State Bilks Boatmen in Tax Usage

Waterways Commission Officials Reveal How Moneys Are Diverted to Other Uses

More than a half million dollars, rightfully belonging to the State Waterways Commission's fund to promote this state's boating recreational facilities, is being withheld yearly.

This alarming fact was learned by your reporter during a four hour interview last Wednesday, December 5, with Bert Robb and Tom Lott, director and commissioner of the Waterways Commission respectively.

Cites Inefficiency
Director Robb stated that "through an inefficient collection of marine gasoline taxes the Waterways Commission is losing approximately \$448,000 yearly." He further stated "from \$110,000 collected from the boat tax each year the Waterways commission receives only half of this amount with the other half going to the State to pay salaries and other miscellaneous expenses NOT CONNECTED WITH BOATING."

Goes for Highways
Mr. Robb pointed out that 17,000,000 gallons of gasoline are sold each year for marine use. The three cents a gallon tax should dump a half million dollars into the Waterways Commission's fund yearly for the betterment of the state's boating facilities. Through the inefficient collection of this tax the commission receives a mere \$52,000 while the other \$448,000 goes to the Highway Department in addition to the tax collection from the sale of gasoline for motor vehicles.

All in all, the thousands of yachtmen of this state are being fleeced of money they personally pay in gasoline and boat taxes which should be used to create more and better boating facilities.

Had Hopeful Plan
When the state began collecting the boat tax from yachtmen three years ago the Waterways Commission set up a program to provide harbors of refuge along the shores of this State. It was the hope of the commission, with the financial help of each community selected for a new harbor and the federal government, to provide these harbors for the boatmen of the state.

In three years the commission has provided new harbors of refuge at Port Sanilac, Traverse City and Grand Traverse Bay in the upper peninsula.

Plan Abandoned
In recent months the Commission has been forced to abandon its original plan because the Federal government has withdrawn its financial support because of the defense effort.

The new program the Commission has been forced to take is that of allotting several small parcels of money to communities willing to put up finances to improve their own existing harbors.

basin is the most recent example. In that project the commission put up \$5,000 to get Detroit started on the job to finish the Memorial Park project which was started 10 years ago and never completed. Detroit is putting up its own \$50,000 for the building of mooring docks and facilities, while its Department of Parks and Recreation is putting in \$60,000 to complete the park proper with landscaping and fencing. It is quite possible Detroit would never have dreamed of sinking a total of \$110,000 into the park project if it hadn't received the financial aid from the Waterways Commission.

Story Producers Results
It was my story in the NEWS two weeks ago, "Boat Tax Funds Misdirected Away from Idea of Refuges," that brought about the enlightening interview with these two energetic, conscientious men. In that story I asked how come Detroit could get financial aid for its Memorial Park basin when it could never be classed as a Harbor of Refuge.

The interview answered my question.

Now you may ask why can't one of Grosse Pointe's municipal docks receive financial backing from the Waterways Commission. Director Robb and Commissioner Lott answered this also.

Said Lott: "Municipal docks such as those of Grosse Pointe Park City, Farms, Shores and Woods are classed as privately owned and in no way can the commission allot money to privately owned enterprises."

Challenges Statement
I questioned this statement in view of the fact that Detroit's Memorial Park Basin is a community project and if Detroit could receive financial aid I could see no reason for not giving Grosse Pointe's municipal docks similar aid.

Commissioner Lott somewhat cleared up this point by stating, "Grosse Pointe's municipal docks are just for the residents of the community where they are located and no outsider could gain access to their facilities as they could at the Memorial Park Basin."

Would Have to Open Gates
From this I gathered that the

only way Grosse Pointe's municipal docks could receive support from the Waterways Commission would be to relinquish their private, standard and open their gates to anyone wishing to use the facilities.

Mr. Lott also made a statement with which I do not entirely agree. He stated, "there is no need for a Harbor of Refuge on Lake St. Clair because the boatmen have access to the Grosse Pointe Club (Little Club), and Grosse Pointe Yacht Club during a storm."

Basins Too Crowded
Maybe this is true, but I wouldn't like to see the confusion that would reign if four or five yachtmen tried to seek shelter during a storm in the Park, City, Farms or Woods municipal docks, or if they tried to get into Crescent, Sail Yacht Club. All of these basins are crowded to capacity with no room to take care of boats seeking shelter.

I admit the Waterways Commission has a tremendous problem on its hands and only time will tell how far it can carry on its program under the present set up of limited finances.

Wooing Legislators
During the past year, the Waterways Commission has not done any construction of harbors, according to Director Robb. For the most part the Commission has been lobbying trying to gain support for its program from the legislators. Many of the legislators, according to Mr. Robb, "do not know our state is surrounded by water and that we have boating problems."

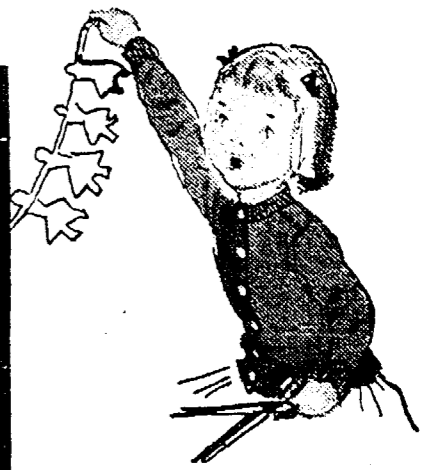

Woods Busy on Codification Of Ordinances and Schedules

The City of Grosse Pointe Woods is busy codifying all city ordinances and getting them in shape to be published in pamphlet form for the convenience of the residents.

The city charter provides for this codification and the work is now being carried on under the supervision of Jules Berns, city attorney. The council spent a great deal of time discussing the matter at a special meeting Monday night, December 10.

Ordinances such as those pertaining to the location of victory gardens, licensing of dance halls, etc., which are no longer applicable because these things do not still exist in the city, will be eliminated. Others will be rewritten and brought up to date.

Berns is being assisted by City Administrator Philip Aillard and Police Chief Walter Goulette. Many of the ordinances are now in typewritten form or merely appear in the minutes of meeting.

The matter of revising some of the license fees is also being taken up at this time. Mayor Leon D. Ratcliffe stated there is no thought of charging license fees for the purpose of obtaining revenue, but it is necessary to

obtain enough to pay for the paper work involved in issuing them. The licenses are necessary to give the police department the authority to control certain business operations.

When the codification is completed, all ordinances, license fee schedules, etc., will be published in pamphlet form, with an index which will make it easy for any resident to find out immediately about the laws of the city as they pertain to his particular interests and activities.

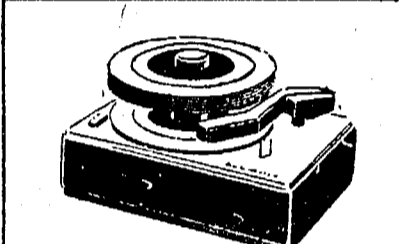
Fire Fighters Elect Officers



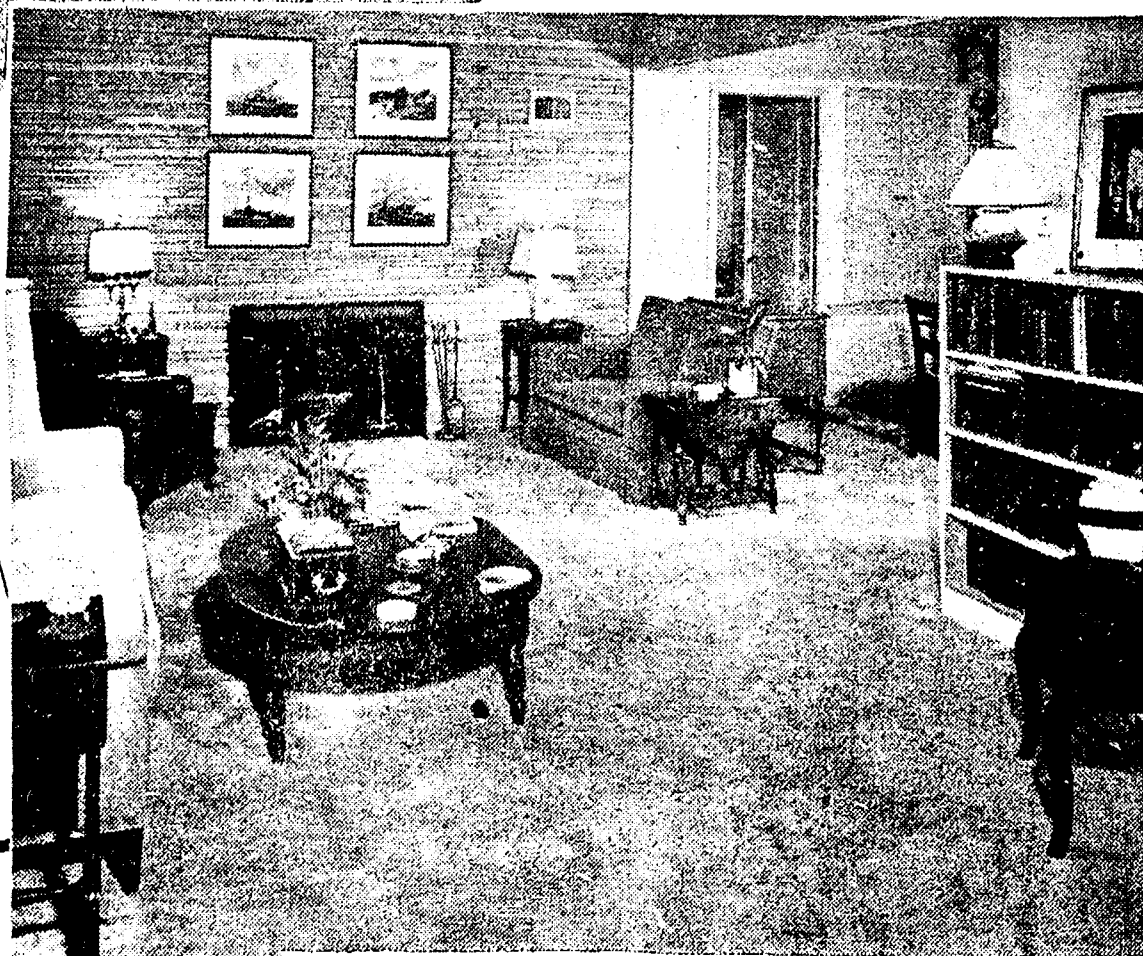

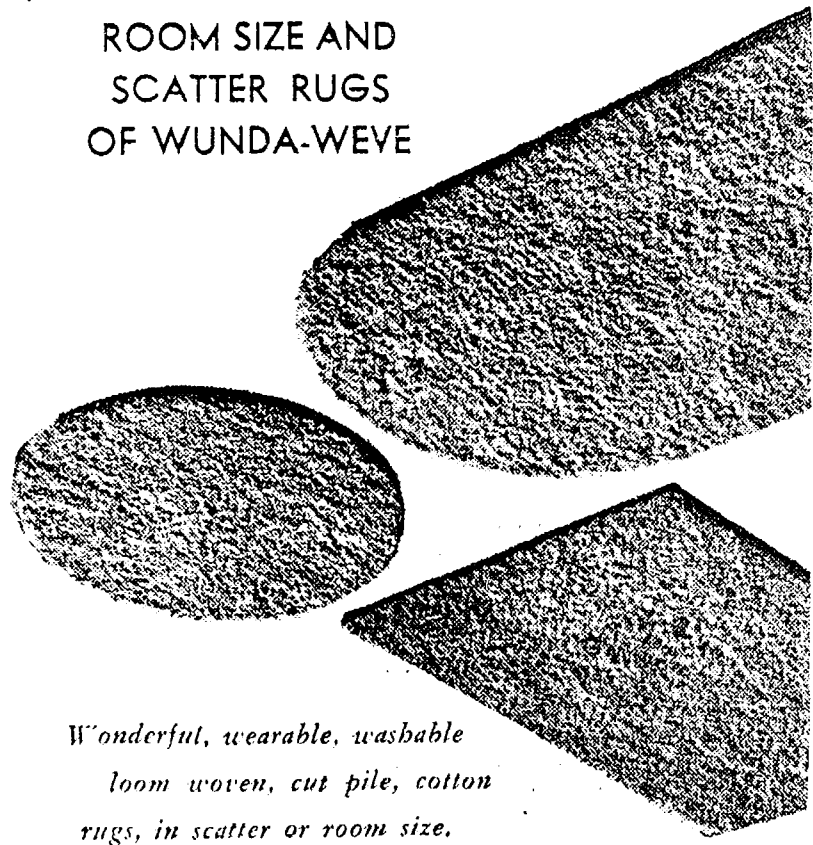

Bird Feeding Stations Can Bring Hours of Delight All Winter Long

Many birds, discouragingly shy at most seasons, may be lured to your feeding trays, tempted to stay longer, and to return again and again to brighten your sober winter garden. Professor George M. Sutton, associate professor of zoology at the University of Michigan, says.

Of particular interest to operators of feeding stations and to bird watchers this fall has been the arrival probably due to food shortage in the north, of the evening grosbeak, a large finch. The colorful yellow, black and white bird can be tempted by box elder seeds.

Also in evidence in Michigan is another Northern finch, the rare Pine grosbeak. Professor Sutton says. Several small flocks have been reported recently in various places in the Lower Peninsula. The bird is about the size of a robin, rose-red all over except for wings and tail which are black with white edges. The female is grey with rose on crown and lower back. The bird, which is remarkably tame, especially likes the red haw (hawthorne berry), snowberries, or any winter fruit seeds.

Since the acorn crop is good this year, certain woodpeckers

ordinarily do not winter here, among them, the red-headed woodpecker, may be counted on to stay for the winter. Downy and hairy woodpeckers are always attracted by suet tacked up on a tree trunk or put in wire containers to keep squirrels from carrying it away.

Pecan bits, now on the market, are especially popular with many birds, as are sunflower seeds. These latter will have a special appeal to the birds if they are left in the flower-head, which may be tacked up in a conspicuous spot in your garden. But remember, the University

ornithologist warns, when you put out special food supplies of suet and seed, you are creating an artificial situation and in fairness to the birds you should continue the practice through the winter. Birds will come to rely on obtaining their daily rations from your feeding station, and some of them may fly considerable distance to get the food you put out.

Absence of food at critical periods, such as the duration of an ice storm, when the birds are unable to procure food through the ice may have severe consequences.

Mrs. Morse said she saw Van Peck crossing the street when she was a long distance from the intersection. When she looked again the same man was in front of her 1950 Cadillac. She tried to stop but couldn't because of the wet pavement.

City Officers Moffat and Mac Eachen detected Van Peck had been drinking and found a broken liquor bottle in his pocket. They issued a ticket to Mrs. Morse for not having her car under control.

Don't Let Tragic Fire Mar This Happiest of Seasons

From childhood to old age the happiest season of the year is that of Christmas. It is a time of homecoming—of "peace and good will toward men"—the mutual exchange of love and gifts—marked by the unusually good behavior of little children. The fire department officials warn that this season of joy and happiness may well turn into sorrow and unhappiness unless

each person is conscious of the dangers of fire. The number one fire hazard of the season, of course, continues to be the Christmas tree. The firemen have some specific recommendations regarding this hazard.

- 1. Leave the tree outdoors as long as possible before trimming and remove it from the home as soon after Christmas as you can. 2. Before erecting the tree, cut the bottom of the trunk on a slant. Use a tree stand filled with water and keep the tree in water all of the time it is in the house. 3. Be sure the tree is anchored in the stand so that there is no danger of tipping or falling over. Do not place it near any register, radiator, fireplace or other source of heat. 4. All decorations should be of fireproof construction and surely no one need be told NEVER TO USE CANDLES OR OTHER OPEN FLAMES. Electric lights are just as pretty and much safer. Of course, even here there are precautions to be taken. Use only lighting sets that bear the Underwriters Laboratories label. Before using, check your sets for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. Last but not least—be sure to turn lights off before retiring or leaving the house.

While the Christmas tree undoubtedly is the principal hazard, there are others that are a close second. Among these are the accumulation of gift wrappings. These are usually very flimsy and flammable and should be removed as soon as possible to the rubbish barrel or incinerator. Smoking should not be permitted around the tree.

Plenty of substantial ash trays should be provided and they should be USED. Keep matches away from little children—not only now but throughout the year. The toys you select for your small children should be fireproof—never of pyroxylin plastic or other quick burning material. Toys for older children involving electricity should bear the Underwriters Laboratories label and should be used only under adult supervision.

As a final word of caution—if you have a fire—don't hesitate. Call the Fire Department at once.

Drivers Warned About Drinking

More than 8,000 posters bearing Detroit's perennial traffic safety Christmas card—"Drunk Drivers Go To Jail"—will be erected starting next Monday, (December 17).

They will appear on street-side standards as warnings to motorists, and in bars for the information of the driver inclined to order that last one too many "for the road." Prepared by the Traffic Safety Association of Detroit, approximately 1,300 will be placed on street standards by the Traffic Engineering Bureau Sign Shop, and the remainder will be distributed to bars and other liquor establishments by Detroit Police Department Precinct Safety officers.

Michigan Liquor Control Commission officials have estimated that an all-time high of 450,000 cases of liquor will be drunk in Christmas and New Year tippling, increasing the possibility of drunk driving. Statistics of the United States Department of Commerce show that twice as much liquor is sold at retail during December than in any other month of the year.

Traffic Judges George T. Murphy and John D. Watts have again declared their policy of sending all drivers convicted of driving under the influence of liquor straight to jail, without any alternative.

"Drunk drivers are a menace on the streets of Detroit and a jail sentence is none too severe a penalty," they said.

Since the "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail" program was inaugurated in 1941, fatal and injury accidents due to this cause have dropped amazingly. Drunk drivers were responsible for 47 deaths and 1,774 injury accidents in 1941. Last year only two persons were killed and 117 injured by drunk drivers.

Charles Rawlings Retiring After 38 Years as Postman

Charles L. Rawlings, of 3478 Pennsylvania Ave., Detroit, an employe of the United States Postal Service, will retire on January 1, after thirty-eight and one-half years of service.

Thirty-two of these years have been spent in Grosse Pointe. Early in January, 1920, he began his appointed rounds of, daily mail delivery. The postal route in those days embraced the area from the north side of Jefferson avenue-Lakeshore road to Mack avenue, east from the (Cabbage Patch) now known as Berkshire place-McKinley place to Lakeland avenue-Woodland place, south of Jefferson avenue.

All the Grosse Pointe communities and far into Macomb County were served by two foot carriers and two mounted carriers in those early days. Thus he says that he has watched with a keen and personal interest the growth, advancement and the many changes unfolding like a great drama, as the area became one of many fine families and beautiful homes. For

me it has been a rare and wonderful experience to see the children of these marvelous families grow from the cradle to manhood and womanhood. Again it was extremely exciting to be the courier of their notes of love and romance during the period of courtship, and to greet their children.

"These years have been so pleasant I feel like a member of many of these families. I desire to express my deepest gratitude and appreciation to those now living on my present postal route (Rivard boulevard, University, Lakeland and Neff), and to those whom it has been my privilege to serve at any time; for the many expressions of goodwill and kindness accorded me through the years. The memory of these wonderful people, their generous examples of courtesy and friendship to me, and all these glamorous and exciting years shall ever be an imperishable comfort and joy to me throughout the remainder of my life."

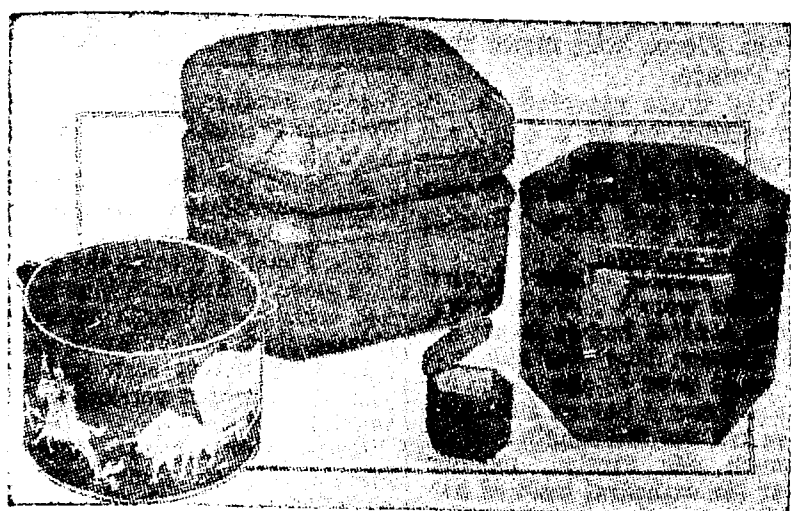

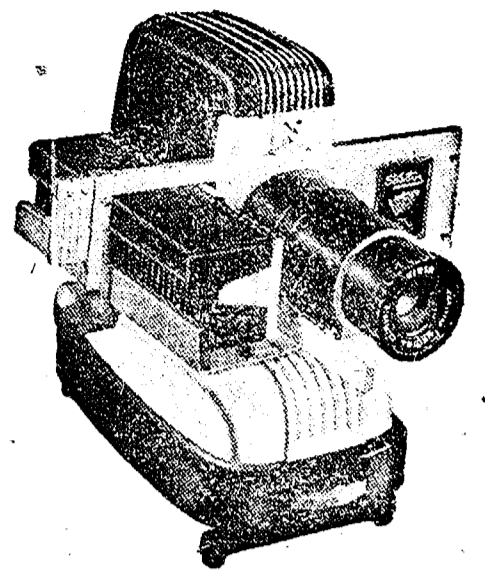

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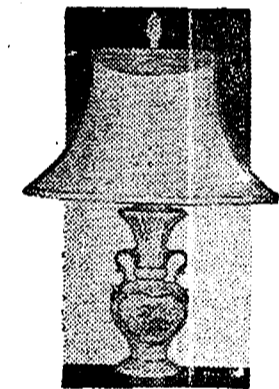

Inter-Church Basketball League Opens on Saturday

Loop Is Larger by Two Teams This Year; First Contests to Be Played in Girls' Gymnasium in High School

Grosse Pointe's Inter-Church Basketball League will open its third season next Saturday, December 15, in the girls' gymnasium at Grosse Pointe High School.

Eight teams will represent six Grosse Pointe churches this year, making the largest entry in the three year-old history of the league. Over 100 church going youngsters will be in competition during the winter and will play in approximately 14 games before the season ends early in April.

Adopts New Rule

A new rule in the league this year opened the door to basketball competition to a host of youngsters who otherwise would have idled away their Saturday mornings looking for something to do. The new rule allows the team managers to sign an unlimited number of 14-year-old or under church-going boys for the first half of the season.

After the last game of the first round of play a manager will be allowed to take his surplus boys and form another team and enter it in the second division for the second half of the schedule.

Coaches Embarrassed

In other years the league limited the number on a team to only 12 boys. This, in some cases, caused considerable embarrassment for the coach who was forced to cut some of his boys from his squad.

The league also adopted a new plan to match the games more evenly. After the first round of the schedule league officials will place the four strongest teams in a First Division and the remaining four plus any new teams of surplus boys in the Second Division. Both divisions will play a double round robin series to determine the champion of the second round.

To Decide Winners

The winner in the Second Division will win that division's first championship. In the First Division the season championship will be decided between the winner of the first round of play and the winner of the second round in the First Division. This playoff game will take place the Saturday following the completion of the second half of the schedule.

Grosse Pointe Memorial is the defending champion and will seek to repeat in the league consisting of Grosse Pointe Methodist, Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian, St. Ambrose, Christ Church, Tigers and Lions and the St. Paul

Panthers and Longhorns. The two new teams were entered by Manager Sandy Wiener of Christ Church and the St. Ambrose squad.

Opening Games

On the opening day the Christ Church Tigers will meet Methodist at 9 a.m. At 10 a.m., the St. Paul Panthers will tackle the Christ Church Lions and at 11 a.m., St. Ambrose will play the St. Paul Longhorns. The final game, at noon, will pit Memorial against Woods Presbyterian, last year's runner-up.

After the opening day the league will suspend operations until after the holidays due to the closing of the High School. After the holidays all the games will be played in the boys' gym.

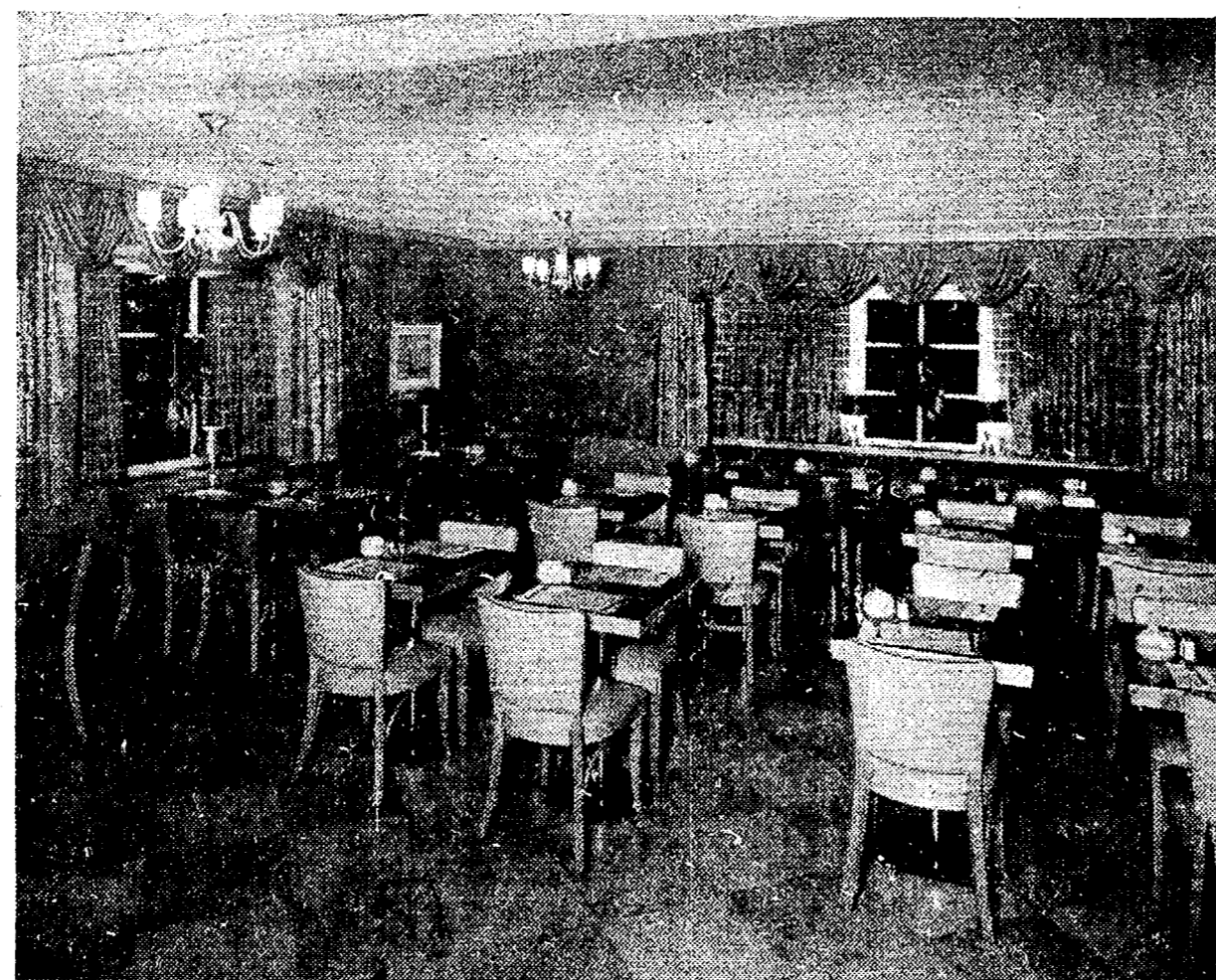

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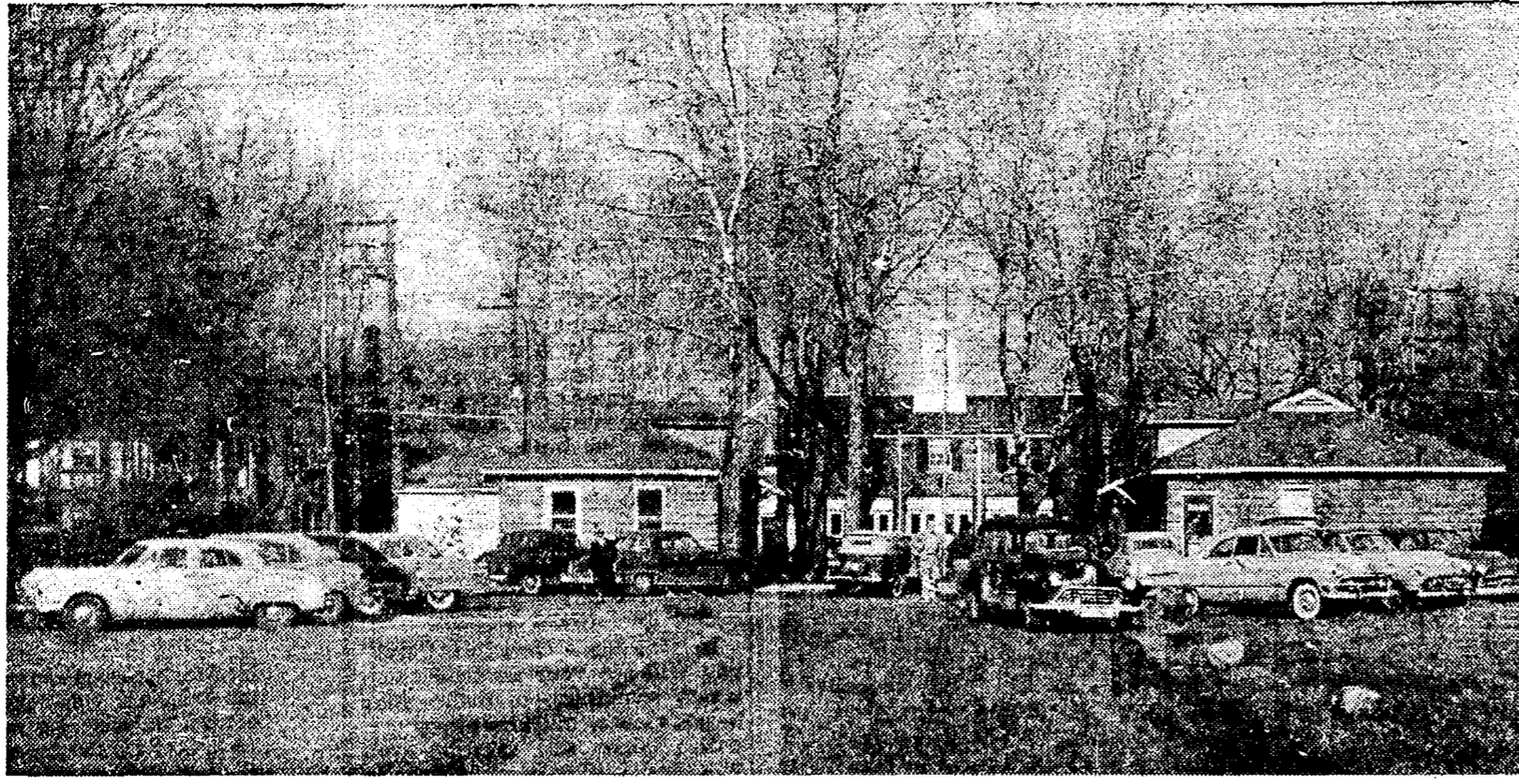
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Christmas Rush Starts at Post Office

All Eyes and Ears

Good Green Corn

We were delighted last week with the Grosse Pointe Community Theatre's production of "The Corn Is Green," by Emlyn Williams. In fact, we can honestly label it one of this group's finest efforts to date. The play is an excellent one—first produced on Broadway in 1940, with Ethel Barrymore and Richard-Waring in the starring roles—and the present director, William Merrill, did a fine job with a cast which, on the whole, was very capable.

Many professional touches were happily noted: Welsh was spoken (as the original script calls for it), adding much to the authenticity of the production. A more timid group perhaps might not have dared such linguistic challenges. The accents of the cast were generally good, and the action moved right along without dragging in the least. Special mention must also be made of the impressively realistic setting, executed under the direction of John K. Sinclair.

Some technical mistakes appeared, but these could be easily corrected with further rehearsal, and frequently it was difficult to hear what was being said. Moreover, William Merrill, who specializes in comedy at Will-o-Way, seemed to by-pass many of the comic lines in his direction.

Those who took the major roles in the play are all actors and actresses with substantial theatrical experience, and they gave a good account of themselves without exception.

M. Haythorne Bambas played Miss Moffat with feeling, though her interpretation of the stern, yet loving, school mistress was perhaps not forceful enough. She is too young and too feminine for the part. Dick Hildebrandt's Morgan Evans, the young miner who becomes Miss Moffat's protegee, was especially good. He played his role with simplicity and warmth; his somewhat limited expression of emotions visible at first later broadened to produce a very real and sympathetic character. Grace Rockhoff as Bessie Watty was fine, though a few more pounds could have helped round out her characterization. However, she was a convincingly insolent and brazen wench, and yet conveyed, too, the essential childishness and inner warmth that was Bessie's.

Jean Reid (Mrs. Watty) was a capable comedienne, with many humorous lines to utter, but we weren't always able to get them because of a pretty thick cockney accent. John Sinclair as The Squire was in the same position and had identical trouble, but he was certainly adequate. Convincing jobs were done also by Luella Wertz (Miss Ronberry) and Jim Hamilton (John Jones). Miss Wertz, especially, offered a commendable portrayal of a spinster who obviously has not given up matrimonial hopes.

So, thanks to the Grosse Pointe Community Theatre for bringing a fine play to the community, and bouquets to those who made such a praise-worthy production possible.

Warning Issued By SS' Manager

Self-employed persons should apply now for their social security account number, urged Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the East Side Office of the Social Security Administration.

Although self-employed persons are not required to report their 1951 earnings until they file their income tax returns early in 1952, Pendergast said that every self-employed person who does not have a social security account-number card should apply for one now to be certain he has the account number when the tax report is made.

Applications for account numbers can be obtained from the local post office, or by contacting the social security office, located at 8720 Mack Avenue, Detroit 14, Michigan.

Most owners or partners in a trade or business who have net earnings of \$400 or more a year are required by the new social security law to pay in full the

tax of 2 3/4% of their net earnings, up to the first \$3,600 earned in the year, at the time the combined income tax and social security tax form is filed.

This coverage of the self-employed is not voluntary, Pendergast emphasized. Participation is required by the law unless net earnings from self-employment are less than \$400 a year, or if the income is derived from the ownership or operation of a farm or from certain professions excluded by the law; such as, physicians, lawyers, dentists, professional engineers, public accountants, and some others.

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

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
