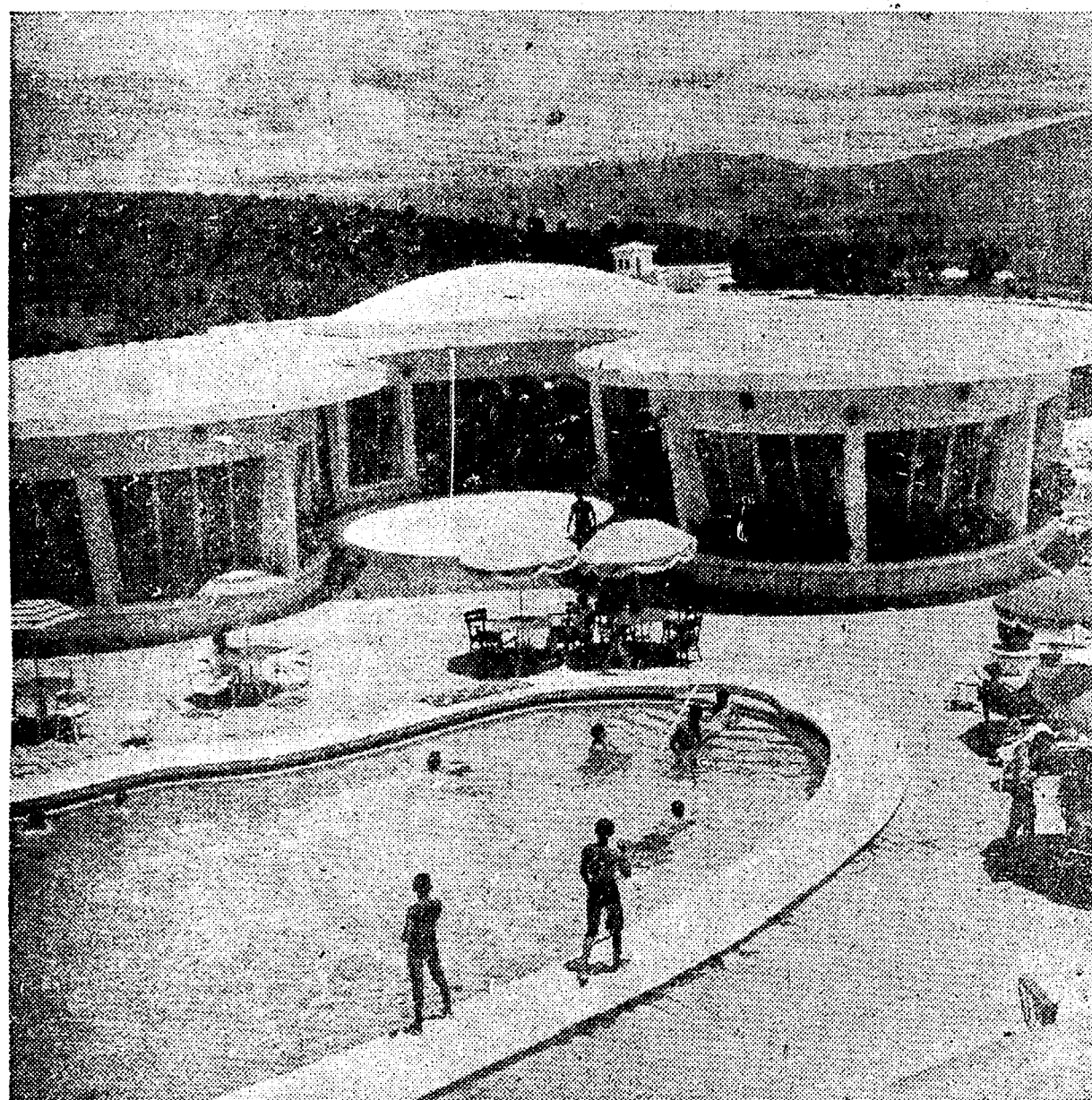

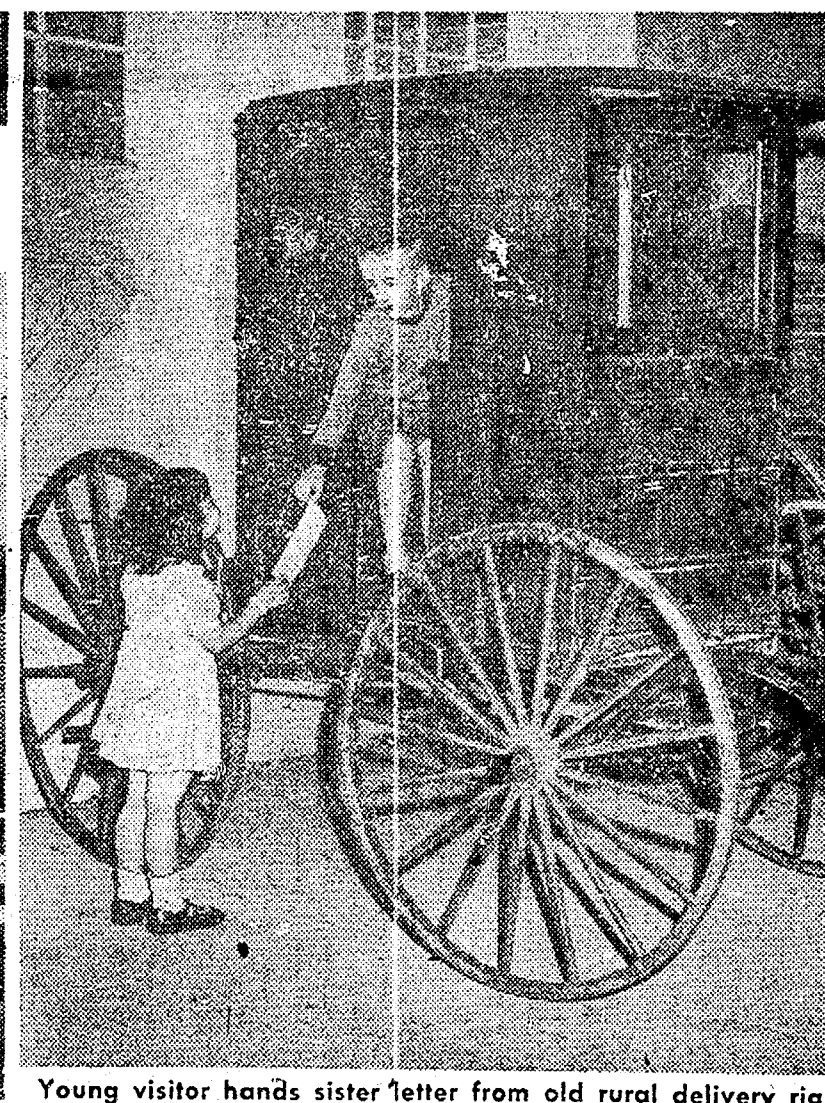
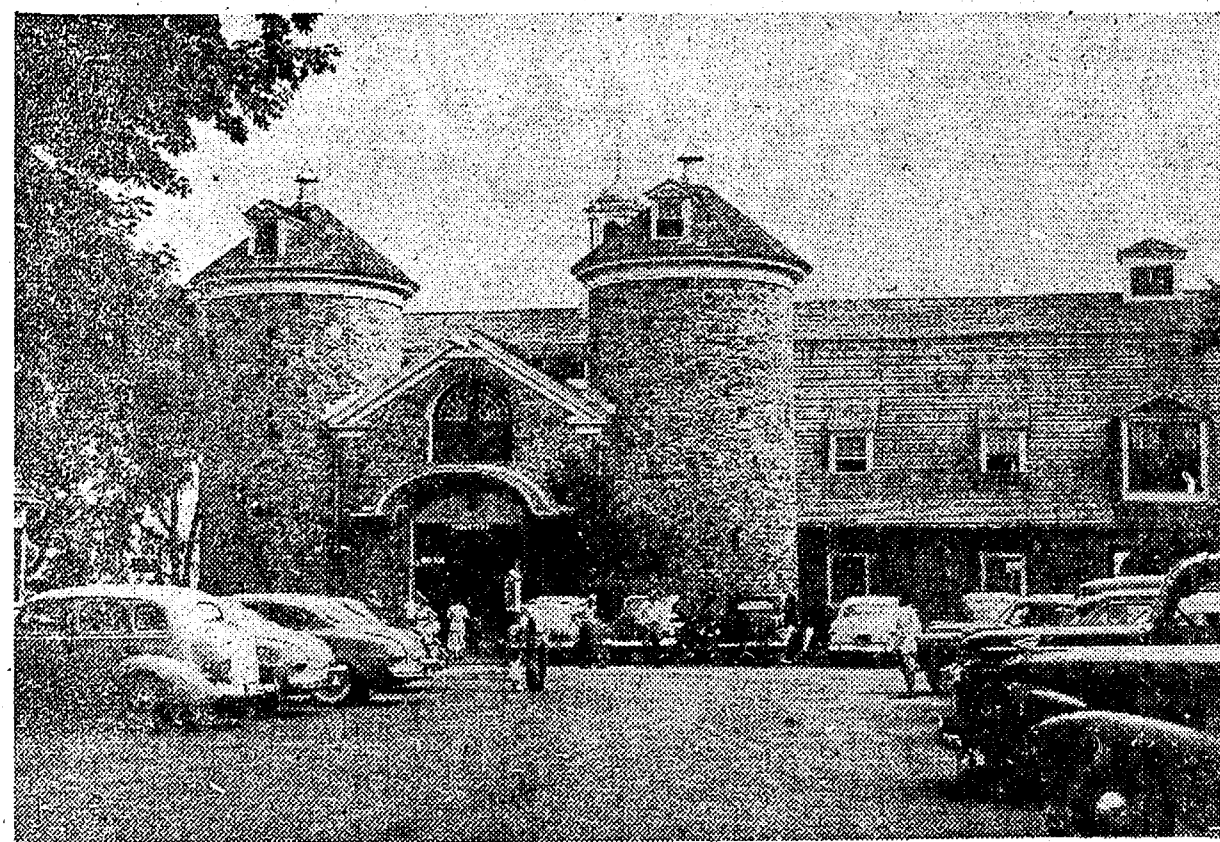

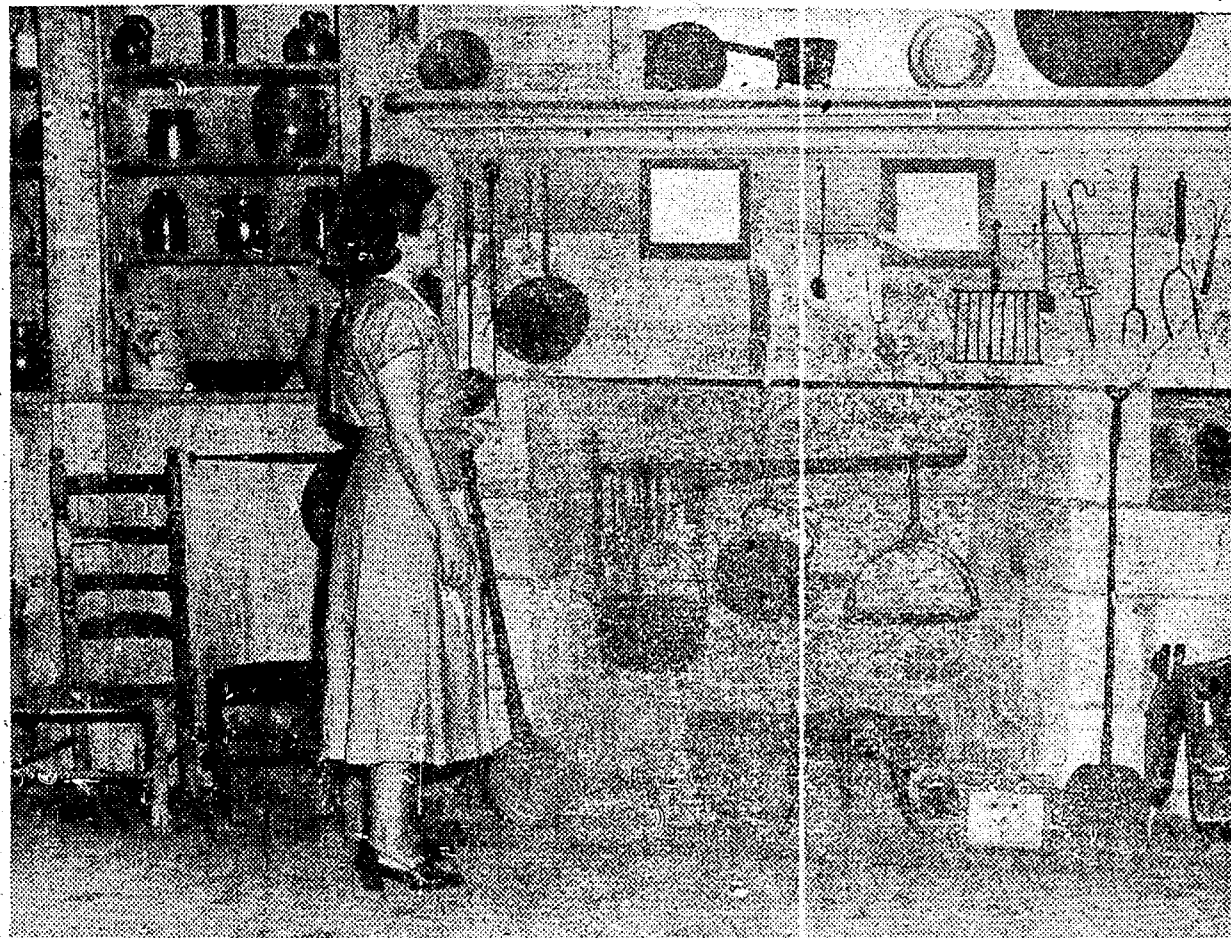

### 56,658 X-Rayed At State's Fairs

One out of every 100 people who had their chests x-rayed at Michigan's 1950 fairs has suspected tuberculosis.

Mobile tuberculosis case-finding units of the Michigan Department of Health, operating at 31 fairs and festivals this summer and fall, x-rayed the chests of 56,658 persons and found 1,087 chest abnormalities, including 519 cases of suspected tuberculosis which otherwise might have gone undetected.

Where the small x-ray film indicated a chest abnormality, the individual was advised by mail to see his physician for a complete examination and, if needed, treatment. Early diagnosis and treatment remain Michigan's major weapons against tuberculosis.

About half of the abnormalities found on the x-rays were due to conditions other than tuberculosis . . . heart disease, pneumonia, silicosis (an illness due to inhaling dust containing silica) and tumors or cancers. Many of these also respond to early treatment.

**THE LOCAL WEATHER** Bureau predicts the coldest weather of the year thus far for today . . . thermometer expected to touch 25 degrees before night-fall.

**STUART WHITE**, Republican member of the State Public Service Commission, is killed when his car skids and strikes a tree on M-80 three miles east of Union City . . . was riding alone and on his way home to Niles from Lansing where he had attended a meeting of the Commission.

**A RECOUNT** in the senatorial race in Connecticut will be held where William Benton, D., incumbent, and Prescott Bush, R., have been running neck and neck for the short term.

**SENATOR TAFT** of Ohio, backed by the prestige of an overwhelming vote in his reelection, says he will not conduct a campaign for the Republican presidential nomination but says

he would not decline a nomination if it came to him . . . Dewey's reelection in New York also marks him as a probable contender; barring the serious appearance of Eisenhower.

**Sunday, Nov. 12**

**WAYNE COUNTY** vote canvassers set aside all other work to clear up the election confusion and try to learn who was elected Governor . . . Kelly's margin in the State now 314.

**PEACE TALKS** on settlement of telephone strike have bogged down both in Detroit and New York . . . reported that charges of unfair labor practices will be filed on Monday by the Union against the Michigan Bell Telephone company with the National Labor Relations Board . . . meanwhile Michigan Bell fired 17 switchmen as the nationwide hit-run strike winds up its third day yesterday.

**WINTER IS HERE** in earnest . . . ice coated state roads take a toll of six deaths . . . 18 inches of snow cover the Lake Michigan shore from Traverse City to Petoskey . . . thermometer ex-

pected to touch 20 degrees in Detroit today.

**A PROMINENT WOMAN** doctor in Santa Fe, N.M., who had kidnapped a nine year old girl and held her for \$20,000 ransom has been captured by FBI men and local police . . . was dressed as a man . . . the child was recovered . . . kidnapping is a capital crime in New Mexico . . . the guilty person, Dr. Nancy D. Campbell.

**THE CHINESE COMMUNISTS** have notified the Security Council they are sending a nine man delegation to argue their charges that the United States is an aggressor in Korea but will refuse to talk about the American charges that the Chinese communists have intervened in the North Korean fighting . . . U.S. will fight the seating of the Chinese Reds in the United Nations.

**TENSION TIGHTENING** along the Adriatic . . . Yugoslavia closes the Albanian legation in Belgrade.

**Monday, Nov. 13**

**THE ENTIRE** Third Division of the U. S. Army has been landed in Korea . . . the division has a famous fighting record in two world wars.

**THE UNITED NATIONS** forces have now thrown a solid battle line across the narrowest

neck of the Korean peninsula and a violent attempt of the Communists to penetrate its center has been thrown back.

**ACTRESS JULIA MARLOWE** is dead at the age of 85 . . . was one of the most famous interpreters of Shakespeare for two generations . . . her portrayal of Juliet in Romeo and Juliet remains one of the happy memories of the theater-goers of that period . . . had been successively the wife of Robert Taber, whom she married in 1894, and E. H. Southern in 1911 . . . born in England.

**EFFORTS TO AVERT** a DSR strike were resumed at 4:30 p.m. today.

**PRESIDENT TRUMAN** has placed before the nation a program for extension of Marshall Plan aid to western Europe . . . regard this as our most critical area in a security sense.

**ELECTION INSPECTORS** from 38 Wayne County precincts will be called on the carpet today to explain glaring errors in ballot counting.

**MRS. ALLEN STAMM**, wife of the well-to-do architect-contractor, and mother of the little girl who was kidnapped in Santa Fe, is demanding the death penalty for Dr. Nancy D. Campbell, 53, which can be imposed under

New Mexico law . . . child was kept drugged and uncared for.

**Tuesday, Nov. 14**

**THE DSR** threatened strike will probably be settled . . . the AF of L Union and the Company reached an agreement on 7 1/2 cent hourly increase and liberalized sick leave benefits . . . settlement awaits only the approval of the 3,800 employees.

**A PLANE** with 51 passengers aboard, most of them Holy Year pilgrims, has crashed into a snow covered mountain in Southeastern France . . . hours after the crash no word received . . . rescue parties have to climb through rain and snow to reach the scene in the Alps.

**GOVERNOR WILLIAMS** now holds a lead over former Governor Kelly of 981 votes . . . a recount of the vote for Governor now looms as probable in the entire 4361 districts of the State.

**AN INCREASE** of one half cent per gallon on kerosene and fuel oil is probable in the Detroit area.

**DETROIT WELFARE COMMISSIONER** Frank R. Gerbig, the only one of the Board appointed by Mayor Cobo, reports to the Mayor that he has found files in district Welfare offices "in unworkable order" . . . confirms Tobin's report on general laxity throughout the department.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT** LOUIS C. MIRIAMI says "I am con-

vinced we have to speed the acquisition of voting machines faster and more efficient conduct of elections" . . . says he will support a definite program under which the City would purchase as many machines each year as can be reasonably put into operation without confusion.

**Wednesday, Nov. 15**

**OAKLAND COUNTY'S** election canvass increased Gov. Williams' lead to 1,406 votes as of late yesterday. Oakland canvassers found only minor errors in the actual vote count, but they turned up a single error of 500 votes in the unofficial total reported for Southfield Township.

**LATE YESTERDAY** a team of six Detroit holdup squad detective sergeants captured two of

the three super-market bandits who got at least \$22,700 in a series of robberies. Both gunmen have confessed and implicated the third man, who has been identified as the "bandit with the southern drawl."

**UNITED NATIONS** forces, hampered by a bitter cold wave from Siberia, and unprepared for it, advanced four miles in Northwest Korea where some 90,000 Chinese Red soldiers were entrenched.

**TIBET PLEAS** for United Nations help against the Chinese Communists went begging for a sponsor to raise the issue before the UN security council.

**THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT** announced that the army had re-

quested the drafting of 40,000 men during January. The request brings to 250,000 the total number of draftees asked by the army since the Korean war began.

**PRESIDENT TRUMAN** ordered the civil service commission to put nearly all federal job appointments on a temporary basis as a defense measure. The order, effective Dec. 1, carried three exceptions—presidential appointees—postmasters and "unusual circumstances" in which a permanent appointment would be "in the interest of the government."

**PROWLER CALL**

The police investigated a prowler call at 81 Cambridge on the night of November 11. They could find no intruders.
