### Fireworks Display To Climax Woods' Jubilee Program

Six-day anniversary celebration started last Sunday with big parade and address by Mayor Paul Rowe.

Crowds jammed a two-mile stretch along Mack avenue last Sunday afternoon to watch the pageantry of a parade stream by that marked the opening of Grosse Pointe Woods' six-day silver anniversary celebration. Clowns, Detroit Mounted Police, lines of banneted cars, and the city's fire trucks with sirens blaring followed the 10th Air Squadron Band of Selfridge Field from Moross road past the reviewing stands next to the municipal building.

From a sound car in front of the stands Mayor Paul Rowe gave a short opening speech on a hot day. He cited the tremendous growth of the city during the 25 years since its incorporation as a village with a few hundred residents and a vast expanse of undeveloped land.

He credited "... the developers and builders to whose broad vision are due the streets, homes and commercial buildings that have come since and to the succession of elected and appointed city officials who... patterned Grosse Pointe Woods into the East Side's most desirable residential community."

Mayor Rowe continued with a description of the improved network of streets, the lake-front and inland parks, and numerous other community developments.

He remarked about the school system, one of the finest in Michigan, and commended the "many good citizens (who) have given of their time to foster and develop youth movements... to the end that our children may become the good American citizens that we know they will be."

He concluded with the proclamation that officially opened the week-long celebration, which will be climaxed by a fireworks display Friday at the Parcels School. The Grosse Pointe Kiwanis Club is sponsoring the elaborate Fourth of July program which will include all kinds of games and contests. All are invited to attend.

### Minor Easterly Puff Shows What Could Happen If Lake Is Subjected to Real Blow

The Grosse Pointe Flood Committee met last Tuesday to hear a resume of the flood threat that has lapped at the Pointe shoreline since the heavy storm damage during the last weekend of March.

The Lake Survey Office had reported the average elevation during the latter part of June to have been 577.4 feet, a very slight increase over the May average of 577.38 feet.

**Issue Warning**

More than a foot under the predicted record high of 578.8, the comparatively stable levels during the past month have led some observers to believe that the danger point has passed. However, authorities have warned that unexpected deluges may change the picture very suddenly.

The high and persistent winds of the first days of this week are indications that the threat of destruction has not passed entirely.

**Pile up Refuse**

The seas drove refuse onto properties all along the lake front. The park pools in the City of Grosse Pointe and Grosse Pointe Park were filled with debris. They now must be drained and cleaned before swimming is again permitted.

### Business Group Plans Vote Drive

Concerned with the apathy of Grosse Pointers toward voting at election time, the Grosse Pointe Businessmen's Association has launched a concerted campaign to get every registered voter to the polls on Primary Election day, August 5, and on general election day, November 4.

In announcing the plans for the election campaign, S. Willard Hosking, of the National Bank of Detroit, Jefferson-Phillip branch, and president of the association, said Albert J. DeRiemacker, vice-president and cashier of the Grosse Pointe Bank, and Lawrence W. Korte of Korte Home Appliance, have been named co-chairmen of the association's committee handling details for the campaign.

"The complacency of Pointers toward voting is appalling," Hosking said. "Evidence of this is seen in the fact that during ordinary elections only 45 per cent of the registered voters care enough to vote, while in a presidential election it's a tough job to get the percentage up to 55 per cent."

"We plan on waging an intensive campaign that will extend into every corner of every Grosse Pointe community. Registrations are at a record level. Now the important thing is to get these

### Residents Urged to Donate To Memorial Center Drive

The direct mail solicitation for annual donations to the War Memorial Center, which was launched last week, had netted 179 contributions totaling \$2,990.91 by Tuesday afternoon.

Last year some 2,200 Pointe families gave donations and signed pledges indicating they were willing to make annual contributions for the operation and maintenance of the Center. All residents are being solicited in this drive and it is hoped many more annual contributors will be added to the list.

The goal is the same as last year, \$18,000, which is required to make up the difference between estimated income and the \$58,000 budget under which the Center operates.

The \$18,000 is the minimum requirement to maintain the same sort of program which has been offered by the Center during the last year. Any amount received over the \$18,000 could be applied to an enlarged program or added facilities to serve the community.

All residents are urged to make a prompt response to the plea for financial support for this Pointe institution which is doing so much for so many. The Center is for all the residents. Last year there were 953 group meetings held there, with more than 36,777 persons attending.

### Durant Discusses Reapportionment

Before the Minute Women, on Friday, June 27 at the Neighborhood Club, Richard Durant, Republican nominee for Congress from the 14th Congressional District in 1950 and running for re-nomination this year, spoke on the subject of the reapportionment plans now being circulated throughout the state.

Although a staunch Republican, Durant spoke on a non-partisan subject before a non-partisan group. In fact, he stated the problem of adequate representation in Lansing was in danger of becoming a partisan, pressure group affair; the only solution was to examine it on a factual basis without the injection of petty politics that one group was trying to bring in.

Pointing out that the Senate had not been rearranged since 1925, and the House since 1943, Durant showed how certain sections of the state were virtually disenfranchised by the present system of representation. "Unfortunately," he said, "our present Constitution is ambiguous in the terms it uses; provides no means for enforcing its provisions; and sets up requirements that are unattainable."

"For example, considered separately, the constitution provisions regarding the House seem simple enough. But when all are considered together—the monetary clause, the use of size of the House in determining the ratio of representation, and the limit of 100 members—those three factors make an equitable apportionment impossible. Some areas inescapably must be under-represented."

Discussing the differences between the "balanced plan" and the CIO plan, Durant pointed out that the latter makes everything depend on population without giving any check or balance to the two houses, and in addition sets up such rigid requirements in the Constitution that it is only a matter of time before "it becomes mathematically certain that it will be mathematically impossible" to have equitable representation even on a straight population basis.

"The balanced plan," he remarked, "gives recognition to the fact that one house should act as a check to the other—the same plan followed in our Federal Government; but it freezes the present Senatorial Districts (plus the addition of two more to Oakland and Macomb Counties) into the Constitution without giving any flexibility to it at all."

A question-and-answer period followed Durant's talk.

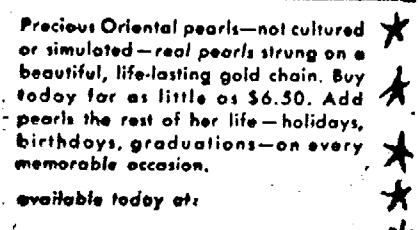
The police report said that Wood had slowed to about 30 miles an hour, and the other car had begun to turn at about 10 miles an hour.





Called to order at 8:00 P.M.  
Present on roll call: Mayor William F. Connolly, Jr., Councilmen Daniel W. Goodenough, William G. Kirby, Richard L. Maxon, Neil S. McEachin and George L. Schlaepfer.  
Absent: Councilman John M. S. Hutchinson.  
Mayor William F. Connolly, Jr. presided.  
A petition of residents on Muir Road between Kercheval Avenue and Ridge Road, requesting relief from noise and smoke from the recently constructed Cottage Hospital power plant, was read. Residents were heard and the Council adopted a resolution ordering the nuisance abated.  
Further consideration of the proposed fence ordinance was given.  
After considering the request of the proprietor of the Hightlight Market, 18330 Mack Avenue, for permission to erect a projecting sign from his store building, it was unanimously agreed that permission should not be granted.  
A petition of residents on Ridgmont Road at Kercheval, requesting that the opening of Ridgmont Road be barricaded pending completion of the improvements, was tabled.  
Final checks for the late Mr. Henry R. Maurer's services were approved.  
The request of the Grosse Pointe Property Owners Association, for the names from the water billing records of the City, was denied.  
Resignations of Police Officers Camiel Dehaveloose and Stanley E. Ainsley were accepted.  
Patrolman William G. E. Worthing, Jr. was confirmed as a regular patrolman.  
The Chief of Police was authorized to attend the Michigan Association of Police Chief Conference to be held at Harbor Springs on July 7th, 8th and 9th.  
The Grosse Pointe Garden Club extended thanks to the Council for the City's cooperation in the recent clean-up campaign.  
Authorization was provided to spend approximately \$2,500.00 to raise the floors in the bathhouse facilities at the Pier to eliminate unsanitary conditions due to high water.

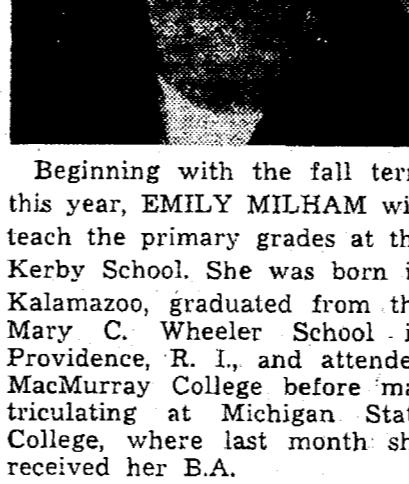
