The only Democrat running in the Park is William A. LaBonty.

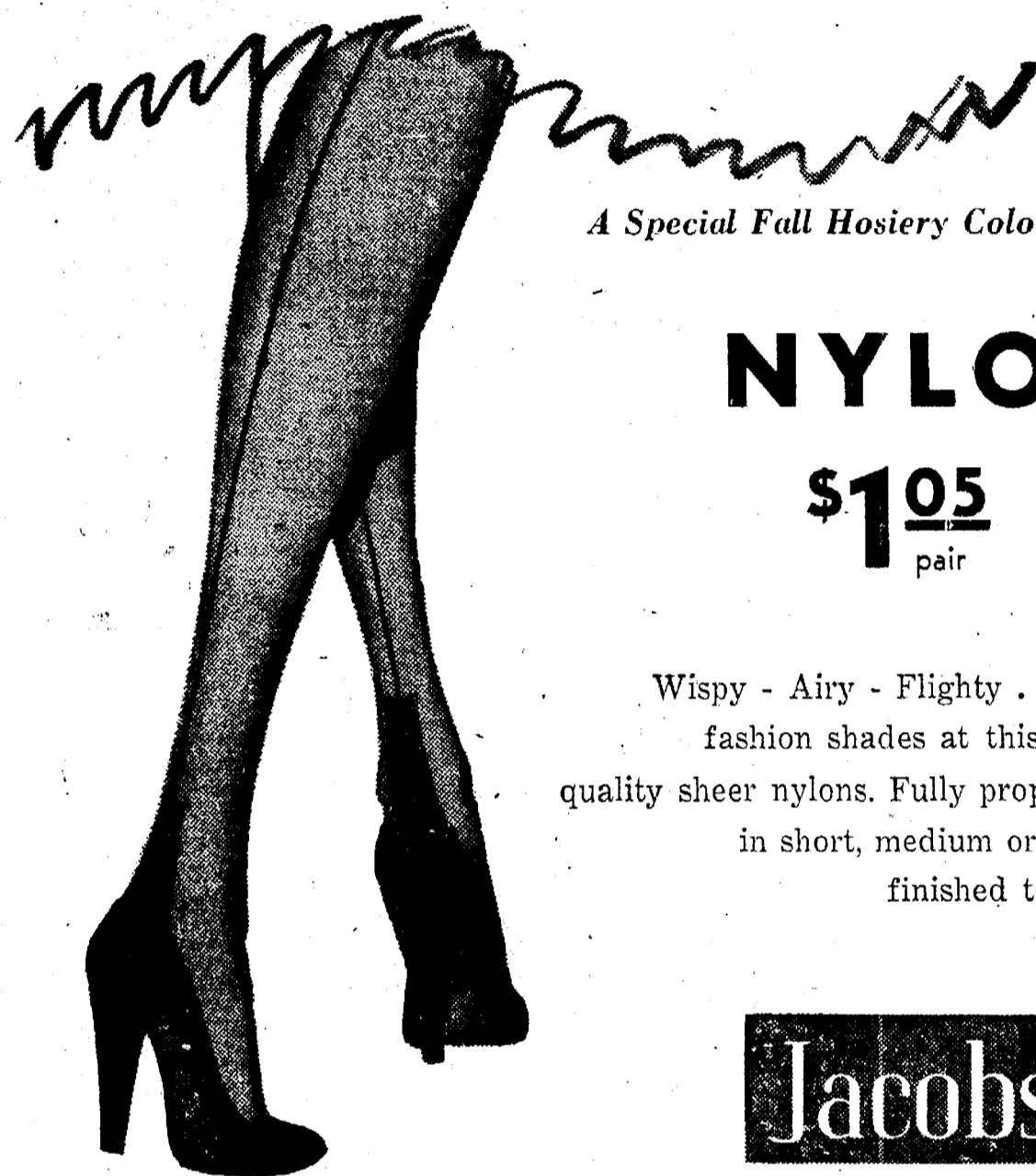
In the City of Grosse Pointe, William M. Adams, J. Cullen Kennedy and Daisy C. Worden are running on the Republican ticket.

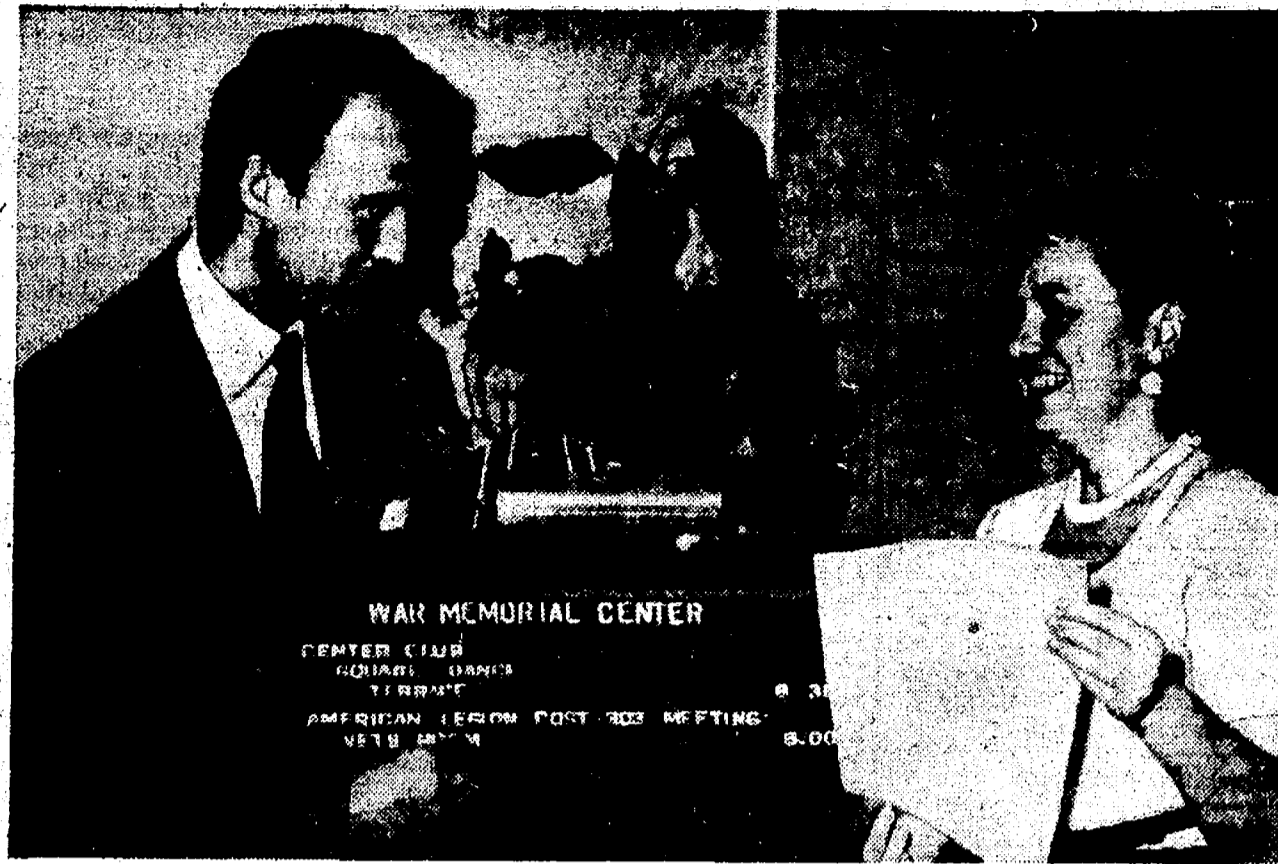

Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center reached into the staff of GP High School to find the young and personable executive director who is to assume this new office Sept. 1.

He is John W. Lake of Lancaster road who, with his mother, Mrs. Markley B. Lake, came to the Pointe just five years ago to teach history at the high school.

Before that the Lake home was in Webster Grove, just outside St. Louis, Mo., and Mr. Lake will stand no more nonsense about raising the hands in horror to say, "Oh, my! St. Louis. It gets so HOT there."

He taught history to young St. Louisians prior to a four year stint in the coast artillery, air defense command, attached to the Ninth Army during World War II.
