Budding Journalist Writes Of Life In Canadian Woods

Late in the spring, the News was approached by a 14-year-old boy who was interested in writing a series of articles describing his camp experiences. The News, always anxious to encourage any prospective journalist, invited him to submit his articles and the first appears below, prefaced by the accompanying letter:
Dear Mr. Edgar:—
I have written the Department of Lands in Toronto for physical information about Canada. This will be used from time to time when in my series of camp articles additional explanation is needed about the terrain, lakes, etc. Mostly my series will consist of human interest stuff—probably interesting camp experiences. Keewaydin being a

canoe camp, I will probably devote much time on canoeing, the art of it in Canadian waters, and interesting experiences some of the people up here encounter while in a canoe.
There is much wild life up here as you might suspect. For that reason I will devote probably one article on wild life and the frequent encounters we have with bear, caribou, moose, deer, elk, fish and the like.
Then I will probably summarize one of our most exciting canoe trips which run from 12 to 14 days each.
I always find my trouble as far as serials are concerned in the opening article and the closing article. However, in this case I will tell about the type of life one would lead here in the North Woods and I will tell a little about the type of terrain one would find here.
In other words, just about the overall life here in northern Ontario. As far as the closing article is concerned I will tell about the conservation of the forestland and crystal clear sparkling lakes and rivers that make up the heritage of Canada.
I will submit a series of articles that will cover the material mentioned on the page that you just read. Enclosed herewith is the first article, entitled "About the Canadian Bush Land."

The first article by the son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Stroh of Lewiston road, now at Keewaydin Camp on Lake Timagami, follows:—
"About the Canadian Bush"
I am right now in Northern Ontario. I am deep in the wilds, deep in the North Woods. The nearest licensed surgeon is about 35 miles away by boat in a little town by the name of Timagami. Around me there are thousands upon thousands of acres of forest land that yet has to be touched by the hand of civilization. There are crystal clear lakes, clean and cold, stocked with bass, northern pike, pickerel, and dore. There are rapid running streams in which lurk record breaking brook and speckled trout.
I am in a section of Canada that cannot be surpassed or even equalled in beauty. Northern Ontario, in the Lake Timagami area, is still lived in only by a few white people who own islands and who own and operate summer camps. The Ojibway Indians who in former days were part of the Algonquin tribe still inhabit the forests of this region just as their ancestors did some two hundred years ago.
The beautiful woodlands of the Timagami region are almost exactly as they were when Indian raids were common occurrences. The splendorous Northern Pine still reach their peaks into the sky forming a spectacle that one can see only in Canada.
The old-timers and Indians call this the bush. It is well named. Though the forests are unmatched in beauty when viewed from across the lake, it is a different story when one is making a portage. The bush is almost too thick. Infested with mosquitoes and black flies the interior of the forests, or as the old-timers say, the bush, becomes the one and only part of the Northland that isn't very popular with the older folk. A woodsman, though, will tell you that it is a lot of fun, and what's more one gets a certain feeling of satisfaction when sitting around a roaring camp fire after a day in the bush eating the contribution he gave to the day's catch.

Detroit born, **ROBERT KEY**, attended the public schools of Keego Harbor, Michigan, and is now receiving his Bachelor of Science



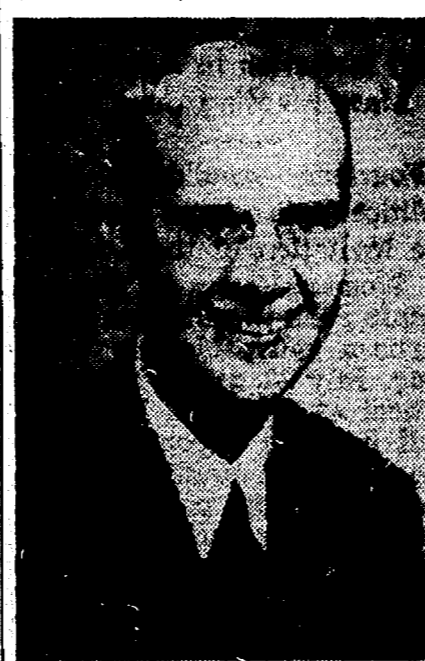
degree at Michigan State Normal College. He will teach the fifth grade at the Poupard School beginning with the fall term this year.

HAROLD VAN DEEST was born in Iowa and attended his public schools. He received his

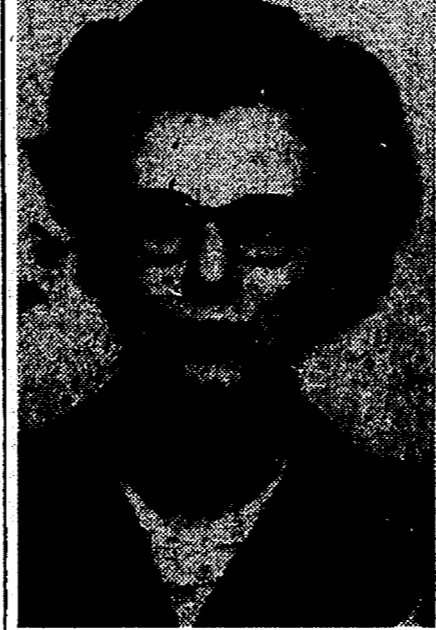


Bachelor of Science degree from Eastern Illinois State College and

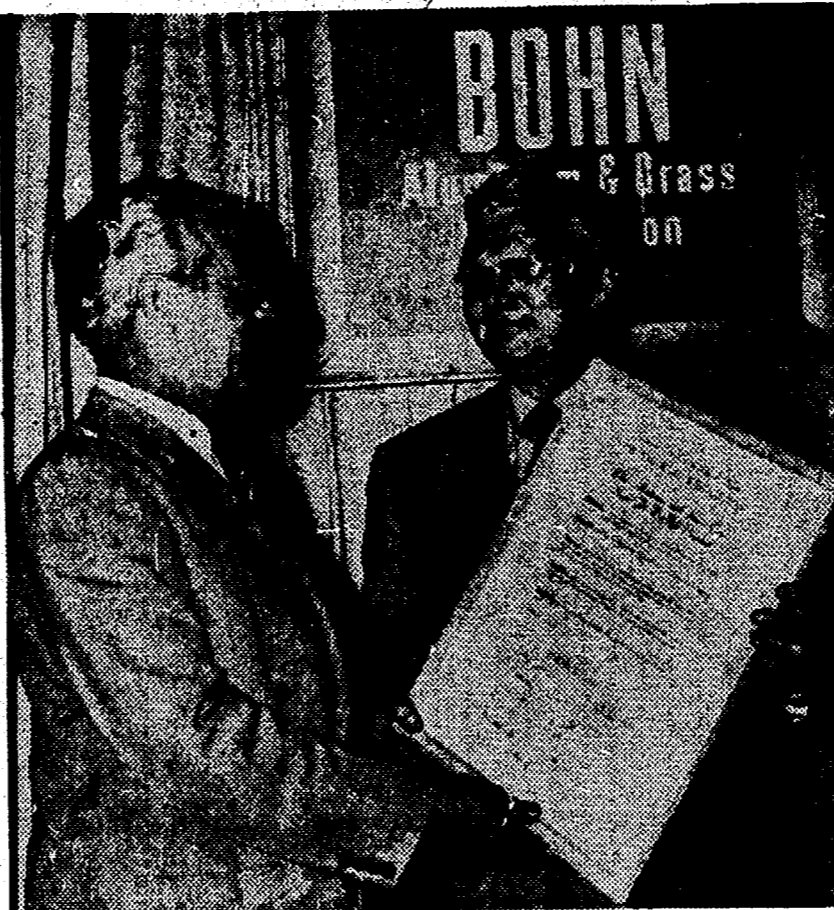

If he can get away from his job with General Eisenhower, we know he'll do it, because he is definitely in Fred Alger's corner."

expense entailed in clearing and surfacing the parking lots.

Argue Over Pier
There was more than a little argument about the proposed pier, which will be constructed of steel and concrete. Councilman Sidney Morgan felt that boat mooring might be dispensed with, just leaving an enclosed swimming area.

The majority of the council members and the Citizens Committee argued that boat owners had just as much right to consideration as the swimmers, and pointed out that the outer sections of the proposed pier would be used by non-boat owners for sun bathing, fishing, swimming and promenading.

Committee Recommendation
The Citizens' Committee held

a brief meeting of its own in another room of the Municipal Building and came back with a recommendation that the outer sections of the dock need not be so elaborate as originally planned, and that by saving here, more facilities might be provided for more boats.

The proposed dock would project out into the lake for 500 feet. The bond issue would also provide for the cost of putting a new sandy bottom in the wading pool and the purchase of additional facilities such as benches, tables and barbecue grills in the park.

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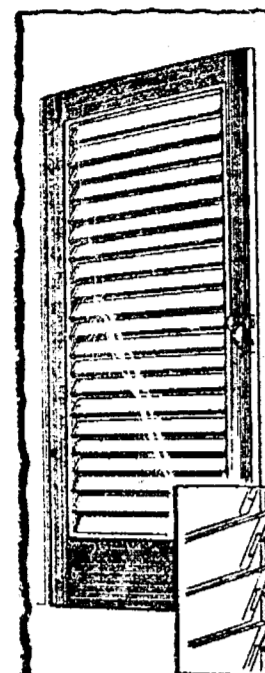

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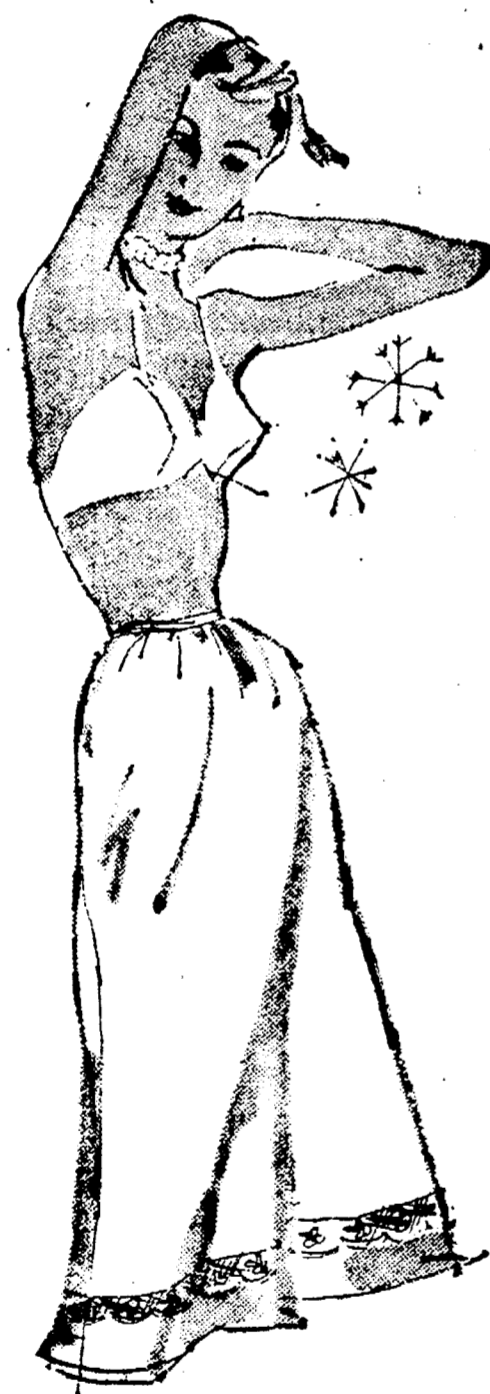
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Police Arrest Youth in Fight

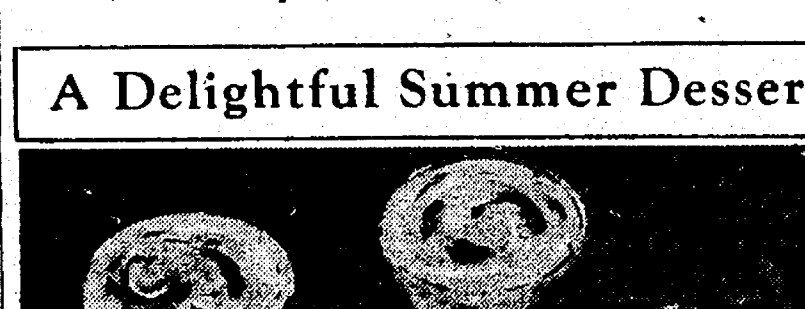

We have news for awed mamas and papas who hover outside the nursery door while their toddlers discuss nuclear fission.

One of the persons directly responsible for all this brilliance in those offsprings has arrived to live in Grosse Pointe.

She's slight, pretty, silver-thatched and brilliant Josephine van Dolzen Pease whose educational books for children are top sellers across the United States.

What's more her book, "This is the World" has recently been translated into German and Austrian and is being sent to children in those countries in the educational program of the United States War Department.

Her books have been transcribed into braille and made into film to be thrown on the ceiling for bed-ridden children.

She and her life-long friend, Miss Edith Thompson, came to the Pointe from Chicago a brief two months ago. Miss Pease was born in Ypsilanti (her grandfather founded the conservatory at Michigan State Normal College) but after graduation from MSNC she left to teach in other states.

Sentimental Reasons And although this is the first time she's lived right here, there were many things to make Grosse Pointe a natural choice. She has a niece in Indian Village (Mrs. Read Hartz); a sister in Detroit (Mrs. Charles King, teacher at Goldberg School); and she is also a cousin of Mrs. Hiram Walker of the Pointe.

Then she likes to remember that her very first bit of literary work to be accepted was published in the Detroit Free Press when she was just 10 years old. Her school teacher sent it in to the paper's children's page. It was a Greek myth—re-written.

When we visited Miss Pease and Miss Thompson the other evening, their home seemed just perfect for the author of children's books. It is an old carriage house set far back in the lane. In the moonlight, its wooded approach and the quaintness of the carriage house make you turn around to see if Goldilocks could be right in back of you.

Informative Books At the door to greet us was the Rand McNally children's book author, quick to tell us that we probably wouldn't find The Three Bears, Snow White, Red Riding Hood et al in her gardens. As we stated earlier, her books lean more to the educational. "This Is the World," for instance, teaches that people are

SUMMER PIE SPECIAL

Lemon or lime chiffon pie is an appetizing finish for a hot weather meal.

- 1 tbsp. gelatin for a firm filling (or 2 tps. for a fluffier filling or for use with small eggs. 1/4 cup cold water. 3 eggs, separated 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup unstrained lemon or lime juice 1/2 tsp. grated lemon or lime rind 1/4 tsp. salt (a few drops of green coloring for lime pie 9-inch baked pastry shell or a graham cracker shell

To make: Sprinkle gelatin on water and soak a few minutes. Beat egg yolks slightly, and add half the water and the lemon or lime juice and rind. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until thick. Add softened gelatin to the hot egg mixture; stir until dissolved. (Mix in the coloring for lime pie.) Cool until thick but not set. Add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff. Add rest of sugar slowly, beating constantly. Then blend with the cooled gelatin mixture. Pour into the pie shell and chill. Keep cold until served.

Graham-cracker shell, which requires no baking and is easy to make, is a good choice for this summer pie. Ingredients: 15 graham crackers; 1/2 cup melted table fat; 1/2 cup sugar. To make: Roll crackers fine. Mix with other ingredients. Turn into pie pan and pat into a solid smooth shell.

COOKING HINT

Much of the food value of carrots is directly beneath the skin, so prepare for the table by washing in warm water and scrubbing with a brush, rather than paring, urge Michigan State College nutritionists.
