James Bushong Brings Distinguished Background to Superintendent's Office

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education has unanimously selected James W. Bushong as superintendent of schools. He will succeed John R. Barnes, who is retiring on account of

his health, on January 1. The new superintendent comes to the Pointe with a distinguished background. He has been superintendent of schools in Bend, Oregon, a position from which he resigned upon his appointment here. For the last year he has been on leave from his position in Bend to attend Harvard University as a Graduate Fellow in Education.

Wins High Honor

Mr. Bushong was one of but five prominent educators from all over the country who were selected for the graduate fellowship. There were more than 600 nominated for the five openings.

He will be able to spend most of his time in the Pointe and complete his requirements for his degree of Doctor of Education from Harvard at his own convenience. He will have completed all residence requirements by next June. He was a member of the Legislative Interim Committee to study post high school education in Oregon, in 1949 and 1950. He was president of the Bend Chamber of Commerce, resigning from that post last September. He was also president of the Superintendents' Organiza-

tion of Oregon. Endorsed by Remus Mr. Bushong was strongly recommended to the Pointe board by Paul Remus, principal of Grosse Pointe High School from 1937 to 1940, and now superintendent of schools in Portland, Oregon. Mr. Remus wanted very much to have him become associated with

the Portland school system. Mr. Bushong also had a distinguished war record. He served in the Navy in World War II, where he attained the rank of lieutenant commander. His last duty was aboard the USS Audubon, an attack transport of the amphibious service. He saw action on Okinawa and Iwo Jima among many other hot spots in the Pacific and also was on combat duty in the Atlantic.

ruary 4, 1951. Mr. J. H. Applegate, President of the Photographic Salon Society of Detroit, announced approximately 1,300 black and white prints and 1,500 color slides were

judged on December 16 and 17. The Detroit Salon Society has an extremely fair pattern for judging the prints and differs from any other form of salon

In Detroit, six judges are used. and for the most part, all prints are viewed by all the judges.

The six judges are split into two panels of three each and panel views half of the prints entered. Any print that recoives three votes the first time it is judged is automatically in

It is from this group the ten best prints are picked as Medal Award winners.

The prints that receive only one or two votes are stacked by each panel and judged, and then the panels swap these prints and judge them again. If a print receives two votes from the other panel it is included in the group to be hung in the show.

Wall space being at a premium only 225 photographs can be selected. If the judges find they have selected more than this number all the prints, except the ones that received three votes in the first round, are viewed again and the inferior ones rejected until the 225 figure is reached.

President Applegate stated that prints have already been received from India, Norway, Bermuda and Sweden to name a few, Also entry blanks were mailed into China but Mr. Applegate expressed concern about getting any prints from there because of the possible Red control in that country.

George L. Schlaepfer will be one of the color slide judges and Dr. C. J. Marinus will judge in the black and white division. Dr. Marinus is a nationally known photographic critic as well as the

Rabaut Praises Gray's Report

The report of former Secretary of the Army Gordon Gray to President Truman on Foreign Economic Policies of the United States has received the endorsement of Congressman Louis C.

President Truman requested that Mr. Gray undertake the work of this report on March 31, 1950. The report analyzes the problem of making "our foreign economic policies serve most effectively our total national and foreign policy requirements."

"In requesting this report and investigation", said Rabaut, "President Truman has beaten to the punch those who are only now demanding a reexamination of foreign aid policies. Mr. Gray's careful analysis has given special emphasis to changed conditions since the Korean situation developed and his findings deserve the careful examination of public and Congress alike."

Rabaut said, "Because of the accelerated pace of European rearmament we are faced with a weakening of the economic structure of Western Europe which Marshall plan aid is doing so much to rebuild. The Gray Report, therefore, recommends that we continue this aid, apart from military equipment, for three or four years beyond the present time.

"But in view of the requirements of our own rearmament program and the limits of our own resources, the report makes he realistic recommendation that the amount of non-military aid extended should depend on the rearmament effort actually undertaken by the individual countries and its total impact on their economics.

"To my mind this is a sensible approach to the problem of encouraging the large and rapid growth of military strength."

Rabaut noted that the Gray Report also recommended further implementation of the Point Four Program of aid to the underdeveloped areas of the world. The 81st Congress made some progress in this direction, he said, but we must continue to expand and encourage private investment through investment treaties and legislation to guarantee these foreign investments

against certain risks. Rabaut said that private investment is the most desirable form of aid since it will also bring the technical and administrative skill so badly needed in these areas.

Rabaut added, "I have always been a consistent supporter of the reduction of barriers to international trade and I heartily concur in Mr. Gray's recommendation that the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act be extended for a period of four years and that this country continue to work for the free flow goods through the elimination of discriminatory trade and exchange practices."
