Pointe Theatre to Present Show at Marine Hospital

On Friday evening, December 15, the Grosse Pointe Theatre will give a benefit performance for the patients at the Marine Hospital. The third act of "State of the Union," which the Theatre recently presented in its entirety at the High School Auditorium, will be performed.

A narrator will set the scene by relating the dramatic action of the first and second acts. For this performance Karl Dumas will take over the role of "Swanson" for Paul Slocomb, who is in New York.

Also on the Grosse Pointe Theatre agenda is the first of a series of round-table meetings, to be held at the Memorial Center on Tuesday, December 19, at 8:15 p.m. Wallace Swanson, who was previously president of the Actors' Guild of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and who played the important role of "Conover" in "State of the Union," is supervisor of these get-togethers.

The meetings, which aspire to be both recreational and instructional, will be built around theatre themes. The enactment of dramatic scenes from important plays, monologues from discussions, reviews of theatre books, improvisations, guest appearances by theatre personalities, discussions of acting and staging techniques, all are included in the programs as they are being set up by Mr. Swanson.

On Tuesday night the guest speaker will be John McCabe, who will speak on the Relation of Community Theatre to Theatre in General. Mr. McCabe, a professor in the Wayne Speech Department and a director in the

Warne University Theatre, is well known, too, for his other dramatic activities. A founder and director of a summer stock company at Milford, Pa., he has been a long-time member of the Catholic Theatre of Detroit, and will direct the group's next major production "The Rivals."

The public is cordially invited to attend the Grosse Pointe Theatre's December 19 meeting. There will be a small admittance charge, to help defray cost of hall and refreshments, for both members and guests.

Pedestrians Top Traffic Problem

Detroit Police and the Traffic Safety Association are co-operating in a program to keep the walking man alive.

Traffic safety officers in each of the Police Department's 15 precincts are visiting more than 500 churches throughout the city, urging pastors to give messages on the pedestrian problem—Detroit's Number One traffic accident problem. In the past, urgent announcements or short sermons have been delivered, or stories stressing the dangers of Detroit streets for the person afoot have been featured in church bulletins.

The Traffic Safety Association has prepared a leaflet outlining the provisions of Detroit's Pedestrian Protection Ordinance and urging people to look for approaching cars before crossing streets. More than 125,000 of the leaflets are being distributed in major office buildings, and churches and by direct mail from insurance agents and companies.

Nearly 1,400 posters, warning drivers to "Beware of the Careless Walker," and another 450 advising pedestrians that drivers cannot see as well at night, have been erected throughout Detroit by the TSA. Radio and television programs and spot announcements are highlighting facts about pedestrian accidents.

In addition, 1,300 streetcar and bus cards advise the person afoot that "You risk your life in crossing any street unless you look." "Too many pedestrians are killed or injured in traffic simply because they do not LOOK for cars," the car card warns. "Every month in Detroit, for example, nearly 90 pedestrians are killed or injured by walking into the side of moving vehicles."

Donald Siutz, TSA managing director, said the Association was trying to reach every pedestrian in Detroit to inform him of the critical accident problem. Twenty persons more have been killed so far this year than last, he said.

"Pedestrians are being struck down either through their own fault or because drivers are breaking the law or driving carelessly or absent-mindedly," he said. "Regardless of who is to blame, in each case a human being is dead and a driver is haunted for a lifetime by the memory of a tragic experience."

Thomas managed to get himself out, police said.

Hear Discussion On Elm Disease

Many Pointers were among those attending a meeting in the Rainbow Room at the Veterans Memorial Building in Detroit last night, December 6, to hear experts from the State Department of Agriculture discuss the Dutch Elm disease.

The Grosse Pointe Garden Council has undertaken a campaign for prevention of this disease in the Pointe area which has so many elm trees.

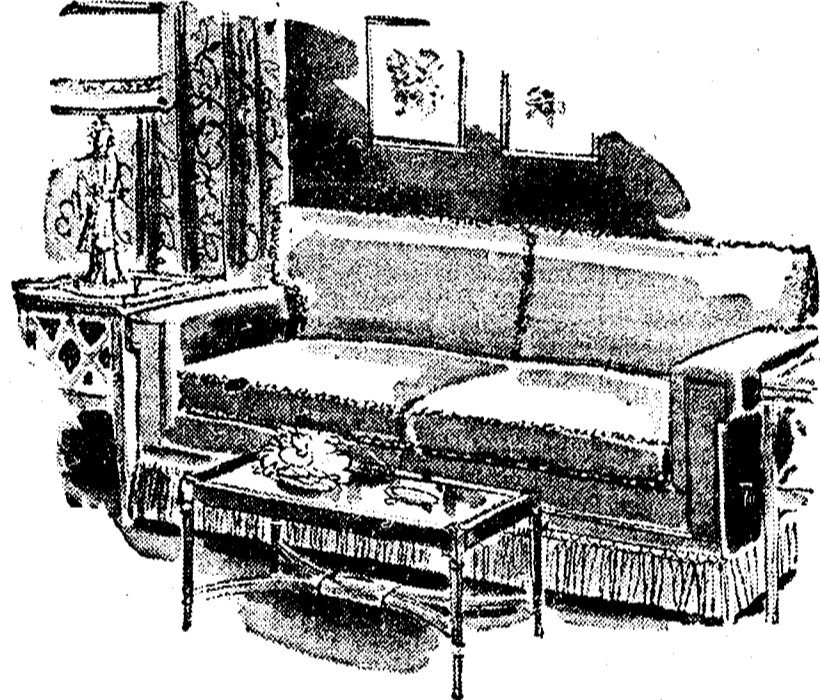

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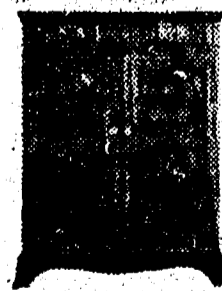

Scouts Ask Help In Paper Drive

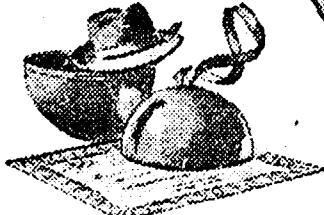

Park and Woods Residents Billed for Township Taxes

Treasurer Damman Says They Are Obligated to Pay For Fiscal Year Ending December 31; Rate is \$1.14 Higher This Year

Though residents of Grosse Pointe Park and Grosse Pointe Woods are no longer part of Grosse Pointe Township, they are still obliged to pay township taxes for the fiscal year ending Dec. 30, 1951, Adolph Damman, Township treasurer, announced.

Damman has mailed tax bills to Park, Woods and Grosse Pointe Shores residents.

Fixed at a rate of \$25.78 per \$1,000 valuation, an increase of \$1.14 over last year, the bills can be paid at the current Township office.

The total collection would amount to \$1,567,600, Damman said. Of this sum, Wayne County gets \$420,416, the Grosse Pointe School District receives \$1,117,786 and the Township gets \$29,397.

Damman said the appropriation for the Township represents its requirements for the budget year ending April 1, 1951.

Most of the Township portion is absorbed by salaries for the Township supervisor, treasurer, clerk and office help.

Damman will remain in office until his term expires April 1, 1951. His salary is close to \$5,000 a year.

The other members of the Township board with the exception of Victor DeBaeke, were forced to leave office due to a State law which demands that all officers of a township must reside within its limits.

House Wrecker Adjudged Insane

The Detroit woman who entered the Balfour road home of Dr. J. F. Wenzel last August during the family's absence, and slashed upholstered furniture and draperies, has been committed to an institution for the insane, it was learned last week.

Shortly before she did the malicious destruction in the Wenzel home, the tires on the cars of both Dr. and Mrs. Wenzel were slashed in their garage. The police stated they were sure the same woman was responsible for this.

She was found lurking in the bushes on the Wenzel property by Park Policemen Vervacke and Coils on the night of August 4. She denied having been in the house, but had in her possession a pair of scissors, a wire cutter and a pair of canvas gloves.

She told police at the time she hated the doctor because surgical work he had done for her did not turn out satisfactorily.

It has since been developed that the surgical work referred to was a figment of the deranged woman's imagination. Dr. Wenzel did not perform any surgical work for her.

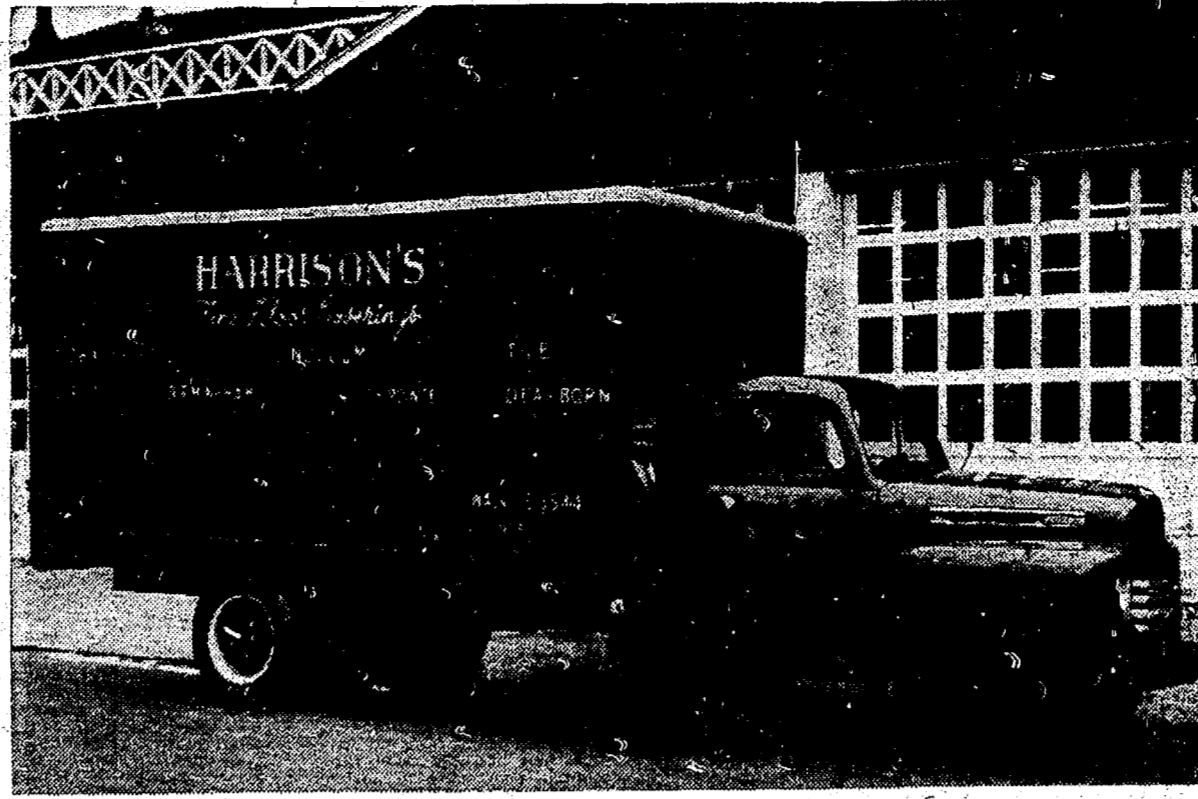
Rotarians Hear Yule Message

The public is cordially invited to attend this annual Christmas presentation.

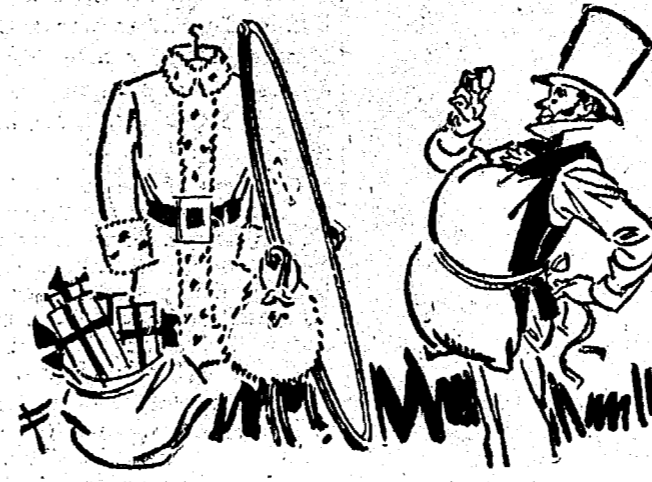

New Booklet Shows When Maid Comes Under Social Security Law

"Do you have a maid?"

Those who do have a maid or any other household worker will need a copy of a brief booklet bearing that question as a title. Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the East Side social security office, is distributing this booklet.

This colorful leaflet sets out, in a few sentences, just how the lady of the house, or any employer of domestic help in or around the home, may tell whether or not the worker is brought under the new social security law which becomes effective on January 1.

The work of those regularly employed in private homes will be credited to social security and the employer will be responsible for reporting wages, along with social security taxes, to the collector of internal revenue.

The title of the pamphlet does not stop with "Do You Have a Maid?" but continues "—or a laundress?—a cook?—chauffeur?—gardener?" Any of these, or any other persons employed regularly for work in or around a private household may come under the new law, and Pendergast urges their employers to request a free copy of the booklet.

A simple test in the booklet, in terms of amount of wages paid and regularity of employment, will tell whether a maid or cook or laundress will get the protection of social security — and whether the housewife should start making reports next year.

Copies of the booklet are available at all post offices, or may be secured at offices of the collector of internal revenue. "Here on the East Side," said Pendergast, "if you'll just call the social security office, WAU 1-8714, or drop us a post card, asking for the booklet, 'Do You Have a Maid?' we'll send it to you by return mail." Address of the office is Social Security Administration, 8720 Mack Avenue, Detroit 14, Michigan.

For the domestic worker's own information about her new social security protection, a special leaflet is available at the social security office. Pendergast pointed out that regularly employed domestic workers will need a social security account number card after January 1, 1951.

The "Do You Have a Maid?" booklet does not apply to domestic work on farms operated for profit. Such work is covered by other provisions in the new social security law.

The booklets are available at all Pointe municipal buildings, in the clerk's offices, at the Grosse Pointe Memorial Center and the Grosse Pointe Bank.

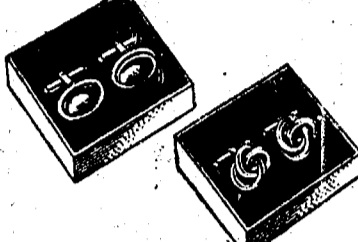

and Navy also leave matter in hands of local commanders.

ADVANCE RESCUE UNITS link up with 20,000 American troops trying to escape Communist encirclement in Korea. Position bettered, but danger is still great. Enemy appears to have moved between main portion of the trapped Americans and their vanguard which met the rescue task force. Gen. J. Lawton Collins, Army Chief of Staff, said Americans would take care of themselves without any further serious losses.

Sunday, December 10
VETERAN WAR REPORTER HAL BOYLE of Associated Press says war in Korea appears to have been militarily decided and Allies must leave Korea. Says UN has no force there or in prospect able to achieve a victory against a Chinese Red Army officially estimated at a million men.

AMERICAN FORCES begin to stream into Humnang this morning. By night most of them had found refuge after escaping traps of Communists and fighting way to American held city from which they could be evacuated by sea. Original force of 20,000 encircled U. S. troops, said to have suffered heavy casualties during continued battle for freedom. U. S. fleet said to be standing by ready to evacuate the entire 10th Corps, which numbered 80,000 men.

RED CHINA said to have promised India she will hold up her troops after they reach 38th parallel. India took lead in attempt to negotiate peaceful solution to Korean war. No one will enlarge on the statement coming from India.

SECRETARY OF DEFENSE GEORGE MARSHALL said President Truman is seriously considering the declaration of a "national emergency." Marshall says there has been no change in the situation since Acting Press Secretary Stephen Early remarked on the same possibility on Thursday.

THE MEXICAN TOURIST COMMISSION says a new road near Mexico City is being paved with silver and gold. Refuse from the San Pedro mines is being mixed with cement. Old refining methods left much of precious metals in the refuse.

GOVERNOR WILLIAMS' margin in recount jumps to 3,047 over former Governor Harry Kelly in recount. Republicans say they may call off the balance of the recount.

Monday, December 11
PRESIDENT TRUMAN has issued a call to leaders of both

parties inviting them to meet with him Wednesday in the White House to "discuss matters concerning the proclaiming of a national emergency and related matters."

RUSSIA SURPRISED the Western powers today by suddenly proposing a four power conference on the Austrian peace treaty after holding up negotiations for three years.

GENERAL MACARTHUR flew to Korea today for battlefront talks with his top commanders. Upon return to Japan he announced he found the UN troops "unbeaten, relatively secure and able to battle the Chinese hordes."

THE 20,000 MARINES and Army troops who fought their way out of the trap of 120,000 Chinese Reds and reached the beachhead, left 20,000 dead Chinese troops behind them.

Wednesday, December 13
FORMER GOV. HARRY F. KELLY will halt the recount today or Thursday and congratulate Gov. Williams on his reelection . . . no lawsuit will delay the inauguration on January 1.

TOKYO . . . Red China's invasion army, spearheaded by two Mongolian cavalry divisions, turned toward central Korea for an apparent drive to outflank the new United Nations' defense line guarding Seoul. . . The cavalry divisions were being supplied by camel caravan.

Tuesday, December 12
AT ST. PETERSBURG, FLA. A. B. (Happy) Chandler, high commissioner of baseball since 1945, will "retire" on the expiration date of his contract May 1, 1952. . . Majors voted 3-0 to shun to renew contract.

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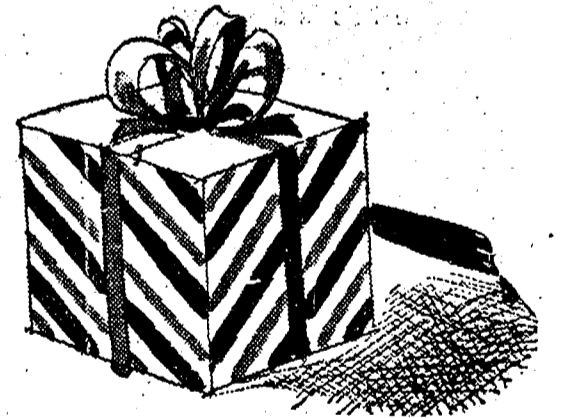

Railroads Urge Early Mailing

The Michigan railroads have joined in the plea to "Do Your Christmas Mailing Early."

"The Post Office department expects to handle six billion pieces of Christmas mail, thereby setting a record," the Michigan Railroads Association states, "and we in turn expect to handle eighteen-nineteenths of that mail. Customarily we do not see no reason why we won't again this year."

The increased transportation demands of the armed forces and the greater civilian requirements call for early mailing to accelerate movement of the expected record volume of Christmas mail, the association states.

In order to meet the record flood of Christmas mail, the association said, the railroads already are making preparations to press into service extra cars capable of carrying the mail and to use special mail trains later in the more densely populated areas.

The association adds that the railroads, year in and year out, transport nearly 99 per cent of the nation's mail of all kinds and that the movement requires almost 17,000 postal transportation clerks who travel a total of 898 million miles every 12 months.

Red Cross Calls For Blood Donors

Red Cross chapters in four counties of southeastern Michigan have joined the Detroit and Wayne County Red Cross in starting the greatest blood donor recruitment campaign since World War II.

The goal for December is 6,000 pints of whole blood, most of which will be flown to hospitals here and overseas, to help save the lives of men wounded in the Korean fighting, including many from this area.

John M. Sullivan, executive director of Detroit Chapter, regards this stepped-up program, requested by the Department of Defense, as the most important peace-time job the chapter has ever undertaken.

Blood donors will be needed in a constant stream, he said, to insure an adequate quantity of fresh whole blood for daily shipments. Donor hours at the Red Cross Regional Center, 153 E. Elizabeth, have been extended to take care of more people, and an extra mobile unit has been pressed into service to accommodate more donor groups in their own neighborhoods. Appointments for group donations may be made through local chapters or branches. The telephone number of the Center is WO. 1-3900.

All healthy persons between 21 and 60 years of age are eligible to donate blood, and young people 18 to 21 may give with their parents' written consent.

"It's a wonderful opportunity," said Sullivan, "for people of this area to include our fighting men, and that means a lot of our own home-town boys, in their Christmas giving. A gift of blood can be a gift of life to a wounded soldier."

No appointment is necessary at the Center, which is open from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday and 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday.

Grosse Pointe's Blue Devil basketball team blew a 12 point lead in the final quarter of its basketball game with Highland Park on the local court last Friday, December 8, and lost the opening league contest, 46 to 42, in the overtime period.

On two occasions the Devils had comfortable margins and each time they relaxed just enough to allow the scrappy, never-say-die, Polar Bears to knot the count.

Fouls Count Big
In the two minute overtime period the Parkers squeaked out a hard fought victory by capitalizing from the free throw line while holding the frantic Devils to one field goal.

The real break in the game came twenty seconds from the end of the final period when Fred Merty slipped and fell to the floor while the Devils were attempting to stall out the clock. Just as soon as Merty hit the floor there were two Polar Bears on top of him to force a jump ball. The Parker controlled the tip and George Duncan, a ninth grader playing his first game, drove in for a beautiful layup shot that knotted the count and forced the overtime.

Pogliano Stars
Ray Pogliano, the Polar Bear spark plug and the boy who caused the Devils much concern in the final game of the 1949-50 season, and the same George Duncan collaborated to give the Bears the cherished victory by connecting for six out of seven foul shots in the two minute overtime period.

It appeared the Devils became too confident and figured they had the game locked up with such a wide margin and the passing and dishing were abandoned with dire results. Defeat looked as if the Pointe boys were looking for individual scoring glory instead of keeping the best interest of the team in mind.

Should Be Helpful
This defeat should do the Blue Devils plenty of good if they can take advantage of their mistakes and remember team work is the only way a team can become a champion.

Your reporter mentioned after the record breaking Hazel Park contest a week ago that the Devils seemed to lack smooth passing and teamwork. Against the Polar Bears the Pointers had a good passing attack when they played together as a unit but the team fell apart like the famous

One Horse Shay when this was forgotten.

Guards Are Weak
Also we mentioned early in the season that the Devils were sadly lacking in strength at the guard positions. This game proved the fact. While Al Mann played a good floor game he didn't make a threat from out on the court with long shots. As a matter-of-fact the Devils took very few long shots during the night and at times even the guards were caught flat footed under the opponents' basket with the center and forwards.

Big Bruce Allan topped the individual scorers with 20 points on 9 field goals and two free throws. Ray Pogliano captured the runner-up honors with 19 points on 6 field goals and 7 free throws.

Fouls Tell Story
The big factor in the Parkers' victory can be seen reflected in the scoring of the two big guns. Allan collected 2 foul shots on 8 attempts and Pogliano got 7 out of 9 tries. That actually tells the story. Grosse Pointe had 23 free throw attempts and made good on only 8 while Highland Park had 21 chances and cashed in on 17.

Next Friday, December 15, the Pointers will entertain Royal Oak. The Acorns don't figure to be very strong this year but they will be stronger than a year ago when they went undefeated in all but one game and set an all-time league record of 33 straight defeats. However, word comes to me from Dave Perrin, a sports writer in Royal Oak, that the Acorns may spring a big surprise in the league this year.

Devils Are Target
The Devils must keep in mind that they are the defending champions and every team in the league is out gunning for them. Probably the best statement to sum up the Pointers' position in the league this year was made by a Highland Park player after the game. He said, "Boy, that's the way to start out the season. A victory over GROSSE POINTE."
