Decorated for Heroism Displayed Six Years Ago

In recognition of meritorious achievement as a pilot during World War II, 1ST LT. GILBERT E. C. VANDERMARLIERE, Flight C, 5th Rescue Squadron, Maxwell AF Base, Ala., was awarded the Air Medal. Presentation was made by COL. LESLIE G. MULZER, Maxwell commandant, in his office while Mrs. Vandermarriere looks on with pride.

The citation accompanying his award stated that Lt. Vandermarriere "distinguished himself by meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight in the European Theater of Operations from April 1, 1944 to April 24, 1944. The technical skill, exceptional courage, and selfless devotion to duty displayed by Lieutenant Vandermarriere, as pilot, contributed to the success of bombardment operations and flight credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

A native of Grosse Pointe, Lt. Vandermarriere first entered the service as an aviation cadet in April, 1942. He was commissioned a second lieutenant with rating of pilot in May, 1943, transferring to the European Theater of Operations the following October, where he was assigned to duty with the "Fitin' Bitin' 369th Squadron," 306th Bomb Group, as B-17 pilot.

Leading the top flight April 24, 1944, as pilot of a B-17 on a mission in which 150 aircraft participated, with a target an aircraft factory in Munich, Germany, Lt. Vandermarriere, who was on his third combat mission, was shot down as he ran into enemy resistance about 15 minutes out of Munich. Wounded in left arm and leg, Vandermarriere was picked up by German farmers and hidden for several hours in the hay in a barn. He was so severely wounded, however, that it became necessary to seek other aid, and he was turned over to the German authorities for treatment and became a prisoner of the Germans.

Released on April 29, 1945 by the 14th Armored Division, Vandermarriere made his way back behind the lines arriving for duty on May 1.

Returning to the "States," he was relieved from active duty and transferred to the USAF reserve the following December.

Lt. Vandermarriere was ordered to active duty and assigned to Maxwell on June 10, 1951. His decorations include the

Purple Heart, and the Presidential Unit Citation.

The son of Julius Vandermarriere of Detroit, Mich., and Mrs. Marcella Vandermarriere of Muir road, Grosse Pointe, he is married to the former Miss Louise Marsack of Grosse Pointe.

Selfridge Offers Scouts Training

A series of one-day training programs at Selfridge Air Force Base, near Mt. Clemens, has been arranged for Explorer Scouts of this area during July and August 5 and 12.

Three programs are being offered—programs A, B, and C. Program A includes an Instrument Course, lectures on Control Towers, and a Link Trainer Course. Program B includes Aircraft Maintenance, Air Reserve and Marine Operations and Parachute Instructions. Program C, including an orientation flight, is not available unless A and B programs are taken first.

It is possible to take all three programs in one week or one program each week for three weeks. Applications must be filed at the Scout Council Office, 51 W. Warren Avenue, at least fifteen days in advance of period desired. Hours are from 8:00 to 4:00 p.m. daily—Monday through Friday. A substantial lunch may be purchased on the Base. Overnight facilities, such as those enjoyed in previously conducted Explorer Encampments, are not now available due to wartime regulations.

These daytime programs, now being announced, offer opportunities for local Explorers to get well acquainted with the Air Forces and to acquire definite help on Aviation Rating Requirements.

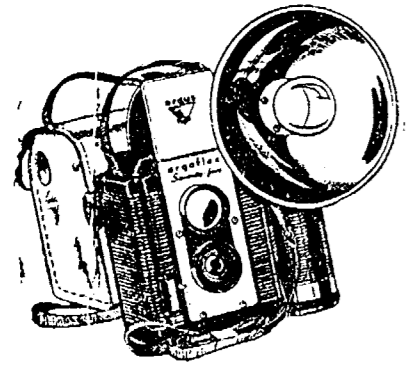

The two boyfriends are Bob Slade, who supplies the intelligence, and Dick Saunders, the man with the muscles.

Rounding up the cast are Armin Seielstad, who plays Nutsy Miller, and Neil Smith, who portrays the snooping reporter.

"The Male Animal" will be presented in an informal style at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. The audience will be seated in a theatre under the stars on the lake front terrace.

Lt. (jg) Oliver received his commission March 14, 1945.

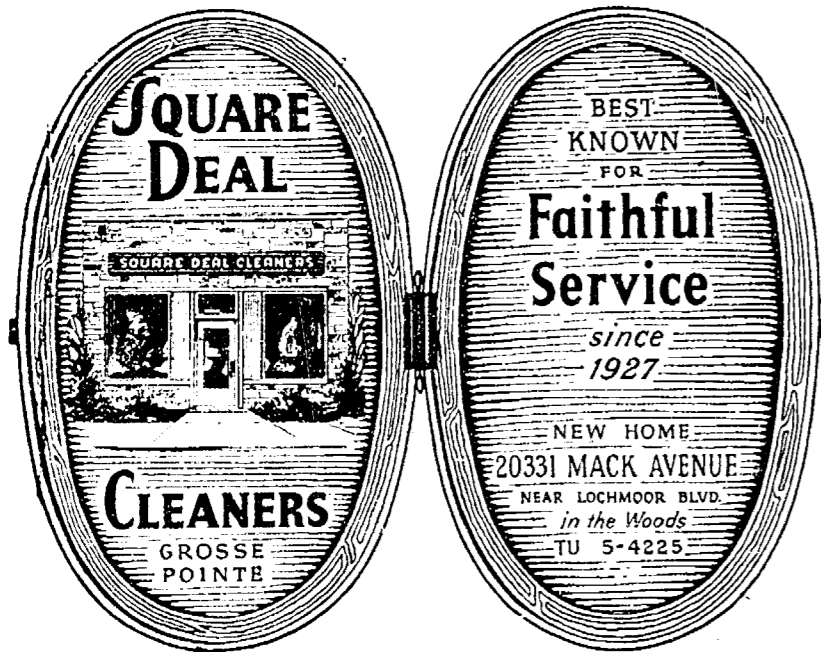
