time he was eleven he had completed eight pieces for the piano. When he was eleven he was granted an audience with the great Russian teacher, Joseph Lhevinne.

The summer John was fifteen, Isidore Philipp, formerly head of the School of Music at Fontainebleau and the Paris Conservatoire, chose John as one of only a few pupils to study with him.

Two years later John played Beethoven's Fourth Concerto with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. John served as a chaplain's assistant in the Navy during World War II, and was fortunate in being able to practice in his free time. Returning from the service he continued his studies under Egon Petri, commuting between Grosse Pointe and Ithaca, N. Y., every week for nearly a year. When Petri accepted a post in California, John followed. While he was there, he took up the study of composition under Darius Milhaud.

He was invited to play at the Carnegie Hall "Pop" Concerts and in the Hollywood Bowl in 1947. He served as pianist with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra under Dr. Karl Kreuger. After the demise of the Detroit Symphony he played several times with the Little Symphony.

During the last two years John has toured extensively giving concerts at many colleges and cities throughout the Middle West. He also played with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. After presenting his own concert at the Detroit Institute of Arts last spring, he left for Europe where he gave concerts in both London and Paris.

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association hopes to bring other nationally known artists to the music lovers of the Pointe and attempt to provide a music and cultural center for the entire community.

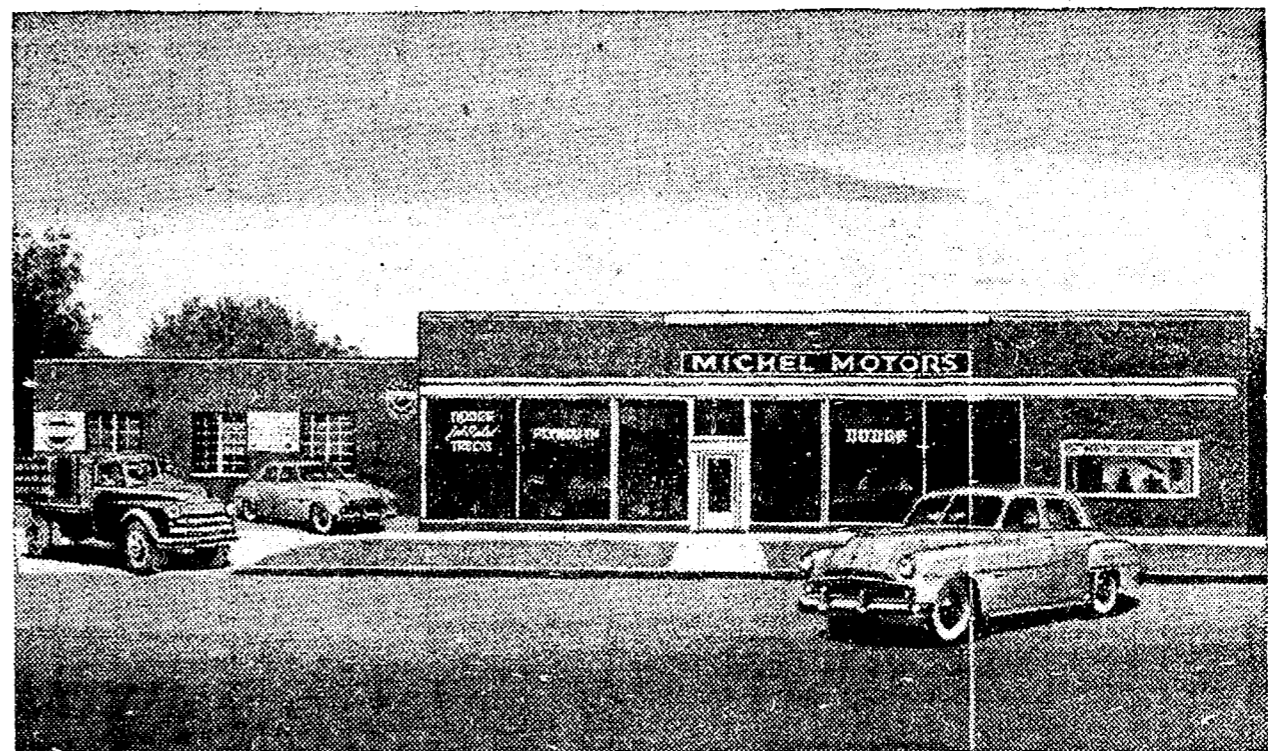
CDS Girls Win Awards For Art

Jeeves Promoted by Parke, Davis

Parke, Davis & Co. has announced the elevation of W. R. Jeeves to director of overseas operations.

Foreign sales manager since 1947, Jeeves will direct the company's vast activities abroad through branches in Havana, Mexico City, Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, London, Bombay and Sydney.

He will be responsible for the development of business in all countries outside the United States and Canada. In addition, he will direct the expansion of present manufacturing facilities and markets, establish licensing arrangements, and set up sources of supply for the various plants abroad.

Jeeves, just back from another world tour, has been with the company since 1927, when he joined the London branch as a sales representative.

He was transferred in 1929 to the Philippines, where he married the daughter of a U. S. Army officer. In 1941, he was brought to Detroit as assistant to the foreign sales manager. He served in that post until his promotion to foreign sales manager in 1947.

Born in 1900 at Cambridge, England, Jeeves was educated in Cambridge and London. He studied pharmacy in both London and Manila. He demonstrated pharmacy at Cambridge University and worked in a Cambridge retail drug store before joining Parke-Davis. He became an American citizen in 1942.

Discussing the world tour, which took him more than 25,000 miles by air in six weeks, Jeeves said:

"In practically every country abroad, American-made drugs are always preferred when they can be made available." Under the currency restrictions, the problem is how to make them available.

"The foreign exchange position is improving. With that should come better opportunities for business than those which existed before Korea."

The trip took him to Sydney, Singapore, India, Pakistan and Great Britain.

Jeeves, who spends two or three months abroad each year, lives in Grosse Pointe with his wife and two younger children, Judie, 15, and Jerome, 8. Their third child, Richard Jeeves, Jr., 18, is with the U. S. Air Force.

Jeeves' hobbies are fishing and the collection of antique pharmacy implements. He is a member of the Detroit Board of Commerce's world affairs committee, the Detroit Boat Club, the Masons and Christ Church, Grosse Pointe.

NAMED TO FOUNDATION

Wendell Anderson, a vestryman of Christ Church, Grosse Pointe, has been elected a director of the newly formed Episcopal Church Foundation. The foundation was organized to "assist the church in enlarging its operations and facilities beyond the range of the annual budget." Announcement of Anderson's appointment was made by the Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church.
