
#### **Truck Robbery** Loss Revealed


The auditorium-gymnasium idea did not originate with this present group of students. In fact it is so old that it is a blot on the public record that something has not been done about it long before this.

For many years both the auditorium and the gymnasium facilities of the High School have been inadequate. When the becutiful building was erected, it might have appeared that provisions were being made to provide for all expected needs for years to come, but a boner was pulled right at the start. The Boys' and Girls' gymnasiums should have been built side by side, with sliding or folding doors that would permit throwing both into one big area, allowing ample spectator space for basketball games and similar events.

But the gymnasiums were built far apart, and neither of them was made large enough to accommodate even moderate crowds at such events. The result has been that many parents of high school children, to say nothing of interested residents who would attend if there were proper facilities, have stayed away rather than fight overflow crowds.

A close relationship between parents and their children of school age is one of the healthiest aspects of community life and the Pointe has passed up to a considerable degree Seattle . . . and would he accept the charges!!! this opportunity to increase its assets.





Letters came in from all over the world from these young men and women who had felt the lack of facilities at the High School when they were students. They recommended that the memorial should take the form of a field house, or gymnasium-auditorium type of building.

There were more at home on the ground floor working for the library project, so the group in service was shunted aside and it was decided that the Pointe's war memorial would be a new central library.

A campaign was conducted and the students supported the library drive, with the expressed understanding that after this was accomplished, they would receive the help of their elders in raising funds for the field house project they so vigorously favored.

That memorial library campaign failed. Fortunately for the community, the Alger family donated a magnificent property which has since been converted, aided by public subscriptions, into a beautiful Grosse Pointe War Memorial.

And also fortunately for the Pointe, Dexter M. Ferry, Jr., has contributed the funds for a new Central Library, which is now being erected.

These two major problems have been solved, and very satisfactorily. But the wish of the students and the young graduates who served in the last war, and of many of the parents who had signified they would support a field house project but not a library, is still but a wish. We submit that it is high time that an answer was given.

It was originally proposed that the last school bond issue submitted for public approval should contain provision for such an auditorium-gymnasium. The Board of Education had gone so far as to have an architect prepare a drawing, and a picture of the proposed building was printed on the front page of this paper. Opposition from the proponents of a new central library was so great that the Board of Education feared if it included the gymnasium-auditorium in the bond issue proposal, without also including a library, that the whole issue would suffer defeat.

Soooo . . . the trio had to trapse over to another department store where "one of Santa's helpers" was listening to requests . .



Completely exhausted, the now aged mother led her offspring to meet daddy who said they'd all stay down town for dinner, which at least sounded like a respite to mama.


