The Farms Council, at a meeting Monday night, authorized the drive to the aid of 8-year-old spraying of elms within a quarter mile radius of the infected trees Mike, the son of Mr. and Mrs. in that city, to be done immedi-George Van Lokeren, of 725 ately at the city's expense. It is estimated this will cost approximately \$1300, based on 2400 trees to be sprayed at the rate of 200 trees per day at \$13 per hour for

labor and equipment. The Farms has plenty of material on hand, left over from the spring spraying. The city has an item of \$5,000 in its present bud-

get for this type of work. The Grosse Pointe Property Owners Association is now considering a plan whereby property owners may have their Elms sprayed by the city-employed teams as they move through the communities. Authorities have advised that all Elms within onequarter of a mile radius of an infected area be sprayed as a more positive means of protection against the spread of the disease.

There was a deal of involved discussion at Monday night's meeting having to do with decibels, which is the usual accepted standard of measurement for sound. An engineer from Chicago, representing the company which sold the heating equipment, testified that the ordinary residential neighborhood has a 40 decibel background of noise. But it seems that the neighborhood in the immediate vicinity of the hospital is no ordinary one and it has a background of noise that only measures 20 some decibels. So when the new heating plant was installed, creating a noise of some 55 decibels, the contrast to the former peace and quiet was a be sold to the boy. bit more than pronounced. It was enough to produce sleepless nightmares.

One cannot help but ask why the heating engineers, or the architects, or the general contractor, didn't get out their measuring gadgets and determine this noise background and installed.

The Farms council has now decreed that the hospital will not be allowed to use its new addition until the nuisances will be the judge about this.

one detail of the recommended methods of correction. It has been agreed that the stack on the new heating plant must be elevated to a height of 80 feet, which will let the smoke and fumes be dissipated to a great degree before descending on the surrounding neighborhood.

The hospital proposes to erect a steel stack. The residents, very outspokenly, want a brick stack, claiming that a steel stack will make the neighborhood look like an indus-trial area and will depreciate the value of their properties. The steel stack would cost some six or seven thousand dollars less than a brick stack and could be built in a much shorter time. The hospital pleads lack of funds and wants to build the steel stack.

Mayor William Connolly refused to become partisan in of the agriculture events prothis argument. He said he did not believe the city has the right to dictate as to the material used in a heating plant stack. George Parker, of Lewiston road, took exception and stated he believed the council had every right to pass an ordinance governing such a problem. He argued for the aesthetic value as well as property value and pressed his point to the extent of getting Mayor Connolly to request City Attorney Long to produce an opinion on the matter.

A shudder ran through the council members as one outspoken woman asked how that august body could consider a steel smoke stack 80 feet high when it was already so perturbed about fences which can be eight feet high at the most. (The council has been wrestling with a new fence ordinance for months.)

We cast our vote with Mr. Parker and the brick stack faction. Our aesthetic senses revolt against an 80-foot steel stack on this property which adjoins one of the finest residential areas in the Pointe. It is a small enough concession to make to these neighbors who have been subjected to not only the rigors of an abnormally hot season, but the battle against two unexpected foes to needed rest and comfort, smoke and noise.
