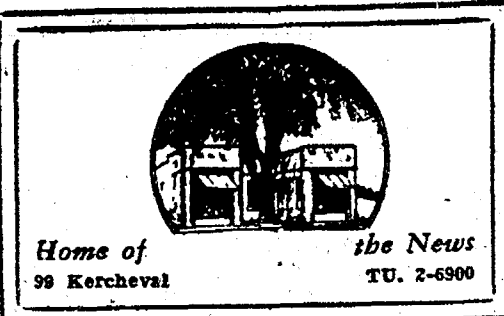

Thursday, December 13.

**PRESIDENT TRUMAN** reported to be cooking up some drastic action in an effort to halt nationwide tax scandals. Meets behind closed doors with Attorney General J. Howard McGrath and J. Edgar Hoover. McGrath discloses that former Attorney General Tom Clark, now a supreme court justice, had complaints of irregularities by T. Lamar Caudle in 1945. Caudle has now been fired by Truman as assistant attorney general in charge of tax cases.

**CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEE** investigating methods of ordnance procurement uncovers many more stories of government contracts going to companies without any manufacturing facilities. Weird purchases by army bared. Bids offered low bidders to withdraw.

**MOUNTING TRAFFIC DEATH** toll (13 so far in December in Detroit), leads Traffic John Watts to proclaim he will send speeders to jail just as is being done with drunk drivers.

**SAMUEL J. HAMWAY**, intelligence division agent of Detroit office of the Internal Revenue Bureau, has been fired by his Washington headquarters after refusing to resign under charges that he accepted special favors and discounts from a heavy taxpayer.

Friday, December 14

**MERCURY** sinks to 12 degrees, lowest of the season, followed by snow storm which continued all day.

**STANLEY JERLECKI**, 28 year old Detroit policeman, and William Brown, ex-convict, shot and killed each other early today when the patrolman surprised Brown and a companion trying to break into a jewelry store. Brown was sentenced to a life term in prison in 1930, but was released in 1945 under a "quick justice" ruling. Jerlecki was father of two small children.

**FILM PRODUCER WALTER WANGER** last night shot and seriously wounded an actor's agent, Jennings Lang, as Lang talked to his wife, Joan Bennett, in a Hollywood parking lot. Wanger said Lang broke up his home. The wounded agent was hit in the groin by one bullet. A second, fired at point blank, missed him. Wanger, charged with assault with intent to commit murder, was held in jail.

**THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION** has granted Michigan Bell Telephone Co. a rehearing on the company's request to boost phone rates \$22,500,000 annually. Rehearing set for January 7.

**JOHN STEWART SERVICE**, long a controversial figure in the State Department, was fired last night by Secretary of State Dean Acheson. Review board had ruled there was a "reasonable doubt" about Service's loyalty to his country.

Saturday, December 15

**DETROIT** digging out from seven inch snowfall which swept from midwest to East Coast. All transportation crippled with schedules far behind. Air flights resumed today. Highways open but extremely treacherous.

**HOUSE INVESTIGATORS** charge that Charles Oliphant, resigned chief counsel for the Internal Revenue Bureau, accepted free trips, costly gifts and other favors from persons seeking tax favors. Given severe dressing down by Chairman King (D), of California.

**FRESH REPORTS** from the Philippines raised the death toll from last Monday's typhoon to 724.

**CANADA HAS ABOLISHED** foreign exchange control, which means that in the future Canadians can purchase or sell American securities without getting a government permit.

**TWENTY-TWO THOUSAND** state employees will share in an annual pay boost of \$8,848,000 approved by the State Civil Service Commission meeting in De-

### St. Michael's Chapel Votes To Separate

Move for Independence Encouraged by Bishop and Vestry of Mother Church

As a result of recent meetings, the congregation of St. Michael's Episcopal Chapel, Grosse Pointe Woods, has decided to separate from Christ Church, Grosse Pointe, of which parish it has been a mission, and become an independent parish.

The following members of the congregation were elected to serve as incorporators to handle the necessary legal procedure: Messrs. Robert L. Bell, F. B. Besinger, A. E. Bodycombe, F. J. Butner, N. B. Fisher, J. N. Jennings and W. F. McQueen.

**Organized in 1947**  
St. Michael's Chapel was organized in the fall of 1947, under the leadership of the Rev. Edgar H. Yeoman, Vicar, worshipping in a temporary building in Lochmoor boulevard until last September, when they moved into their beautiful new church on Sunningdale drive.

Due to the rapid growth of the congregation, and its financial status, this step has been encouraged by the Bishop of the Diocese and the Rector and Vestry of Christ Church, Grosse Pointe.

A parish meeting will be held on January 6 for the purpose of electing the first vestry, after which the group will function as a parish. Formal acceptance of the new parish into the Diocese will be made at the annual Diocesan Convention in January.

Ice skating season is here, even though it won't be winter officially until one minute past 11 o'clock this Saturday morning, December 22. The Old Girl really blew into town early this year and the kids aren't a bit mad.

The Farms is treating the youngsters, and to double dip this year. The usual facilities are available at the municipal pier, and a brand new rink has been opened off Kerby road between the baseball field. It can be reached either from Kerby or from Chalfonte. The new rink has been flooded and Dame Nature took care of the rest. Lights are expected to be installed any day now and there will be skating, with an attendant in charge from noon to 10 p. m. every day.

### St. Clare Church Campaign Results Nearly Double Goal As Workers Raise \$480,356

Rev. Philip L. Colgan, Pastor and Head of Drive, Praises Parish for Enabling Building of New Structure to Be Continued

The sum of \$480,356.50 almost double the minimum goal of \$250,000, has been subscribed during the active phase of the Augustinian Church of St. Clare of Montefalco Building Fund Campaign, which has just been completed, the Reverend Philip L. Colgan, O.S.A., pastor and honorary chairman, has announced.

A Solemn High Mass will be celebrated in Thanksgiving for this work which was accomplished by over 150 volunteer campaign workers.

**Holy Victory Dinner**  
A victory dinner was tendered all the men and women who worked on this drive for a new church—now under construction—on Monday evening, December 10, in the Pompeian Room of the Hotel Whittier in Detroit.

"Our highly successful campaign," Father Colgan said, "is the answer of our prayers to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and our patroness, St. Clare. Through our campaign, our entire parish—our priests, our good sisters of St. Dominic, our workers, our parishioners and the children of the school—have been besieging Heaven with their prayers for the success of the campaign."

**Tribute to Parishioners**  
"The sum that has been raised in this parish is a tribute to the spirit of generosity and sense of obligation of every parishioner. A great deal of the credit is due both the Reverend Edward J. Sweeney, O.S.A., and Mr. Frank A. Alter, who have worked untiringly to aid all those working on the drive."

"The campaign workers worked night after night for four weeks in house-to-house solicitation of the entire parish. To them go the laurels for they have been responsible for the success of the campaign."

### Traffic Death Spoils Park's Fine Record

Pedestrian Killed as He Steps From Between Parked Cars On Mack Avenue

In the greying dusk last Thursday evening, December 13, Grosse Pointe Park's perfect pedestrian accident record was blemished.

Eighty year-old Edson Fuller of 3264 Somerset stepped into the path of a car driven by Ralph E. Baker, Sr., 35, of 20293 McCormick, Detroit, and was fatally injured.

The accident occurred at 6:30 p. m. and Mr. Fuller died in Bon Secours hospital at 3:30 a. m., December 14.

**Violated Cardinal Rule**  
Mr. Fuller violated the cardinal rule for pedestrians. He walked from between two parked cars 75 feet east of the Somerset-Mack intersection and was hit 22 feet from the spot where he left the curb, according to another driver who was following Mr. Baker going east on Mack.

He also stated Baker never had a chance to avoid the victim as he appeared from between the parked autos. No warrant was issued in the case.

**Spoils Year's Record**  
This was the first fatal pedestrian accident in the Park in almost two years. The Park had only two weeks to go to give it a clean pedestrian record for 1950 and 1951.

Statistics have proven that the majority of the pedestrian accidents involve aged people. This is due to the fact that their reflexes aren't as keen and in a good many of the cases their eyesight isn't as sharp as it should be.

### All Kids Asked To Meet Santa

Mr. Boyd emphasizes that every kid in the Pointe area will be more than welcome. All they have to do is appear at the showroom at 12:30. Thousands of youngsters are entertained at these famous Boyd parties each Christmas time.

### New Kerby School Traffic Problems Produce Petition

School and City Authorities, Police and Representatives Of P-TA, Adopt Plan for Safety; Parents Dissatisfied

Completion of the big addition to New Kerby School and total occupancy of the building have produced a traffic and pupil safety problem that has been receiving a great deal of attention from the Farms police department and representatives of the school and its Parent-Teachers Association.

The New Kerby P-TA filed a request with the department last month, asking that three officers be assigned to the school to guard the safety of the children while they were going to and from the building. A meeting was called for December 1, at which time the whole problem was discussed and a program agreed upon.

**Those Attending**  
This meeting was attended by Robert Grow of the P-TA, Vernon Hicks, school principal; William Swartz of the P-TA, William Kirby, member of the Kerby P-TA and a member of the Farms Council; Chief of Police Walter Hoyt and Lieut. James Furton, and Harry Furton, City Clerk.

It was pointed out by the police that it has only four officers available to handle traffic at the five schools in the city. It was obvious that three of these could not be assigned to Kerby, leaving one to handle the other four.

**Measures Suggested**  
The city officials and police agreed that a traffic light should be erected in front of the school, crossing lanes plainly marked, warning signs be erected and safety loading stations for the buses be established in the rear of the school on Beaupre.

The school authorities approved of the plan and prepared mimeographed reports of the results of the meeting, instructions to parents asking that they be sure their children were fully acquainted with all the rules, and a map of the district showing the safest routes to the school from all points.

**Petition Presented**  
At a meeting of the Farms council Monday night, a petition was presented signed by some 30 parents of Kerby School children, saying that they were greatly dissatisfied with the adopted plans and would like a re-hearing of the problem, with a new committee being appointed to represent the parents.

The council has agreed to sit with the new committee at a future date. In the meantime, the plan as adopted at the December 1 meeting will be carried on.

The City of Grosse Pointe Park announces its municipal offices will be closed on Monday, December 24, but will remain open the following Monday, December 31, the day before New Year's.

### Telephone Call from Egypt Informs Parents of Plans

The invitation we received to be a houseguest of the T. D. Buhls of Ridge road didn't mention that a super-special, pre-breakfast, second-floor show was to be staged. We weren't interested in entertainment. Our own apartment was being gone over by a crew of carpenters, painters and plumbers. We were in dire need of a place to sleep. A haymow would have sufficed, but the Buhls residence seemed much more attractive.

**Shared Opinion**  
Apparently we weren't the only one holding this opinion. "The Cat," who has played too many repeat performances in the Pointe, none of them by command, had to choose the same setting in which to display his histrionic ability. We missed the show and he didn't even leave a note to tell us if we snore.

Ultra meticulous at heart, we always clean everything out of our pockets and neatly hang up our clothes before retiring at night. head off at every car which enters the driveway. He is the scourge of every delivery boy in the Pointe and makes furious dashes to the door every time a bell rings. He has enjoyed the reputation of being able to smell a trespasser as soon as he crosses the Pointe limits.

That reputation was blasted forever with the eery silence which emanated from his lair on Monday morning, December 17. He never let out a single, tiny, challenging snort. The scorn with which he has since been treated has pushed his tail so far between his legs, his tip is leading his nose to a hiding place of shame.

**Had Busy Night**

Monday was one of "The Cat's" busiest nights, or mornings. No one can be certain of the time of the robberies. He gave the same perfect performance each time, and had no audience.

He put on a show in the Owen Skelton residence at Ridge and Vendome, diagonally across the street from the Buhls. Here he became more audacious than usual, and broke out a small window pane in the breakfast den to turn the latch and gain entrance.

Here too, he made a complete circuit of the house, but the would-be spectators slept on and

his act went unobserved.

**Frozen Window**

He attempted to get into the home of Mrs. Theodore Hinchman, at 224 Vendome in the immediate neighborhood. Again he broke out a small pane of glass, but then found the window frozen shut and abandoned the project.

The Farms police can't say in which order he visited the three premises. "The Cat" had made his curtain bow and vanished long before they knew anything about the show he had put on. The Buhl and Skelton robberies were discovered between 8 and 9 a.m. It was not learned that he had also tried to get on the stage at the Hinchman's until a maid discovered the tracks in the snow in the early afternoon.

**Returns To Stage**

The first return appearance after being banged up while escaping from the John Woodhouse home on Lake Shore road several weeks ago, was made by "The Cat" last Thursday morning, December 13, when he entered the home of Dr. Charles W. Adams at 41 Beacon Hill.

Footprints all around the William Barbour home in Old Brook lane revealed that he also tried to get in there the same night, but was unsuccessful.

As in all previous performances, "The Cat" is still interested only in money. Nothing else was touched. He got \$100 in the Adams' home, \$50 from each of two wallets. He extracted in the neighborhood of \$100 from Mr. Skelton's wallet and carefully tossed aside a larger amount of traveler's checks which were unsigned.

At the Skeltons' he took \$20 from Mr. Skelton's wallet, \$60 from Mrs. Skelton's purse and a quantity of quarters and half dollars from a box.

**Passed Up Goodies**

He passed up our solid gold toothpick and ear spoon, cast aside our genuine ivory elk's tooth watch fob ornament and our zippo lighter, but deftly nipped around 100 bucks out of our poke. And just before Christmas!

And as he vanished out of the front door, as usual, he didn't even have the courtesy to leave a note. "And to all, a good night."

The Rev. Dr. J. Clemens Kolb, rector of Christ Church, will present Mr. Whittemore for ordination. Mr. Ordway will be presented by the Rev. Bruce Cook, chaplain of Episcopal students at the University of Michigan. The preacher will be the Rev. Knud A. Larsen, executive secretary of the Youth Division of the Department of Christian Education of the Episcopal Church. The Rev. William Logan, Curate of Christ Church, Detroit, will be Litanist and the Rev. Henry W. Sherrill, Curate of Christ Church, Grosse Pointe, will read the Epistle.

Mr. Whittemore will continue to serve as a curate of Christ Church. He was born in Detroit when his father was Rector of Trinity Church. He is a graduate of Cranbrook School, Yale University, and the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Mass. During World War II, he served as commanding officer of an LST in the Pacific Theater.

Mr. Ordway is a native of Battle Creek and is Curate of St. Thomas Church in that city. Before graduating from the University of Michigan and the Episcopal Theological School, Mr. Ordway served as a B-17 pilot in the 8th Air Force operating out of England. He is married to the former Janet Hatch and has two small children.

### Seek Volunteers For Woods Club


And still the attendance grows! Where formerly it was reported in the Grosse Pointe News that the average attendance of the gym programs at Parcels school, sponsored by the Woods Community Club, was averaging 90 teen-age boys an evening, the figures for the month of November show that the average is now closer to 115.

Volunteers are still needed. Though the Community Club wishes to thank those fathers who have willingly helped when they have dropped in with their sons, volunteers who can attend regularly are badly needed both for Tuesday and Thursday nights. If you are a man who has had some training or experience in gymnasium programs and like boys, there is a place for you in the following scene.

Two modern gymnasiums at Parcels school . . . Either Mr. Herman Steinman of Trombly school or Mr. Edward Wernet of

Grosse Pointe High School in charge. In one gymnasium there will be a group of 60 younger boys playing a game like Dodge Ball, 30 boys to a side. Someone needs to be the official starter and stopper. One man for each side is needed to referee when a boy is "officially out." A fourth person can find a complete job in just checking the boys in and out of the gym.

In the second gym, 60 more boys in small groups under each basket trying to conduct a game or practice skills. At this point the directors can do no more than take the attendance and referee in the most important decisions. If there were at least four men present who knew the game of basketball, each basket could be supervised with the boys receiving guidance in increasing their ability and skill. A regular system of shooting could be established, guaranteeing fair and equal use of the equipment.

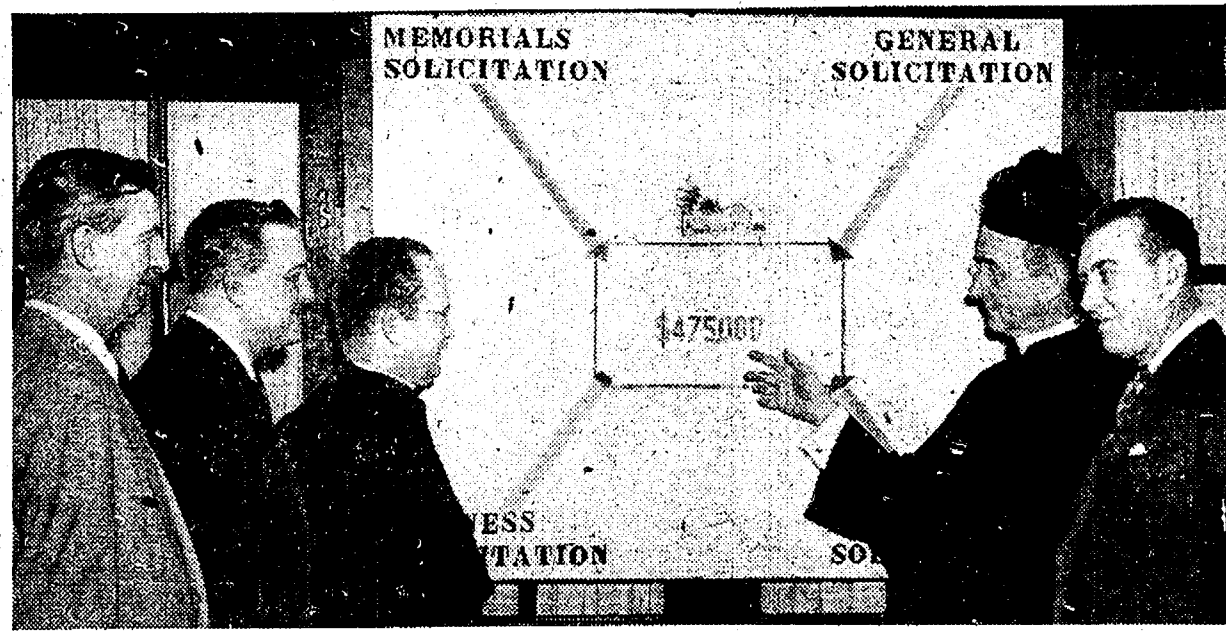
The damage to both cars was not extensive but expensive. Rose's Hudson had the right side caved in and the Galvin Cadillac had its front end smashed.

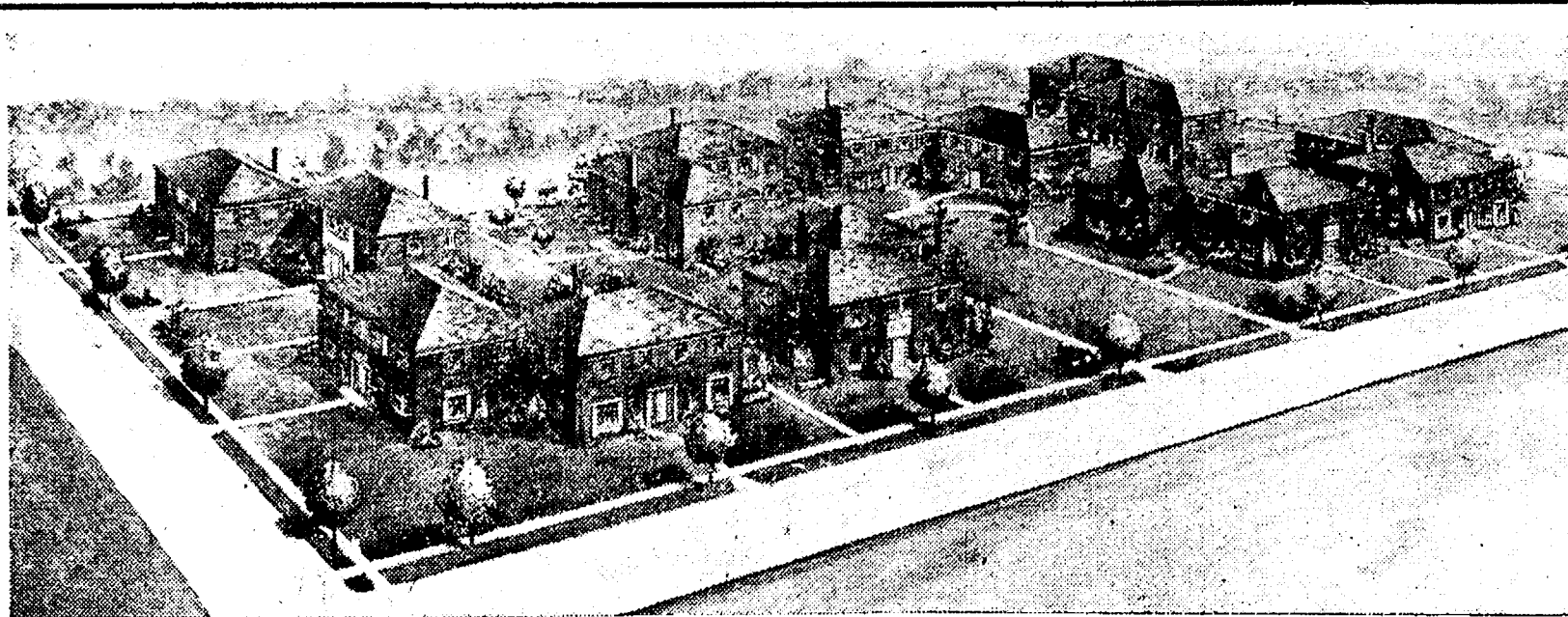

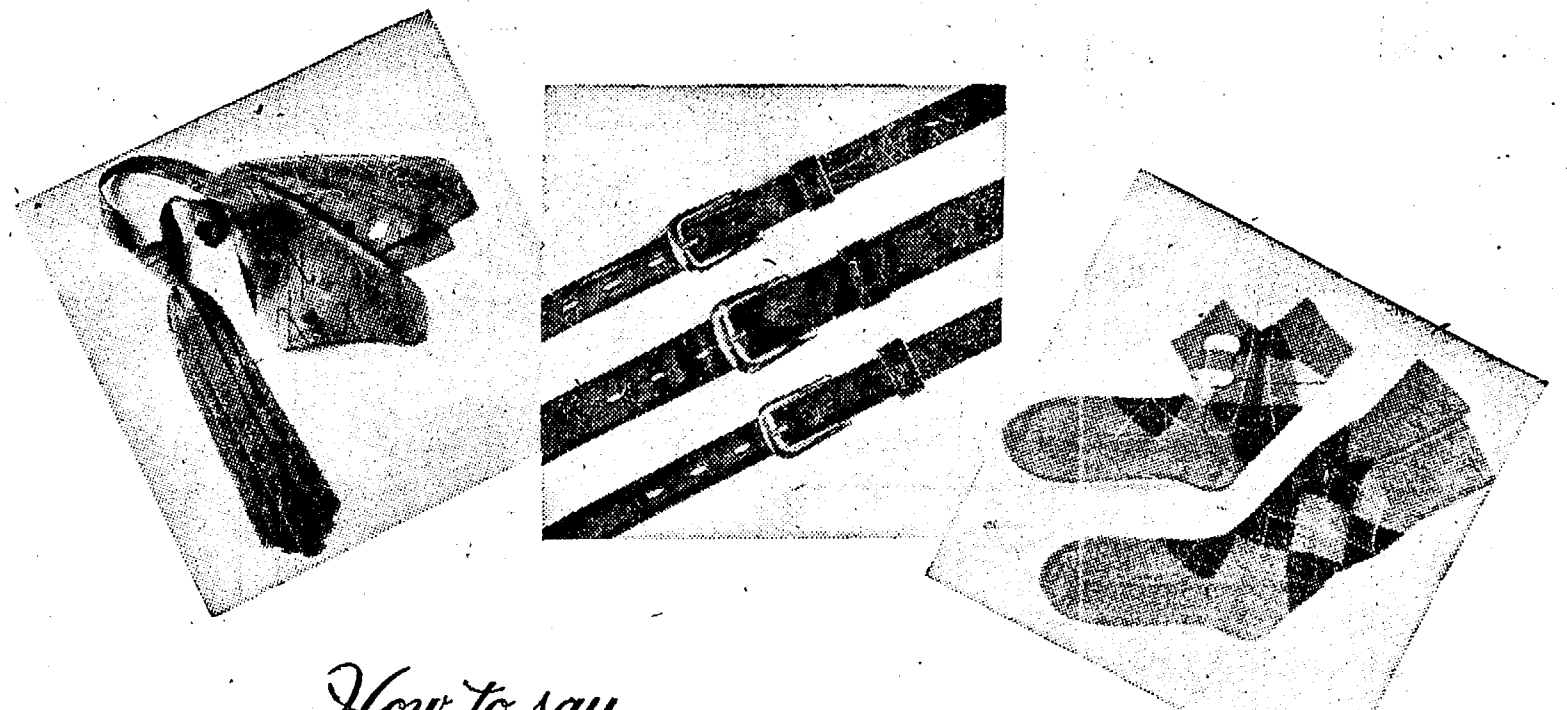

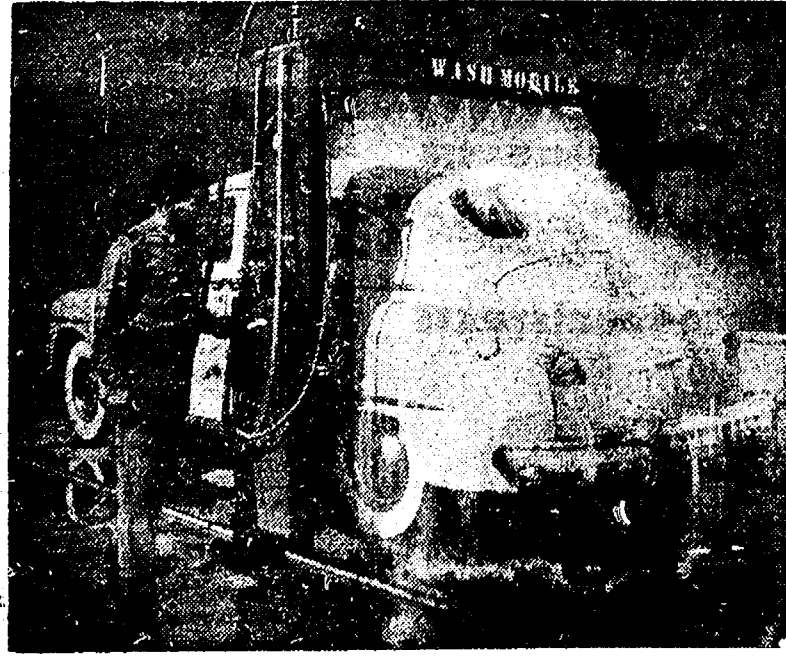

### GPHS Students Involved In Own Political Campaign

Grosse Pointe High School is now in the midst of its campaign for student offices.

Each semester elections are held to determine the Student Association government for the next half year.

Petitions were circulated by all candidates for the four major S.A. offices and the Senate.

Monday, January 7, is the date of the primary elections. On the following Friday the traditional campaign assembly, at which all finalists give campaign speeches, will be held in the boys' gym.

This assembly, with the entire school in attendance, is the scene of much waving of banners, loud vocal support of the candidates and parades. In general, the assembly approaches the atmosphere of a national political convention.

On the next Monday, January 14, the final elections will take place.

Student Association acts as the students' voice in solving their own problems.

The Student Association sells an S.A. ticket to the students at the beginning of each year to raise funds for its various activities.

These activities include helping to pay for the school's athletic program and putting on S.A. dances.

The school's Honor Court, which has jurisdiction over violators of student rules, and the Service Club, which enforces these rules (which are set up by the S.A.), are among the branches of the Student Association.

The four S.A. officers are: president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

The primary responsibility of the vice-president is taking charge of the Service Club.

The S.A. secretary must take minutes at all Senate meetings and act as the government's record keeper.

**Work of Visiting Teachers Praised by Voters' League**

Responding to public interest in special services to children in Grosse Pointe, the League of Women Voters has recommended recently that the present staff of visiting teachers in the Grosse Pointe Public Schools be expanded from two to four trained members. This recommendation together with others regarding services for children has been made directly by letter to the Board of Education.

The visiting teachers who are school social workers are members of the Department of Pupil Personnel of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools. Lynn M. Bartlett is the Director of the Department. The Department coordinates many of the special services for children which are provided by the Board of Education.

In addition to the recommendations made to the Board of Education, the League of Women Voters sponsored a group discussion on December 14 at the War Memorial Center on the topic, "Is Ours the Best Mental Health Program for Our Children?" The discussion was led by a panel which include Mr. Bartlett, Mrs. Ruth Hayes, Visiting Teacher; Mrs. Elizabeth Armstrong, Psychiatric Social Worker and Consultant at the Children's Center; Bernard Segner, District Supervisor of the Gratiot Office of the Family Service Society, and Mrs. Mary Gwynn, League of Women Voters State Chairman of Children's Services.

Visiting teachers are helping school children to be more successful and happier persons in their homes, at school, and in the community. Because visiting teachers work through the schools they share the responsibility for improving mental health of the child particularly with the child's parents and his teacher.

There are certain abilities all wish for their children—that they get the most out of their schooling, that they have friends of their own age with whom they have pleasant associations, that they accept and live under the rules of their homes, schools, and neighborhood. Many children at some time or other find it difficult to develop these abilities. Yet with some special attention the majority of these children can overcome their difficulties.

Visiting teachers see individual children in regularly scheduled interviews. Here the child can get more help from a specially trained person than it is usually possible for him to receive from his teacher in the group situation of the classroom.

In addition to seeing children, the visiting teacher has interviews with the child's parents in most instances. Parents are the most important persons in the life of the child. Visiting teachers recognize the need for seeking help from the parents when the child appears to be having difficulties in school or elsewhere. Parents contribute a great deal to helping the visiting teacher see a child through a trouble-

some situation. Through interviews with parents the difficulties which the child is having may be clarified and eventually understood, and some workable plan developed to help the child overcome them.

Visiting teachers keep in constant contact with the child's classroom teacher. Like the teacher, the teacher is able to help the child better and together they plan ways of improving the situation in school.

As well as seeing children, parents, and teachers, visiting teachers help families locate community resources outside the school system when necessary. This work brings the visiting teacher in contact with physicians health and welfare organizations, camps, and club groups in the community.

**Trim Evergreens For Decorations**

"If you enjoy evergreen trimmings for the holiday season you can kill two birds with one pruning, so to speak," says Joseph T. Cox, extension landscape specialist at Michigan State College.

"You can combine pruning operations on your lawn plantings with your search for holiday greens," he explains. This is an ideal time for pruning ornamental evergreens, since the needed and bread-leaved types are dormant at this time.

Arborvitae or Cedar, Pfitzer Juniper, Japanese Spreading Yew, Canadian Hemlock, Silver Red Cedar, Canaert Red Cedar and Common Juniper are among plants that may be pruned now. Spruce, pines and firs should not be pruned unless you want to remove branches or correct the shape of the plant.

Cox makes several suggestions for successfully pruning your ornamental evergreens. He ad-

vises removing any damaged or broken branches to the nearest normal part of the plant. Cut back branches that are giving the plant a lop-sided appearance.

Among other suggestions, Cox says to prune, making several

cuts at different heights. This will be easier and will result in a pruning job that won't be noticed by the casual observer. And don't try to do the whole job in one pruning. Leave some for next year's holiday season.

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

### Advice on Taking Movies At Home Offered by Expert

If your home includes growing children and your photographic equipment includes a motion picture camera, you are probably looking forward to getting an exciting record of the Christmas fun.

He warns that most people use too little light in capturing the scene. "If you try to get by with two photo-flood bulbs placed a few feet from the subject, you will get a glaring foreground and overexposed while the background will be lost in murky gloom. Remember that the background is bound to show. This being so, why not make it a really important feature of your Christmas movie? Let it show unmistakably as your home, your Christmas decoration."

"By and large," Davis advises, "if you have a fast enough lens, your lighting will be more effective if you use more and stronger bulbs, particularly if you place them farther from the subject or place them in such a way as to raise the general room illumination."

He warns that most amateurs have a tendency to "pan" excessively—the panning being the device of moving the camera to include a larger field than can be seen at any one fixed location. The resulting scene is often paced too slow or too fast or too jerky. A tripod can be a great help in obviating these difficulties, Davis says, as it will keep the image firm on the screen. "Remember, the movie camera is meant to record action. Let the subject create it."

If you are filming a scene, Davis suggests holding each scene for the length of time you would like to see it appear on the screen, or even a little longer. Scenes which are too short will not convey the impression you originally intended. Excess footage can always be cut out during the editing process.

"To create interest" and make the film move briskly, you will have to vary distance, angle and length of each scene. Try taking a few shots at very close range. You'll need tripod and tape-measure to make sure the scene is in focus. You can get within a few inches of your subject with portrait attachment," Davis reminds.

### Gift Wrapping Ideas Offered

Christmas gifts signify the joy of giving during the Holy Season. Gifts can better express the joy of Christmas when they are wrapped with care and imagination.

Marygrove art students give these suggestions in wrapping attractive presents for the family that will lend a decorative touch to your Christmas tree.

To do an effective wrapping job you will need the usual tools of colored paper and ribbons, and an addition of tinsel, cutout figures, tin foil, stars, angel hair, and "sparkle."

To wrap a square package, wind the ribbons so that it crosses in a corner and tie it in a large bow. Stick a candy cane or spring of holly into the bow. For variation, instead of ribbon, tie some packages with different colored tinsel and paste matching stars about the top of the package.

Add a festive touch to a large gift by doing it up in bright paper and ribbon, pasting a cut-out white paper snowman in one corner, and spreading a thin layer of glue around him. Sprinkle lightly with sparkle or artificial snow.

Give round gifts a holiday air by wrapping in colored cellophane gathered at the top and tied with silver tinsel. Silver stars or bells glued to the cellophane will give it that Christmas look.

Bulky presents don't have to be wrapped. Tie a perky bow with wide ribbon and drape it "blue ribbon style" across the side. To give it mystery, it may be loosely enveloped in Christmas paper, with the bow blued to the side.

Smaller gifts look best simply wrapped, so color combinations are most important here. Gold and red, green and silver, deep blue and cocoa, or red and chartreuse are some of the best wrapping combinations.

An imaginative gift wrapper can use all kinds of wrappings to dress up a package. White paper looks gay when tied with ribbon and tinsel twined together, with tiny decorations, (small balls or bells), tied to the bow with thread.

Tinsel has great possibilities in gift wrapping. Besides using it to tie packages and make bows, it can be used to "draw" outlines of bells, stars, or other simple Christmas symbols on flat gifts.

First, outline the picture with very small dabs of glue at short spaces, then press the tinsel down until it dries, forming an unusual effect. This type wrapping looks especially festive when done with plain, bright paper.

For that extra special gift, use your favorite wrappings, tying the ribbon into a flat knot instead of a bow, and paste a pleated doily over the knot. Make an angel figure by circling a tin-foil skirt around a cardboard angel cutout and glue it by the bottom of the skirt to the doily so that the angel stands up.

Be careful to pleat the doily around the outside of the skirt, or the angel won't stick. Angel hair, always a favorite holiday trimming, may be glued to the using very small amounts of glue. Vary this wrapping by using snowmen, carollers or Christmas tree cutouts pasted flat over a wisp of angel hair instead of the angel figure, on top of the package.

There is no end to the different effects which can be achieved by varying color combinations and traditional Christmas trimmings in wrapping your gifts to please the eye on Christmas morning.

### Holiday Candy Making Advice

Your family and your friends get more than food out of the homemade candies of holidays. Lasting memories are built for children as they watch the candy cooking and finally "scrape the bowl."

That is all good—but the candy can be good, too! Poor candy is not only disappointing to those who make it but it represents a poor investment in money and time.

If you want very fine crystals in your fudge, fondant, or penoche consider these suggestions offered by Dr. Pauline Paul of the food and nutrition department of Michigan State College.

Avoid stirring the mixture after the sugar is dissolved.

Avoid letting crystals form on the sides of the pan during cooking. Simplest way to remove these is to cover the pan closely for a short time, allowing the steam to dissolve all crystals. Watch carefully so the candy doesn't boil over while covered.

Avoid shaking or moving the candy while it's cooking.

Four the candy from the pan without scraping to avoid crystallization. Even one crystal of sugar will start a chain of crystals causing the whole mass to granulate.

Add acids such as vinegar, cream of tartar or lemon juice to hinder crystallization. If hard water seems to neutralize some of the acid you may substitute corn syrup, using one tablespoon to one cup of sugar. If you use vinegar or lemon juice, the proportion is one-half teaspoon to one cup of sugar. But use less of the cream of tartar—one-sixteenth of teaspoon.

**AFTER HITTING** three below zero for a new record for the date Sunday, the mercury again hit two below yesterday before a new snow storm started as evening approached. Snowed all night and Detroit awoke under an additional six to seven inches. Rising temperatures to sag again tonight to near zero mark.

**REDS AGREE** to identify their prisoners, thus ending one dead-end in the Korean peace negotiations. But world is stunned to hear only 3100 prisoners are being held. About 11,000 Americans alone are listed as missing and were thought to be prisoners. Had been rumors that thousands of American prisoners had been murdered by the Reds.

Reaching 17 yesterday, he immediately reenlisted. Says he "never had it so good." He saved \$1700 while on his first hitch. He could retire at 34 with 20 years of army service behind him.

**LAST CARGO VESSEL**, the ice-coated freighter Hagarty, locked through the Soo Sunday to close the 1951 shipping season.

**WORST AIR TRAGEDY** of year and second worst in American aviation history took 56 lives yesterday. Two engined C-46 non-scheduled airliner carrying persons to vacation in Florida crashed on river bank dotted with homes and warehouses at Elizabeth, N.J. One engine caught fire shortly after takeoff from Newark. Seemed to explode just before wing fell off. All aboard killed.

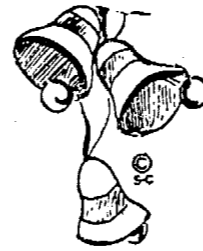

### JELLIED CRANBERRY AND ORANGE RELISH

Put through food chopper, using medium blade:

2 cups of fresh cranberries  
1 fresh orange,  
Add 1 cup of sugar and put aside.

Pour 1 cup of hot water over a package of lemon gelatine and then add 1 cup of cold water. When gelatine begins to thicken add the cranberry mixture, pour into mold and place in refrigerator to stiffen.

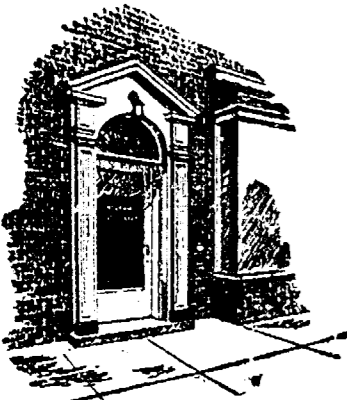
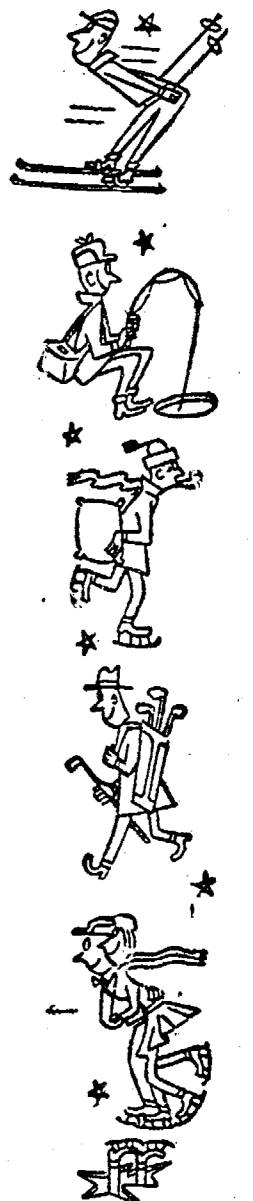
