enough, to necessitate the elimination of any connotations "park" might bring to the collective mind of the jury.

Along with the semantic gymnastics that councilmen twisted through, they were faced with divergent opinions on whether or not the properties should be purchased without first condemning.

One faction saw the possibility that the jury, with knowledge of the fact that present zoning restrictions governing the area in question (zoned against all but single-family dwellings) may be permanently invalidated when the deed restrictions run out in 1967, would value the properties at higher rates than the city could pay. Some felt the ordinance could be defeated at that time, with the possibility that the land would be rezoned for business construction, thus greatly increasing its value.

To buy the properties now might avoid additional expense resulting from a judicial decision as to their value.

Jury Must Decide

The jury must decide the market value. Hettler stated that testimony by realtors would reduce the awards to the property owners to approximately \$5,000.

Some owners are asking \$6,000 to \$10,000, and one is demanding \$65,000. Any formal offer at this time of over \$5,000, he added, would hurt the chances of a decision favorable to the city.

Should the case be defeated, the project may be dropped.

American delegation on the four-power Austrian Treaty Commission and was deputy to Secretary of State George Marshall. He was also a member of the American delegation at the London meeting of the Council of Foreign Ministers.

He became financial advisor to Gen. Douglas MacArthur in Japan in 1949, after touring the Far East.

Key Figure

Dodge thus was a key figure in untangling the scrambled economies of both post-war Japan and Germany.

He advocated that Japan be self-supporting. He was a member of the United States delegation to the Japanese Peace Conference in 1951.

Dodge is a former president of the American Bankers' Association, the Michigan Bankers Association and the Association of Reserve City Bankers. He was a director of the RFC's Detroit branch.

He is a director of several industrial and insurance corporations and Chrysler Corp.

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

Report Reveals Farms' Growth

Grosse Pointe Farms issued 14 building permits during October, revealed last week. Murray M. Smith, city engineer, stated that the total value of the permits reached \$197,300.

These permits raised the total issued since the first of the year to 225, of which 225 are assessable. The total assessable value was increased to \$3,420,862. Of the permits approved during October, 7 were for residences. Assessable values ranged from \$17,000 to \$40,000. The combined value was reported to be \$190,000.

The remainder were issued for miscellaneous construction, with a total value of \$7,300.

Smith stated that since January 1, 118 residence permits, 99 miscellaneous building permits and 8 business permits have been issued.

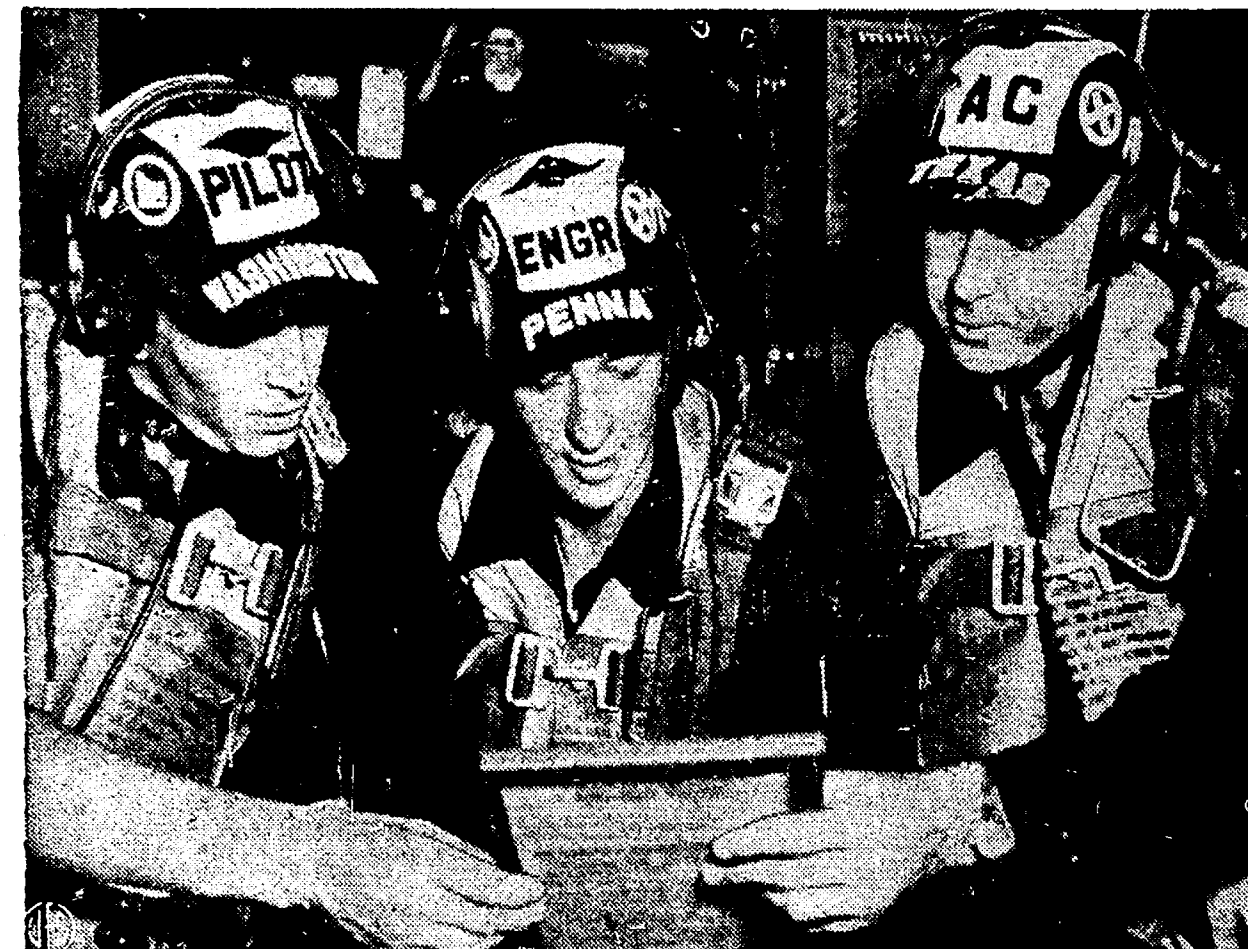

October Health Report Submitted

Sixty-one cases of communicable diseases were reported in the Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods area during October, according to a release by district health commissioner, Dr. Thomas S. Davies. Of this number, 59 were confined to four of the Pointe communities, Grosse Pointe Shores excepted.

Chicken pox had the highest incidence of all diseases reported. Thirty-nine cases were reported in three communities, Park, Farms and Woods. Grosse Pointe Park, which reported the greatest number of illnesses (42), had 35 of the chicken pox cases. Grosse Pointe Woods had three.

Second highest disease incidence was found in scarlet fever. A total of eight cases was reported in the Park, City and Woods. The Park had four cases; the Woods, three.

Grosse Pointe Woods followed the Park in reporting the greater number of communicable diseases (12) in a single community.

Other diseases in the district: bronchial pneumonia (1), mumps (2), mononucleosis (1), measles (1), gonorrhoea (1), amoebic dysentery (1), impetigo (1), pertussis (1), Weil's disease (1) and four cases of polio. Grosse Pointe Woods had two cases, and the Park and City reported one each.

The four new cases brought the 1952 polio count to 27. Nineteen of these were in the Pointe area.
