

While on our trips the canoe is the most important part of our equipment, for without it we would be stranded somewhere without any means of travel.

The campers at Keewaydin are not the only ones whose livelihood and welfare in the bush depends upon the canoe and of course the operation of it.

Wake up Great! There are many people who live up here either on islands or on the mainland, who have canoes as their only means of travel. Such people would be at a loss without it.

On our canoe trips we usually find out if we can handle a cance while shooting rapids that we frequently encounter in the many rivers of this territory. The peoole in the canoes who get through the rapids can generally consider themselves capable canoeists. Anyone can paddle in open water, but going through a good stretch of fast water is different.



The City had a debt of \$1,800,-000 back in the depression years of the early 1930's when a dollar was worth a dollar and some of the officials state the belief that it would be much easier now to pay off even the possible \$2,200,-100 debt than it was then.

Probable Plan While complete details for the proposed bond issue of \$260,000 have not yet been worked out, the plan will undoubtedly be to pay off this debt at the rate of \$10,000 per year from 1953 to 1973 inclusive. The last four blocks of bonds of \$15,000 each will probably be callable on the interest dates.

It has been estimated this proposed bond issue would cost about 70 cents per thousand dollars of valuation. The assessed valuation of the average home in the City was reported to be \$8.-000, which would mean the average taxpayer would have to pay \$5.60 per year or \$140 for the 25

EMILE BISCHOFBERGER, MANAGER OF THE GROSSE POINTE CLUB

You have to get up early in the morning for a chat with Emile Bischofberger, manager of the fashionable Grosse apple pie, which last week he told Pointe Club.

Guests for Lunch

It was over a cup of early morning coffee at the Butcher's Inn, that Bohemian haunt of butchers, farmers and wholesale grocers, that we begged from him four menus for readers of Grosse Pointe News.

For a party luncheon he sug-

gested: Consomme Florida Celery Green Olives

Breast of Chicken Sylvester Brolled Tomatoes with Zuchinni
Sweet Potatoes Bennett
Julienne of Curumber Salad
Hot Buttered Rolls
Canteloupe Ring

The breasts of chicken are dipped in flour and then in egg and are fried to a golden brown. Next they are masked with mushroom puree (sauteed mushrooms put through a sieve and mixed with just enough cream to form a paste). These are placed in a roaster and tenderized in the oven for 20 more minutes. When served, they are garnished with broiled bananas (and Emile warns never to overcook fruit), baked fresh peach halves (dip peaches in grapefruit juice a few moments and they won't turn brown) and broiled pineapple ring.

Consumme Florida is made by using half clear green turtle soup and half clear chicken gumbo.

The boiled sweet potatoes are cut in slices, almost an inch thick, then French fried and finally placed in a baking dish and covered with maple syrup and cider. Each slice is topped with a whole marron. Cut tomato slices an inch thick for broiling, top with zuchinni which has-been sliced and

sauteed with shallots. Emile likes to use an oil dressing, spiked with lime juice on his julienne of cucumber salad which is served in a crisp lettuce cup. And the cantaloupe ring is centered with vanilla ice cream. Fresh raspberries and Kirshwas-

ser should be passed. Friandise are super super petit fours, their delicately tinted icings flavored with finest liquers.
