


"Years ago when we had 23,000 cases I used to say 'I don't know what we will ever do if we get 60,000 cases.' Well, we'll be pretty near that point this year, unfortunately—upwards of 55,000 cases. This past summer has broken all rules and regulations about polio. The March of Dimes gave' assistance to some 90,000 patients, 46,000 of them stricken

in previous years. This January we shall have a carry-over caseload of 58,000 cases, plus whatever cases occur during 1953." Strides have been made in patient care, too, he reported, largely through cooperation among




Detroit Edison Co. lineman James Kin, 27, was killed December 9, when a 40-foot power pole in Warren Township toppled to the ground, crushing him.

> A chest X-ray is the most important method used to discover tuberculosis in the early stages. The Department of Health maintains a permanent chest X-ray

center at 3125 Hastings Street to X-ray people who live in the area inside the Boulevard, where tuberculosis is highest, and a mobile unit to provide service in certain selected plants and neighborhoods where the need is greatest. The department also X-rays everyone employed as a foodhandler in Detroit.

For the last 15 months a program of BCG vaccination against tuberculosis has been carried on by the Department of Health. This supplements present methods of early diagnosis and hospital care. Make sure you are free from

tuberculosis by having your chest X-rayed between now and the 24. There will be no waiting and chest X-rays are now taken without the need for removing clothing.



Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Remove from heat. Stir in milk and vanilla and mix until mixture is well blended. Turn into pan or shape in desired form. Allow to stand several hours. YIELD: Approximately 14 pounds.

Chocolate Squares-Turn mixture into an 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle with chopped nuts, press lightly. Cut into squares.

Coconut Balls-Shape into 34-inch balls, then roll into shredded coconut. Walnut Patties-Shape into 34-inch balls, and press whole walnut or pecan in center.

Pralines-Measure 1 standard tablespoon of mixture. Place on a piece of waxed paper. Use another piece of waxed paper to place on top of pralines. Press with bottom of a water glass to make a 2-inch circle. Press pecans in surface.

Chocolate Nut Roll-Add 1/2 cup coarsely chopped nuts to mixture. Divide mixture in half. Make two rolls about 11/2 inches in diameter. Lightly press roll into chopped nuts so that all area is covered. Allow to stand several hours; slice each roll in approximately 16 slices.
