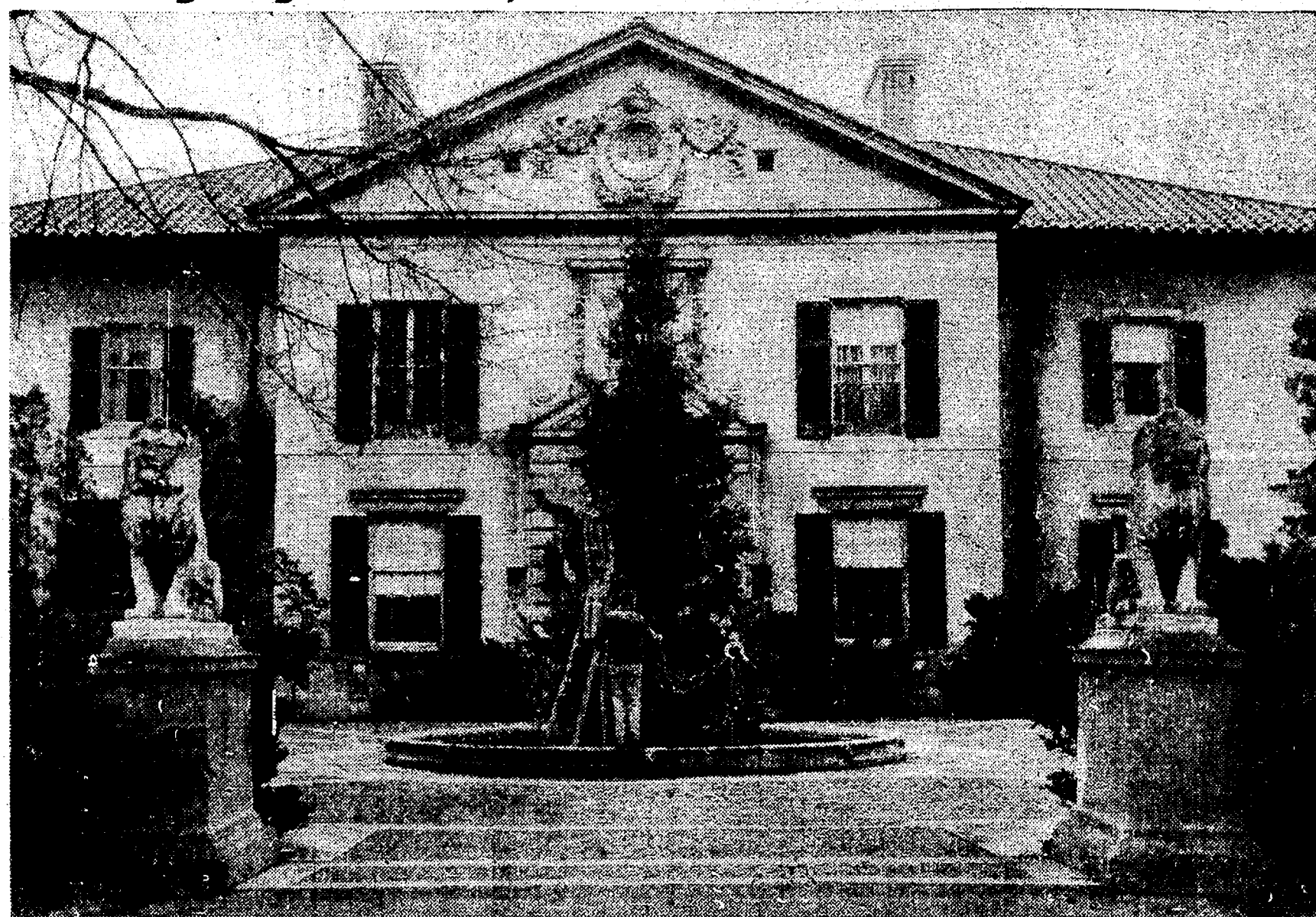

For the first time Grosse Pointe will have a community tree lighting ceremony at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center, 32 Lake Shore drive. The ceremony will take place from 7:30 to 8 p.m. on Tuesday night, December 23. The tree is centered in the circular driveway and will be but the introduction to the beautiful holiday decorations which will be found throughout the building proper. This event will be sponsored by the service clubs, Rotary, Kiwanis, Optimist and Exchange, which hold their luncheon or dinner meetings at the Center. ### Busy Thieves' Efforts Net But Pittance

Total of 50 Cents Missing After Three Places Are Entered; \$200 Overlooked

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### Pedestrian Hit By Car in Park

John Socia, aged 85, was rushed to Bon Secours Hospital, December 13, after being struck by an auto late in the evening at Hampton and Wayburn.

Socia, who lives at 1129 Wayburn, was hit when he stepped from the curb into the crosswalk as the car, driven by Norris Ouellette, Jr., of 1115 Nottingham, approached the intersection.

Ouellette told police that his accelerator had gotten stuck as he neared Hampton, and he had reached down in an attempt to fix it. When he looked up, he saw Socia in the street in front of him, slammed on his brakes and swerved to avoid him. Socia was knocked down by the left rear fender.

He was treated for lacerations of one hand and the bridge of his nose. X-rays revealed he had cracked some ribs. Park police ticketed Ouellette.

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### Woods Schedules Special Election For February 16

Voters Will Be Asked to Approve Increase in Pay for Councilmen and Mayor and Amendment on Publications

Wood voters will go to the polls in a special election on February 16, 1953, to cast their ballots on two proposed amendments to the city charter. The first amendment concerns an increase in compensation to the mayor and councilmen of \$350 per year for their services to the city.

Presently, the charter calls for a compensation not to exceed \$400 to each councilman, with an additional payment to the mayor of \$200.

**Would Get \$750 Per Year**  
The new proposal states that "each councilman and the mayor shall receive as compensation the sum of \$750 per year. The mayor shall, in addition, receive the sum of \$200 per year."

The second proposed amendment deals with the publication and recording of ordinances enacted by the council.

Registration for the special election by those who are not already registered will be received at the municipal offices through January 19, 1953.

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# Infantile Foundation Head Describes Long Polio Fight

The search for a vaccine against infantile paralysis has accelerated and it would be a tragic mistake to assume the race is won, Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, said Tuesday night.

Speaking at the Hotel Sheraton-Cadillac before Wayne County March of Dimes volunteers, editors, radio and TV representatives and City officials, doctors and educators, the leader of the March of Dimes declared that years of work financed by the American people had resulted in marked progress, but the desired

preventive for polio has not been found.

"The blood fraction, gamma globulin, used for years in measles, now has been proved effective as a temporary preventive of paralytic polio," he said. "However, we must bear in mind that gamma globulin, even if it were available in sufficient quantities, which it is not, is not the final answer to polio. What we seek eventually is a vaccine which once given, generally speaking, would protect indefinitely, later possibly requiring renewal or booster shots.

"Such a vaccine, should it be discovered, would be given long before the so-called season and would be more or less permanent or at least long-lasting in its effect."

Mr. O'Connor pointed out that development of techniques of polio immunization came about through a partnership of scientists with lay people, the public

### Christmas Fire Warning Issued

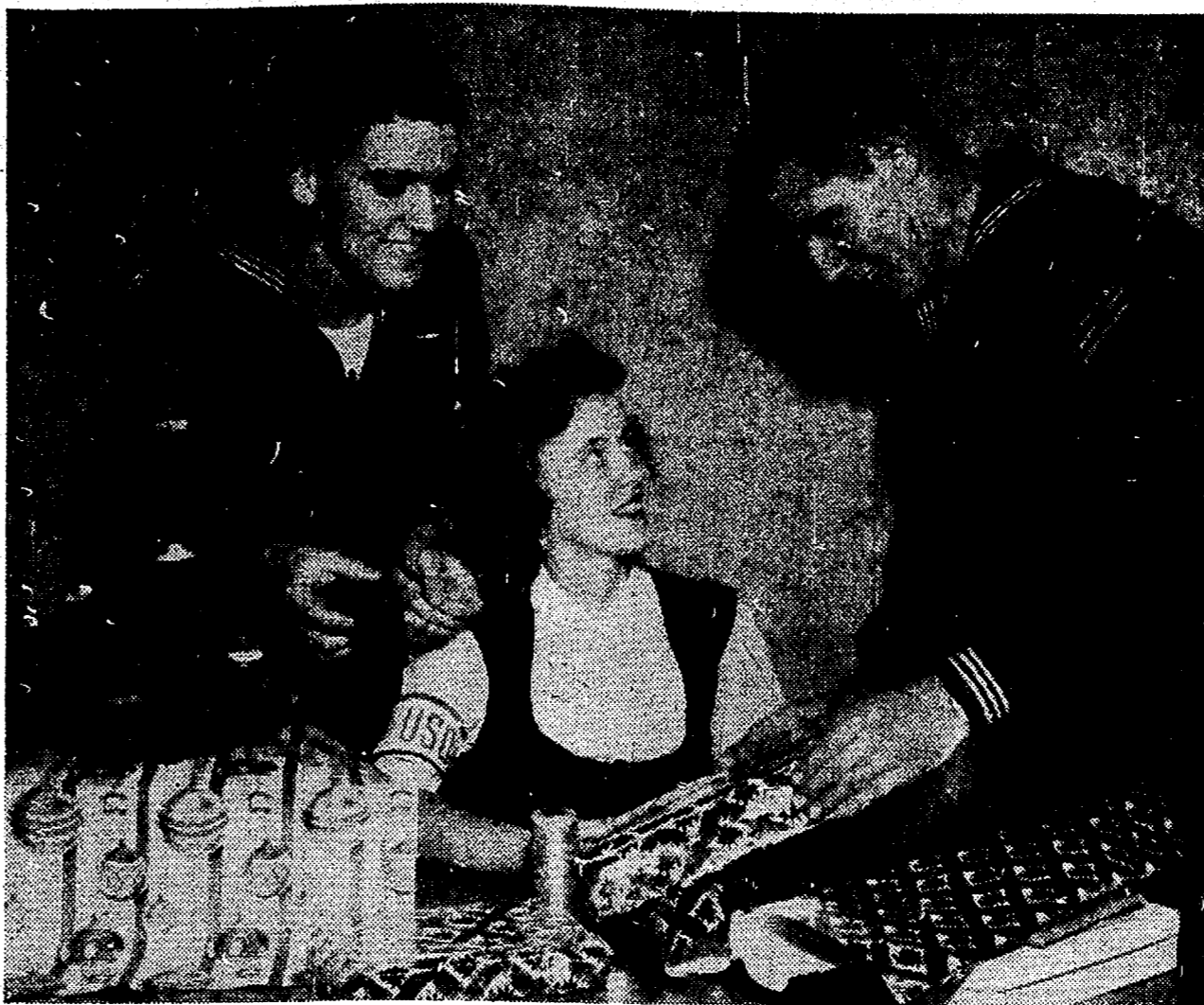
Fire Chief Edward L. Rector of Grosse Pointe Park, warns that combustible Christmas decorations introduce serious fire hazards during the current season, and asked local citizens to take extra precautions to avoid turning holiday cheer into grief and tragedy. Chief Rector recalled last year's tragic Christmas fire in Tijuana, Baja California, when 34 died and 98 were injured in a fire resulting from a blazing Christmas tree at the annual charity party for orphans and poor children. To prevent a similar disaster this year he urged that these safety rules be followed by any persons or organizations holding parties at home, school or church. 1. Don't locate the Christmas tree near any stairway or elevator shaft which would provide a draft. 2. The tree should not block a door or any exits. 3. An inspection of the tree should be made by someone in authority to determine whether the tree has dried out to the point that it should be removed. 4. Be sure plenty of ash trays are provided for smokers. Don't allow smoking near the Christmas tree. 5. Be sure that all decorations throughout the room have been flameproofed. 6. Avoid using net or gauze-like fabrics for dresses, costumes, or children's clothes. Loosely woven fabrics easily catch fire. 7. If loosely woven costumes have to be worn, they should be flameproofed, with the following solution: mix 9 ounces of Borax and 4 ounces of Boric Acid in a gallon of water. Dip the fabric into this solution, wring by hand, then hang to dry. This flameproofing method must be repeated after each laundering of the garment.

### James Kin Killed As Pole Crashes

Detroit Edison Co. lineman James Kin, 27, was killed December 9, when a 40-foot power pole in Warren Township toppled to the ground, crushing him. Kin had been working atop the pole, stripping dead wires that ran to another pole that had been taken out of service several months ago. Investigation by company officials disclosed that the pole, installed about 27 years ago, had rotted at the base. 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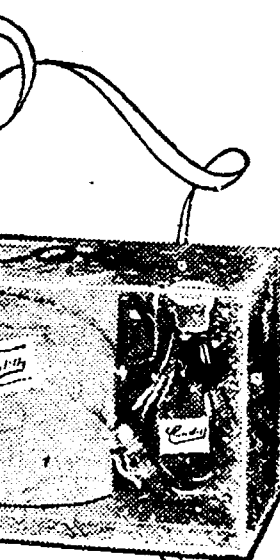
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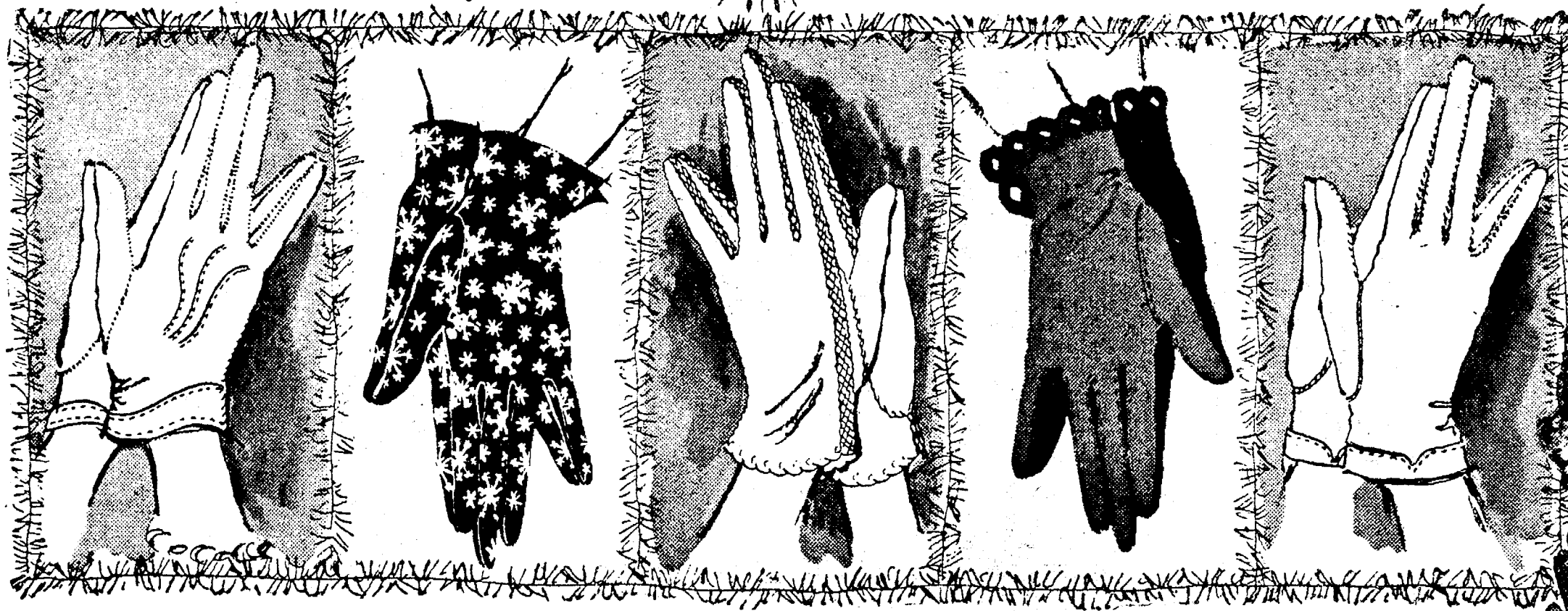

### Quintet Finishes Therapy Course

Mrs. Jane Bradley, 10585 Lanark; Mary Bryant, 687 University; Mrs. George Custer, 466 Calvin road, and Mrs. Carolyn Kidnie, 5224 Lodewyck, and Mrs. Lorraine Eldredge, 1156 Harvard road, were graduated from the second volunteer occupational therapy course, conducted by Wayne University and sponsored by the Central Volunteer Bureau of United Community Services. Volunteers who take the course conducted at the Detroit Memorial Hospital must pledge three hours per week of service to Detroit agencies, where they will work under the direction of registered occupational therapists for at least a year.

The 40-hour course is divided into eight hours of lecture on development and value of occupational therapy, institutions using the service, types of activity, hospital ethics and the role of the volunteer assistant in occupational therapy. Thirty-two hours are devoted to craft training in weaving, leatherwork, needlework, puppetry, ceramics, knots and braids, blockprinting and stenciling, use of salvaged material and other crafts.

The course runs for eight weeks. Thirty-three were graduated from the course.

The volunteers work in children's institutions with physically handicapped and ill children, with the adult ill and handi-

capped and in homes for older people.

The course is approved by the American Occupational Therapy Association.

### Learn to Cut Cost of Food

Holiday food costs may go zooming up in your family if you don't check your food buying habits carefully, warns Faye Kinder of the Michigan State College foods and nutrition department.

For instance, do you use reconstituted dry milk solids for some or all of the milk consumption in your family? If not, you are missing an opportunity to save money while providing your family with inexpensive milk. Do you take care to buy inexpensive fats such as lard for cooking?

When you are pondering in front of the meat counter, do a little mental calculation and figure how many servings a pound or piece of meat will make. Figure up mentally how much the meat or fish will cost per person.

Miss Kinder points out that buying in-season foods is wise. When fresh oranges are in abundant supply, buy them fresh and when not, buy canned or frozen orange juice. Following this suggestion will mean keeping track of plentiful and less expensive foods in your markets at all times of the year.

Be cautious about buying "ready-made" foods. The price paid for them includes a lot of service and packaging which lifts the price all out of proportion to the cost of the food itself. Finally, be alert to save even a few cents, stresses Miss Kinder. A few cents each time you go to market will amount to a pretty big sum by the end of the year.

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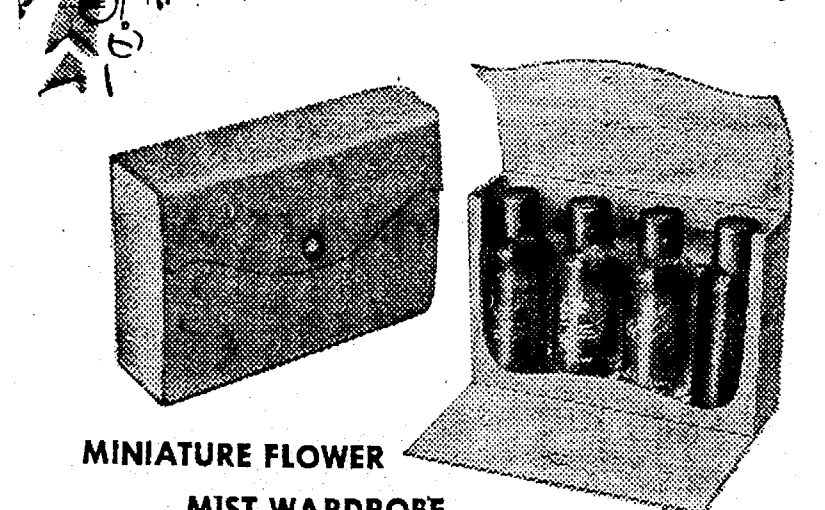


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### Choir Offers Yule Concert

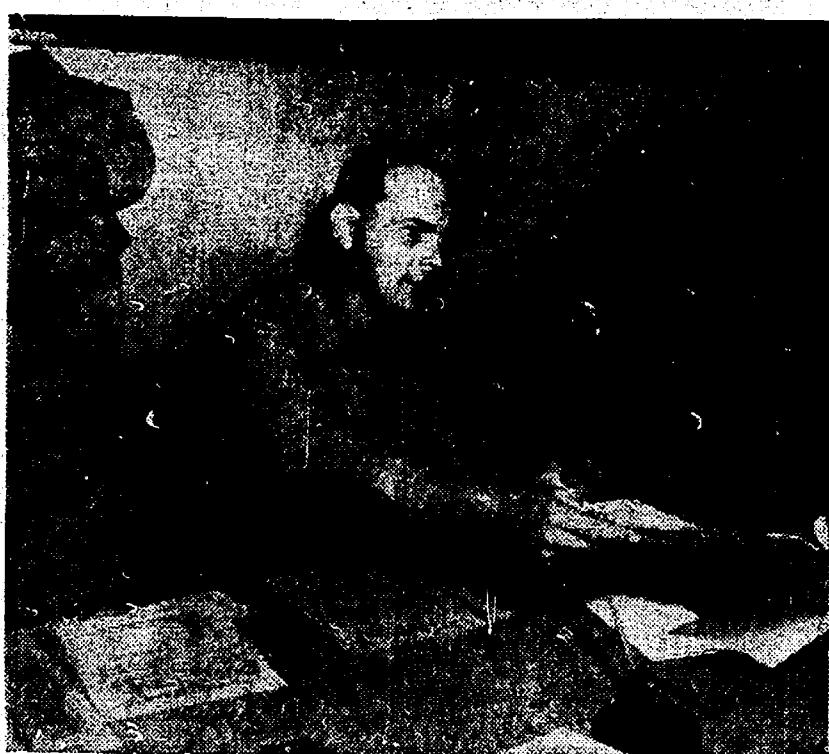

not only now but in the years to come.

**Tells of Survey**

He told of a survey made several years ago by experts from the University of Michigan, which showed that the Pointe as a whole has only about half as much space devoted to recreation as it should have for its population.

Mayor William Connolly stoutly defended the Farms in this respect and said that his city has much more recreation space than the other Pointes.

**Hearings Required**

Mayor Connolly and the council assured both Mr. Reuter and Mr. Messner that no steps would or could legally be taken with-

out public hearings on the proposals. Such hearings would have to be advertised in advance and all residents would be given a chance to state their views.

In keeping with the promise of council to the Board of Education, that the matter would be given serious thought and study, City Engineer Murray Smith produced several drawings he had made showing ideas that might be worked out for the re-routing of McMillan.

**Merely Keeping Faith**

It was also emphasized that

the creation of these drawings did not mean that the council is reconciled to such a plan, but merely that it is keeping faith in its promise to study the matter seriously. No official action was taken.

The Farms has already offered the Board of Education \$10,000 for a portion of the playground towards the Muir road end of the area, which could be tied in with the present municipal lot north of the alley in the rear of the Kercheval business district between McMillan and Muir roads.

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## Make Christmas Last All Year

The approach of Christmas seems a proper time to make a deep bow of respect and pass the praise to an organization which for a long, long time has been spreading the great salve of Christian charity throughout the entire year. We refer to the Grosse Pointe Lions Club which conducted its 28th annual Goodfellows' Newspaper Sale in the Pointe on Monday morning.

This is the one fund-raising activity the service organization conducts annually. Upon its success depends the amount of good work which may be carried on during the next 12 months. During the last 27 years the Pointe Goodfellows have collected in the neighborhood of \$80,000, practically all of which has been expended to brighten the lives of the unfortunate in this community and throughout the entire Metropolitan Detroit area.

There is a reserve fund which has been built up during the years against any sudden emergency which might arise, or to take care of unusual requests from worthy organizations which need help. For example, in 1950 the Lions Club here was able to appropriate \$5000 to Bon Secours Hospital to help that fine institution build a great new addition. During the present year it gave Cottage Hospital \$700 towards its building and furnishing fund in connection with the great expansion program now going on there.

The charity program of the Lions Club is widely diversified. One of the chief aims is to see that no Pointe home is entirely devoid of Christmas cheer. Among the largest expenditures from the Goodfellows' fund annually is that for Christmas baskets, for even a community so favored as this one does have needy families and homes that know privation. In addition to providing bountiful quantities of Christmas food, the Lions cooperate with the Toy Club to see that no child goes without the toys so vital to youngsters for a happy holiday.

But the good work of the Lions Club does not stop when the yule season has passed. The members keep in constant touch with the local and district welfare organizations and are ever alert to find places where their funds will do the most good.

During 1952 the money raised by newspaper sales was spent in many ways. The Christmas baskets cost \$1643. Deaf mute children were benefited to the extent of \$404. The club sent \$25 to help in the constant battle against tuberculosis. Emergency hospitalization for destitute people took another \$240 out of the charity fund.

The Lions contributed \$25 towards the Grosse Pointe Clean-Up campaign, aimed at making the community a more attractive place in which to live. They spent \$216 to buy a television set to bring entertainment to the poor unfortunates in the Wayne County General Hospital. The War Memorial Center here, which serves all the people, was given \$100.

The club recognizes the great work done by the Safety Patrol boys and girls in the schools and rewarded them by sending them to several baseball games. This cost \$195.

The Torch Drive was given \$400. A total of \$231 was spent to provide optical attention and glasses for those who could not afford to pay for them themselves. Boys' work took another \$150 and the service organization donated \$100 to the drive to get out the vote in this fall's election.

All of these services represent a total outlay of \$4,355 during 1952, made by one club to alleviate suffering, provide cheer where it is most needed and to contribute to the general good of the community and the area. It is a fine record.

We attended the weekly luncheon meeting of the club last Thursday and were interested in the spontaneous manner in which this organization goes about its charity. Present were Judge Carl Wiedeman and Judge Miles Culehan, who told of a project in which The Crisis Club, another organization to which they belong, has become active.

The Crisis Club learned of a source for obtaining Braille watches and figured it would be a fine thing to provide them for as many blind persons as possible. It has been learned there are 3,000 such persons in the Detroit area who would be grateful recipients. The watches are being distributed as fast as possible, but the project is naturally a costly one.

Judge Wiedeman hadn't finished his story before a motion was made and seconded that the Grosse Pointe Lions Club immediately send a check to the Crisis Club to pay for 20 of these watches. It was pointed out that Christmas would be the ideal time for distributing as many of these gifts as possible, and that there should be no delay.

The motion was not only carried unanimously but another one was made and carried, instructing the chairman of the charity committee to investigate this project further, and bring in a recommendation as to whether or not the club should make a heavier investment in this worthwhile cause.

The 1952 Lions Club Goodfellows' Newspaper Sale is now over and funds have been raised for another year. The club is grateful to all who make this program possible. They are especially grateful to the Pointe police and firemen who are such a large factor in the annual sales.

And the residents should be thankful that there are organizations like this one which make a business of spreading the Christmas spirit throughout the whole year.

If you have served on the program committee of any organization recently, you will be aware of the change in emphasis in program planning. Group participation and discussion are replacing the former method when a speaker talked and the audience merely listened.

Films are becoming increasingly popular as a springboard for group discussion but to find just the right one for a particular purpose has not always been easy. A plan for the appraisal and distribution of films which should meet this need has recently been worked out by the Film Council of America.

Representatives of all church groups, PTAs, clubs and other local organizations are cordially invited to attend.

Among the subjects to be covered during the coming months are Economic Education, Political Education, International Relations, Humanities, Health and Safety, Marriage and the Family, Child Development, Biography,

History, Travel, Children's Films, Religion and Ethics, Contemporary National Scene: Business and Industry, Civil Defense, Conservation, Sociology and Sports.

Through this program it will be possible for representatives of Grosse Pointe organizations to see the best in new films and to arrange for their later use by local groups. In addition the film collection of the Public Library is always available for organizational use.

Christmas Story Hours to which all boys and girls of school age are invited, will be held at all the Grosse Pointe Libraries.

At the Woods Branch, Christmas stories will be told at the regular story hour time, 3:45 Thursday, December 18. At the Main Library and the City Branch the Story Hours will be held Monday, December 22 at 10:30 a.m.

At long last we are able to make some statement regarding the closing of the City Branch and the opening of the new Central Library. The present Main Library—to be known now as the Park Branch—and the City Branch will both close December 31 at 5 p.m. The City Branch will not be reopened. The Park Branch will resume work again possibly some time during the following week.

A tentative date for the dedication of the Central Library is Sunday, January 25, and as planned now, it will be open for business Monday, January 26.

All the Grosse Pointe libraries will close both Christmas eve and New Years eve at 5 p.m.

This is not just a rush-hour occurrence. It happens at any time of the day. Because the Charlevoix-Woods bus immediately follows the Kercheval-Deanhurst it is assumed that the second bus will do.

One member of our family who is a nurse doing 12-hour private duty at one of the Grosse Pointe Farms residences south of Kercheval has had to resort to calling a taxi to get to and from work because the drivers won't stop. Her transportation cost per week by this method is \$15.50, no tips. (Distance traveled daily is approximately five miles, round trip.)

We would like to visit our friends and relatives lying in Cottage or Bon Secours Hospitals but how many times we've been ignored by the Kercheval-Deanhurst bus drivers!

Going to downtown Detroit or returning from Detroit, we Woods residents prefer to use and should use the Charlevoix-Woods bus. It was added to the route for our comfort and convenience and for this we are extremely grateful.

My suggestion? If we, "in the Woods" wave a hankie at the Kercheval-Deanhurst driver he should accept this as a signal that our destination is Kercheval Avenue or the area south of Kercheval Avenue. In this case a Charlevoix bus will not do.

This is not a personal matter but rather a community problem. Employers would be happy

if employees reported for duty on time. Employees would be happy if they had a convenient means of transportation upon which they could depend. Potential customers would take advantage of the excellent stores on Kercheval Avenue. Even our friends and relatives lying in the community hospitals would be delighted to see an expected visitor on time.

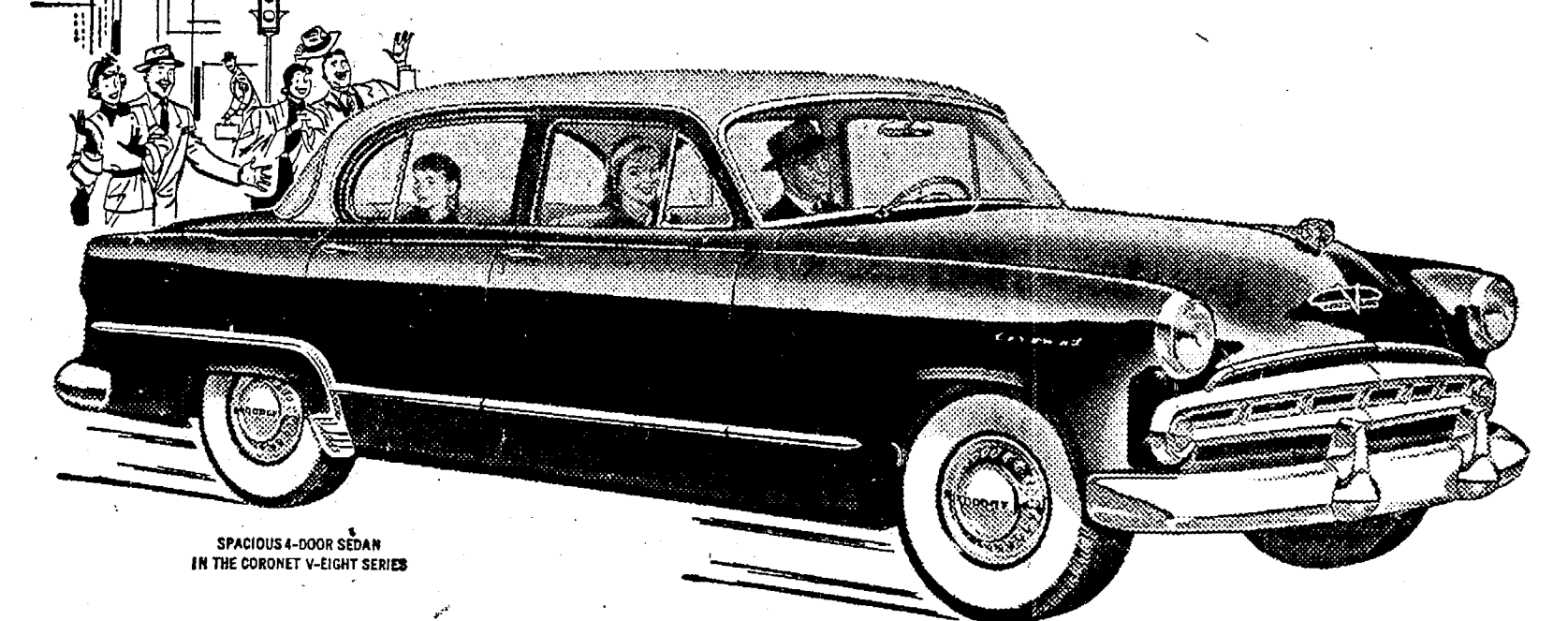

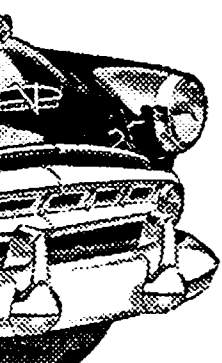

### Police Request Traffic Course

Establishment of a short course in police traffic handling as part of the law enforcement program at Michigan State College has been recommended by the safety and traffic and police training committees of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police.

The course would provide training in specific phases of traffic control, such as engineering accident prevention and investigation, public relations and information, driver licensing and allied subjects. It would be open to all municipal police and sheriffs' officers.

The safety and traffic committee also made the following additional recommendations for consideration of the association's executive committee:

Re-introduction of bills in the legislature to make it a violation of state law to block railroad crossings for an unreasonable length of time and to legalize the drunkometer test.

New legislation to establish a speed limit of 45 miles per hour for school buses, adopt the uniform traffic signal law, and to likewise authorize the appointment of driver license examiners other than police and sheriffs' officers.

The executive committee was urged to consider a re-study of the law pertaining to the failure to answer a traffic summons for the purpose of making it more workable. It was also asked to again survey the need for an increase in driver license fees, a proposal lost at the last session of the legislature.

It was suggested that a study be made of the provisions for issuing driver licenses to persons under 17 years of age so that there might be a better determination of those who could qualify.

These "ERB exams," as they are called, go out to schools all across the nation; more than 98,000 were distributed during the past year. Mr. Shover's report, which contains copious statistics, may be summarized by pointing out that three quarters of the tests taken by DUS and CDS students were in the two top quarters. Half of all tests taken were in the first quarter. The two schools surpassed the average performance of independent schools throughout the country.

The Junior and Senior Glee Clubs under the direction of Mr. Neale Stahl performed and the boys of the Lower School presented the play, "There Was One Who Gave a Lamb." Vandewalle attended the University of Detroit High School and the University of Detroit. He has a brother in the Navy stationed in Japan.

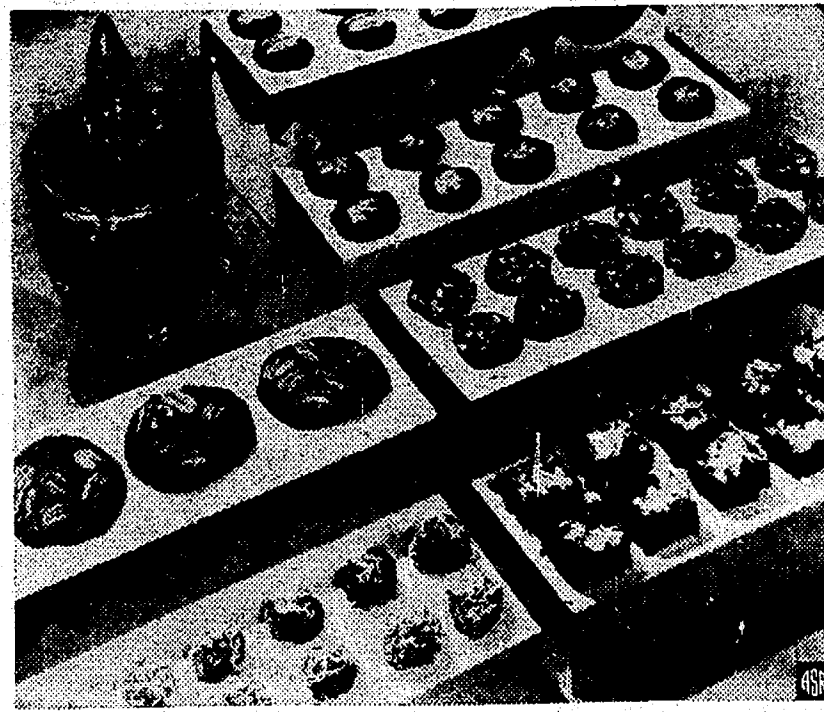

Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Remove from heat. Stir in milk and vanilla and mix until mixture is well blended. Turn into pan or shape in desired form. Allow to stand several hours. YIELD: Approximately 1 1/2 pounds.

**Chocolate Squares**—Turn mixture into an 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle with chopped nuts, press lightly. Cut into squares.

**Coconut Balls**—Shape into 1/2-inch balls, then roll into shredded coconut.

**Walnut Patties**—Shape into 1/2-inch balls, and press whole walnut or pecan in center.

**Pralines**—Measure 1 standard tablespoon of mixture. Place on a piece of waxed paper. Use another piece of waxed paper to place on top of pralines. Press with bottom of a water glass to make a 2-inch circle. Press pecans in surface.

**Chocolate Nut Roll**—Add 1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts to mixture. Divide mixture in half. Make two rolls about 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Lightly press roll into chopped nuts so that all area is covered. Allow to stand several hours; slice each roll in approximately 16 slices.

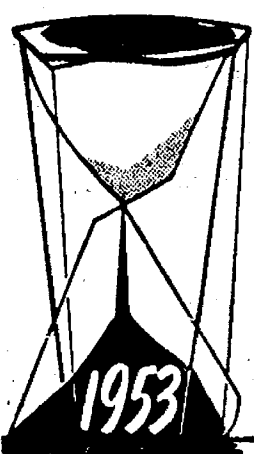

One of Michigan's largest industries, the tourist business annually brings into the state an estimated \$500,000,000.

The project will help the Council get better results for each advertising dollar expended and enable it to direct its promotional program to the most receptive readers.

The bureau's questionnaires also will attempt to find out what people do when they get to Michigan, how long they stay, where they stay, how much they travel within the state, how much they spend and their reasons for coming.

With the completion of the survey, the Tourist Council can do an even better job of promoting Michigan, which in turn will bring more vacationers to the state each year.

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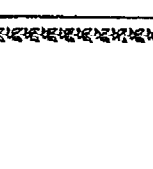

How does one get elected to the National Honor Society? How many graduating seniors are chosen, and what are the requirements? Is it true that one or two teachers can eliminate a student from the running?

The answer to the last question is emphatically no. It is impossible for only a few teachers to eliminate a student because of the way the students are selected.

The Charter of the National Honor Society permits Grosse Pointe High School to elect not more than 15 percent of each graduating class to the Honor Society.

All graduating students having a B or better average are listed alphabetically. This list is sent to all faculty members. The teachers rate only the students they know by a 1, 2, 3, 4, or 5 rating, in character, leadership, and service. The meanings of these numbers are: 1 - below average, 2 - somewhat below average, 3 - average, 4 - somewhat above average, and 5 - above average.

Any student having a final negative (1 or 2) rating in any single area is automatically eliminated from the race.

A total composite rating is then obtained for each student in each area.

During the student's high school years, a record of service projects is also kept by a student's counselor. This record, including all the extra-curricular activities the student engaged in from the 10B, is another determining fac-

tor in the election of students to the National Honor Society.

All these records and tabulations are included in a final composite rating in all of these fields. This final list of students is then arranged according to the composite rank with the highest first and so on down the line.

The upper 15 percent of the whole class is then chosen from this composite list of B average students. In case of a tie at the bottom of the 15 percent, the next highest or tying student may be elected also.

The selection of graduating students to the National Honor Society is done on a purely competitive basis within the graduating class, and the results are tabulated not by personal opinion but by mathematical computation.

The standards for election to the National Honor Society have remained the same throughout the years.

### Holiday Suppers Best if Simple

Holiday suppers can be fun and easy if you employ a little strategy, says Faye Kinder of the Michigan State College foods and nutrition department.

Make it simple! That is the keynote of Miss Kinder's recommendations. Plan to serve buffet style and when the guests ask to help—let them. They will feel more a part of the party and you will get less flustered. The buffet service will save dishes and linen, too.

The real secret is to plan a menu that can be prepared—at least in part—a day or so in advance. Miss Kinder suggests molded gelatine salads with either fruit or vegetables and ice box desserts such as chiffon pies or filled angel food cakes. On the day-before list you could also include cooking shrimps or fowl for casserole dishes and getting most of the items for the relish tray ready. But Miss Kinder cautions against overdoing the early preparations that might end in soggy or dried out foods.

Here is a suggested menu: Ham loaf, au gratin potatoes, jellied fruit mold, relish plate, rolls, coffee and angel food cake filled and iced with chocolate whipped cream. In the menu the salad and dessert could be prepared the day before and also a relish plate that included celery sticks, carrot sticks, radishes, cucumber fingers and green pepper sticks.

### MAYAN HOMEMAKER

Woman was the homemaker in the Hayan Civilization in Central America (about 3500 B.C.-1499 A.D.). It was she who prepared and cooked the maize. It was she who shelled the ear, placed the grains in a solution of lime and water over night, cleaned and ground them between rubbing-stones in the morning, and baked the maize meal into round cakes. It was she who invented new maize dishes and combined the meal with meat, beans, or calabash seeds. The Mayas also raised sweet potatoes, tomatoes, squashes, and beans, and had plums and pears for fruit. For meat, they hunted the wild boar and deer, raised a breed of dogs for eating, tamed the wild turkey or kept herds of deer. On ceremonial occasions they used a drink called balche, made from honey of a stingless bee, kept in long wooden tubes as hives; but their favorite beverage was cocoa, spiced with chili.

### CHINESE ETIQUETTE

Dinners in Ancient China began with fruit and sweets and ended with soup and rice. Knives and forks were not used in China. Instead, the people were remarkably skilled in the use of "chop sticks" held between the thumb and fingers of the right hand, which conveyed to the mouth food already cut into small pieces. There were many rules of etiquette, and to place the chopsticks across the top of the bowl meant that the guest wished to leave. The Chinese considered knives and forks barbaric. "We sit at table to eat," they said, "not to cut up carcasses." Cooking was already a fine art, and a banquet was not complete without the "five flavors," the sweet and sour, the salty and spicy, and the bitter.

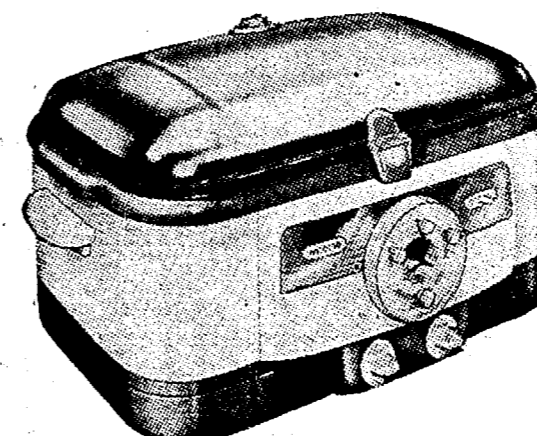

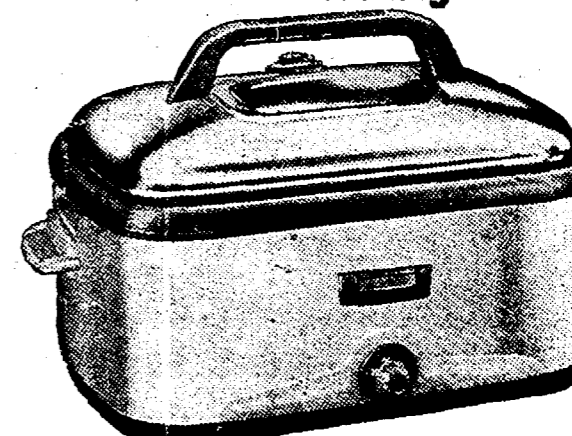

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# "Stretch" Johnson Big Star As Devil Cagers Take Two

It was a "lucky day" for Grosse Pointe High when Dave "Stretch" Johnson transferred from Indianapolis last Fall and accepted Coach Howard MacAdam's invitation to try out for the Devils cage squad. Johnson was a BIG question mark and the only thing MacAdam knew about him was that he played basketball in Indiana and that he stood six feet five inches in his basketball shoes.

Since the season began Johnson has gained a huge and loyal following among the students at Grosse Pointe High.

In the first two games of the season Johnson suffered from first game jitters because he was anxious to make good. However, the jitters have long since disappeared and in two games last week he was the star in two resounding Blue Devil victories that extended the Pointers' current winning streak to four games in as many starts.

Coupling his efforts with guard Dave Terris, who notched 13 points, Johnson poured in 14 points against a GOOD Mount Clemens quintet to pace the Devils to a thrilling 56 to 53 victory on the Bathers' home court on Tuesday, December 9.

**Had Beaten Pontiac**  
The win carried much significance, because the Bathers had scored a surprising 47 to 44 upset victory over Pontiac, which is always a basketball power year in and year out.

Three nights later Johnson led the Devils to their first Border Cities League victory, which was at the expense of a veteran Royal Oak quintet, 58 to 46, on the Devil's home court on Friday, December 12.

In this game Johnson chalked up 23 points besides turning in a handy defensive game at his pivot position.

This victory was a sweet revenge. The Acorns boasted two straight victories over the Devils, both last year when the Pointers were without their new "bean pole" center. Only one other team in the league held that distinction, that being Highland Park which became State Class A champion last year. The Polar Bears still have to be beaten by a Blue Devil team after five starts.

**Almost Threw Chances**  
In the Mount Clemens game the Devils jeopardized their chances of winning right at the opening whistle when they exhibited some plain and sloppy ball handling. But a good defensive job held the Bathers in check until the Pointers rallied their forces and worked out a five point lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Bathers became desperate toward the game's end and began hitting unanny shots that you wouldn't believe unless you saw them, and pulled within 3 points of a tie with a little more than a minute remaining. The Devils the successfully stalled out the clock.

The Royal Oak game was an entirely different picture. The Acorns coach once again made the mistake of trying to make a zone defense work against the

Blue Devils. This was to the liking of guard Johnny "Tweedle Dee" Diccico who began popping long shots from way out which put the Pointers in a narrow lead at the end of the first quarter, 16 to 13. The Devils, thanks to Johnson and Diccico, upped the Devil margin at halftime to 27 to 23 and from there on in it was the Pointers' ball game all the way.

"Long Jaw" Smith was a marked man, and that coupled with the fact that he just couldn't make the ball wrinkle the nets for more than six points kept the Pointers' score down. Smith had the misfortune of having several of his shots rim the basket and then pop out.

Jerry "Bulldog" Goebel, recently selected on the Detroit News All-State Class A football team as center, played just the last half and was plagued with bad luck on his shots also. Lou "Tweedle Dum" Hribar got into the game just long enough to add six points to the Pointers' cause.

Actually, Johnson broke the Acorns' shell in the very first quarter when he hit seven of his first eleven shots and with Diccico's long shots finding their mark Royal Oak switched to a man-to-man defense for the remainder of the contest.

The Pointers made good on six of 14 foul attempts and Royal Oak had about the same percentage, making good on 12 of 27 tries.

**Share League Lead**  
The victory gave the Pointers a share of first place in the Border Cities League along with Fordson, who whipped Wyandotte, 47 to 33, and Highland Park, who humbled Monroe, 74 to 31, on the same night.

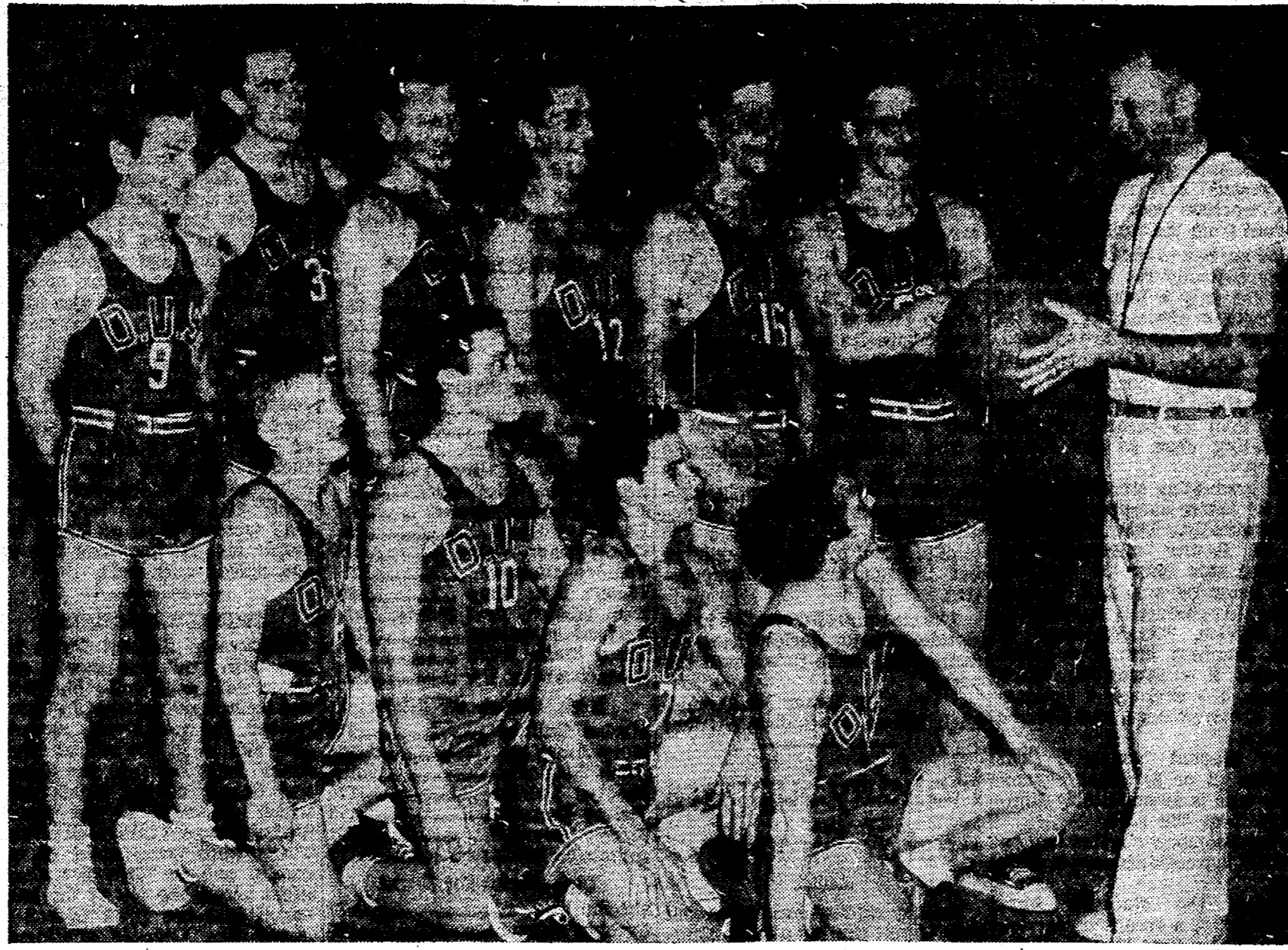
The Devils will tackle the Fordson Tractors on the local court on Friday, December 19, before taking on the Grosse Pointe Alumni in the annual holiday contest.

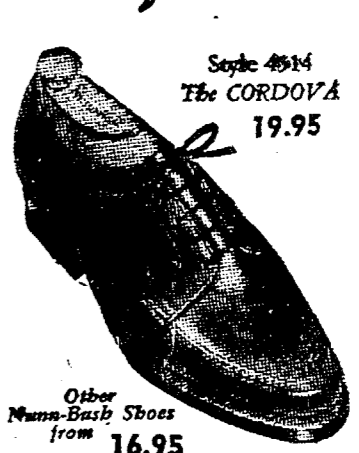
**Fredal Injured**

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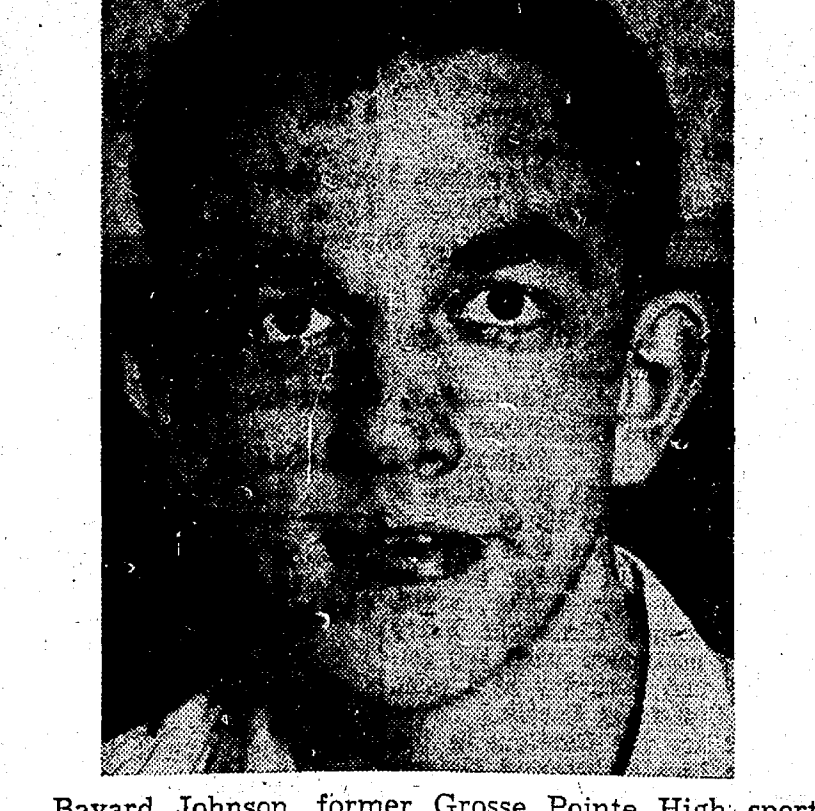



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

The Sampson station wagons roll into the ranch for a 24 hour visit. That night, the Crosbys enjoy a Sampson-cooked barbecue around a big camp fire. Bing's household provides home baked cakes and gallons of ice cream at the end of the barbecue and then the whole group settles down for a sing fest.

**Visit With Bing Next**  
Bing and the boys sing and the girls from the Pointe entertain the Crosbys.

They've toured the ranch with the boys who point out the landmarks; they've watched cattle being slaughtered; and they've listened to Bing's library of his own records, many of which never have been published.

**Cooking A Hobby**  
Except for a few hotel meals, and those times when they are entertained at luncheons and dinners, the Chet Sampson travelers enjoy home-cooked fare. A student majoring in the hotel and restaurant school of Michigan State College is hired for just this purpose.

And Chet's other interest (of course you realize travel comes first, he's recently opened his own travel bureau on the main floor of Jacobson's) is cooking.

His are the pies, cakes and hot breads to be found on the menus, all neatly typed so anxious mamas and papas can see nutrition was well remembered.

We picked one at random: breakfast—fresh grapes, cereal, sausage, bacon and eggs and milk; lunch—baked ham, fried potatoes, lettuce salad, coconut pudding, fruit juice punch; dinner—roast beef, mashed potatoes

and gravy, fresh kernel corn, cream cheese nut roll and peach salad, banana cream pie.

### Cook In Trailer

No one drinks tea or coffee and appetites are inspired since there's no in-between nibbling. The tightly planned travel schedule wouldn't permit it.

The people along the way, who now await the familiar station wagon caravan each Summer and Autumn, may not realize that Chet has not only 57 girls or boys on the trip, but five or six dozen cinnamon buns raising in the end trailer!

They stop for all meals—in national parks, sometimes just at the side of the road. The divided tops of the trailers come off and, presto, become bridge tables for hungry travelers.

Each trip (the girls go just after school's out and the boys' trip is taken in late Summer) covers 8000 miles and occupies five and a half weeks.
